

The Death of Benjamin Fisher

The only deadly encounter on record between Native Americans and Hamilton County's white settlers took place a little over 200 years ago in Strawtown. What sparked it wasn't a conflict over land, however, but rather justified outrage over a murderer going unpunished.

Unfortunately, the exact details of the incident were already growing murky over 100 years ago. In fact, T. B. Helm noted in his 1880 county history that . . . there are almost as many versions as there are people who have heard the circumstances narrated.'

The basic facts are fairly

solid, though.

One of Strawtown's earliest settlers was a man named John


(or maybe Philip — more on that later) Shintaffer. Shintaffer operated a small trading post, primarily selling whiskey and buying furs. Most of his trade was with Indians because there were so few settlers in this area at that time.

In the early spring of 1821 one or two (accounts differ) well-lubricated Indians - usually identified as Potawatomis – got into an argument with the trader, accusing him of watering down the whiskey.

The hot-tempered Shintaffer reacted by tossing the Indian





Per her wishes, there will be no public services. John and Vera have planned a special family gathering of remembrance in Indiana.



Attorney General Todd Rokita invites Hoosiers to visit IndianaUnclaimed.gov today in honor of Flag Day to see if they are flagged for any unclaimed money. Flag Day is an important part of our history as a country. For most Americans, the flag represents pride, sacrifice, opportunity, strength, and freedom.

"Making sure unclaimed property gets back to the rightful owners is an important part of our mission," Attorney General Rokita said. "My office is committed to serving Hoosiers and protecting their individual liberty.

While all states administer unclaimed property programs, Indiana is the only one where the attorney general oversees this function. Last year, Attorney Gen-

eral Rokita's Unclaimed Property Division returned \$48 million to Hoosiers, and there are no signs of slowing down. So far this year, over

\$23 million has been claimed with more than \$700 million just waiting for the rightful owner.

Some property owners in the Unclaimed Property Division's database include patriotic names and businesses, such as Red, White, Blue, Betsy, Ross, Stars, Stripes, and Wave. Hoosiers are encouraged



boxes you own. Once unclaimed property is in its custody, the Unclaimed Property Division conducts an aggressive outreach effort to locate the

rightful owners or heirs. Individuals and/or businesses have 25 years in which to claim money once it is reported to the Unclaimed Property Division.

- Keep your engine tuned, and don't let your engine idle (e.g., at a bank or restaurant drive-thru)
- Conserve energy by turning off lights and setting the thermostat to 75 degrees or above

Air Quality Action Days are in effect from midnight to 11:59 p.m. on the specified date. Anyone sensitive to

changes in air quality may be affected when ozone levels are high. Children, the elderly, and anyone with heart or lung conditions should reduce or avoid exertion and heavy

work outdoors. Ground-level ozone is formed when sunlight and hot weather combine with vehicle exhaust, factory emissions, and gasoline vapors. Ozone in the upper atmosphere blocks ultraviolet radiation, but ozone near the ground is a lung irritant that can cause coughing and breathing difficulties for sensitive populations.

IDEM examines weather patterns and current ozone readings to make daily air quality forecasts. Air Quality Action Days generally occur when weather conditions such as light winds, hot and dry air, stagnant conditions, and lower atmospheric inversions trap pollutants close to the ground. 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States Take on Transgender Extremism



Attorney General Todd Rokita

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita and 25 other state attorneys general are calling on President Joe Biden to withdraw the recent U.S. Department of Agriculture's Guidance, which erodes the principles of Title IX by implementing new, expansive sex discrimination laws for schools that receive nutritional assistance from the federal government.

"This administration has gone too far by forcing sexuality and transgender extremism into every part of our daily lives," Rokita said. "The new guidelines totally distort and dissolve the progress of women's rights in our country. Instead of ensuring the current law, Title IX, is upheld, President Biden

insists on catering to woke elites and ignoring the true problems Hoosiers and all Americans are coping with today."

Title IX was passed 50 years ago to ensure equal opportunities for women, but it is now being twisted to include the same protections for anyone who claims to be the opposite sex. This move comes as no surprise after Biden issued an executive order on his first day in office to force every federal agency to adopt a new set of standards when it comes to sexual identity. He defended his executive order by incorrectly citing the Bostock v. Clayton County case.

Earlier this month, the USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, announced it would implement the new adaptations. The Biden administration's promise to make Title IX rule changes turned heads when details were revealed.

As a result of this the rule changes, any state, local agency, or program receiving federal funds through the Food and Nutrition Act and the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program administered by the USDA, must comply with the unlawful application of Bostock and Title IX, or lose federal funding.

The National School Lunch Program serves nearly 30 million schoolchildren each day, many of whom rely on it for both breakfast and lunch. Approximately 100,000 public and non-profit private schools and residential childcare institutions receive federal funding to provide subsidized, free, or reduced-price meals for qualifying children.

Expanding the concept of "discrimination on the basis of sex" to include gender identity and sexual orientation is harmful to Indiana schools and schools across the coun-

Rokita argues the new guidance is unlawful because it was issued without providing states the opportunity to respond as required by the Administrative Procedure Act. Further, it misapplies the Supreme Court's holding in Bostock and forces regulatory measures on state agencies and operators receiving federal financial assistance from the USDA.

The next chapter of life was college, where you had no money and your girlfriend was probably in a different school far away, said Shank, who married the girl he met, then got a job, had a family, bought a house and acted responsible for many years.

Many years later, a friend asked Shank, "What do you do for fun?" Shank didn't have an immediate answer. But it did make him ponder the question. His answer: find an old car like he had in high school. His search ended with a 1954 Chrysler that had been stored for many years and was in mint condition. The Shanks drove the car to the Channel 6 Auto Tour one year, and were asked if then Noblesville Mayor Mary Sue Rowland and husband, Ted, could be passengers for the tour. "What an honor...," he

Shank then contacted the Noblesville Christmas parade organizer to get the names of the old car owners who participated. Shank would contact those folks to see if there was any interest in starting an antique car club in Noblesville. "She told me she was tired of organizing the parade, and she would only give me the list if I would take over getting the cars for the parade, Shank said. It worked out perfectly, and Central Indiana Vintage Vehicles was born.

The first car show was June 22, 1991, at Don Hinds Ford when the dealership first moved

to Fishers that year. The next year, they moved to a shady location, on the grass at Forest Park, where there are public restrooms nearby and an opportunity to serve food and drinks. The show has been there ever since. "After 31 years of presenting the Father's Day Car Show, what makes it all worth the time and effort is seeing the families all coming together spending time together enjoying the old hobby," Shank said.

Besides the Studebaker, Shank has a 1938 La-Fayette with an upgraded drivetrain that's considered a street rod. He also has a fiberglass reproduction of a 1929 Ford Model A Roadster. Since he can only drive one car at a time, he said his grandsons would drive the Shay to the Father's Day Car Show with a cute girl sitting next to them.

Grabb, who will be perched at the deejay table playing his favorite rock 'n' roll tunes on Sunday, shared a little more about his love for cars.

Growing up in Decatur, Ill, Grabb learned how to drive on two cars at the same time. His mom had a 1958 Oldsmobile 98 four-door hardtop, an automatic and "quite a car." His dad drove a new 1960 two-door Mercury Comet, a 6-cylinder with a manual transmission, and the most difficult to master.

"One time, Dad had me driving out in the country, and we were going up a long and fairly steep incline. About half-way up, he said, 'Stop the car.' Once the car was fully stopped, with my foot firmly on the brake to prevent us from rolling backwards down this hill, he said, 'Ok, you can go now.'" That, my friends, is when and where I learned to drive a stick shift, going up a hill from a standing stop. It took a number of tries, and my Dad was grinning and chuckling the whole time. We repeated this exercise several times until I became a champ at it,"

Grabb said. He got his own car at age 17, between his junior and senior years in high school. He had to get a car because of his summer job as a lifeguard at a pool that was about 30 minutes from home. After much searching, he discovered that one of the school maintenance workers had a car he wanted to sell. And Grabb could afford it. "Only \$40." He took his dad to look at the car, a 1952 Chevy fourdoor sedan, dark green over light green, with the motor sitting in the trunk and a rod through the block. "The car was solid, there was zero rust, the interior was in good shape, and there was an AM radio sitting on the backseat waiting to be installed." By the time he was driving the car, the total investment was \$40 for the car, \$35 for a good friend's junkyard to install

a good engine out of a 1953 Chevy and \$40 for four new tires, complete with port-a-walls. The neglected paint was given a hand rubdown with running compound followed by a good coat of wax. "Man, did it shine. I went through the interior, painting the rubber flooring black, shining all chrome to new condition, and removing the sunshade over the windshield so the car wouldn't look like it belonged to some old person," Grabb said. "The car was geared low and would go anywhere. I carried a strong chain under the front seat and would often be called upon to pull friends out of mud or snow of whatever. I charged \$2, and I was a lot cheaper than a tow truck, and their parents

would never know.' Grabb has owned a few cars over the years. Now, he has a 1961 Buick Electra, a 1967 Buick Skylark and a 1969 AMX, the latter of which he'll show on Sunday. "I bought it new when I came back from overseas and needed a car," Grabb said. "The

car had been sitting for 13 years in my pole barn and it has undergone a lot of mechanical refreshing in the past two years. It is now ready to drive as of last week."

The Father's Day Car Show means everything to Grabb. Proceeds from the show go to The Elysian Foundation, which benefits severely brain-damaged young people who are housed in Hamilton County and supported by Normal Life of Sheridan. The Indy GTO Club of Indianapolis also adopted the Elysians as its charity. Each Christmas, the clubs make residents' holidays

more special. Grabb said the Father's Day Car Show is "a chance for car owners to interact with the general public and share knowledge of each owner's specific car ... People will enjoy the opportunity to walk through a beautiful park, gazing at the variety of cars ... There really is something for everybody."

into a roaring fire. He then stood by and watched the poor man burn to death. (In the version with two Indians, the second Indian was seriously burned but survived.)

Sometime between April and June (accounts differ,) while a few of Shintaffer's neighbors were at the trader's cabin to sharpen their axes -Shintaffer owned the only good grindstone in the area — a small band of Indians arrived to avenge their fallen comrade.

Although the settlers weren't crazy about Shintaffer themselves, they felt they had no choice but to defend him.

A battle was fought with clubs, stones, and tomahawks. When it was all over, one of the Indians was dead, as was settler Benjamin Fisher.

A short time later, Shintaffer, who'd caused the whole thing, packed up his family and bugged out.

After the fight, relations between the Native Americans and the settlers were a little tense for a while, but no more blood was shed and eventually things settled down.

I tried tracking Shintaffer down to see what became of him, but that trail got a little murky, too. (Encountering over a dozen different spelling variations for "Shintaffer" didn't help.)

The only references I could find to "John Shintaffer" in that time frame are connected to Hamilton County histories. The 1820 United States census doesn't show a "John Shintaffer" in this area.

A "Philip Chintaffer," does appear in the 1820 census for this county, however, so I checked

later reports, and found "Philip Shintaffer/Phinlaffor/Sintaffer" in Greene County, Indiana in 1830 and "Phillip Shintaffen" in Cass County, Michigan, in 1840. (A Michigan land entry establishes that the 1830 and 1840 censuses refer to the same person.)

Although one Greene County history notes that their Shintaffer possessed a "quick temper," just like the Strawtown trader, I'm not completely comfortable identifying him as "our" Shintaffer.

For one thing, Helm got his version of Benjamin

Fisher's death straight from Fisher's daughter, Mary Fisher Simmermon and Mrs. Simmermon told Helm the trader's first name was "John." I can buy that she might have gotten some details of the tale wrong after 50-odd years, but it's difficult to believe she would ever forget the name of the man responsible for her father's death.

Also, census records are only as good as the census taker and some of those people weren't that reliable, especially in the early days.

Because good history is built on facts, not assumptions, and because the only documentation I could find connecting the Greene County/Michigan man to Hamilton County is a name, I'm just going to end this by echoing our early county historians Shintaffer disappeared and was never heard from again.
