a few years later we'd be dealing with our own pandemic.


While there are differences between the two outbreaks, there are also some similarities. Take the subject of masks and mask mandates.



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

WHEREAS, the Town of Sheridan, Indiana ("Town") has the authority to adopt ordinances to regulate the removal of trash under its jurisdiction; WHEREAS, in 2010, the Town adopted Ordinance 2-10-9-2 establishing trash rates, regulations and enforcement mechanisms to address the removal of trash

WHEREAS, the Town continues to believe it is in the best interests of the community to maintain procedures for the removal of trash within the Town's jurisdictional limits and also believes it is just and proper to increase slightly the rate of these services in order to ensure the Town receives the best and most efficien service possible;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SHERIDAN, INDIANA, THAT:

 The above recitals are incorporated herein by reference.
 Chapter 52 of the Sheridan Municipal Code is hereby amended as follo § 52.01 ESTABLISHING RATES FOR TRASH SERVICE.

§ 52.02 SOLID WASTE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

REGULATIONS. (A) Every bin shall be kept in sound condition, weather tight, and in good repair, and shall not be in such a condition as to constitute a nuisance (B) All residents of the town shall place bins containing solid waste at the curb in front of the residence no earlier than 7:00 p.m. the evening before the designated collection day and shall remove the bins no later

than 7:00 p.m. the day following the designated collection day.

(C) When not out for collection, all bins shall be kept within an enclosed structure on the property (such as a garage or shed) or adjacent to the residence and out of sight.

Alzheimer's association greater Indiana chapter will host virtual day of action

Volunteer advocates from across the state will urge lawmakers to pass legislation to help Hoosiers affected by Alzheimer's and other dementia during the Alzheimer's **Association Greater** Indiana Chapter's virtual Day of Action on Feb. 1, 2022.

Alzheimer's Association advocates will push for three legislative priorities, including SB 353, authored by Sen. Vaneta Becker (R-Evansville) and Sen. Stacey Donato (R-Logansport), which would require minimum dementia training standards for home health

"More and more Hoosiers facing dementia are opting for in-home care, yet home health aides in Indiana receive little or no training on caring for someone with the disease," said David Sklar, director of government affairs, Alzheimer's Association Greater Indiana Chapter. "It is crucial that home health aides receive adequate training so they are prepared to provide quality patient-centered care.'

Advocates will also push for HB 1087. authored by Rep. Ethan Manning (R-Logansport), to create a dementia coordinator role in state

government and two proposed bills - HB 1123. authored by Rep. Gregory Porter (D-Indianapolis) and SB 112, authored by Sen. Donato - that would add Alzheimer's expertise to Indiana's Medicaid Advisory Committee.

"We had a major public policy victory in Indiana last year with the passage of a bill to require a state dementia plan," continued Sklar. "That law was a critical first step in making Indiana a more dementia-friendly state, and we hope to build on that momentum during this session with an ambitious agenda. State legislators on both sides of the aisle

recognize the urgent need to address this issue."

About 110,000 Hoosiers are currently living with Alzheimer's disease. Another 215,000 are serving as unpaid family caregivers. The cost of serving Hoosiers living with Alzheimer's and dementia on the Medicaid program reached \$1.1 billion in 2020, and that number is expected to increase more than 17 percent by 2025.

Indiana Voters Overwhelmingly Support Term Limits for Congress in New RMG Research Poll

Seventy-six percent of registered Indiana voters support term limits for Congress according to a poll conducted for U.S. Term Limits (USTL) by RMG Research. The poll of 500 registered Indiana voters was conducted on January 14-16, 2022. The poll showed support for congressional term limits was broad-based among all demographics and party affiliations. Sixty-seven percent of respondents favor the Indiana legislature adopting legislation that would call for an amendment-proposing convention to adopt term limits under Article V of the United States Constitution. 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being spearheaded by the nonpartisan, grassroots nonprofit advocacy group U.S. Term Limits.

"Term limits for Congress is the one issue that unites all Americans," said Nick Tomboulides, Executive Director of U.S. Term Limits. "As this poll indicates, Indianans want to see action on this issue and see the legislature pass legislation for a constitutional convention for term

limits. "In the era of entrenched, career Washington politicians who make a fortune off the backs of taxpayers, term limits for Congress is a must," said Micah Beckwith, Indiana State Chair for U.S. Term

limits will help return our republic to a purer and more idealistic citizen legislature, precisely what our founders envisioned to ensure liberty for generations to come. Contact your Indiana state representative and state senator today and tell them to help make term limits for Congress a reality."

The poll also showed that sixty-six percent of Indiana voters are more likely to vote a state legislator who supports implementing congressional term limits. This also cut across party lines and showed that despite intense political polarization, support for congressional term limits is the one issue all Indianans

a visitor questioned the word "colored" used to describe the former Baptist church building's black congregation.

In the 21st century, the word "colored" is an outdated term.

The HCAA gallery visitor who had noticed the use of the word "colored" on the building's historical marker contacted the Noblesville Diversity Coalition (NDC) about replacing the marker. Upon receiving the message, NDC member Bryan Glover contacted then HCAA president Sue Payne, county historian David Heighway, Jones and her daughter, Regina A. (Jones) Mack.

"Today, 'colored' is generally considered offensive because of the word's association with a long history of racial segregation," Glover said. "Most black people, including myself, do not use the label 'colored' except in circumstances when it is appropriate for writing about our history.

But Constance Jones isn't offended. "As far as I'm concerned, I don't have a problem with 'colored' because that's what we were called then. That was our identification ... It has since evolved to 'colored' to 'black' to 'African-American.' I prefer 'people of color,'"


Jones said. Historical research ended up finding several documents that show the original, official name of the church was First Baptist Church.

Given Constance Jones' history with the church, she and daughter Regina (Jones) Mack, a 1978 graduate of Noblesville High School and a fourth-generation member of the former First Baptist Church, were invited to be a part of a committee -- that would also include Glover and board president Dana Randall, and Hamilton County historian David Heighway -- to do research on the history of the name of the church and come up with a plan if they decided to revise the plaque.

In his research of the Baptist church, Heighway found a newspaper article about a 1930s court case, with another church wanting the name, but the court ruled that this congregation at 195 S. Fifth St., was the "First Baptist Church" and that "colored" was not a part of the official name of the church.

Glover said, "It's complicated. But our interpretation of everything that we could find in the newspapers was that the word, 'colored,' was something that was just used in those days ... to distinguish black from white. So color often got put in legal documents."

The committee would eventually decide to revise the verbiage on the marker, with the removal of the word, "colored," to represent the historically accurate name, First Baptist

Church. But the plaque would also read, "First Black Baptist congregation formed in 1853.

NDC's mission is to build a more welcoming and inclusive community for all people, said Noblesville's Corinne Gunter. NDC's social media specialist.

Glover is hoping that the community can connect with the story of the church. "The important thing is to know we have this rich, diverse history that goes back to the early days of Noblesville; we need to embrace that. The plaque, to me, is the thing that commemorates it all ...We have to be sensi-

tive to the past, and what things were called, and sensitive to today's times, how they think of things ... It's complicated. There is not just an easy answer."

Last Wednesday was the first time that Constance Jones saw the new plaque that is now displayed on the exterior of the build-

ing.
"I'm thankful and grateful for the plaque," Jones said. "If it makes people happy, that's fine. I just want people to know the beginnings."

On the new plaque, Glover said in the name of the church, "there is no reference to any racial congregation, just its legal name." But the plaque also reads "First Black Baptist congregation."


They all helped make the revisions to the plaque, and Jones said. "I chose the scripture on the plaque," which reads, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. II Timothy 4:7 KJV (King James Version).

A Noblesville native born at Harrell Hospital on Ninth Street half a block north of the Square in downtown Noblesville, Jones graduated from Noblesville High School 65 years ago and has lived her entire life in Noblesville, except for eight vears in El Paso, Texas. Her ex-husband is Charles Jones, the first black police officer in Hamilton County. They're the parents of three, Regina Mack, Alicia and Mark Jones, who all graduated

from NHS. Jones' mom served on the Civil Rights Commission and was secretary of the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville's Auxiliary. Jones served on the board of directors for Habitat for Humanity for more than 10 years and also chaired its family selection committee for 10 years.

"We have been extremely active in Noblesville because this is our home. It's been gratifying. I sang the National Anthem on Senior Night at the high school," she said.

Jones is distantly related to Glover, and

> both are descendants of the Roberts Settlement, an African-American pioneer farm settlement in Atlanta, Ind.

> Glover, a 1975 Noblesville High School graduate, who was the liaison between the HCAA and the NDC, grew up in Noblesville, his family living in Hamilton County since the 1830s. His parents attended school here in the 1930s and 1940s.

He remembered the old notices in The Ledger, which would print the word, "colored" in parentheses after Baptist Church. "Given that I saw it done often enough. it looked to me like they were trying to make sure the readers of the newspaper knew which Baptist church we were talking about," Glover said.

One of the ministers mentioned on the historical marker is the Rev. Barney Stone, an exslave, Civil War veteran, "highly respected citizen of Noblesville" and a preacher in the former Baptist Church. There is an historical picture of the Rev. Stone displayed inside the Birdie Gallery. His daughter was Constance Jones' Sunday school teacher, and they would celebrate the Rev. Stone's birthday every year in Noblesville "which was highly unusual at the time to do that," she said. He was a slave who escaped from slavery and settled here when he was able to, and went back and got the rest of

his family, she said. "He was quite a man."

The Rev. Ernest Butler, a Hamilton County civil rights leader who was instrumental in desegregating the city's swimming pool, was another of the wellknown black ministers at the former First Baptist Church.

Noblesville artist Rodney Reveal, 72, Noblesville, a 1968 NHS graduate, painted a picture of the former church and made prints for Jones and, for this project, he removed the old plaque and replaced it with the new plaque on the building.

The former historical marker is stored away as an historical artifact, said Payne, past president of the HCAA.

The topic is timely for Black History Month, celebrated each February, with 2022 marking its 46th year.

Payne, who was born in Riverview Hospital, said this is a wonderful opportunity to bring this awareness. "HCAA has always been proud of that heritage.'

Randall said, "The part that's so cool about Noblesville Diversity Coalition and other groups, is if you take the journey, you get to go back into history and experience in that context ... and uncover an amazing history ... This was a great experience for us."

Now I know why I didn't remember more — I couldn't find anything in the Ledger about masks actually being worn in this county.

Other aspects of the flu were covered decently enough — illnesses and deaths were regularly reported — but in general, more space was devoted to the war in Europe than the war against disease at

Most articles on the flu dealt with its impact rather than methods used to prevent its spread. The only really detailed preventative information to appear in the Ledger was

a State Board of Health order published at the beginning of the epidemic

in early October. That order called for a temporary ban on all public gatherings. Spitting in public places was also prohibited. Street cars, interurbans and railway passenger cars were to keep their ventilators open regardless of cold temperatures and were to be thoroughly cleaned after each trip.

Although the directive stated that a cloth or paper handkerchief should be held over a person's face when coughing or sneezing, masks weren't

mentioned.

I don't know if the Ledger's lack of coverage on masks means county residents didn't wear them, or if the newspaper simply didn't feel that aspect of the epidemic was worth reporting.

That certainly wasn't the case in other Indiana cities.

Some communities, like Seymour and Martinsville, required masks only in certain settings (theaters, pool rooms, barber shops, etc.,) but others, such as Indianapolis and Fort Wayne, endured periods when masks were mandatory in all public

places.

During the latter part of November, 1918, any Indianapolis businesses or theaters caught admitting people without masks ran the risk of being closed.

Selig's, an Indianapolis dry goods store, reminded shoppers to wear their masks in its newspaper ads, while The Outlet, "Indiana's Largest Men's Store," went a step further, providing customers with a free mask at its main entrance.

Some large conventions and meetings were still held, but attendees had to be masked.

The November 25,

1918, Ledger noted that Noblesville resident Fred J. Hord went to a "monster men's meeting" at the African American Y.M.C.A. in Indianapolis to hear the dean of Howard University speak. Upon his return, Hord reported that everyone in the record-breaking crowd sported a flu mask.

Fort Wayne was really serious about masks. People were arrested there for failing to comply with the city's mask mandate.

To help residents abide by the mask order, the Fort Wayne Sentinel printed the Red Cross' directions for making flu

masks at home.

This involved taking a piece of gauze, either medicated or plain, and folding it several times. The initial instructions for the mask required some sewing and tape, but a later version was simply fastened with a safety pin at the back of a person's

Did the masks help? It's debatable. (One newspaper pointed out that people were trying to use coarse mesh to shut out a germ so tiny it could only be seen by a microscope.)

Thankfully, today we have better masks AND vaccines.
