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What makes Leah Leach smile? "Books," said the 43-year-old Noblesville resident. "I love books, anything with tactile, paper and learning something new." She started the Gal's Guide Library in 2016, and the library became a reality in 2020. It houses the first women's history library in the United States. Bookshelves surrounded her in the Gal's Guide Library, located in a room on the second floor of the Nickel Plate Arts Campus in downtown Noblesville. "We have about 5,000 books in the collection now." How's the foot traffic? "We get regular traffic ... Whenever Nickel Plate is open, we are open as well. It's a small but mighty library to come and check." Hours are noon to 5 p.m. Wednesday-Friday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays, and by appointment Sunday-Tuesday. Who mans the library? "I'm in here most of the time. If I'm not, my glorious volunteer Barb is." Leach was found on Thursday evening at Noble Crossing Elementary teacher Melissa Jones "Girls Positivity Club" meeting, which meets at the Gal's Guide Library. Leach also does torn-paper art. "Some of the books that need a new life and need some recycled love, I turn them into art projects." She has two kids, Samantha, a Noblesville High School freshman, and Kami, a Ball State University freshman, "and a wonderful husband named Josh who loves to manicure our lawn." What else? "My daytime gig is this, and I'm pretty much always here ... This is my passion and this is what I'm excited about. If I'm not here, I'm at home either painting or reading." When her daughters were younger, Leach was a filmmaker and part-time stay-at-home mom in between filming seasons. She retired from filmmaking in 2016. She offers a Galentine's Brunch on Sunday for moms to celebrate Valentine's Day. It's "ladies celebrating ladies," and the event is sold out. There will be 32 over-21 moms at the event, which will serve Mimosa cocktails. February is Black History Month, with black female authors featured in the Gal's Guide library. March is Women's History Month, "which is what we do all year long." There is also a Gal's Guide podcast, too. "Otherwise, we're rockin' the library and having fun." 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Ask Rusty - Do Medicare Part A and B Backup My Medicare Advantage Plan?

Dear Rusty: I was told that I can use Medicare Parts A and B as secondary coverage to my Medicare Advantage plan. Is that true? Signed: Puzzled

Dear Puzzled: Many do not understand how the various parts of Medicare work, and especially how or if "original Medicare" (Medicare Part A and Part B) interacts with a Medicare Advantage plan. If you now have a Medicare Advantage plan, it is the private insurer who provides your plan that administers all of your healthcare needs, instead of the federal government agency which runs Medicare (that federal agency is called the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, or "CMS").

Although you must pay Medicare Part A and Part B premiums to the federal government to obtain a Medicare Advantage plan, all your healthcare services are handled by the private Medicare Advantage plan provider

and not by the government's CMS agency. When you have an Advantage plan, Medicare Parts A and Part B do not act as secondary coverage for your Advantage plan. You don't get healthcare services from both, because when you choose a Medicare Advantage plan you are deselecting CMS as the administrator of your healthcare needs.

Deciding whether to use "original Medicare" to administer your healthcare services or to use a Medicare Advantage plan is always a very personal choice. Medicare Advantage plans

cover almost all the medically necessary services that original Medicare covers, although you must generally use "in-network" providers to obtain full coverage. But if you incur healthcare expenses which are not covered by your Medicare Advantage plan, you must pay them yourself - federal Medicare Parts A and Part B are not backup coverage for those uncovered healthcare expenses. So, what you were told is incorrect - Medicare Part A and Part B do not act as secondary coverage to your

Protecting Your Lungs Can Start With One Scan

(Family Features) Not too long ago, smoking used to be everywhere. In fact, many people remember the days before there were even smoking and non-smoking sections in restaurants. People who smoked and others who didn't mingled in the same dining room. They sat side-by-side on a plane. Some rode in the backseat of a smoke-filled car, and no one gave it a further thought.

Today, things are done differently. However, those memories can be an important indicator for those who smoked back then to advocate for their health with a lung screening.

Importance of Early Detection

Lung cancer has the highest mortality rate among cancers, killing men and women more than any other type. If found in its earliest stage, however, lung cancer is more likely to be successfully treated, according to the American Cancer Society. In fact, detecting lung cancer in its early stages can make the survival rate as high as 90%.

You Can Have A Porterhouse Steak As Long As It's Rare - A Rare Treat

It sometimes seems that the world is determined to classify senior citizens as an endangered species, telling us that we need to exercise more in order to keep in shape and eat foods not because they are tasty but because they're good for you, says Rebecca Weber, CEO of the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC]. "They are right, of course, whoever they are. But does that mean we can't take an occasional break -- that we can't take it easy every once in a while or have a meal not because it is particularly good for you but because you crave the flavor?"

Certainly you should consult your healthcare provider when it comes to questions about exercise and nutrition, stresses Weber. "Who knows, you may find that your workouts do not have to be as excessive and exhausting as you might think. You may also learn that it's okay to have a real steak instead of a Grilled Tofu Steak with Piquillo Salsa Verde, as suggested by the folks at Food and Wine."

There's a lot of research out there that shows we, old timers, should heed our MDs when it comes to activities

that can have an impact on our health, says Weber. But there is also a lot of research that indicates you might be able to skip a healthy meal on occasion in favor of a Porterhouse steak, for example. But it's recommended that you choose a steak that is lean and that you don't overdo it.

Julia Zumpano, a Registered Dietician at the Cleveland Clinic, says "When you prepare red meat, focus on dry cooking methods, like baking, broiling, grilling, roasting, poaching or air frying." She also recommends that you should limit the amount you eat to one or two servings of six ounces or less per week. And, she says, limit yourself to less than three ounces a week if you have heart disease and/or high cholesterol. But, again, check with your doctor before you indulge.

Even the naysayers admit that it's okay to have red meat once in a while. The Website, health24, put it this way: "Thanks to high-protein diets, red meat is making a comeback. Red meat has been linked to a host of health problems, including heart disease, cancers and diabetes. It's also

A.G. Rokita Warns Hoosiers Be Aware Of Valentine's Day Scams

As Valentine's Day approaches, love is in the air — but so are romance scams, and Attorney General Todd Rokita wants Indiana consumers to be on the lookout.

"More people are going online these days to look for that special someone," Attorney General Rokita said. "Many do so without a problem, but in some cases, folks are finding scammers instead. We want to protect Hoosiers from falling victim to fraudsters intent on taking advantage."

In romance scams, perpetrators prey upon unsuspecting matches by creating fake profiles to take advantage of victims online. They go to great lengths to pose as prospective romantic partners with similar interests in order to lure people into providing gifts, money, or personal information.

Over recent years, these scams have been on the rise. According to the Federal Trade Commission, in 2021 U.S. consumers reported \$547 million in losses to romance scams — up about

80% from 2020.

Here are a few warning signs that someone might be more interested in your money or personal information than your affections:

- Your new romantic interest sends a picture that doesn't look realistic. Rather, the person looks more like a model from a fashion magazine.
- The relationship is moving fast, and the other person quickly professes their love for you.
- Their story seems suspicious or off.
- The person attempts to isolate you from friends and family.
- The person requests inappropriate photos or financial information that could later be used against you.
- The person asks you for money and requires specific payment methods such as a wire transfer, preloaded gift card or cash.

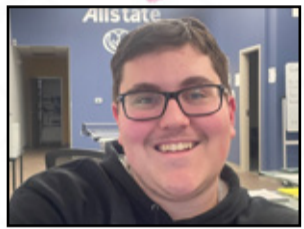

"Unfortunately, lung cancer symptoms typically don't show up until the disease has advanced and when they do appear, they can be similar to common respiratory illnesses with cough, shortness of breath or pain in the chest, back or shoulders" said Dr. Ella Kazerooni, professor of radiology and internal medicine at the University of Michigan and chair of the American Cancer Society National Lung Cancer Roundtable. "Screening detects lung cancer when there are no symptoms. That's why it's important for people at high risk of lung cancer to get annual lung scans to help increase the likelihood of catching cancer early when it's most treatable. A lung cancer screening is a painless evaluation that usually takes minutes to complete." However, according to a study published in the "Journal of the National Cancer Institute," the national average of at-risk individuals getting screened is only 5%. In 2021, the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF), a panel of national experts in disease prevention and evidence-based medicine, updated guidelines for who is eligible and recommended for annual lung screening. However, the Epic Health Research Network reported 87% of at-risk individuals eligible for screening based

on the USPSTF guidelines didn't receive an annual screening despite it being covered by insurance. What is a Lung Cancer Screening? A lung cancer screening is a preventive health check, like a mammogram or colonoscopy. It checks the lungs and looks for any changes from year to year. If there's something unusual in the lungs, a screening can help detect it at an early stage. A low-dose computed tomography (LDCT) scan is the only method recommended for lung cancer screening in high-risk patients. A LDCT machine takes a 3D picture of the lungs. This type of scan uses 75% less radiation than a regular CT scan and doesn't require the use of needles. Often, there are no symptoms of lung cancer. A LDCT scan can find something before patients know it's there because the symptoms are easy to mistake or don't appear until the cancer is well advanced. Who's Eligible for Screening? Lung cancer can affect anyone. A family history of lung cancer, a personal history of lung disease, lifestyle or environmental factors can put a person at elevated risk. Most importantly, a person's age and smoking habits can be an indicator of whether he or she should consider

screening. More people now qualify for yearly LDCT scans, according to the updated guidelines published by the USPSTF. The guidelines lowered the eligibility threshold based on a person's age and smoking habits. An annual LDCT screening is recommended for people who meet this criteria: 50-80 years old Actively smoke or have a history of smoking within the last 15 years Heavily smoke or used to heavily smoke (people who have smoked for 20 "pack years" or more) Pack years are determined by the number of cigarette packs smoked per day by the number of years a person has smoked. For example, smoking one package per day for 20 years equals 20 pack years. 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10 Winter Safety Tips for a Propane-Fueled Home

1. Make sure you have an adequate propane supply. Schedule regular winter visits with your propane supplier so you always have an adequate supply in your tank.
2. Mark the location of your tank with a flag, post or stake. Ensure it is higher than the average snow cover depth for your location. These markers can help you avoid plowing or shoveling rooftop snow on top of your tank. Should your tank become covered with snow, use a broom to clear it.
3. Make sure your heating system and appliances are running efficiently. Before the start of each heating season,

have a qualified service technician inspect and service your appliances and propane system. This can help ensure your appliances are running as efficiently as possible.

4. Create an emergency preparedness plan and review it with everyone in your family. Post a list with contact information for your propane supplier and emergency services along with instructions for turning off propane, electricity and water. If you need to turn off your propane, contact a service technician to inspect your propane system prior to turning it back on.
5. Prepare a family disaster supply kit. Include several days' worth of water and canned foods, along with a car opener, extra clothes, blankets, flashlights and

batteries. Also include a battery-powered weather radio so you can stay informed as conditions change.

6. Check your chimneys, flue pipes, vent connectors and propane tank for damage, blockage or debris caused by snow and ice. Use a broom rather than a shovel and clear these areas frequently to help reduce the possibility of carbon monoxide poisoning.
7. Consider installing UL-listed propane gas detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. These detectors can provide you and your family with an additional measure of security. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding installation, location and maintenance.
8. After a storm passes and it is safe to do so, check the entire area for

damaged power lines, damaged gas lines or damage to your propane tank. Immediately call your local utility company or propane supplier if any of these hazards exist. Do not attempt repairs yourself.

9. Never use a stove for space heating and never use outdoor propane appliances indoors or in enclosed areas, particularly in the event of a power outage. Proper ventilation is necessary for safe operation, and the carbon monoxide sensor can be lethal. Only use appliances in doors that are designed and approved for indoor use, never store, place or use a propane cylinder indoors or in an enclosed area.
10. Conserve energy. Keep thermostats at 65°F during the day and 55°F at night, and close off any rooms that don't need to be heated.

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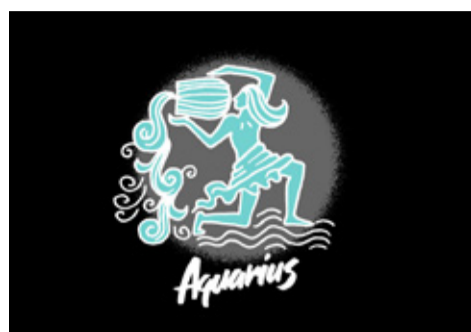

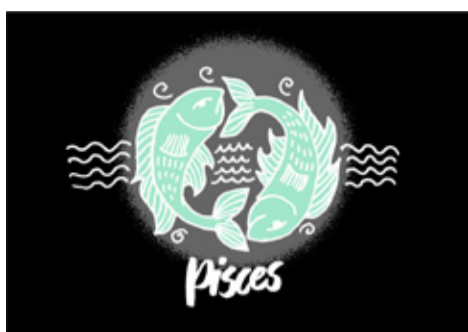

Those attending can enjoy a brew while listening to some of Beethoven's greatest pieces for small ensembles performed by talented THSO musicians.

"We are thrilled to partner with Terre Haute Brewing Company for this event. Classical music doesn't need to be confined to the traditional concert hall, and our musicians are really looking forward to bringing their craft into a new venue," commented Samantha Johnson-Helms, Executive Director and Principal Clarinet.

Beethoven & Brews will include a few of Beethoven's most notable chamber works, including his String Quartet Op. 18, No. 1, the Sextet Op. 17 arranged for woodwind quintet, and his Trio Op. 87 for two oboes and English Horn. Beethoven's works will be preceded by Haydn's String Quartet Op. 20, No. 2, a composer that would have had significant influence on Beethoven's style and compositions.

Concerts in the THSO Presents! series were first

imagined in 2004 by Artistic Director David Bowden and former THSO Board Member Bev Cristee as an outreach program, taking the THSO – sometimes the full orchestra and at other times smaller ensembles – into atypical venues in the community to connect the THSO with a wider audience. The initial series of concerts was presented in historic churches in downtown Terre Haute.

Over the years, a wide variety of styles and artists have been presented. These include a cabaret featuring Rumer Willis at the Indiana Theater, a Sinatra Valentine at the Terre Haute Brewing Company, a Simon & Garfunkel tribute, a concert featuring music from the Downton Abbey Era, Beethoven Symphony No. 9 at Hatfield Hall, and an Irish-themed concert at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church.

"We are delighted to continue presenting concerts in this series," said David Bowden. "The Terre Haute Brewing Company has been a wonderful partner, and we are excited to return to this venue."

The pairing of the THSO's Beethoven & Brews is especially appropriate for two reasons. First, Beethoven was known to enjoy his

pipe and a glass of beer after dinner. Also just as Beethoven is an important historical figure, both the Terre Haute Symphony Orchestra and Terre Haute Brewing Company hold a long, notable history in the Wabash Valley.

The THSO presented their debut concert in 1926 at the then recently-built Indiana Theatre under the direction of Will H. Bryant. At their beginning the symphony was a volunteer group of musicians who provided community entertainment. Over the next 40 years, the orchestra would grow, even welcoming Grammy Award-winning violinist Isaac Stern as a guest artist. In 1962, for the first time, all THSO members would be paid, making the orchestra truly professional. This makes the THSO, now in their 96th year, the oldest professional orchestra in the state of Indiana, a title they are honored to bear. The Terre Haute Brewing Company holds a significant and rich history as well. As one of the original nine commercial breweries in the U.S. (established 1837), and the second oldest remaining today, the THBC current brewmasters incorporate many local ingredients as well as references to the Terre Haute heritage in

their beers.

Doors will open at 6pm. The concert begins at 7pm. Terre Haute Brewing Company is a family friendly venue and those under 21 are allowed. Guests are welcome to use the restroom or visit the bar anytime throughout the evening.
