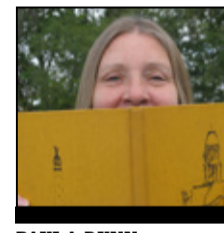
was Cottingham Estates housing addition.

Noblesville's Homegrown Department Store: A History

From Time to Thyme

Sixty years ago this week, Noblesville's homegrown department store, the Craycraft Dry Goods Co., closed its doors for good.

In announcing the closing, the January 2, 1962 Noblesville Daily Ledger observed that 1962 would have been Craycraft's 95th year in business.

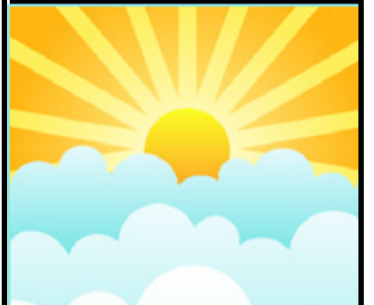
I'm afraid they were a little off. In digging through the old newspapers I discovered the firm would actually have been 90.

The Ledger apparently based its calculations on 1867, the year founder Daniel Craycraft arrived in Noblesville. However, Craycraft didn't enter the dry goods trade immediately upon moving here. He initially worked as a photographer for a year or so, and for three or four years after that he was a partner in the Vestal & Craycraft drug store.

It wasn't until 1872 that he opened a variety store on the northeast corner of Logan and



Wakesurfing Bill Will Keep Indiana's Waters Safe for Future Generations

Boating and towed water sports are a beloved multi-generational pastime — a way for many to spend time outdoors, engaging in healthy physical activity and having a lot of fun with the whole family. As a lifelong Hoosier, boating industry member, avid boater and wake surfing Dad, it is important to me and my family that Indiana has clear laws to protect our recreational activities while also addressing important safety issues on our lakes.

This legislative session, Senator Sue Glick introduced Senate Bill 187 (SB 187), which just passed the Senate by a vote of 40-6 and now moves on to the House for a vote, where it is sponsored by Representative David Abbott. The bill establishes and enforces smart and responsible safeguards for wake surfing and wakeboarding

in Indiana waters.

This bill proposes needed safeguards to protect our communities and our recreational activities, and I'm happy to see our state Senator swiftly passed this measure. SB 187 would prohibit wake surfing and wakeboarding at night, addressing the valid public concern for accidents on the water after sundown. The bill would also sensibly prohibit wake surfing behind any boat whose propellers extend beyond the transom or swim platform, into the area where a person would surf behind a boat. The proposed bill also aligns restrictions on wake surfing and wakeboarding on small, public freshwater lakes (70 to 300 acres), to be consistent with these lakes' speed limit exemption. Wake surfers and wakeboarders would need to follow the same rules currently in

place for water skiers. To ensure each of these proposed regulations are followed, the bills propose penalties and a procedure for property owners to petition the Natural Resources Commission (NRC) to adopt other rules concerning wake boarding and/or surfing as they deem necessary. The passage of SB 187 will help to promote the significant economic benefits of the boating industry to the Indiana economy, supporting over 14,000 jobs in approximately 400 Indiana businesses. Over 200,000 boats are registered to Hoosiers, and an estimated \$313 million a year goes into the state's economy when considering revenue generated from boats, engines, marine accessories and more. The recreational boating industry, of which I am a proud member, has a long tradition of

supporting education and promoting responsibility among boaters. We feel that many of the wake sport-related issues that arise on the water and in lake communities can be managed with a renewed commitment to responsible practices. This bill, accompanied by educational programs, will help to accomplish this.

I applaud Senator Glick and Representative Abbott for introducing and supporting SB 187 and I encourage the Indiana legislature to pass this important legislation for Governor Holcomb to sign into Indiana law.

A week ago, there was a 90-minute public information session to give people an opportunity to review preliminary design plans for the intersection of 146th Street and Allisonville Road

For those who didn't attend the meeting or haven't kept up to date with the plans, the \$29 million project now going on \$37 million, expected to begin in spring 2023 and completed by fall 2024, will construct 146th Street over Allisonville Road via a new overpass bridge, to reduce congestion at the intersection, which currently has traffic signals. There will be exit and entrance ramps connecting 146th Street to a roundabout on Allisonville Road below, much like Keystone Avenue in Carmel.

"This is something that we have been discussing since I became a Commissioner in 2013," said Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. "The traffic on 146th Street continues to increase each year as it's one of the most traveled east to west

corridors in the county and has exceeded its original growth expectations."

Eight-foot-wide Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) pedestrian paths will be installed on the west, south and east legs of the project. Also, the northern portion of the road that circles Northridge will be reconstructed, and a new entrance to Willow Crest neighborhood in the southeast quadrant of the intersection will be constructed. A new frontage road will provide access to six residential properties in the northeast quadrant of the intersection.

The eastbound and

westbound bridges are expected to be widened to accommodate the additions of both acceleration and deceleration lanes.

The first phase of the construction is to construct a crossover pavement in the grass median west of Allisonville Road, and to remove median curbs.

The next phase, 2abc, shifts traffic on existing pavement to allow the construction of the ramps offline. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained in the eastbound and westbound directions, while traffic will be reduced to one lane in the northbound

and southbound directions. Right turns will be allowed. The 146th Street Bridge over White River to the west of the intersection will be widened, and traffic will be shifted on the bridge.

In Phase 2d, Allisonville Road will be closed

to construct the pavement connecting the new ramps. Two lanes of traffic will continue to be maintained on 146th Street.

In Phase 3a, Allisonville Road will stay closed during construction to the north and south and the piers for 146th Street

bridge over Allisonville Road. Two lanes of traffic will continue in each direction on the new ramps.

In Phase 3b, Allisonville Road will be reopened with one lane north and southbound with right turns only. The 146th Street traffic will remain on the ramps while 146th Street, the retaining walls, and the bridge are constructed.

During Phase 4, traffic will be open in all directions with some single-lane closures for finalizing curb, gutter and pedestrian path, reconstruction of center curbs and to finish the eastern end of the project.

The project will require 1.7 more acres of right-of-way, 1.11 acres of temporary right-of-way and 16 home relocations of which 11 have already been acquired.

North Ninth Streets (the future site of the American National Bank.) There, he sold a little bit of everything from toys, to glassware, to buggy whips, to "Fancy and Staple Groceries."

In October of 1880, the store moved into its permanent home, the first building east of Citizens' Bank. (The bank occupied the southeast corner of Conner and South Ninth Streets.)

According to the August 25, 1905, Enterprise, Craycraft's variety store narrowed its focus to dry goods about ten years after the move. (Dry goods stores generally sold toiletries, notions, ready-to-wear clothing and yard goods, but no hardware or groceries.)

When Daniel Craycraft died in 1902, his 21 year-old son, George, took over the reins. Luckily, George had already decided to follow in his father's footsteps and had just finished up his studies at a business school back east.

Two years later, George sold half interest in the store to head clerk Eugene Osbon and for a few years

the store was known as "Craycraft & Osbon." (There's a neat photo in the Ledger's 100th anniversary tabloid of a crowd standing in front of the Craycraft & Osbon store, waiting for \$100 worth of pennies to be tossed from the roof as part of a sales promotion.)

After Osbon's exit around 1910, Craycraft's once again became a family concern.

George's brother, Albert, joined the business in 1911, and following George's death in 1940, he and George's sons, George, Jr. and David, ran the company until it closed.

In addition to the main Conner Street location, Craycraft's opened The Annex ("a budget price, ready-to-wear store") on the north side of the square in 1932 and from 1948 to 1956 the three Craycrafts and Albert's son-in-law, Charles Lyon, operated an appliance store, Craycraft-Lyon, Inc.

Craycraft's main store was remodeled four times, the last time in 1950 when it took over the building once occupied by the bank.

I remember Craycraft's, but I was so young my memories of it are a little hazy and confined mostly to things a kid would think worth noticing, like the water fountain, the open tables filled with merchandise and the balcony.

Albert Craycraft noted in John Foland's "Remembrances" that the balcony was added so they'd have a place to sell Victrolas and Victor records. They also installed soundproof rooms where customers could listen to the records.

(Incidentally, the whole Craycraft family was quite musical. George, Sr., and Albert both played in small orchestras and many Noblesville children took piano lessons from their sister, Edith Craycraft Hovey or from Albert's daughter, Mary Lyon.)

My main memory of Craycraft's is of the shoe department. George Thom, who ran it, grew up down the street from my mother and "Uncle George" was the only person Mom trusted to fit me with shoes.

Even if Craycraft's only lasted 90 years, that's still an amazing run for one business.
