#### Ask Rusty - I have Medicare Advantage - Why is a **Medicare premium deducted from my Social Security?**

Dear Rusty: My wife and I have a Medicare Advantage Plan, and we do not use Medicare for our claims. However, we still have the Medicare premium deducted from our Social Security checks. Is this correct? **Signed: Wondering** 

#### **Dear Wondering:**

If, after age 65, you choose to take Medicare outpatient coverage of any kind you must pay that Part B premium, even if you decide to acquire a Medicare Advantage plan instead of using "original Medicare" to administer your healthcare claims.

Medicare Advantage plans (often referred to as Medicare "Part C") are healthcare plans offered by private insurers who will administer your healthcare claims instead of the Federal Government. But you cannot get a Medicare Advantage plan without first being enrolled in Medicare Part A (inpatient hospitalization coverage) and

#### Can 'adaptogens" relieve stresses from COVID-19?

The world has been in a state of extreme stress for nearly two years now since the breakout of the COVID pandemic. Sadly, there appears to be no end in sight. We may not be able to do anything about the cause but, perhaps, there is a way to deal with the effects by adapting to the stressors, not in a psychological way; rather by ingesting aptly named herbal medicines called adaptogens. Of course, before you begin self-medicating, whether the drug is a natural medication or a chemical-based medicine, it's important that you consult your healthcare provider.

Lest you think somebody came up with the "adaptogens" moniker to mask a 21st Century version of snake oil, think again. Or, at least, consider how the experts at the National Institutes of Health came to the conclusion that they might just be what the doctor orders in dealing with stress: "Adaptogens were initially defined as

Part B (coverage for outpatient services) and paying any associated Part B (and perhaps Part A)

As you know, you pay a low premium (or perhaps no premium) for your Medicare Advantage plan. That's because the Part B premium you are now paying from your Social Security is actually going to your Medicare Advantage plan provider, enabling them to offer you equivalent coverage at little or no additional cost. Some Medicare Advantage plans even provide added coverage which Medicare Part B doesn't, such as dental and vision and, sometimes, prescription drug coverage. If that all sounds enticing, remember that Medicare Advantage plans usually also include restrictions on which medical service providers you can use, unlike "original Medicare" which permits you to use any medical service provider who accepts Medicare (nearly all).

So, when you see or hear a Medicare Advantage provider advertising "no cost" or "very low cost" coverage, recognize that they can offer that only

The National Institute on Aging [NIA] recommends that you take it slow at first. You don't want to overdo it. Over-exercising – particularly at the outset - can make you want to quit, or worse, cause injury.

- Begin your exercise program slowly with low-intensity exercises.
- Warm up before exercising and cool down afterward.
- Pay attention to your surroundings when exercising outdoors.
- Drink water before, during,





#### WWS talks to families about district-wide mask mandate

Below is a message that Dr. Paul A. Kaiser, Superintendent of Schools, sent to WWS families about the district-wide mask mandate and what families should expect moving forward.

"Rocks families, In accordance with our current COVID-19 protocols announced on November 8, since all but two schools (Monon Trail Elementary and Westfield Intermediate School) went above the 1.75 percent threshold of positive cases, starting tomorrow, Friday, January 7, masks or face coverings will be mandatory at all Westfield **Washington Schools** buildings for all before, during and after school activities - including BAC, TOTS and All-Aboard. Masks will remain highly recommended for spectators of all sporting events. We will remain in a district-wide mask mandate until all nine schools simultaneously have a positivity rate below 1 percent. Per federal mandate, masks will continue to be mandatory on school buses.

We will continue to conduct contact tracing and notifying families if their

child has been exposed to someone who tested positive for COVID-19. In masked situations, close contacts do not have to quarantine as long as they do not show symptoms. In unmasked situations, like lunch, close contacts will need to quarantine, regardless of showing symptoms or not, unless they are fully vaccinated or have had COVID-19 in the past 90 days. With this update in masking protocol, any student who needs to quarantine or isolate due to COVID-19 may return to school on day 6, regardless of vaccination status.

Other mitigation measures -- including regular sanitization, promoting hand-washing, monitoring of symptoms, cohorting and distancing -- will continue as well, when appropriate and available.





### USDA announces increased funding to support healthy school meals to kids

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack has announced an adjustment in school meal reimbursements to help schools continue to serve children healthy and nutritious meals. This move will put an estimated \$750 million more into school meal programs across the nation this year, making sure federal reimbursements keep pace with food and operational costs, while ensuring children continue to receive healthy meals at school.

'USDA understands that balancing the pressures of the pandemic with the need to feed children healthy and nutritious meals continue to be a priority for schools across the country," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "The Biden-Harris Administration is doing everything we can and these higher meal reimbursements will help allow school meal programs to continue meeting their mission of giving children the nourishment they need to grow, learn,

School lunch reimbursement rates usually do not increase during the school year. However, this year, due to the pandemic, USDA allowed schools to benefit from the highest rates available, which are normally reserved for the USDA Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). By law, these summer rates adjust for inflation annually in January.

This adjustment is welltimed to ensure the purchasing power of schools keeps pace with the cost of living. Schools receiving these reimbursement rates can stretch their operating budgets further during these tough times, while giving families fewer meal expenses to worry about each school day.

At the start of the 2021-2022 school year, the SFSP lunch reimbursement rate for participating schools was already 15% higher than the standard reimbursement for a free lunch. Now, because of higher food costs and other



circumstances, schools will receive an additional 25 cents per lunch. Taken together, schools are receiving 22% more for school lunches than they would under normal conditions.

This action is part of USDA and the Biden-Harris Administration's joint effort to ensure school meal programs are strong and have the assistance they need to navigate current challenges. This year's upward adjustment will add to the range of flexibilities, resources and hands-on support USDA has provided to school meals, which has included:

• Providing \$1 billion for schools to buy food for their meal programs and another \$300 million for states to purchase 100%

American-grown foods to be distributed to schools;

• Awarding up to \$200 million to states for purchases of domestic local foods for distribution to schools, through the new Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement

 Ensuring schools are not penalized if they cannot meet meal standards due to supply chain issues;

 Issuing and extending 14 nationwide waivers that allowed schools to run more flexible meal programs and serve free meals to all students, including relaxing meal pattern requirements, allowing parent/guardian pick-up of meals, and permitting meal service outside of the typically required group settings and meal times;

 Reimbursing local child nutrition program operators for emergency operating costs during the early months of the pandemic due to COVID-19 related restrictions and closures;

• Publishing new edu-

cational resources to help schools plan and serve meals, including a new set centered around the theme of Planning for a Dynamic School Environment, aimed at helping schools leverage current flexibilities;

 Ensuring schools and their partners understand complementary options for feeding children both in and out-of-school, such as the Child and Adult Care Food Program's (CACFP) At-Risk Afterschool Program and "grab 'n' go" meals for children during remote or hybrid learning, student quarantines, and school closures;

• Providing Pandemic EBT benefits to children attending schools participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) via virtual learning or a hybrid model.

#### Rokita: Liberty hangs in the balance as U.S. Supreme Court hears arguments on Biden's mandates

Attorney General Todd Rokita pledged to continue defending personal freedoms as the U.S. Supreme Court today prepares to hear oral arguments on two of President Joe Biden's COVID-19 vaccine mandates.

"In a free republic, the protection of individual liberty must be a priority," Attorney General Rokita said. "The federal government's overreach through vaccine mandates threatens our country's foundation. Truly, Hoosiers' liberty hangs in the balance as the Supreme Court deliberates over these important constitutional issues."

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear oral arguments over two separate vaccine mandates. One of those is an Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) rule requiring vaccination or weekly testing of workers at large employers. Attorney General Rokita's lawsuit challenging this

OSHA vaccine mandate was consolidated with other similar suits and is part of what is being heard today. The other vaccine mandate that will be heard is a Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) rule requiring vaccination of all staff at all Medicare and Medicaid providers. Attorney General Rokita filed suit to stop this government overreach.

Attorney General Rokita has filed four separate lawsuits against the Biden administration over its draconian vaccine mandates. In addition to lawsuits over the OSHA and CMS mandates, he also has filed lawsuits over 1) a vaccine mandate for federal contractors and 2) a mandate requiring masks for children as young as 2 years old and vaccines for staff and volunteers at childcare programs receiving Head Start funds.

All these lawsuits have borne positive results.

A federal appeals court

initially prevented the OSHA mandate from going into effect. Although another federal appeals court subsequently lifted that ruling, the Supreme Court now has the opportunity to chart the correct course.

In Indiana, the federal vaccine mandates for Medicare/Medicaid providers and Head Start facilities are not in effect thanks to the lawsuits filed by Attorney General Rokita and likeminded attorneys general in

other states. Indiana has also secured an injunction against the federal contractor mandate, but the court limited that injunction to the State of Indiana's contracts.

"Hoosiers can rest assured we will keep working to protect their constitutional freedoms," Attorney General Rokita said. "This fight against gross federal overreach is one we absolutely must win, and we will not rest until we prevail on behalf of liberty."

that adaptogens exert an anti-fatigue effect that increases mental work capacity against a background of stress and fatigue, particularly in tolerance to mental exhaustion and enhanced attention."

In other words, adaptogens are not some new concoction. In fact, its origins date back thousands of years and "is a traditional herbal medicinal product consisting of a fixed combination of [plant] extracts." And, according to the Healthline Website, they can increase your resistance to stress, help you deal with exhausting situations and, as a bonus, they may also help you deal with weight gain.

Leslie Korn, PhD, a Harvard Medical School-trained traumatologist, was consulted on the use of adaptogens for the Healthline report and she says that they can enhance our "ability to come into balance" - a condition that the Mayo Clinic describes this way: "Balance problems can make you feel dizzy, as if the room is spinning, unsteady, or lightheaded. You might feel as if the room is spinning or you're going to fall down."

The Healthline report provides an example of how adaptogens work. "When we face a stressor, whether physical or mental, our bodies go through what's called general adaptation syndrome (GAS). GAS is a three-stage response: alarm, resistance, and exhaustion. Adaptogens help us stay in the resistance phase longer, via a stimulating effect that holds off the exhaustion. Instead of crashing in the midst of a stressful moment, task, or event, we attain equilibrium and can soldier on." The report goes on to suggests that you




