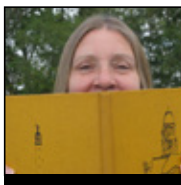

She was born on August 27, 1933 to Henry Moore and Virgie (Walpole) Moore in Halls, Tennessee.

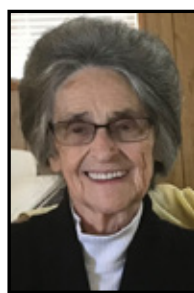
For 35 years, Mrs. Bingham worked as an LPN for Parkview Convalescent Center in Elwood. She was a member of Faith Apostolic Church.

Sheriff's Office Crash Team Investigating Fatal Crash at 276th Street, Devaney Road

On Monday May 16th, 2022, at approximately 4 p.m., deputies from the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office responded to a personal injury accident at 276th Street and Devaney Road. The crash was reported to involve a vehicle and a motorcycle. While at the scene, deputies were made aware that CPR was being performed on the injured party. The injured party was later

pronounced deceased by paramedics on scene.

The deceased driver of the motorcycle was identified as 45-year-old white male Jeremy Chris of Atlanta, IN. The investigation is continuing and being led by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Team.

The roadway was closed from 4 p.m. to 5:52 p.m. for the duration of the on-scene

investigation. The initial investigation showed a red in color Chevrolet Silverado pickup was westbound on 276th Street and turning left onto southbound Devaney Road.

This maneuver brought the truck turning left, into the path of the silver in color Suzuki motorcycle that was traveling eastbound on 276th St. Both vehicles collided in the intersection.

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Reminds Drivers 'Click It or Ticket'

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, along with other agencies across Indiana, will be increasing patrols as part of the national "Click It or Ticket" enforcement campaign ahead of Memorial Day weekend. For the next three weeks, officers will be out in full force making sure drivers and passengers are buckled up and children are properly secure.

The goal is to reduce the number of traffic injuries and fatalities from lack of seat belt use, a continuing concern. Data from the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) shows that unbuckled motorists make up almost 40% of all passenger vehicle deaths in the state.

The overtime patrols are funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) with grants administered by ICJI.

"Our focus is not on writing tickets but to encourage people to buckle up in order to saves lives," said Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush. "Seat belts are your best form of protection in a crash and against dangerous drivers. At the end of the day, we want everyone to reach their destination safely."

Since the "Click It or Ticket" initiative began more than 20 years ago, seat belt use has gone up 30% in Indiana to 92.9%, which is slightly higher than the national average of 90.3%.

Despite making progress and advances in vehicle safety, in 2020, 226 unbuckled vehicle occupants lost their lives on Indiana roads – the second highest in the past decade. Young drivers, especially males, were the least likely to be buckled during a crash.

"We cannot tolerate another deadly year like the one we just had on our roads," said Devon McDonald, ICJI Executive Director. "Many of the people we lost would still be alive today had they made the decision to buckle up. Seat belts make a difference. They save lives."

Research has repeatedly demonstrated the safety benefits of seat belts and the dangerous consequences when people choose not to use them. Buckling up can reduce the risk of injury or death in a crash by 50%. Without a seat belt fastened, people can be ejected from a vehicle and killed, and that risk increases if the driver is speeding or impaired.

Tragically, vehicle collisions continue to be a leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 13, and NHTSA data shows that approximately 46% of all car seats are being used incorrectly. Parents and caregivers who do not buckle up are more likely to have kids who are improperly restrained.

"There's nothing more tragic than reading the

news about a child who was injured or killed because they weren't properly secure in a vehicle," said Robert Duckworth, ICJI Traffic Safety Director. "Parents are responsible for their child's safety, and car seats are only effective if and when used correctly."

Indiana law requires the driver and all passengers to buckle up. Children under age eight must be properly restrained in a federally approved child car seat or booster seat.

Throughout the campaign, officers will be watching for seat belt and car seat violations while conducting high visibility patrols during the day and night, when unrestrained driving is at its peak. Drivers can be cited for lack of seat belt use, but also for each unbuckled passenger under the age of 16.

Parents and caregivers are encouraged to make sure children are in the right car seat and that it's used correctly and properly installed. Resources can be found at www.nhtsa.gov/TheRightSeat. Recovering your unclaimed property is safe, secure, and simple. Search for your name at the IndianaUnclaimed.gov database — which, by the way, includes some Hoosiers who share a name with some pretty famous racers such as Mario, Foyt, Andretti, and who still have funds waiting to be claimed.

In 2021, Attorney General Rokita's office returned over \$48 million in unclaimed property to its rightful owners.

To keep track of all your assets, Attorney General Rokita recommends Hoosiers get in the

driver's seat and:

- **Keep a record of all bank accounts.**
- **Indicate your interest in and awareness of all accounts by contacting the holder at least once every three years.**
- **Record all stock certificates and be sure to cash all dividends received.**

- **Update your address with all businesses when you move.**
- **Talk to loved ones about any safe deposit boxes you own.**

Once unclaimed property is in its custody, the Unclaimed Property Division at Attorney General Rokita's office conducts

outreach efforts to locate the rightful owners or heirs.

Individuals and/or businesses have 25 years to claim money once it is reported to the Unclaimed Property Division.

Just this year, \$19,505,033 million has been returned to Hoosiers. \$746,413,505.22 million is waiting to be claimed — and you could be next to cross the finish line.

Attorney General Todd Rokita Fights COVID-19 Misinformation

Attorney General Todd Rokita is fighting to expose COVID-19 misinformation and calling on the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and other agencies to provide transparency for the data used to make public health decisions.

In response to HHS's Request for Information (RFI) regarding COVID-19 misinformation, Attorney General Rokita partnered with esteemed epidemiologists Dr. Jay Bhattacharya, Professor at Stanford University School of Medicine and Dr. Martin Kulldorff, Senior Research Fellow at the Brownstone Institute and former Professor at Harvard University School of Medicine to review the evidence and data behind COVID-19 recommendations and

guidelines.

"The federal government must evaluate how misinformation from government agencies at all levels led to the adoption of extreme strategies that came at a high cost to life and liberty," Attorney General Rokita said. "I believe in Hoosiers, and I believe they can be trusted with the facts to make informed decisions for themselves and their families. I truly appreciate Dr. Bhattacharya and Dr. Kulldorff for their expertise and leadership to expose the truth."

"For two years, the government forced us to stay in our homes, cover our faces, and keep our kids home from school," Attorney General Rokita said. "We were expected to blindly follow and obey these public health orders and not question the wisdom of unelected officials. Families across Indiana and across the nation demand the truth."

The submitted response to HHS poses questions on claims made by Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, and other non-elected health officials, including:

- Vaccines stop the spread.
- The eradication of

COVID-19 is a feasible goal.

- There was no reasonable policy alternative to lockdowns.

- Mask mandates are effective in reducing the spread of viral infectious diseases.

- Mass testing of asymptomatic individuals and contact tracing of positive cases is effective in reducing disease spread.

- The reported number of COVID-19 deaths is accurate.

"The government spent close to \$5 trillion fighting COVID-19, but still can't provide Hoosiers with an accurate number of deaths or hospitalizations from COVID-19," Attorney General Rokita said.

Attorney General Rokita has consistently defended liberty in the age of COVID-19 by leading the charge against President Biden's mask and vaccine mandates. Now, he is determined to expose the facts surrounding data on the numbers of deaths and hospitalizations related to COVID-19.

"We can't improve our response to a future pandemic without an honest and accurate accounting of the number of deaths and hospitalizations inflicted by COVID-19," Attorney General Rokita said.

celebration with the Noblesville business community that has supported them over these many years, DuBois said. So the sign company is sponsoring the evening entertainment that includes the Edward Zlaty Trio and DJ Sunny Moon.

"We always welcome back a core 75 businesses and civic organizations as exhibitors," DuBois said.

But there are newbies, too. "We are happy to introduce a dozen first-time exhibitors to the event," he said. Artisan Alley adds five more businesses to the mix. In total, there are 100 businesses and organizations contributing to this year's event.

In 2020, the Taste was in March, a day before the pandemic. In 2021, Taste was in August.

This year, it's May. "Choosing a date is a bit of logistics and luck," DuBois said. "We think the Taste is best positioned in the first half of the year. Since our 2021 Taste was shifted from the traditional spring time frame due to Covid and held in late August (2021), we wanted to have at least seven months between events."

DuBois said, "We also are partnered with the City of Noblesville and the Embassy Suites, and we consider their availability. This all resulted in a May date for this year."

There is always lots of food, hence the name "Taste of Business." This year, eateries include Aspen Creek, Chuy's

Tex-Mex, Jim Dandy (new to the Taste), Cloud Nine, Marco's Pizza, Matteo's Ristorante Italiano, Nameless Catering, Condado's Tacos (new to the Taste), Ginger's Cafe and Bier Brewery (also, new to the Taste.)

Several other exhibitors usually serve food, like Chamber Legacy Partner Riverview Health, which always offers up a healthy snack at the Taste. "The Chef at the Embassy Suites also offers up a savory sample," he said.

DuBois said, "We couldn't be more grateful for the restaurants who are joining us this year to share their hospitality. All restaurants have been challenged by staffing, supply chain and ris-

ing food costs. So their participation is just that much more valued."

What about local manufacturers? "We are excited to have several of our manufacturers back showcasing what they make right here in Noblesville and the careers associated. Our largest private sector employer, SMC, is joining us this year, as is Helmer Scientific and OmniWall/Noble Industries."

DuBois said, there are also a number of business services exhibiting for the first time, ADP, Kemper Health, Armstrong Accounting Solutions (wristband sponsor) and Health Markets.

Plus, he said, "Two sure-to-please first-timers are Smith Jewelers and

Camp BowWow.

the hat was Samuel Carey, a prominent Philadelphia Quaker. After Carey's death, the hat was passed down through Carey's Carmel family until it landed in the hands of his great-great grandson, Clinton Carey.

Clinton Carey then gave the hat to Leroy Patty, a friend of his grandfather, Isaac Carey. The Ledger article stated that Patty planned to donate the hat to the Indiana State Museum, but I can't confirm that happened.

Our next stop is a display of "old papers, bills of goods, reports, letters and many business papers" noted in the July 12, 1907, Enterprise. The documents were uncovered during the demolition

of the old Thompson Hotel on Noblesville's South Eighth Street, "eleven doors south of south west corner of the public square."

Ananias Thompson owned the hotel during the 1840s and 1850s, and one of the items discovered was a bill for goods he'd purchased for the business in 1845. At that time, a bag of coffee cost — brace yourself — 12 1/2 cents!

I have no idea what became of all that paperwork.

Our next exhibit is definitely on my list of the "Ten Most Wanted Hamilton County Historical Items."

In 1923, the American Pictures Company of Indianapolis was engaged to

produce a motion picture of the county's Centennial celebration, "Centennial Year in Hamilton County."

The company filmed all the highlights of the huge two-day event held on October 3 and 4: The speeches; the parade; the big dinner on Logan Street; decorated homes, businesses and churches; and more.

A week later, the film played to packed houses at the American Theatre on Logan Street in Noblesville for four days before being sent on to a theater in Sheridan. Afterward, it was supposed to be put into a box with other Centennial-related items and preserved for future generations.

I know Noblesville's library used to have a copy in storage, but this valuable film has mysteriously disappeared.

That's a shame. We certainly could have used it next year when we celebrate Hamilton County's bicentennial. (Luckily, we at least have Dr. Earl Brooks' still photos of the Centennial.)

The next object on display is a photo of famous African American abolitionist, writer and orator, Frederick Douglass, taken at the time of his 1880 visit to Noblesville by local photographer, O. A. (Orlando Andrew) Harnish.

I've mentioned this photo before, but I figure it can't hurt to raise the

subject again, just in case someone, some day, comes across the original, or even a copy (Harnish sold copies for 25 cents!) in their attic.

Harnish's granddaughter, Elizabeth "Betty Lou" (Harnish) Spencer, said all of Harnish's photographic equipment disappeared long ago. However, that doesn't mean some items might not still be in this area.

Imagine finding a previously unknown photo of Frederick Douglass taken by a local photographer!

The virtual museum is about to close now, but on your way out, take a peek at our virtual gift shop. We have a new item, a historical/science fiction novel, "Thomas

Edison and the Purgatory Equation," written by my classmate (NHS '73,) David Church.

David's book recently won the Pinnacle Book Achievement Award for Best Book in Science Fantasy!

University.

Each team consisted of four players competing across rounds in head-to-head matchups against other schools. The preliminary area round are round-robin style, while the qualifying rounds are bracketed, with seeding determined by win/loss record; in the event of tied records, five tie-breaking categories come into consideration. Nine teams qualified automatically for the state finals, while seven others received at-large bids based on their average score in bracketed matches

Carmel High School qualified for the state finals in first place, with an average score in bracketed rounds of 552.5 points; the next closest team, Saint Joseph High School (South Bend) qualified in an at-large spot with an average score of 447.5 points per match. Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern high schools both qualified in at-large spots, with average match scores of 307.5 and 237.5 respectively. St. Theodore Guerin High School finished just 2.5 points behind the final at-large qualifier.

At the state final competition, Carmel High School took top spot and Hamilton Southeastern finished third, with Saint Joseph taking runner-up. Carmel finished third in the first edition of the quiz bowl, held in 2020, followed by second in last year's quiz bowl.

Academic Super Bowl - Senior Division

The senior division for the academic super bowl was contested over six rounds, the first five focusing on one specific subject from either math, social studies, English, science or fine arts, with the sixth round an interdisciplinary round. The interdisciplinary round drew questions from all other subjects, with some questions requiring knowledge in at least two different subject

areas.

Each round featured 25 multiple-choice questions, and each correct answer was worth one point, for a maximum score of 25 points. Seven teams qualified for the state final, held on May 7th at Purdue University. Teams qualified for only the subject field in which they were in the top seven.

Noblesville and Carmel high schools were the only county high schools to qualify in any of the subject fields, both doing so in the social studies area competition. Carmel finished in third, with a score of 18 points, while Noblesville came in sixth with a score of 17 points.

At the state finals, however, Noblesville roared back to finish in third place, behind Terre Haute North High School in first and runner-up Franklin Community High School.

Academic Super Bowl - Junior Division

In the junior division, which followed the same format but without a state final competition, Sheridan Middle School finished in the top 10 in two competitions in Class 4 (schools with enrollment of up to 255 students). In English, Sheridan finished 9th with a score of 19 points, while in social studies, they finished 8th with a score of 14 points.

Elementary Science Bowl

The Elementary Science Bowl was held as an online, three-round competition across four days, from January 24th - 27th. The three rounds consist of a team round, an individual round and an experiment round. For the team round, an unlimited number of competing students from each team collectively answered ten questions, with each correct answer worth four points, for a maximum score of 40 points.

The individual round saw four students per school compete, each

answering fifteen questions with two points awarded for correct answers. The scores of each student are then averaged to get the team score.

The experiment round, also contested by an unlimited number of students from each team, featured ten questions, with each correct answer worth three points, for a maximum of 30 points. The final team score is the sum of the scores from the three rounds.

Schools were classified into separate divisions based on both enrollment in each eligible grade and the age of students competing. Fourth through sixth graders were eligible to compete. The five classes were:

- Yellow, comprised of fourth graders only and with no enrollment requirements;
- Red, comprised of fourth and fifth graders, and a total enrollment in the two grades of 162 or less;
- Orange, comprised of fourth, fifth and sixth graders, and a total enrollment in the two grades of 163 or more;
- Green, comprised of fourth, fifth and sixth graders, and a total enrollment in the three grades of 186 or less
- and Blue, comprised of fourth, fifth and sixth graders, and a total enrollment in the three grades of 187 or more.

In the Blue Class, Fall Creek Intermediate School (HSE) took home the state title with a perfect score of 100 points. Hamilton Southeastern Intermediate and Junior High School (HSE) finished tied for second with Perry Meridian Sixth Grade Academy, each school earning a score of 99 points. Riverside Intermediate School (HSE) came in third place with a score of 99 points, but losing on tie-breakers. Sand Creek Intermediate School (HSE) came in sixth place

overall with a score of 85.50 points.

In the Orange Class, College Wood Elementary School (Carmel) finished in the top spot with a blistering score of 101.50 points.

And finally, in the Yellow Class, Geist Elementary School (HSE) finished in third place with a score of 92.50, behind St. Richard's School (Indianapolis) with 102.50 points and Creekside Elementary School (Franklin) with 99 points. Brooks School Elementary (HSE) finished fourth, with 88 points, and Thorpe Creek Elementary School (HSE) finished seventh, scoring 82.50 points.

Elementary M.A.T.H. Bowl

The M.A.T.H. Bowl, held in person, consisted of four rounds with eight multiple choice questions in each round. Correct answers earned one point, for a maximum cumulative four round score of 32 points. Teams could consist of a maximum of 20 students, with three students competing in each round, and a maximum of eight alternates. Students may only compete in one round.

The classifications are identical to those for the Science Bowl; however, schools may enter multiple teams, provided that there are at least 24 students competing for a minimum of 12 students per team.

The 2022 M.A.T.H. Bowl was held on April 12th, with host sites located across the state.

In the Blue Class, Riverside Intermediate School Team 1 (HSE) and Sand Creek Intermediate School (HSE) finished tied for state runner-up with 30 points each, behind Southside Elementary School (Columbus) and West Lafayette Intermediate, who tied for state champion with 31 points. Fall Creek Intermediate School Team 2 (HSE) finished in third place with 30 points,



missing out on a three-way tie for runner-up on the fourth and final tie-breaker (greatest number of successive questions answered correctly).

Fall Creek Intermediate Team 2 finished sixth with 29 points, one spot ahead Westfield Intermediate School Team 1 (Westfield-Washington). The two teams also tied; tie-breaker one, the number of times each team answered the final question of each round correctly, gave Fall Creek the edge.

In the Orange Class, Carmel Clay Schools dominated the field. College Wood Elementary School (Carmel) took home the state title with a score of 31 points. They were followed in second place by Cherry Tree Elementary School (Carmel) with 28 points, one point ahead of Towne Meadow Elementary School (Carmel) in third place, with 27 points. Smoky Row Elementary School (Carmel) and West Clay Elementary School (Carmel) finished fifth and seventh, with 27 and 25 points, respectively. And Carmel Elementary School finished one point outside of the Top 10, with 24 points. A performance for the ages from Carmel Clay Schools, taking five of the top ten spots.

In the Red Class, St. Louis de Montfort Catholic School in Fishers, finished in fourth place on 24 points, tied with Akron Elementary School (Akron). Akron piped

St. Louis de Montfort on tie-breaker one, answering three of the final questions in each round to St. Louis de Montfort's two.

In the Yellow Class, New Britton Elementary School (HSE) took top spot with 26 points, two points ahead of Maple Glen Elementary School (Westfield-Washington) in third place, with 24 points. Thorpe Creek Elementary Team 1 (HSE) finished in fourth place with 23 points, one point ahead of Shamrock Springs Elementary School (Westfield-Washington) and Fall Creek Elementary School (HSE) who finished on 22 points each. It took all the way until tie-breaker four to give Shamrock Springs the edge; they answered seven consecutive questions correctly to Fall Creek's five.

Rounding out the Hamilton County school in state top ten for the Yellow Class were Brooks School Elementary (HSE) in ninth and Monon Trail Elementary School (Westfield-Washington) in tenth. Tied on 21 points after four rounds, it again took all four tie-breakers to determine placement, with Brooks School getting six straight questions right to best Monon Trail's five.

Around the State

Hamilton County students also took home recognition in several other contests and accolades.

In the 2022 Martin Luther King, Jr. Essay Contest, junior division, Clay Middle School student Barrie Terman took second place, while Creekside Middle School student Aparna Prasad took third place. In the senior division, Carmel High School student Kylee Nichols won first place.

The 2022 Indiana Academic All-State Cheer Team featured two Hamilton County students, Maria Hand of Westfield High School and Chloe Tapnio of Carmel High School.
