What makes Caden Carpenter smile? "Having fun" said the then 14-year-old Noblesville resident. The former eighth-grader at Fall Creek Junior High School, now sophomore, was found in 2019 at the Forest Park sledding hill. He sported a ski tag on his jacket from Perfect North Slopes, a ski resort in southeastern Indiana. Is he a good skier? "I'm a lot better at it than snowboarding," he said. Caden sledded with his sister, Kaia, then 10, now 13. And their dad, John Carpenter, a math teacher at Fishers High School. His mom, Jennie, is a part-time stay-at-home mom and part-time early-childhood musical instructor in Carmel. What else? Caden runs cross country and track and enjoys the outdoors, including hunting and fishing with his family. The Forest Park sledding hill is among many busy sledding hills, including Simon Moon Park in Westfield has a great sledding hill as does Flat Fork Creek Park and Heritage Park in Fishers and West Park in Carmel. Plus, don't forget Koteewi Run Seasonal Slopes at Strawtown Koteewi Park in Noblesville, with online reservations and two-hour tubing sessions starting at \$25. Koteewi Run is central Indiana's only groomed snow tubing hill, with tubers sliding 700 down groomed lanes in custom snow tubes to a soft landing, and then ride a tow line back to the top for another run. No experience necessary, just proper attire for the conditions. While Koteewi Run was closed on Thursday, the tubing hill opened on Friday and will be open throughout the weekend for normal operations. Koteewi Run owner and operator Brian Cooley tweeted on Thursday: "We're doing a lot of snow cat work today to absorb the falling snow and get lanes groomed out for what looks to be fast conditions tomorrow night."

## Winter Storm Underwhelms, Leaving Snow, Ice And Frustration

Snowstorm Landon, the epic 2000-mile-wide snowstorm that was predicted to blanket much of the country in a foot of snow and ice, has blown through, falling short of the dire predictions being made beforehand. The National Weather Service (NWS) reported 7.6 inches of snow fell on the greater Indianapolis area between Feb. 1 and Feb 4. The record for snowfall in Indianapolis by Feb. 4 came in 1982, when the city received

14.6 inches of snowfall. Hamilton County Sheriff Dennish Quakenbush confirmed that there haven't been any fatal crashes or major incidents reported in the last 48 hours, saying, "We responded to 33 traffic hazards, which includes cars sliding off the road or into ditches, and we responded to .9 crashes, none of which had any serious injuries." Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt spoke

of how Hamilton County's response ultimately dampened the effects of the storm, saying, "I'm really proud of all our departments, our Emergency Management Administration (EMA) had multiple meetings... and they worked closely with all our towns and cities and did the best job they could." He went on to say, "Our facilities guys and highway guys did a fantastic

Each of the show choirs proudly represented the school last Saturday at the Franklin Community High School ShowFest, and each brought home a Grand Champion trophy.

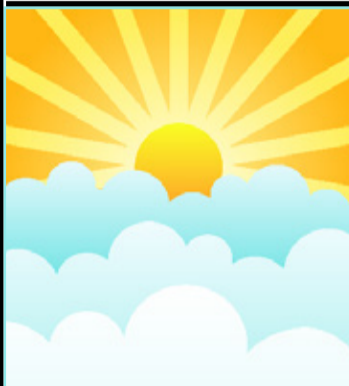

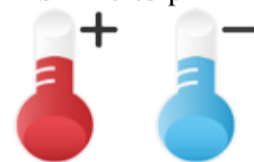
Today, Fishers High School plays hosts to several highly competitive schools in this area show-choir competition. Fishers Electrum and Fishers Sound top show choirs will perform their

# Reader Questions School Board Leadership

Dear Editor,  
I'm writing to express my support for House Bill (H.B.) 1130. Throughout 2021, Noblesville School Board President Joe Forgey repeatedly used his position as the supreme judge to determine what was and was not acceptable speech at school board meetings to silence parents and taxpayers whose comments he disliked.

Forgey regularly interrupted people (public comment starts at 52:50) during their 3-minutes of talk time and for two months held meetings virtually. He claimed the shift to virtual had something to do with COVID. However, the format change came after numerous parents (standing room only) went to an August board meeting to voice their displea-

sure with Superintendent Niedermeyer's sudden and unexpected reversal from mask-optional to mask mandate, which Joe supported. Coincidence?

The August board meeting was boisterous at times. Parents were caught off guard by Beth's mask decree. At the beginning of the school year, masks were optional. Then, around four o'clock on a Friday afternoon heading into a holiday weekend, the Superintendent's office sends an email to parents communicating that the mask mandate was back in effect. People can debate the efficacy of masks. Some take as absolute truth whatever mask doctrine federal and state health officials give, no matter how fluid it is, others do their research and arrive at a different

conclusion. Regardless, parents have every right to question mask mandates vigorously. Leadership is difficult. It's not always unicorns and lollipops.

With one notable exception, Laura Alerding, the Noblesville School Board has all but relinquished their role in providing oversight on their one and only employee, the outgoing Superintendent, Beth Niedermeyer. For example, Beth was given the authority to dictate mask policy in Noblesville Schools without board approval. I want to think that a robust debate on the matter would have yielded a different result, but that is not likely given the weak leadership of Joe Forgey on this and other closely related issues.

Censoring speech among adults, especially

regarding the relationship between parents, taxpayers, and the school board, is gross negligence on the part of President Forgey. The good news is that there is a school board election coming up this year, and Joe is up for re-election. In the meantime, H.B. 1130 must pass the Senate and be signed into law by Governor Holcomb. I have little confidence in the Governor on a host of issues. He is far more interested in bowing to the teachers' unions than talking with parents and taxpayers to understand their concerns when it comes to education. One fight at a time. First, let's get this through the Senate.

Thank you, Representative Goodrich, for leading the way with H.B. 1130.



job. The county is now back on yellow (travel advisory) and most of the roads look pretty good.” Sheriff Quakenbush went on to give a clearer picture of road conditions in the county, saying, “The roads are passable, the county and cities have cleared primary roads and streets...On some of

the northernmost roads, we’re still seeing some blowing and drifting, and obviously we want people to exercise caution while driving, but overall things look pretty good.” Noblesville Street Department Commissioner Patty Johnson gave an update on their progress cleaning roads,

saying, “The main roads are looking pretty good. Right now, we are in the subdivisions, working on primary and secondary roads there, which means any neighborhood streets besides cul-de-sacs, and we’re at 25-30% of the way done and we are going to try get those finished before the night

shift.” This comment was as of 12:05 p.m. on Fri., Feb. 4. Noblesville Fire Department Division Chief for Logistics and Public Relations Trevor Hash confirmed there were no storm-related fires, saying, “We had no fires or major accidents because of the storm, we had one

small incident, an electrical fire at a nail salon, but nothing because of the storm.” Westfield Street Superintendent Travis Stetnisch confirmed that all primary roads in Westfield have been cleared for regular traffic. He commented on the relationship between the city

and the county, saying, “We work together with them, we have an agreement with them where there are some county roads in town that we take care of, and there’s some roads way out west in town that they take care of, so we have a great partnership with the County.”

### 84% of the world's most popular passwords can be cracked in less than a second

Cracking passwords is easier than you might think. According to NordPass research, 84.5% of the world's most commonly used passwords can be cracked in less than a second.

Overall, on the global list, 169 passwords out of the 200 can be cracked in less than a second. That's 84.5%, whereas last year the passwords were a bit stronger — 73% of the passwords could be cracked in less than a second. Back in 2019, this number was 70%.

English speakers use weaker passwords  
This year's NordPass research looked not only at global trends but also at passwords in 50 different countries. Interestingly, we noticed that passwords in other languages take a bit longer to crack than English words. For example, in Italy, where many

passwords were various Italian words and names, only 30.5% of passwords could be cracked in less than a second. However, in the US, the percentage is 75%, in the UK 66%, and in Canada 72%.

"The English language is used very commonly all over the world, so naturally, English words can be cracked easily. However, we don't recommend using dictionary words, whether they're Russian or Vietnamese, as hackers carry out what are known as dictionary attacks, during which they automatically check all dictionary words and see if your password is one of them," says Chad Hammond, a security

expert at NordPass.

How to create strong passwords

Hammond recommends remembering three simple rules for good password hygiene:

1. Create lengthy, unique, and complex passwords. It's also a good idea to use a password generator to create truly secure passwords.
2. Store these passwords in a password manager. An average person has around 100 accounts, so it may be hard to remember all of these passwords.
3. Set up multi-factor authentication (MFA). Whether that's a physical security key, a code sent to your phone, or biomet-

rics, it's a good idea to add an additional security layer to your accounts.

How did NordPass calculate the time it takes to crack passwords?

The estimation of how long it takes to crack a password was performed by our Online Strength Checker. A password checker is a web tool that helps users evaluate their password strength.

However, the suggested time to crack a password should be treated more as a reference rather than a rule. The time the password is hacked depends on additional aspects, such as the computer technology used or the type of attack.

### Enjoying spring flowers for as long as possible How to fertilize perennials

If you literally want to experience the spring season up close, why not bring spring flowers into your home. But how can you make sure that you can enjoy your gorgeous bouquets for as long as possible?

Seasonal flowers

Did you know that bulb flowers are real seasonal flowers? Tulips, daffodils, hyacinths, and ranunculus symbolize spring, and they are typical harbingers of spring. The growth process is both unique and fascinating, since the flowers are already hidden inside the bulbs. A bud grows and emerges from

its little bulb to produce one or more impressive flowers.

Art

Once you put them in a vase, spring flowers become a living work of art. Not only are the flowers spectacular and a statement in and of themselves; tulip and hyacinth stems also continue to grow in the vase. Once they are in a warm home, the growing and flowering process starts immediately. The stems meander their way upward and then the buds finally open to display their cheerful color.

Care

You will generally be able to enjoy a spring bouquet for around seven days. If you look after your flowers, you will enjoy them for even longer and the flowers will bloom even more beautifully. We have listed eight tips for the best care:

1. Put the flowers in water as soon as you can.
2. Use a clean vase that gives the flower stems plenty of space (store vases upside down in the cupboard, to avoid dirt getting in).
3. Fill the vase with lukewarm water.
4. Cut off the bottom of the stems diagonally to

remove bacteria and to allow the stems to optimally absorb water.

5. Make sure no leaves are submerged in the water, as they will rot and flowers do not thrive in dirty water.

6. Add cut flower food to help the flowers develop properly and last longer.

7. If the water is dirty, change it.

8. Place your flowers in a spot away from fruit, direct sunlight, or drafts to prevent the flowers from wilting too quickly.

Just like people, perennials need nutrition to grow and bloom optimally. This nutrition can be provided in the form of fertilization. But how and when is this best done?

Basic requirements

The basic requirements of perennials are light, heat, water, and nutrition. A part of the nutrition is already present in the soil in the form of minerals; for the other part plants depend on fertilization. Fertilize twice a year: in spring and in late summer.

Extra boost

Spring fertilizing is the most important: it is the foundation. Fertilizing in March gives your perennials an extra growth boost. Fertilizing in late summer (July/August) is necessary to give the plants strength before entering the winter period.

Top condition

Ask for organic fertilizer at your garden center or hardware store. Organic fertilizer has several advantages compared with chemical fertilizers. They allow plants to grow more gradually and improve the soil. Garden fertilizer,

ornamental garden fertilizer or border fertilizer are suitable for perennials. Check the packaging for the correct dosage; too much fertilizer actually gives weaker plants energy. Sprinkle the fertilizer on the soil near the plants. The fertilizer will allow them to grow and flower optimally and allow the soil to remain healthy and fertile. In this way, you can keep your perennials in top condition and enjoy them year after year.

Tips

Do not fertilize when the foliage is wet; if the fertilizer sticks to the leaves, there is a risk of leaf burn.

Also apply a thin layer of green compost to the soil.

The foliage will tell you whether your perennial is getting sufficient nutrients. For example, smaller and lighter colored leaves indicate a nitrogen deficiency (N) and leaves that turn yellow between the veins indicate a lack of magnesium (Mg).

### There is always room for strawberries

As you plan this year's garden, be sure to include some strawberries. They are low in calories, high in vitamin C and antioxidants, and provide seasonal interest in gardens and containers.

Best of all, you don't need much space to grow this delicious fruit. There are three types of strawberries: June or spring bearing, everbearing, and day neutral. Select the best type of strawberry for your space and harvest needs.

June-bearing strawberries produce one crop of berries in late spring to early summer, depending on where you garden. They produce the largest harvest but in the shortest span of time. Plant now and enjoy an abundant harvest next year.

Everbearing strawberries usually produce two crops of berries each year. You'll enjoy fresh strawberries early and late in the season, while day-neutral plants produce berries throughout the growing season.

Delizz®, a day-neutral strawberry, was the first ever strawberry to be selected as an All-America Selections Winner. Just like the flower and vegetable winners, it was tested

nationally and selected for its performance for the home garden. This 2016 winner is a compact plant perfect for hanging baskets, containers or garden beds. It can be started from seed or transplants and will produce sweet fruit the first year and all season long, even during hot weather.

Up the ornamental appeal of traditional in-ground plantings with a star shaped or tiered bed. The elevated beds make for easier planting, weeding, and harvesting. You'll find a variety of tiered shaped beds to purchase or plans to make your own.

Use strawberries as a groundcover in sunny well-drained locations for an abundant harvest. Their attractive leaves, white flowers, red fruit and brilliant red fall color add sparkle to the landscape and provide fresh fruit for your meals.

Or grow them in a container, window box or hanging basket on your porch, balcony, or deck. They'll be close at hand and easy to harvest.

Mix a few everbearing or day-neutral strawberries in with flowers to create an edible and ornamental

planter. The harvest will be smaller when grown in a mixed container, but the flowers, fruit and fall color add ornamental appeal and the fruit will be a welcome treat.

Boost the harvest by growing strawberries in their own container. Fill a hanging basket and watch as the runners cascade over the edge for added ornamental appeal.

Try filling a traditional strawberry pot – container with planting hole openings on the top and sides – with plants that produce several harvests and remove the runners as needed. Keep all the plants from top to bottom looking their best with this DIY watering device. Place soil on the bottom of the container. Set a couple of perforated PVC down through the planter. Slide the plants through the hole from the inside of the pot. Fill the remaining space with soil. Gently tamp and water thoroughly to eliminate air pockets. As you water, the water travels through the pipe and out the holes, providing moisture to all plants from top to bottom.

Check containers daily and water thoroughly and

often enough to keep the soil slightly moist. Reduce maintenance and increase success by incorporating a low nitrogen slow-release fertilizer into the soil at planting or sprinkle over the soil surface as needed. This type of fertilizer promotes growth without interfering with flowering and fruit production.

Start now identifying spaces to add strawberries to your landscape, deck and balcony. Then order seeds or plants early for the greatest selection. Before you know it, you'll be enjoying garden fresh strawberries in your morning cereal, salads or as a snack at the end of the day.
