The Westfield Washington Public Library will cut the ribbon on its new outreach vehicle on Tuesday, May 24th at 10 a.m. in the library's parking lot.

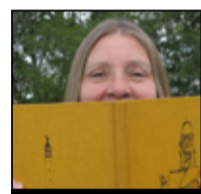

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Hamilton County Parks & Rec Acquires Land for Public Parks

The newly acquired farmland, indicated above by the grey square in the center of the photo, will offer increased opportunities for Hamilton County nature lovers.

In an effort to address the statistically alarming lack of dedicated public park space in Hamilton County, steps were successfully taken recently by the Hamilton County Parks and Recreation Department (HCPR) to acquire an ecologically significant parcel of property.

With unanimous approval provided by the department's park board, and supported by the Hamilton County Council and Commissioners, 107 acres of land in Hamilton County, located near the intersection of 216th Street and Hinkle Road, were purchased, with the intent of adding the

acreage to the county's park system. The acquired property, referred to as HC Farms, brings the total amount of land owned and maintained by the county park department to slightly more than 1,800 acres - which remains less than 23% of the space needed for parks in the county, as recommended by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

According to HCPR Superintendent of Natural Resources and Education, Amanda Smith, the HC Farms property represents the most significant opportunity that the park department has encountered in twenty

years. "Aside from the large list of plant and animal species currently found in the area, this property's environmental characteristics would be most enjoyed by passive recreation users who would appreciate the plant and animal diversity, scenic views, and relatively rugged terrain," she said.

As surrounding properties in both Noblesville and Westfield are being developed for commercial and residential use at such a rapid pace, county officials and park leadership felt it was imperative to secure the property, knowing it holds the potential to provide Hamilton County citizens and visitors with a park experience unlike any other available within the county park department. Hamilton County Parks and Recreation is currently seeking funds available through Indiana Department of Natural Resources programs - the In Lieu Fee and the Land and Water Conservation Fund, to acquire land previously impacted by development and agricultural activity, which has the potential to be restored and preserved as critical wildlife and

aquatic habitat.

Parks Director, Chris Stice, commented on the importance of the land acquisition, saying, "Hamilton County Parks, with invaluable support provided by Indiana DNR, feels blessed to be able to procure this ecological asset on behalf of our county and community. The department's intent is to restore the land's wetlands and stream corridor and expand the existing prairie.

Appropriate reforestation measures will also be taken. We are looking to strategically develop and maintain trails on the property, as well." The director added "By restoring the quality of the land's habitat, we are remaining true to our departmental mission of providing high quality passive parks and serving as responsible stewards of the land entrusted to us."

No specific timeline has been established for the park department's

planned efforts at the HC Farms property, as studies and exploration of the land and its potential are currently being conducted. Public input will continually be sought during the master planning process.

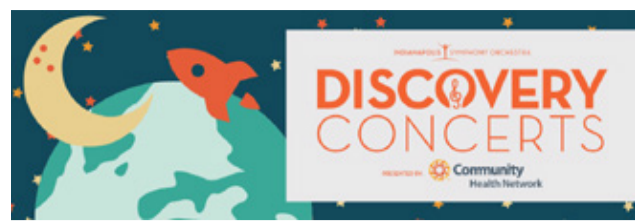

neighborhood Flea Market was a creative response to stark reality, a great salvage opportunity and a desperate need to raise funds for Preservation Hall," NPA president Sandy Stewart told me back then. The NPA Flea Market committee easily transformed from home tour committee chaired by board vice president Jeanette Crow and secretary Mary Catherine Dillon, who are still accepting vendors for this year's Flea Market.

"The Market has been a great opportunity to downsize," said Huff, whose front yard in Old Town yard will be full of items that need to go to good homes.

wooden rolling pin in hand, that had accompanied a Noblesville Daily Ledger story.

Because arrangements were made for Senator and Mrs. New to personally deliver the pie to the President, Mrs. Moore didn't actually fulfill her pledge until the News returned to Washington three months later.

When she finally got down to business, she baked two pies — one for President Harding and a second for Senator and Mrs. New, "so they could tell how it tasted while it was fresh."

I'd never heard of crumb pie, so I did a little research online to see what Mrs. Moore's pie would have been like.

I'm still not sure, however, because I discovered several different variations of "crumb pie" exist. One version is made with molasses, like Pennsylvania Dutch shoofly pie,

while another has more of a custard base. And there were others.

The newspapers pestered Mrs. Moore for her recipe, but she declined to share her special "formula" with them. All she'd reveal publicly was that it was crucial for the bread crumbs to be homemade and the sugar to be a certain kind.

(She did, however, tell the Ledger that "persons sufficiently interested" could "apply to her personally" for the recipe.)

I came across this recipe in the February 27, 1922 Elwood Call-Leader. I can't say it's what Mrs. Moore's pie was like, but geographically and time-wise, it was the closest I could find.

Crumb Pie

Line a baking dish with pastry. Beat four egg yolks with three-fourths of a cup of sugar, add the grated rind and juice of an orange, one cup each

of finely chopped walnuts and bread crumbs, one-half teaspoonful each of grated nutmeg, cinnamon, a pinch of cloves and ginger with two teaspoons of baking powder and the whites of two eggs, beaten until stiff. Mix and pour into the shell. Bake in a moderate oven (350-375 degrees) until firm.

With so much advance publicity, I expected the Ledger to print some kind of follow-up story after President Harding got his pie, but all I could find was a mention in Mrs. Moore's 1932 obituary that she'd received a thank you letter from the President for her effort.

I guess her 15 minutes of fame had already run its course.

"I think by default, it has become just another day. We are really good at celebrating holidays and events on off-days so that we still have those memories. We are going to have a massive all-holiday celebration when I get home."

For any parent, being able to maintain home life and career life is not simple. The U.S. Navy continues to shape its policies toward giving everyone an equal chance of success. In 2022, the Navy launched the Maternity Uniform Pilot Program giving pregnant Sailors access to free maternity uniforms to wear while on duty. On April 7, 2022, the Department of Defense enacted a policy which allows new mothers in the military or DoD civilian workforce to be reimbursed for the cost of shipping breast milk when they are on official travel for more than three days. The administrative ability for a mother to continue her military service is there, and the Navy is committed to making sure her command is equipped to offer her their support.

"I was fortunate to have a super supportive chain of command," says Rummel, who has served 15 years of active duty and has been a mother for 12 years. "Having all of them behind me, there was not much of a stopgap. It is one thousand percent do-able."

Even with all the measures taken to ensure that becoming pregnant during your service does not hinder your career in the Navy, some women may still have concerns that it might have detrimental effects. As of 2020, women

accounted for only 20% of the total Navy force. With any predominantly male work environment, there can still be some lessons to learn when it comes to fully welcoming its female teammates.

"You get judged for having a baby," says Engineering Aide 1st Class Jessica Couvillier, a Sailor attached to Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit 202 Det. Jacksonville, Florida, and currently deployed to CLDJ where she is assigned to the public works department. "No matter what time you plan on having a child, in the military, someone is going to judge you for it. Someone might think that just because you have a baby, you can't fulfill your obligations to the Navy."

The times that a military parent is away from their child can be difficult, but they are not away all of the time. A military family can have many unique and positive experiences together.

"Being a mom in the military is hard, but I do love my job," says Couvillier, who has served nine years in the Navy and been a mother for four years. "I do believe it's good for my daughter too, because she gets to travel a lot. She gets to go to a lot of new places, and she gets to do lots of new things that she might not get to otherwise."

Traveling to new places and living in new homes every few years can be an exciting adventure for a military family, but some parents might feel that is not the best option for their children. There is an alternative. A Sailor can continue to serve their country and still come home to their family nearly every day as a member of the U.S. Navy Reserve.

"It was a big decision for me to change from active duty to the Reserves," says Logistics Specialist 1st Class Vicky Cruz, a U.S. Navy Reserve Sailor, from San Antonio, attached to Naval Supply Systems Command Fleet Logistics Center Sigonella, Italy and currently deployed to CLDJ where she is assigned to the camp's U.S. Postal Service office.

"As a parent, you have an attachment to you permanently and that makes it harder to go away. I knew I did not want to get out completely. I love the Navy. I thought the Navy Reserve was that happy medium where I could still stay home, build a life with my family, see the kids growing up and still be a part of the world's

greatest Navy."

U.S. Navy Reservists do go on deployments. Every Reservist is required to be mission-ready physically and administratively. However, a Reservist does have the ability to spend much more time at home than their active duty counterparts. If someone is already a mom or dad, choosing to serve in the Reserves may be an excellent opportunity.

"I chose the Reserve because I had a five year old at the time," says Master-at-Arms 1st Class Kelly Gaines, a U.S. Navy Reserve Sailor, from Noblesville, Indiana, attached to Naval Security Forces Crane, Indiana, and currently deployed to CLDJ where she is assigned to the N34 security department. "I am a mom. I love being a mom, but I also love being in the military. I thought as a Reservist I would have to leave my son behind a lot less, or move him around, but I still wanted to be in the military. I love it."

Parents play a significant role in many people's lives. Many Sailors will spend Mother's Day away from their moms, and many Sailors are moms who may spend this and several more Mother's Days away from their children. If a Sailor's mother is an important relationship in their life, they will hopefully be able to reach out and say "thanks."

"My mother is super proud of me," says Gaines, who has served in the Reserves for 12 years and been a mother for 17 years. "She brags and tells everyone how happy she is and proud that I am in the military. I'm proud of the mother I am. She is such a great mother, I feel that helps me be a great mother."

Camp Lemonnier, Djibouti serves as an expeditionary base for U.S. military forces providing support to ships, aircraft and personnel that ensure security throughout Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia. The base enables maritime and combat operations in the Horn of Africa while fostering positive U.S.-Africa relations.

With more than 90 percent of all trade traveling by sea, and 95 percent of the world's international phone and internet traffic carried through fiber optic cables lying on the ocean floor, Navy officials continue to emphasize that the prosperity and security of the United States is directly linked to a strong and ready Navy.
