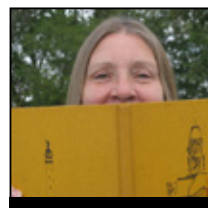
I've got some reader feedback to catch up on!

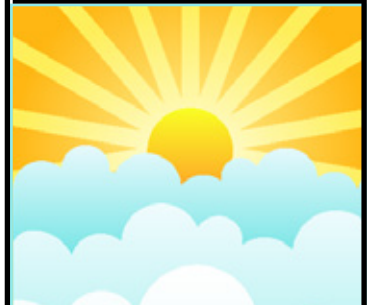
Both he and his wife, Betty, were also quite involved in the Hamilton County Theatre Guild.

Wayne Eugene Caldwell Nov. 2, 1923 - Feb. 2, 2022

Wayne Eugene Caldwell, 98, of Fishers, passed away peacefully on Wed., Feb. 2, 2022, at the Prairie Lakes Health Campus.



Mr. Caldwell was born to Robin Vernon and Cora Helena Fischer Caldwell in Clay Center, Kansas on Nov. 2, 1923. He attended elementary schools in Longford and South Exeter District 42, Clay County, Kansas. He graduated from Clay County Community High school in 1941.

After graduation, Mr. Caldwell worked for two years at various jobs including work on a dairy farm, in the wheat harvest, in building, construction and with a paving company that laid cement for the runway at the Smokey Hill Army Base in Salina, Kansas.

In February, 1943, Mr. Caldwell was drafted into military service in the Army Air Corps. He completed his basic training at Clearwater, Fla., and then transferred to Kansas City, Missouri, to attend the Midland Radio School. Upon completion of school, he was assigned to the Army Air Force-Signal Corps on Flight 360S, 604th T.T.C. and transferred to Camp Murphy, Fla. to attend the Training Schools of Radar. He made Expert on the 1903 Rifle and on the .22 caliber Carbine. Training for Mr. Caldwell continued in Boca Raton, Florida, with the Airborne Radar School and with the LORAN Navigation system with specialties in the High and Low Altitude Altimeter-Navigation; the Mark II, Great Britain system; Homing and Rendezvous Flying and the American Long-Range Navigation (LORAN). Subsequently, he was transferred to Kearns Field, Utah, before departing for the Clark Air Base in the Philippine Islands where he was assigned to the Ken's Men 43rd Bomb Group, 403rd Bomb Squadron, A.P.O 72. It was at the Clark Air Base on April 2, 1945, where Mr. Caldwell accepted the Lord as his personal Savior after struggling for three months with the loss of three friends in the crash of an A-20 plane that he was destined to be on, but seconds before the plane's departure, he was assigned to another aircraft. He also was stationed in New Guinea, Luzon and the Western Pacific. Mr. Caldwell received an Honorable Discharge from the war in 1946 after serving as Sergeant and receiving the American Service Medal, the Asiatic Pacific Service Medal, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with 1 Bronze Star, the World War II Victory Medal and the Good Conduct Medal.

He married Joan Wiese, June 6, 1946.

After the war, Mr. Caldwell accepted the call to the ministry and then graduated from Miltonvale Wesleyan College, Miltonvale, Kansas, with a Bachelor Degree in Religion in 1949. In 1953, he graduated from Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City, MO, with a Bachelor of Divinity degree. In 1957 he graduated from Central Baptist Theological Seminary with a Master in Theology degree. Finally, in 1969, he graduated from the Iliff School of Theology with a Doctor of Theology degree in Theology, Church History and Philosophy. Dr. Caldwell was ordained, in 1950, by the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church where he pastored churches from 1948-1968 in Kansas City and Butler, Missouri; Clay Center, Ottawa and Manhattan, Kansas; Englewood and Denver, Colorado. Dr. Caldwell was a Professor of Religion and Philosophy, Miltonvale Wesleyan College, Miltonvale, Kansas, 1968-1972; Professor of Religion and Philosophy, Marion College/Indiana Wesleyan University, Marion, Indiana, 1972-1984; Adjunct Professor of Religion and Theology, Indiana Wesleyan University, Marion, Indiana, 1984-2008; and General Editor of The Wesleyan Church, Marion and Indianapolis, Indiana, 1984-1992. Dr. Caldwell has 16 Published Books and Articles with Unpublished Works, 1953-2008.

Survivors include his wife, Joan; two daughters, Joy Caldwell of Fishers, Indiana and Eunice Rickey (Brian) of Marion, Indiana; one son, Philip Caldwell (Jill) of Carmel, Indiana; four grandchildren, Kari (Jason) Wuertley of Marion, Jeffrey (Amber) Rickey of Canton, Michigan, Desiree (Mark) Lambert of Carmel and Bethany (Jason) Lewis of Carmel; eight great-grandchildren, Lacey Lambert, Jackson Lambert, Hadley Lewis, Bennett Lewis, Shelby Hollingsworth, Aubri Hollingsworth, Isaac Rickey and Cohen Rickey; as well as numerous nieces, nephews, cousins, neighbors and friends.

He was predeceased by his parents; step-father; sister, Doris of Clay Center, Kansas; and brother, Elmo of Louisville, Kentucky. He was a faithful servant of the Lord with The Wesleyan Church and loved children, young people and students he taught. Dr. Caldwell loved to teach his college classes and was a perpetual student of learning and studying all of his life.

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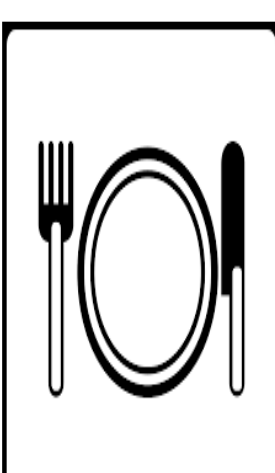

Riverview Health Chosen For Hyperbaric Oxygen Treatment Study To Help Veterans

Riverview Health Wound Care has been chosen to partner with Indiana Department of Health and Purdue University to participate in a new program to study hyperbaric oxygen therapy (HBOT) treatment for traumatic brain injury (TBI) and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) in veterans.

During HBOT, patients lie down in a clear acrylic chamber allowing staff to monitor throughout the entire process. This type of therapy works by surrounding the person with 100 percent oxygen at higher-than-normal atmospheric pressure. This increases the amount of oxygen in the blood, allowing red blood cells to pass more easily through the plasma to help heal a wound from the inside out. HBOT greatly increases the rate of healing tissue and salvages limbs that otherwise, may have been lost.

"We're very excited to be a part of a program that is researching the growing benefits of HBOT," said Crystal Whisler, senior program director of

Riverview Health Wound Care. "We constantly see success stories with our patients who are treated with HBOT for chronic and non-healing wounds, so expanding our reach to now help veterans who are suffering from traumatic brain injuries or PTSD will be that much more rewarding for us and a great way to give back to the community."

Veterans with chronic TBI and PTSD can experience physical and emotional symptoms, including headaches, dizziness, depression, and anxiety, that can signifi-

cantly disrupt their quality of life. The research being conducted aims to provide medical research showing how HBOT can reduce or eliminate these symptoms.

Riverview Health Wound Care was the first in Hamilton County to offer HBOT. The research study began in January 2022 and will go through June 2023. Participants must be a veteran, have a physician's referral and be pre-screened by Purdue University before beginning the program. old. So how many years ago was that? She would never divulge her age anytime to anyone.

But her son said it was time to share her age.

Phyllis Davis, who enjoyed a well-lived life, lived to be an impressive 99 years old.

She was born at home near Jolietville on Oct. 7, 1922, to Clarence and Mary (Stuart) Davis. She grew up on a farm. The house is still there.

Phyllis Davis graduated in 1941 from Westfield High School, where she was class valedictorian, acted in school plays and performed in the school band, "I think clarinet," Sid Davis said.

She grew up attending Eagle Creek Friends Church and played piano there up until about three years ago.

Phyllis always had a sense of humor. She and her sister, Ramona, used to travel around the state doing a comedy act, and even one family flew her to Arizona to do her show. Ramona did the comedy, playing a "bag lady," and mom played the little organ. The Sadie Hawkins was the name of the show. M mom's sister was the bag lady.

Phyllis kept the Davis name all of her life, mar-

rying (an unrelated) Robert S. Davis on Oct. 25, 1947, at age 25, first settling on Hazel Dell Road, then moving to his farm in Noblesville, where she lived for the rest of her life.

Sid Davis was their only child. "My great uncle Les Davis built this house in 1914. And when he died in 1934, my dad's dad (Lou Davis) and Mary (Stuart) Davis bought the farm, and they moved here in 1934."

"She had the enjoyment of music. As a kid, I always heard her playing the piano ... and the marimba, the saxophone, the clarinet and the harp, but not as much as the piano," for which she also taught lessons.

She played music at church, weddings, funerals and civic functions. She dragged the harp everywhere.

People around Noblesville who weren't involved in the 4-H program might also remember Phyllis as secretary for Noblesville Township Trustee Reno Taylor. Or from her two four-year terms as Hamilton County treasurer, 1975-82. Or maybe serving 23 years as manager of the former Noblesville Golf and Batting Center that her son owned on Willowview Road until 2016. People would often stop by just to see Phyllis at the Center,

located within a couple of minutes from her house. She waited on customers at the counter and served food. "She made a lot of friends there," her son said. "She enjoyed all of the families and the little kids. She loved to be around people."

In celebration of Phyllis' birthday, each October, Sid would throw a fall bonfire party at his log cabin and invite anybody who wanted to stop in from late afternoon until after midnight. Family and friends would enjoy beef stew from Lutz's Steak House and pork chops hot off the grill. Phyllis would make side dishes, like baked beans or potato salad.

When Sid Davis was young, he said they ate at home most of the time. She was a good cook, said the 1972 Noblesville High School graduate. Sid Davis said, "People really liked her, what a kind and generous person she was, and she was a caring person toward everybody she met. She put an impression on people that she met with her kindness and generosity and caring."

He said everywhere she went, she tried to help people who needed help, talk to people if people needed somebody to talk to," he said.

Every year for more

than 50 consecutive years, taking over the piano for her predecessor in 1966, Phyllis Davis played songs from memory on the piano during the 4-H Fair Queen Pageant and during the 4-H Fair's Fashion Revue.

Before the Pageant and Fashion Revue took place in the 4-H Exhibition Center, I remember when Phyllis played the piano, which would roll into the old Show Arena, where the pageant took place for many years when I was a young journalist at The Noblesville Ledger.

In July 2014, according to The Times' archives, Phyllis Davis was honored at a celebration with the gift of a wristwatch, for her many years of providing piano music. That same year, at the Indiana State Fair, "she was glad when she got the 100-year-old (Hoosier Homestead) farm award." He said. "She was really proud of that, that the farm had been in our family for 100 years," said Sid Davis who went with his mom to the Indiana State Fairgrounds to receive the award.

In July 2017, Phyllis almost didn't have the opportunity to play when the pageant committee made a decision to use recorded music instead of having Phyllis play the piano. But then the committee,

at the last minute, decided to keep the tradition alive and to invite her to play one song for the Queen Pageant.

She ended up playing quite a few songs, during the scholarship and nine- and 10-year 4-H'er recognition and when the Queen contest judges were out of the room making their decision.

I wasn't the only one that year who wanted to see her piano traditframonion continue.

At that 4-H Queen Pageant, Kathy Kreg Williams and County Commissioner Steve Dillinger escorted Phyllis Davis into the building along with Sid Davis. Both, along with Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt, passed on an invitation to the Noblesville Mayor's Ball so they could be at the Queen pageant, and to see Phyllis play the piano.

They were all glad to see that everything worked out. And so was the audience.

Phyllis played her old favorites during that night: "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," "Careless," "My Heavenly Father Watches Over Me," "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," "Moon River," "Tennessee Waltz" and other old favorites."

She told me she wouldn't have been upset if she

didn't get to play anymore at the event. She knew that times change. "They're doing it differently. Whatever they want to do is OK with me," she said.

In July 2018, she played the piano again for the Queen Pageant. A few days later during the Fair, she was presented the piano to enjoy at home. She wrote a Letter to the Editor published in The Times:

Dear Editor, A big thank you for the lovely gift of the piano I played for about 70 years for the Queen Contest. I really liked the piano and the beautiful girls and their apparel. Also, about three years ago, the 4-H Council awarded me a beautiful wristwatch, which I am enjoying. Thank you all very much and may God bless you all. -Phyllis E. Davis, Noblesville.

And God bless you, Phyllis Davis, for bringing joy to so many others in this wonderful life. Rest in peace.

template the world's peaceful slumber, until at last, the spell is broken by my favorite sound ... my neighbors firing up their Kubota™ tractors.

I've got the best neighbors. Real snow buddies.

That's because they are handy. Because they are handy, they have the best equipment. And because they have the best equipment, and are handy, I haven't had to clean snow from my own driveway in thirty-seven years.

In fact, if statistics are kept for the most utility tractors per capita, I'm sure my neighborhood rivals Canada. There are eight homes in my neighborhood, and we claim ownership of five utility tractors.

But that's not to say they aren't all needed. Nearly all of us in this end of town have what I'd call unconventional driveways, and we haven't had any municipal snow removal

services on the main drag here, since my neighbor Jack lost his seat on the Town Board.

My neighbor Lewis has the toughest go. He owns a hobby farm at the end of the street. Only his mailbox lies within the town limits; the rest of the farm lies just outside. Consequently, the town only plows up to Lewis' mailbox, even though they tax his entire farm for sewer services. Lewis' Bx Series tractor plows nearly two hundred yards of snow to release him from his drifted drive-way. As for the sewage, luckily its downhill to Lewis' mailbox.

Dickie has the next longest run. His house sits way back off the street, and his 100-yard driveway runs perpendicular to Lewis. My driveway is next longest. My garage sits behind my house, and about forty-five yards to the throughway. However,

mine is a cutout driveway. The snow of-ten drifts from bank to bank, and can reach thigh-high in even the most modest of storms -- high enough to bury a neighbor kid or two, something I've often contemplated trying.

Of those with tractors, Dave has the shortest driveway. Dave bought a brand new L Series tractor this year. He is so proud of that tractor. When the winter storm was forecast, he moved his wife's S-Class Mercedes out of the garage, to make room for the tractor. Char was displeased, of course, until she saw how much snow the tractor moves out of that deep depression at the end of their driveway. Much more than a Mercedes, anyway.

With this many utility tractors in the neighborhood, it's not unusual to see them all on the move at once. Like Hitler in the

Sudetenland, once one driveway is vanquished of snow, each neighbor is on the lookout for more land to conquer.

Dave got me, this year, for which I am "e-thermally" grateful.

For my part, I grab my ergonomically shaped snow shovel -- formed one winter when I backed over the handle with my car -- and clean all my neighbors' sidewalks and patios, which the tractors cannot reach.

It's a small contribution, but a fair little tradeoff. It has worked well-- except for the year I accidentally scooped up my neighbor Shawna's favorite ceramic garden gnome, and unknowingly threw it under their truck tire.

She never said anything, but it was easy to catch her drift.

sulted that book many times!)

Pam Ferber emailed to say she became curious about the Spanish flu epidemic of 1918 when we were in the early stages of our own pandemic, so she borrowed a book from her library to find out more about the ways people tried to control the spread of the disease back then.

She said the book noted that cities where masks were worn DID have fewer deaths than those where people went maskless and that doctors actually were working on a vaccine then; they just didn't have any success. (One doctor even died when he used himself as a guinea pig to test his vaccine!)

Pam also mentioned that her mother, Pat Gibbs, had exchanged correspondence with Lucy Washington's great-great grandson, African American author and lawyer, Cyrus Colter. (Pat wrote a piece on Colter for a special publication the Ledger put out in 1998 to commemorate Hamilton County's 175th Anniversary.)

David Sutton asked if Lucy Washington was buried in Noblesville, either in Riverside or Crownland Cemetery.

Actually, she was living in the Howard County Infirmary at the time she died and, according to Findagrave.com, she's buried in a Kokomo cemetery.

I don't know for sure how she ended up in the Howard County Infirmary, but my guess is that her

granddaughter, Mary, who wasn't young herself by then, probably no longer felt able to care for her adequately.

I'm also guessing that she was taken to Howard County because that was one of the periods when Hamilton County's county home/poor farm was in fairly bad shape.

(In December of 1900, the Hamilton County Board of Charities reported that, among other things, the home's 46 residents were expected to bathe in a single washtub in an old run-down outhouse that couldn't even be used during the winter.)

Mrs. Washington wasn't abandoned, though. There were family members in Howard County who could keep an eye on her. Reverend Richard Bassett, the younger brother of Mary's husband, Reverend Miles Bassett, lived in Kokomo.

(By the way, Reverend Richard Bassett was quite distinguished in his own right. He was the third African American to serve in the Indiana House of Representatives, having been elected to represent the people of Howard County in 1892.)
