What makes Diane Reed smile? "About everything," said the 82-year-old Noblesville resident. "I like to see the glass half full, when I see people in a way, when they say something, I usually take it as an uplifting thing and more often than not I smile especially when something is really silly, then I really smile. I'm probably one of those old-fashioned people who smiles at the silliest things." She was found in a nun habit, portraying Sister Albertine in The Belfry Theatre's next production, "The Lilies of the Field," opening Friday and continuing weekends through March 27 at The Ivy Tech Auditorium in Noblesville. It's not the first time that she has performed as a nun in a community theater production. She portrayed a nun in The Belfry's "Nunsense" and "Nunsense II" and "The Sound of Music." And she has played a maid at least twice. She has been acting since she started on "this very stage," (The Ivy Tech Auditorium, which is the former Noblesville High School) almost 50 years ago, in 1973, when she and her husband moved to Noblesville and they both acted in "Guys and Dolls," directed by Betty Foland and John Foland. "My husband was cast as Sky Masterson, and they put me in as a Hot Box Dancer. Then years later, they reprised the ("Guys and Dolls") show at The Belfry, then I played a Mission Worker. Diane was born and raised in Pittsburgh, Pa. What brought her to Hamilton County? "My husband's job," she said. "We moved around a lot. He started a new job here." Reed didn't think she wanted to leave the last place she lived. "But when I moved here (to Noblesville), people were so friendly." Hobbies and interests? "I'm working as an evaluator and grade tests for various states. "Until Covid, I was a substitute teacher, and I loved it." She plays Bridge with a group of men and has been in the choir and played handbells at Noblesville First UMC. She has three children and three grandchildren. "I had the record (at one time) of being the oldest mother at Riverview Hospital to have a baby ... I was 43."

'The Lilies of the Field' Play is About Faith, Endurance, Belfry Director Says

It was the "beautifully crafted story about faith in God and how He often provides others as a means to answer our prayers" was the reason that Linnéa Leatherman of Westfield chose "The Lilies of the Field" for her first play to direct for The Belfry Theatre. "We have all needed faith and endurance to get us through the last few years, and this play is about a nun from what was East Germany in 1954 who never waivers in her faith that God will send her "a big stronk

man." Those are the words (and spelling) that author William Barrett used to describe the big strong man who appeared to help a group of German-speaking nuns build a chapel in his 1962 novel that was also a 1963 film starring the late Sidney Poitier, who just died three days before the first read-through of this Belfry Theatre play. That story is now being told in The Belfry Theatre's upcoming production of the play, which opens

Hamilton County Clerk's Office Begins Mailing Absentee Ballots

The Hamilton County Clerk's Office began sending out absentee ballots today. Registered voters can vote absentee by mail for a number of reasons, among them:

- If they are confined to their residence, hospital, or nursing home due to illness
- If they are caring for someone who is confined
- If they are 65 years of age or older
- If they are absent from the county on election day during the entire 12 hours the polls are open
- If they are a voter with disabilities
- If they have official election duties outside of their voting precinct

• If they are scheduled to work the entire 12 hours that the polls are open

- If they are observing a religious discipline or religious holiday during the entire 12 hours the polls are open
- If they do not have transportation to the polls
- If they are a member of the IN National Guard deployed or on assignment in Indiana or a public safety officer

"If you're planning to request an absentee ballot, please do so as early as possible," says Beth Sheller, Hamilton County Election Administrator. "It's as easy as submitting an application

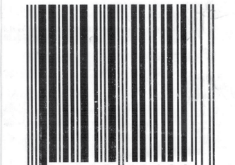

He was born Jan. 9, 1944, in Vandalia, Ill., he was the son of the late Ralph and Viola Smith.

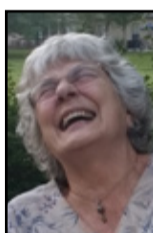
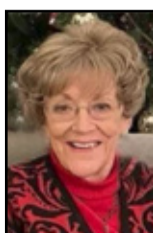
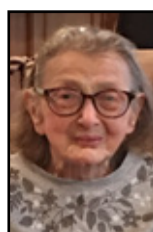

On February 26, 1987, President Ronald Reagan officially declared March National Disabilities Awareness Month. The proclamation called for people to provide understanding, encouragement and opportunities to help persons with disabilities lead productive and fulfilling lives.

The Arc of Indiana works each and every day to raise awareness about the strengths and needs of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Equally important, we work to be part of the solution in ensuring ALL people have the opportunity to live, learn, work and fully participate in their community.

We want to be at the table and "in the room where it happens" to not only represent people with IDD, but also to ensure people with IDD themselves have a voice at the table through our strong affiliation with Self-Advocates of Indiana.

Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch and the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHEDA) today announced the state's mortgage assistance program, the Indiana Homeowner Assistance Fund (IHAF). The portal is accepting applications for mortgage assistance for Hoosiers impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

As part of the American Rescue Plan Act, the U.S. Department of Treasury awarded Indiana with \$167,921,663 to be used for assistance with the mortgage payments, property taxes, homeowners insurance and homeowner/condominium fees of eligible Hoosiers.

"The Indiana Homeowner Assistance Fund (IHAF) is designed to promote housing stability and prevent foreclosures across the Hoosier state," Crouch said. "We are pleased to work with our network of program partners and participating lenders to provide this assistance."

Applications are being accepted through 877gethope.org. Accommodations can be made for homeowners who would prefer non-electronic applications or who would prefer assistance in completing their online application by calling 877-GET-HOPE.

- To qualify for IHAF, as determined by the U.S. Treasury, at the time of application you must:

- Be a homeowner who is defined as the owner-occupant of a single-family home, condominium, 2-, 3-, or 4-family dwelling or manufactured homes permanently affixed to real property. The home must be located in Indiana and be the homeowner's primary residence

- Have an income equal to or less than 150% of Area Median Income, adjusted for household size or 100% of the National Median Income, whichever is greater

- Have experienced a financial hardship after January 21, 2020, associated with the COVID-19 pandemic

The maximum per household IHAF assistance amount is capped at \$35,000 and is limited to one time per household. This assistance is paid directly to the mortgage lender and is not considered taxable income.

"IHEDA remains committed to allocating funds from the federal government to Hoosiers in need," said Jacob Sipe, Executive Director of IHEDA. "Housing stability continues to be one of our top priorities as we recover from

the pandemic. We look forward to administering this mortgage assistance Hoosiers across the state."

The following documents may be required in the application:

- Income documents:
 - Acceptable income documents may include paystubs or other wage statements, depository institution (or bank) statements demonstrating regular income, or a statement of income from an employer
 - IRS Form 1099s and tax filings (for self-employed applicants only)
 - Social security, child support, unemployment, and other income statements as applicable
- Mortgage statements or other mortgage documents
- Property tax statements from your city, town or county
- Homeowner's Insurance statements
- Homeowner or Condo Association fee statements

In addition to the IHAF program, IHEDA has additional resources for Hoosiers in need of assistance:

Rental Assistance – The Indiana Emergency Rental Assistance Program provides up to 18 months of rental and utility assistance to those who self-attest to having been impacted by COVID-19.

Utility Assistance – The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and the Low-Income Home Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) helps Hoosier homeowners and renters pay their heat, electric and water bills: eap.ihcda.in.gov.

shows up in the bowl, you have a leak

- Listen. One of the simplest ways to watch out for leaks is to listen for dripping from your faucets or showerheads and running water from your toilet

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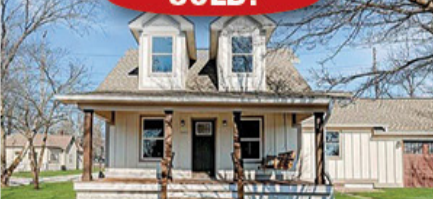

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How to Support People with Developmental Disabilities in Your Workplace and Community

March marks Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month, a time to increase public awareness of the needs and potential of all people with developmental disabilities. The awareness month also highlights a time to provide encouragement and opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities to achieve self-sufficiency and independence.

A developmental disability is attributable to a mental, physical or combined impairment that results in substantial functional limitations in three or more activities of daily living, such as self-care, communications, learning, mobility, problem solving or independent living. Examples of developmental disabilities include cerebral palsy, epilepsy and Down syndrome. Despite having unique challenges, with the right individualized supports, people with developmental disabilities have the potential to contribute greatly to their families, workplaces and communities.

The importance of inclusion:

It's vital to consider and value people with developmental disabilities in the same way we would anyone else. While we are all different and unique, we tend to have similar aspirations for a good life — living somewhere we enjoy with those closest to us, engaging in work and social activities that interest and stimulate us, and maintaining relationships with family and friends. It's pivotal to respect the autonomy of people with developmental disabilities to make

decisions for themselves based on their own preferences and to treat them with the same respect we expect people to treat us.

Additionally, it's important to advocate that people with developmental disabilities be meaningfully included in activities and places that many of us take for granted, like the school system, in sports and recreational activities, places of worship, volunteering activities and in the workplace. As a health plan, our team at CareSource is creating a culture where our care coordinators discuss employment during the initial and annual plan of care. We provide education to the person or their caregiver when they are interested in a job and help to identify and secure the supports necessary to accomplish their employment goals.

As an employer, we need to practice what we preach. At CareSource, we are committed to employing and creating internship opportunities for people with developmental disabilities. Sometimes, we need to customize a job to match the skills and strengths of a person. Other times, we need to offer a compatible job coach or technology to assist and allow them to be as productive and successful in their role as possible. By embedding evidence-based practices and flexibilities into our workplace, our workforce will be more reflective of the rich diversity of our markets and the people we serve. The quality of the services we will provide will be enriched, and our strategies, ideas and innovations will be better informed by the very populations we are here to serve.

How to Be Supportive:

Common misconceptions about people with developmental disabilities is that they are limited in what they can do or how they can contribute to family life, the workforce or their communities. We can minimize these assumptions by meaningfully engaging with developmental disabilities in our workplaces, social circles or various recreational activities. The more that people with developmental disabilities are included in typical community life, the clearer their value as

friends, classmates, employees and coworkers is realized by the public and people who benefit from their engagement.

People should also utilize resources and take the chance to educate themselves about the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000, the landmark U.S. Supreme Court case *Olmstead v. L.C.*, the federally-funded Developmental Disabilities network (including state Councils on Developmental Disabilities, University Centers for Excellence in Devel-

opmental Disabilities Education, Research, and Service (UCEDDs), and state Protection and Advocacy Systems). Also, consider learning more about advocacy groups focused on people with developmental disabilities like Self-Advocates Becoming Empowered and TASH.

As private citizens, we can engage as a volunteer for advocacy organizations supporting people with developmental disabilities, we can become a mentor or peer to someone with intellectual and developmental

disabilities, or we can participate in community events that are focused on promoting people with developmental disabilities. Friday and continues weekends through March 27. It's the third show in Hamilton County Theatre Guild's 57th season, and the show is dedicated to Poitier, acknowledged in the show's playbill.

"I love how the play teaches us that you never know when you may be the answer to someone's prayer," Leatherman said.

A Gary, Ind.-born actor by the name of DéJon LéTray Marshall-Fisher plays Poitier's lead role of Homer Smith, the handyman, in all eight performances of The Belfry play.

Kim O'Mara plays her first lead role as the main character, Mother Maria Marthe (and came in well after the play was into its rehearsal period due to replacing the original cast member), and "has an amazing job" and "is the perfect foil" to Homer Smith, Leatherman said.

"The play is set in 1954, and Homer is a Black man recently discharged from the U.S. Army and traveling across the country in his station wagon when he meets the Rev. Mother

... who has been praying for God to send her a big, strong man to build her a chapel." Poitier was the first Black actor to win an Academy Award for Best Actor.

"It is an iconic role," Leatherman said. "As a director, you find yourself figuratively holding your breath, and praying, before your auditions for an actor to come your way who not only fits the type of character needed for an iconic role, but who has great acting skills and the physical stamina to carry the role."

She said Marshall-Fisher is "marvelous" in the role. "He has created a character with which our audiences will relate and whom they will adore. DéJon graduated from the theater program at Indiana State University and learned there how to work hard to create a multi-faceted character like Homer. He has not only done that but has made it a fun experience for all of us, as we have seen him bring Homer to life." (Read more about Marshall-Fisher in an

upcoming edition of The Times.)

Although she has been on several community theater stages, in the Indy metro area, also in northwest Indiana and Boston, she had never thought about seeking a directing experience in this area. Then, three years ago, her friend Belfry play director Carla Crandall of Noblesville began talking to her about directing for the playhouse. So Leatherman applied to be a guest director.

While the show has been rehearsing in The Belfry Theatre, performances will be in The Ivy Tech Auditorium at Ivy Tech Hamilton County in Noblesville. "It's a rather bittersweet experience, because we are in this marvelous tiny theater with all of its wonderful history, some of which includes my husband, Duane (an actor), and I being onstage there, yet our audiences will not meet us there," Leatherman said. She arrives an hour before rehearsal and sits in front of the stage and thinks about not only her show and its rehearsals but

all of the shows and all of the people who have been on stage and poured their hearts out to Belfry audiences over the years.

Leatherman found casting the show (she lost two cast members after being well into the rehearsal process) and finding crew (she had to replace several staff members) were among the challenges of doing the show. She said finding cast and crew was difficult due to "so much competition" and because many of the theaters "are in production at the same time."

Another challenge was rehearsing on The Belfry's "tiny stage," while knowing that the show would be performed on a much larger stage, where the actors would wear microphones and adjust their blocking, at The Ivy Tech Auditorium.

"While a challenge, it is also a wonderful opportunity for an actor to expand his experience and vision," said Leatherman, who in the past has worked with Christian Youth Theater Indy with casts of up to 90 youth.

The set is a side-by-side model of the nuns' refectory and a cafe owned and operated by Jose Gonzalez. Creatively designed by Ian Marshall-Fisher, constructed by Ian and Robert Rave and cast members, and decorated by Jan Borchering and Kathy Rosemary, the set allows for nonstop movement of the multitude of scenes in this show.

There are no set changes to slow down the forward momentum of the scenes, she said, and the actors bring their own props onstage and off, so nothing stops the show except the ends of the acts, Leatherman said.

She feels blessed to use the Ivy Tech Auditorium, where her cast and crew moved their set and assembled it on the brief span of last Sunday afternoon and followed up with a tech cue-to-cue, "where actors go to places for each scene and we make sure out lighting design by Erica Matters and my staging for

the actors match up, along with our sound design by Geoff Lynch." Then they will have to move everything -- including set, furniture, props and costumes procured for cast by Judy McGroarty -- back to The Belfry on the final Sunday afternoon.

Leatherman's enjoyed working as a team, creating this show. Assistant director Lori Lavelle and Leatherman worked together in this capacity on two "enormous" CYT shows, "Peter Pan: A New Musical" and "Tarzan," with 70 to 90 youth ages 7-19 in the cast and crew.

She's glad to collaborate with her assistant director, "an exceptionally creative person with ideas that often enhance a scene in ways I have not considered" and have Lavelle's experience with tech issues.

Show producer Andrea Odle came into the group late but, fortunately, Odle is "an extremely motivated person who gets the ball rolling in all kinds of situations, which has been just what has been needed for our show, and we all really appreciate what she has been able to accomplish for us," Leatherman said. "There are all kinds of tasks that need to be done to mount a community theater production, and the producer is responsible for a great deal for that. It's a big job."

Leatherman grew up in Portage, Ind., and started her acting career at the elaborate Gary Music Theatre at the Valparaiso Opera House, and with Ross Summer Music Theatre in Merrillville. She also did theater while

living in Boston during the late 1970s. "Theater brings people together, and you become very close to those with whom you perform," Leatherman said. She met her husband, Duane, at the Repertory Theatre at CTS in 1987 in the direction of "Camelot," and have been performing together and separately ever since.

She was asked to go out to Myers Dinner Theatre in Hillsboro to work as a professional actress in 2005, and then was asked to direct in 2006, which began her career of directing in musical productions. She was there for 13 years.

While she was at Myers, Leatherman was constantly performing in a show while rehearsing for the next show, playing many leading roles, giving her "a resume that many would envy."

For "The Lilies of the Field," she conducted auditions in mid-December because she thought it might be difficult to cast the show with so many competing theaters having auditions over the winter, and because she wanted to allow for rehearsal cancellations due to winter weather.

The show has five nuns, four men and a folksinger.

"Each of them tells a part of the story, and each is important to the show," Leatherman said. "I always tell my actors that the playwright wrote each specific line to tell you more about the character, or to tell the story. That is why it is so important to always memorize a script exactly as it is written."

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house square today, the current home of the Hamilton County Historical Society Museum. The old log jail was located on the northwest corner of the square.)

The May 7, 1945, Noblesville Daily Ledger reported that the handmade, six or seven inch-long key had recently been presented to Sheriff George Michelfelder by farmer Daniel Dawson.

Dawson, 88 at that time, stated that he'd acquired the key about 70 years earlier from Amasa Hess, whom he identified as a former sheriff. (Actually, Hess

served as county treasurer from 1875-1877.)

Our next exhibit appeared a few days later in the May 10, 1945, Ledger.

After reading about the key to the jail, Judge Fred Hines revealed that he possessed a key to the old two-story 1837 courthouse, the one in use before the 1879 courthouse (our current "old courthouse") was constructed.

The courthouse key was given to him by his father, Hiram Hines, a former county auditor, but the judge didn't know where his father got the key, or how long he'd had it.

The June 23, 1881, Indianapolis News brought up another relic of the past with a Hamilton County connection.

According to the News, sometime in the 1850s workmen digging a cellar on Indianapolis' East Market Street unearthed a handsome tomahawk decorated with "silver devices — one of which was a rising sun — and with William Conner's name in intaglio."

The tomahawk was thought to have been French handiwork, but how it came to be buried in Indianapolis, and how long it had been there, remains a

mystery.

Next up is the 1856 Hamilton County map mentioned in the January 29, 1904, Hamilton County Ledger. This treasure was discovered in the office of then county auditor Isaac Powell.

The map included the forgotten Adams Township village of Dunbar and Shieldsville, a town located west of Atlanta (which was then known as Buena Vista,) but Olio, Aroma, Omega and Sheridan were missing and Carmel was still called "Bethlehem."

(I'd love to know what happened to that map. As

far as I know, the 1866 county map is the earliest one we have.)

Our final exhibit appeared in the September 2, 1881 Republican-Ledger.

Westfield miller John L. Semans happened to be living in Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1845 when relations between the Mormons who founded the city and their anti-Mormon neighbors turned violent.

In 1848, Semans moved to Westfield and brought with him a souvenir of the Illinois Mormon War — a cannonball.

Not long afterward, in an effort to spite his brother,

Semans' young son buried the ball in the ground somewhere.

Although multiple attempts were made to locate Semans' souvenir, the cannonball remained lost until 1881 when some men discovered it while grading their yard.

The museum is closing now. Please move toward the exits, and remember to keep checking this space for future exhibits!
