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Are Political Sign Ordinances Being Selectively Enforced?

"Rules for thee and not for me." You might have heard the phrase, which refers to making others follow rules without having to follow rules themselves. In this column, I'll be referring to political signs in the right-of-ways -- and how some political signs are removed by the City of Noblesville and some are not removed. Code enforcement is done by the City's Planning Department, which in February sent out letters to 2022 political candidates, as a reminder of the Unified Development Ordinance standards for the City of Noblesville. The ordinance states that signs are not allowed on city-owned property, nor within the city's right-of-way or on utility poles. That said, I asked: Why isn't the City of Noblesville's Planning Department removing signs that are clearly in the right

of way, according to both the Hamilton County and City of Noblesville Geographic Information Systems (GIS), specifically signs that are displayed on the northwest corner of Indiana 19 (Cicero Road) and Logan Street in downtown Noblesville? The right-of-way goes all the way back to the property's gravel area, according to the GIS, which the Noblesville Planning Department uses religiously. It appears that most of these political signs are incumbents. So here is where I ask: Is this an issue of rules for thee and not for me? Before 8 a.m. Monday, I posed that question and other questions that I have about enforcing the City's sign ordinance in an email to the Planning Department's code compliance manager, Justin Hubbard. He answered my email just after 4 p.m., with a response that read very much like a media spokesperson had written it. He replied to my question about the political signs in the right-of-way at Ind. 19 and Logan Street, by telling me, "This issue was recently brought to our attention and is under review. Following the 1989 Logan Street project, this property was never replatted so the boundary lines are less clear. On Friday, we located a historical document from the 1989 project that will help us determine specifically how much right-of-way actu-

If you've ever studied a map of Hamilton County, you can't fail to notice this county has several roads that go nowhere. Well okay, they actually do go SOMEwhere; they just don't lead where you might expect because the communities for which they were named no longer exist. In a few cases, like Cyntheanne and Gray, a single building remains behind to preserve the memory of the bygone community. Cyntheanne Road still takes you to the Cyntheanne Christian Church (on Cyntheanne Road between 126th and 136th Streets) and Gray Road leads to Gray Friends Church (146th Street and Gray Road.) Another example is Hazel Dell Road, which was named for the old Noblesville Township school at 169th Street and Hazel Dell Road, and the neigh-

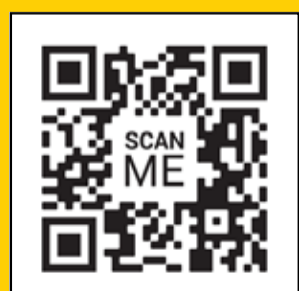

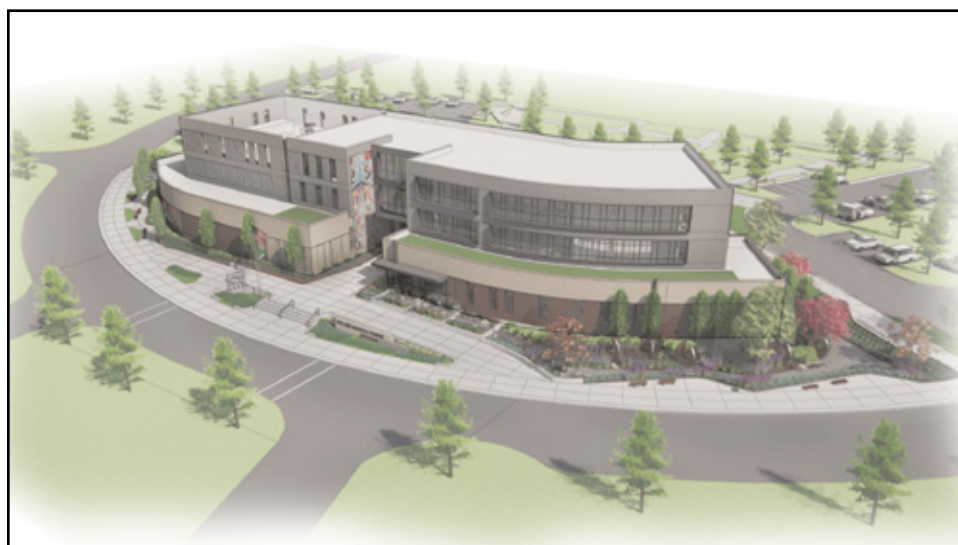

City Of Fishers Unveils Design, Programming for New Arts & Municipal Complex

The City of Fishers presented the design and programming plans for its new Arts & Municipal Complex this evening to its City Council during a public Work Session. The City sought RFPQs for a new Complex in the fall of 2021 after receiving engineering reports deeming the existing City Hall in dire need of millions of dollars of repairs due to foundational and mechanical failures.

"We've been able to leverage an unfortunate situation into an opportunity to answer a long-standing need in our community and to continue making investments in arts and culture in Fishers," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "I'm grateful for the collaboration of Fishers' arts groups, the Indianapolis Arts Center, and the City Council to make this a reality. Upon completion of this building, our arts community will have a home, and city staff will be able to better collaborate and effectively serve our community every day."

With a large pedestrian breezeway at its center, the three-story Arts & Municipal Complex will dedicate its first floor to

the Fishers Art Center, a dynamic arts education facility with a dedicated exhibit, performance, and gathering spaces. In coordination with the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission, the City of Fishers collaborated with the Indianapolis Art Center to leverage their 90 years of experience and expertise to determine space needs for the Art Center. To draw from the Art Center's vast experience and expertise, the City of Fishers intends to enter into an operator's agreement with the Indianapolis Art Center to program and operate the facility.

The Fishers Art Center will also feature a flexible studio-style theater with varying seating and configuration options to accommodate a variety of performances, meetings, and events. The theater will seat up to 250 for performances and more than 330 for flat-floor events. Fishers-based artists, performance groups, and nonprofits will have priority usage of the theater space. The upper floors of the complex will serve as a home for city administrative offices, with roughly 60 office spaces available.

Fishers-based artists, performance groups, and nonprofits will receive preferential use of the theater space.

"We are eager to collaborate with Fishers leaders and residents to fill the Fishers Arts Center with programming that's based on best practices but is also uniquely matched to the history, culture, and diverse population of Fishers," said Indianapolis Art Center President and CEO Mark Williams. "We look forward to classes, exhibitions, special events, and more that will celebrate, nurture and display the full range of Fishers' residents' creativity."

The Art Center was integrated into the rebuild of Fishers City Hall as a result of community feedback indicating a desire and demand for arts education and experiences within the community. The Art Center will be in the heart of the Fishers Nickel Plate District, a designated Statewide Cultural District.

"This is an exciting time for the arts community in Fishers," remarked David Decker, president of the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission. "Having a

physical home in Fishers was a long-term goal for many of us in the arts community and I can't think of a better location than this. We look forward to collaborating with Indianapolis Arts Center to continue to grow and drive arts in Fishers."

The second and third floors of the building will hold municipal offices and conference rooms to accommodate current staffing levels while planning for flexibility for potential future growth if needed.

The Arts & Municipal Complex will replace the existing footprint of City Hall located at 1 Municipal Drive with a slight expansion of its footprint to the east and west. Current parking lot access and capacities will be maintained. Following stakeholder feedback and design period, construction for the Arts & Municipal Complex will commence in the fall of 2022 following the demolition of the existing City Hall structure. Access to the Nickel Plate District Amphitheater (NPD AMP) and much of the AMP lawn will be maintained throughout the construction period. Residents conducting business with

the City will continue to have access to and complete transactions at the City Services Building at 3 Municipal Drive. More detailed information and timelines will be released as they become available.

The City sought the consensus of the City Council during a May 2021 public meeting to determine the benefits and risks of further investment in the existing City Hall compared to the demolition and reconstruction of a new facility. City staff shared the results of an engineering report that indicated the facility's foundation was failing, causing the building to sink in addition to a number of mechanical issues. City Council gave City staff the direction to begin the process of due diligence to seek RFPQs for the project. RFPQs were submitted to the city in fall 2021 with a design scoping agreement awarded to Meyer Najem and DELV Design in December 2021.

"It's been an incredible experience to lead the design of the Arts & Municipal Complex - not just professionally but personally as a resident of Fishers," said Jeremy Welu,

principal and co-founder of DELV Design. "The partnership with Meyer Najem and the City has allowed us to truly meet the goals of this project: to provide a functional and beautiful community beacon that becomes a 'building for the people,' and we couldn't be more excited to see it come to fruition."

The new facility has an estimated budget of \$22.8 million. Deputy Mayor Elliott Hultgren and City Controller Lisa Bradford presented the financial strategy for the funding the facility which will include using \$6 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, \$16 million in municipal bonds, and the remaining balance using City cash reserves. No property or income taxes will increase as a result of this project.

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Safe Driving Encouraged Ahead of Marijuana 'Holiday'

April 20, more commonly known as 4/20, has become synonymous with marijuana use and, in some circles, is considered a marijuana "holiday." Consequently, there will likely be an increase in marijuana use, despite being against the law in Indiana.

To prevent crashes, the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) wants to remind motorists that drug-impaired driving of any kind is dangerous, illegal and should be avoided at all costs. "There's a common

misconception that marijuana use doesn't affect your judgment or that it somehow makes you a better driver," said Devon McDonald, ICJI Executive Director. "That's simply false. THC has been known to slow reaction times and impair cognitive performance, which is a dangerous combination when behind the wheel."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, between 2009 and 2018, the presence of marijuana had nearly doubled among drivers who were killed

in crashes and tested for THC.

In light of this growing concern, over the past couple of years ICJI has provided dozens of police agencies with a new tool, known as the SoToxa Mobile Test System, to help identify and keep drug-impaired drivers off the road.

SoToxa is similar to a portable breathalyzer, but instead of testing for alcohol, it tests for the presence of six types of drugs: cocaine, methamphetamine, opiates, cannabis (THC), amphetamine

and benzodiazepines. In Indiana, the test is voluntary, non-evidentiary and can only be administered to individuals suspected of impaired driving.

As of March of this year, officers have administered more than 1,098 tests to drivers, with 566 coming back positive for at least one or more substance. Of those positives, 52% had traces of THC.

"This data gives us better insight into the prevalence of drug-impaired driving in Indiana and underscores the importance of improved educa-

tion and awareness," said Robert Duckworth, ICJI Traffic Safety Director. "Regardless of what day it is, driving while impaired by any substance is against the law and puts you and others in harm's way."

To keep road users safe, ICJI is asking the public to obey the rules of the road and to never drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Before heading out, plan ahead by designating a sober driver or using a ride service or public transportation. Never let friends get behind the wheel if they're

impaired.

It's also important to buckle up, avoid distractions and be on the lookout for unsafe drivers. Motorists are encouraged to report suspected impaired drivers by calling 911 or contacting their local department.

Police officers are always on high alert for signs of impairment while patrolling the road, but especially on days like 4/20.

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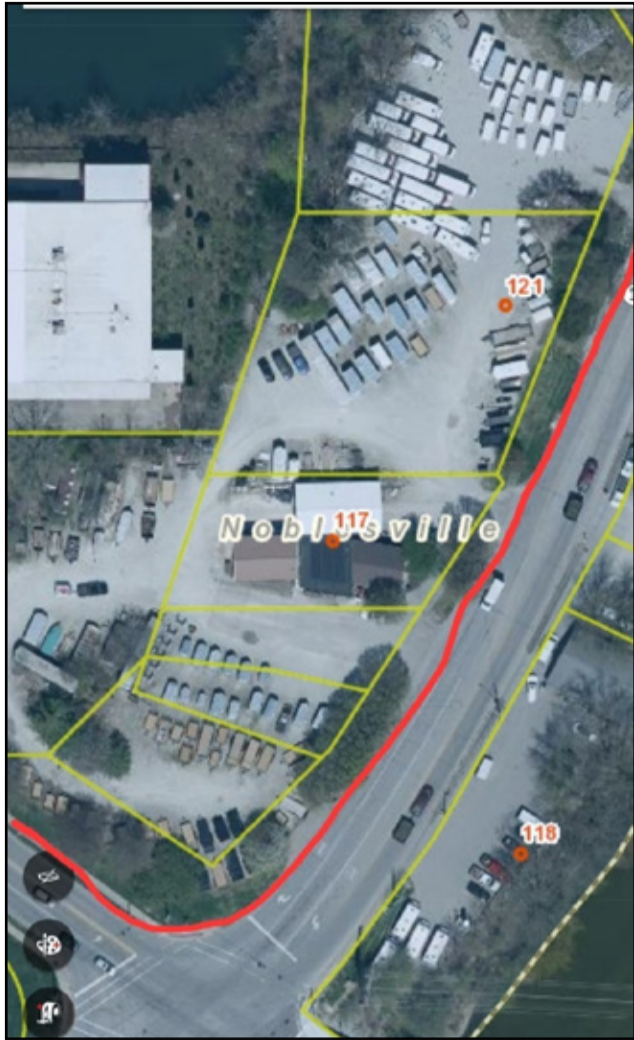

ally exists. We are going out this week to measure and see what is and is not right-of-way. In cases like this, where the right-of-way is in question, the City of Noblesville always sides with property owners unless it is beyond dispute that signs are located in the right-of-way."

Sounds like selective enforcement in favor of mostly incumbents.

It's like the city's hesitant to touch these signs.

The city spent a lot of time and effort and taxpayer dollars measuring, trying to find markers

and removing other candidates' political signs -- both large and small -- on other private properties in Noblesville that could also be considered "gray areas" of right-of-way on the GIS.

When I asked Hubbard who was responsible for removing political signs, he said, "It is the property owner's responsibility to place signs in the appropriate locations and to remove any signs placed in the right-of-way."

He went on to say, "The City of Noblesville Planning Department also has the ability to remove

signs from the right-of-way as part of our management of municipal property." Hubbard said, "We attempt to speak to property owners where possible to ensure that they are aware of applicable rules before removing signs in the right-of-way."

So, why didn't the City attempt to contact these property owners or political candidates, which I was just mentioning, before spending a lot of time and effort and taxpayer dollars taking down their political signs? And giving them the chance to move the signs out of the right-of-way?

All signs that are removed by the City, that the City sees as right-of-way violations, are taken to "sign jail" inside a gated area behind City Hall, where the candidates can retrieve the signs.

I also asked about the City ordinance that reads: "Signs may not be placed on vehicles or trailers which are parked or located for the primary purpose of displaying said signs." If this ordinance applies to private property, out of the right-of-way, how is this ordinance not an infringement on First Amendment rights?

The only response, from Hubbard, was, "The City of Noblesville does not regulate the content or message of signs, only the types of signs and the location of signs."

This obviously refers to political signs.

The U.S. Supreme Court, in a previous court case in Ladue, Mo., ruled that the display of political and other types of signs on residential property "is a unique, important, and protected means of communica-

tion, and cities and towns cannot restrict the display of such signs."

So why does the City of Noblesville reprimand some politicians, particularly new candidates, for having signs on vehicles and trailers, and not others?

Again, selective enforcement.

New political candidates don't have time and energy to fight the City because they're busy campaigning for office and trying to get their names out there.

All of this shows how important political yard signs have become during our local campaigns.

Political signs cost anywhere from \$5 for a small yard sign to a couple hundred dollars for a large 4-by-8-foot sign installed with heavy posts.

Recently, our Hamilton County Commissioners adopted an ordinance to limit political signs at poll locations for early voting on government property. The ordinance limits the number of political signs allowed at each polling place, one sign per voting location on Election Day and no more than two signs per voting location on Early Voting Days.

While political signs, at this time of year, pop up everywhere, like dandelions, the signs are a tradition.

And with an expected low-voter turnout due to the Primary being a non-presidential election, getting the word out is even more vital.

Now, with less than two weeks until the May 3 election, we'll see if the City's tape measure is accurate.

borhood that surrounded the school. Although classes haven't been taught in the old schoolhouse for decades, the building still exists.

The rest of the little hamlets and villages with roads named for them have vanished without a trace, though. The only place you're likely to find any information about them is an old 19th or early 20th century newspaper, or an old map.

One of those places is Moontown. I've passed Moontown Road a gazillion times, but I only learned in recent years that there was indeed a village called Moontown once at the intersection of what is now State Road 32 and Moontown Road.

According to a 1904 Hamilton County Ledger, Moontown was platted by John Moon, but I've been through the deed books in the courthouse up to the 1880s several times and I've never seen that plat.

Olio Road used to lead to the village of Olio. In its heyday, Olio, nicknamed "Licksillet," was the largest community in Fall Creek Township. Back then it was considered important enough to show up on early maps, but about all you'll see today at the intersection of 126th Street and Olio Road is Hamilton Southeastern High School.

Little Chicago Road took its name from Noblesville's Little Chicago school (Noblesville Township School No. 2,) and the neighborhood surrounding it at the intersection of State Road 38 and Little Chicago Road.

Little Chicago's social life centered around the school and a Methodist church, but the church was gone by 1902 and the school closed in the 1940s.

Stringtown Pike was named for another No-

blesville Township school, Stringtown (also known as School No. 7,) and the area around it. There actually was no "town" to this Stringtown. It consisted of just some rural homes and the school, which served as a neighborhood community center.

(Several states have a "Stringtown." The name supposedly comes from settled areas where the buildings were "strung out" along a road.)

Dunbar Road used to lead to the Dunbar school at 256th Street and Dunbar Road. The name is said to have been created by combining the name of the landowner, Isaac Dunn, with that of a teacher, a Miss Barr.

Supposedly, 33 lots were laid out in Dunbar in 1855, but I've never encountered a plat map for it in the deed books, either.

Although the school closed in the early 20th century, the neighborhood continued to be called "Dunbar" long after that.

(And yes, Isaac Dunn is one of my ancestors.)

The one road that's a complete mystery to me is Dartown Road. I couldn't find a single reference -- anywhere -- to a "Dartown" in this county.

And just to add another wrinkle, the road has two sections -- one in Adams Township between 246th Street and 256th Street, and another in Washington Township between 175th Street and 181st Street.

I have to believe there's a good story there somewhere.

If anyone has information about Dartown Road, please let me know. I'm curious.
