


FACES of **HAMILTON COUNTY**

What makes Les Reinhardt smile? "The creative arts," said the 41-year-old Fishers resident. She is executive director of Fishers Arts Council and operations manager for Nickel Plate Arts in Noblesville. She joined the Fishers Arts Council board in 2018 as treasurer: it's been an all-volunteer group since 2005. "We made a vote at the end of 2020 to have an executive director position for five (paid) hours a week. Because of the amount of volunteer time I was putting in, they voted to have me be in that position." At Nickel Plate Arts, where she works 20 hours per week, she facilitates gallery spaces in Noblesville, Fishers, Meyer Najem (Construction) Gallery, Four Day Ray Brewing and a nonprofit wing of Hub & Spoke community center. She is a member of Actors Equity Association and is a Union Stage Manager. She has been married for 19 years and has a 9-year-old son. "We moved to Hamilton County (when her son was 5) because of the schools." She manages Fishers Arts Council's social media, website, events and does grant writing. For Nickel Plate Arts, she manages gallery space and keeps the calendar going. She was found in summer 2021 managing the Fishers Arts Council's artist reception for Hamilton County Artists' Association and Craig Ogden artwork at Fishers City Hall. In his day, Foland was kind of a rock star in the auction world, selling land in 87 of Indiana's 92 counties, as well as 19 other states.


Before I get into that, though, I want to elaborate on what I said last week about the honorary title of "Colonel," in case you aren't any more familiar

Through INTAP, eligible small businesses may apply to receive up to \$15,000 in professional services from a qualified vendor to complete growth and improvement projects that require specialized assistance or technical expertise such as app or technology development, intellectual property legal assistance and grant writing assistance for the Small **Business Innovation** Research and Small **Business Technology** Transfer (SBIR/ STTR) programs. The program is administered in partnership with **Ivy Tech Community** College Bloomington's

Cook Center for Entrepreneurship, which houses the South Central Indiana SBDC regional office.


INTAP has assisted 128 businesses with completing projects since the program was launched in 2017, 68 of which were completed in 2021. To be eligible for INTAP, Indiana small businesses must meet the following criteria:

- Be or become an Indiana SBDC client,
- Have a physical presence in Indiana,
- Use a vendor physically located in Indiana, • Be able to complete
- the project within five months and before Dec. 31, 2022.
- Be an eligible project type, and
- Be able to demonstrate a positive impact after completion, including but not limited to new job creation, increased production or sales, or new market expansion. Indiana companies are encouraged to learn more about eligibility requirements and submit applications online.



The orchestra - a resident company of the Palladium at The Center for the Performing Arts - is in the middle of its 2021-22 season. In the interest of safety for all, five upcoming concert dates are being postponed:

- Family Fun Concert, Sunday, January 23
- Masterworks 3 with the Harlem String Quartet, Saturday, February 12
- Beethoven Lives Upstairs: A Classical Kids Live! Event, Saturday, February 19
- Pops Concert: Serpentine Fire - the Music of Earth, Wind & Fire, Saturday, February 26
- Side-by-Side Concert with Fishers High School featuring CSO Young Artist Competition winner Abigail Ko, Sunday, March 6.

"Three of the affected concerts are our family concerts," stated Robert Schlegel III, Chairman of the CSO Board of Directors. "Normally, at Family Fun and Side-by-Side, young people are actually on the stage with our musicians, literally side-by-side with them. With the current COVID surge, and with so few among the younger age groups vaccinated, or even able to be vaccinated, our board determined that this probably isn't the best thing to be doing at

"Hopefully, the peak of this particular surge will be reached over the next month or so, and by the time we resume our concerts, we'll be on the down side of Omicron,' Schlegel added.

Masterworks 4 on Saturday, March 12, and Masterworks 5 with guest artist Edgar Meyer on Saturday, April 23 will be CSO's next concerts, both at the Palladium at 7:30 pm. The Family Fun concert, originally set for January 23, has been rescheduled for Saturday, May 14, 3 pm at

the Palladium. The other concerts affected by the temporary pause, including Serpentine Fire: the Music of Earth, Wind and Fire, will be booked for the 2022-23 season.


Cara Pittenger, CSO Executive Director, says a ticket refund policy has been put into place. The CSO's 46th season got off to a rousing start back in early September when the orchestra teamed with Hamilton County Parks to present Classical Mystery Tour: the Music of The Beatles in front of a 1600-person capacity audience outdoors at Coxhall Gardens' Centerpiece amphitheater. That concert was followed a week later by a Symphony Uncorked performance at Martinsville's Cedar Creek Winery. The season made its way to the Palladium stage in early October with the orchestra's Masterworks 1 program with guest artist Orion Weiss. A Masterworks 2 performance at the Palladium followed in early November, and two well-attended Holiday Pops concerts with Hoosier singer/songwriter Jon McLaughlin were presented in mid-December at Westfield High School Auditorium.

The new year kicked off January 8 with a Palladium-based CSO Pops Concert with guest artist, the great jazz trumpeter Byron Stripling.

"During our temporary absence from the stage, we invite our fans to keep in-touch and up-to-date on orchestra activities via our website (CarmelSymphony.org), our e-blasts and through postings to our social media platforms," said Pittenger.

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Music Academy in Fishers. The show - a comedy of manners set in a single dining room where 18 scenes from different households overlap -- opens on Friday and continues for two weekends, a total of eight performances, through Jan. 30. Tickets are still available.

It's Wilson's first time directing a show for The Belfry Theatre, a Noblesville community theater in its 57th season.

Besides being a play that "fit" the theater venue, she thought back through the years of attending performances and remembered "The Dining Room" as being one play that she wanted to direct someday because it looked to be a challenge.

"The Dining Room" has a small cast of seven who portray 60 characters over four decades, use more than 200 props and wear more than 150 pieces of clothing and nearly 30 different wigs.

"And, of course, I like the show," she said.

For a moment, let's talk about these 200 props and all of these dining room set pieces

"Obtaining the accurate props and furniture was beyond crazy," Wilson said. "The process took more than two months of searching and driving from town to town." Yes, she drove in the pouring rain to Gaston, Ind., a place the Hoosier didn't know existed, to find a great deal on the perfect dining room table and chairs for the show. "After we acquired the dining room table and chairs and began our journey home, we immediately noticed a pungent smell: cat urine. Needless to say, the windows came down, despite the rain. When we arrived home, my husband (Rich Wilson) ripped off the (dining room chairs') seat covers and tore out the foam. He sized up everything, ordered foam, and we bought fabric to recover the chairs," she said. He also repaired and polished the furniture. They then located a dining room server for sale in New Castle, so they took another road trip. Luckily, the next server she

What was next? "We traipsed through antique store after antique store throughout Central Indiana to find the most accurate items for the time periods," said Diane Wilson, who found delicate glassware and a silver coffee/tea set in a Westfield antique store, and antique blue and white dishes on Facebook Marketplace from various geographical locations: West Lafayette, Avon and a small town north of Noblesville. "Again, more road trips," she said.

They drove to an Indy antique mall to find a "rat tail back" spoon and "pistol-handed" knives and a silver carving knife. They drove to another part of Indy to buy a tea cart, which her husband refinished.

"I texted, emailed and messaged those I knew who had done props at various theaters and acquired their assistance for items I needed," she said. One of her props crew, Molly Kraus, created a beautiful flower arrangement that's 4-1/2 feet long, made from unused flowers, and a cake from a "dummy" that Wilson purchased. Her husband (who by now has become "set construction" and "set crew" for her show) made ice cream by covering styrofoam balls with spackling. "I found dried spackling in my kitchen for a week, Diane Wilson said.

The couple also borrowed items as well as found some items around the house. Cast members also brought in needed items that included three-pronged forks and table napkins. Plus, they bought live plants and, so far, have kept them alive.

The search for costumes from the 1930s to the 1970s was another chore, but lots of fun, being that Diane Wilson loves the 1930s, '40s and '50s. "I even owned a few items that are

going to be seen on the stage," she said.

"In total, we needed more than 150 pieces of clothing.

While she found a couple of pieces in The Belfry's costume, more of the pieces came from female cast members' closets, Goodwill and even about 20 pieces from her husband's closet. While her husband has black dress pants and black shorts in his closet, she assumed all men did. Nope. Also, a cast member involved in a local barbershop group was able to borrow a couple of tuxedos for those who were "tux-less." And a maid's uniform was purchased.

"Wigs were another issue," she said. "Since the seven actors are playing different decades, we ended up needing nearly 30 wigs.' Amazon Prime came to the rescue. "I can't tell you how many (wigs) we bought, tried on and then returned for one reason or another."

Once the "basic" outfits were finalized, she snapped photos of each, and then created a "key" of what each actor would wear for each character, who also needed accessories, everything from bowties to pearls to eye glasses.

Being that The Belfry Theatre building has been

closed for performances since spring 2020, first due to COVID cancellations then due to building issues, the productions are currently being staged at offsite venues.

She has had nearly all of her play rehearsals in her home before moving Sunday morning into the theater for tech week. "I was fortunate to have the space at my house where my husband and I could clear away furniture in our basement and bring in the dining room table and chairs, along with a few other pieces, to create a 'set,'" she said. "It actually worked quite well, as far as being able to direct." Their pool table and a couple of other tables served as their "props room." Their movie room and exercise rooms ecame the dressing rooms. The cast became comfortable at the Wilsons' home. "We would unlock the front door and turn on the outside light and, one by one, they'd arrive and take their

places," Diane Wilson said. Not having a home theater at this time has been a challenge. "We had one day to paint the (theatrical scenery) flats. We've rehearsed in a space slightly smaller than the stage. And since all of the furniture is at my house or in my neighbor's garage, I've had to rent a U-Haul to move the items to the theater."

Despite the challenges, Wilson is thrilled to be directing her first show for The Belfry Theatre. She returned to community theater in the fall of 2018 after a 25-year hiatus and "landed" at The Belfry, being cast in "Our Town," a show she had taught and loved. "I felt very welcomed and comfortable with The Belfry people," she recalled. "Having had a great experience as an actor at The Belfry, I knew I wanted to

direct there, as well.' She relates directing to one of her previous jobs working at Mattel Toys as a project manager. Her assignment was to take Barbie dolls from cradle to grave, gathering all of the items that were needed to create the perfect doll and watching it come to fruition. "Directing is quite like that," she said. "You lift the words from the pages and with wonderful actors, a great backstage crew and fantastic people behind the scenes, you create an amazing show and bring it to your audience to enjoy."

She said the play "is definitely not a politically correct play." For instance, some subject matter that was taboo during those time frames, were discussed as they would have been in the time periods.

One of her favorite scenes is a 1960s birthday party scene, where kids (played by actors ages 13-72) are behaving like "good little boys and girls" while two parents, not married to each other, are discussing "seeing each other" behind their spouses' backs. Another scene, in the 1950s, is a mother trying to relive her life through her daughter's and her daughter not wanting to do what her mother did.

In her own acting career, Diane Wilson's favorite roles were Mrs. Soames in "Our Town," directed by Nancy Lafferty at The Belfry, and the many roles that Wilson played in "Red, White and Tuna," directed by Ron Richards at The Belfry. Mrs. Soames voiced thoughts that others were too afraid to say, and her roles in "Tuna" allowed her to play more characters than she's ever played in a short period of time. At The Belfry, she has assistant directed under four directors, all with different styles.

Wilson, who was born in Indianapolis and attended Southport High School, attended Purdue University until she married, then transferred her credit hours to State University of New York in Brockport, N.Y. Following graduation, she began teaching English, speech/ debate and drama in and around Rochester and was active in Sweet Adelines and community theaters. She worked at Mattel Toys in southern California. In Connecticut, she stayed with Mattel sales. with auctions led the public to refer to civilian auctioneers as "Colonels,"

too Col. Roland C. Foland was born in 1881, either in Adams Township or Tipton. (Sources differ.)

In 1892, his father moved the family to Oklahoma where they participated in the land run that took place when Cheyenne and Arapaho lands were opened to white settlement. (Hmm. I wonder if that was the start of Foland's interest in real estate.)

They returned to the Boxley area three years

Foland graduated from Boxley High School in 1903 and in the years immediately following, he taught school, married, and spent time at Purdue studying animal husband-

He also graduated from the Jones National School of Auctioneering and Oratory, the first school of its kind in this country. Successfully completing those studies established

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his right to be called "Col-

onel." His career as an auctioneer began in Ekin around 1906 when he sold his first piece of property, a horse, for \$5. From 1913 on, however, he specialized in

auctioning real estate. Back then, selling real estate that way wasn't commonly done in this part of the country, but Foland believed wholeheartedly in the auction method and did everything he could to promote it.

He certainly had a gift for publicity.

You can't read through old Noblesville Daily Ledgers from the first half of the 20th century without running across ads for his Fo-Land Auction Company. Many include his slogan, "Auctioneering is the White Heat of Salesmanship."

In 1919, he hired a plane to make an advertising tour of this area, traveling from Kokomo to Marion to Crawfordsville. Along the way, he stopped several times to deliver short lectures on the sale

of real estate by auction. Whenever he passed over a town, he tossed literature detailing his upcoming

sales out of the plane. The highlight of his flight was the auction of a 96-acre farm southeast of Noblesville. According to the Ledger, the event was witnessed by the "first crowd to be attracted to a land sale by the flight of an airplane in Indiana and probably in the United

States . . . " Foland was also enthusiastic about educating others on his favorite

subject. In 1921 he wrote a book, "Foland's Plan of Real Estate Auctioneering and Side Lights on the Auction Method of Selling Real Estate," and for many years he conducted a school for auctioneers, training the participants in various aspects of salesmanship.

It didn't bother him that he was turning out competition. He felt having people conduct auctions properly benefitted the profession as a whole and viewed those who completed his courses as co-workers rather than

competitors.

Wow. Imagine the world if everyone had a similar mindset.
