Coming up on the seventh anniversary of his heart attack -- on July 4, 2015, while participating in Carmel's 4.5-mile Freedom Run & Walk, during which he collapsed, his heart stopped and he was given CPR -- Robinson, 69, Noblesville, said, "It's bittersweet."

The anniversary of surviving his near-death experience seven years ago, he said, gave him an

Then I thought of the tale of Frank Hawkins at Gettysburg. The battle of Gettysburg, a turning point in the Civil War, took place over three days, from July 1 to July 3, 1863.

I've visited Gettysburg several times, and with each visit I've found myself more and more fascinated by the events that occurred there. That's why Hawkins' experience caught my





He loved sharing the fruits of his labor with those he loved, especially around the holiday season - giving notes such as "your gift this year consists of one dressed hen" to family members at Christmas. Another tradition that he held dear was hosting the Arthur family bonfire and cookout every fall. 

IDEM Issues Air Quality Action Day in Hamilton County for Today

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) has issued an Air Quality Action Day (AQAD) and is forecasting high ozone levels in Hamilton County for today.

IDEM encourages everyone to help reduce ozone by making changes to daily habits. You can:

- Drive less: carpool, use public transportation, walk, bike, or work from home when possible
- Combine errands into one trip
- Avoid refueling your vehicle or using gasoline-powered lawn equipment until after 7 p.m.
- Keep your engine tuned, and don't let your engine idle (e.g., at a bank or restaurant drive-thru)
- Conserve energy by

turning off lights and setting the thermostat to 75 degrees or above

Air Quality Action
Days are in effect from
midnight to 11:59 p.m. on
the specified date. Anyone
sensitive to changes in air
quality may be affected
when ozone levels are
high. Children, the elderly, and anyone with heart
or lung conditions should
reduce or avoid exertion
and heavy work outdoors.

Ground-level ozone is formed when sunlight and hot weather combine with vehicle exhaust, factory emissions, and gasoline vapors. Ozone in the upper atmosphere blocks ultraviolet radiation, but ozone near the ground is a lung irritant that can cause coughing and breathing difficulties for sensitive populations.



IDEM examines weather patterns and current ozone readings to make daily air quality forecasts. Air Quality Action Days generally occur when weather conditions such as light winds, hot and dry air, stagnant conditions, and lower atmospheric inversions trap pollutants close to the ground.







Rokita Announces Gun Owners' Bill of Rights

Attorney General Todd Rokita yesterday announced the publication of the Gun Owners' Bill of Rights — a document created to help ensure that Indiana citizens understand the constitutional provisions and other laws that safeguard their Second Amendment liberties.

"America's founders understood the God-given rights of free people to protect themselves against intruders, violent attackers and even an overreaching government," Attorney General Rokita said. "Although often misconstrued, this right was

not established to ensure

opportunities for hunting or target practice."

The U.S. Supreme Court recently reaffirmed the constitutional right of law-abiding citizens to carry firearms without government interference.

The drafters of Indiana's 1851 constitution produced an even stronger expression of the right to gun ownership for personal protection than the guarantee contained in the Second Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. They wrote, "The people shall have a right to bear arms, for the defense of themselves and the State."

To clarify legal rights

and responsibilities, the Gun Owners' Bill of Rights includes answers to commonly asked questions, such as whether a license to carry a handgun is required in Indiana, whether "open carry" is legal in Indiana, whether there are restrictions on where Hoosiers may carry firearms, and whether a private business may prohibit an individual from carrying a firearm. It was written to coincide with Indiana's implementation of "constitutional carry" on July 1.

Drive Safe: Don't Lose Your Independence This Fourth of July

The Fourth of July is one of America's most iconic holidays, but it's also one of the deadliest times of the year to be on the road. Amid a rising number of traffic fatalities, the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) is urging motorists to celebrate responsibly by driving safe and sober this Independence Day.

"On average, we're losing about 16 people every week in fatal collisions in Indiana," said Devon McDonald, ICJI Executive Director. "We can't allow this to become the 'new normal.' Everyone needs to examine the decisions they're making and commit to safe driving, especially over the holiday weekend."

Since the start of the pandemic, traffic fatalities have been on the rise across the state and nation. Last year in Indiana, a total of 931 people lost their lives on the road – the highest in the past decade. Unfortunately, it's a trend that has continued in 2022.

Early estimates from ICJI show that 404 people have been killed in crashes so far this year. That's 17 more when compared to the same time in 2021.

Evidence suggests that the rising death toll stems from an increase in dangerous driving behavior, which worsened during the pandemic but also tends to be more prevalent around certain holidays like the Fourth of July. While impaired driving has been a significant factor, speeding, distracted driving and not wearing a seat belt are also concerns, according to state officials.

"We're seeing increases in almost every category of unsafe driving, well above where we want to be this time of year," said Robert Duckworth, ICJI Traffic Safety Director. "It's important to remember these aren't just statistics. These are people whose lives were tragically lost. We need the public to recognize that so much of this preventable."

Most deaths and injuries due to crashes are avoid-



able if drivers and members of the public exercise caution and follow the rules of the road: slow down, wear a seat belt, pay attention and drive sober.

For those attending Fourth of July parties, plan ahead for a safe ride home by designating a sober driver in advance or by using a ride service or public transportation. Never let friends get behind the wheel if they're impaired.

To further prevent drunk driving, ICJI's Sober Ride Indiana program is running a special holiday campaign in Ft. Wayne and Indianapolis this weekend. From July 1-4, the program is offering \$15 off Uber and Lyft rides up to 1,000 redemptions (per city).

Ride credits are only available between the hours of 5 p.m. and 3 a.m. while supplies last. To redeem a discounted ride, visit SoberRideIndiana. com.

For a list of safe driving tips, visit www.NHTSA. gov/risky-driving. Motorists are encouraged to report suspected impaired drivers by calling 911 or contacting their local police department.

June 30 Deadline Fast Approaching for 21st Century Scholarship Enrollment

Indiana seventh- and eighth-grade students can still apply for the 21st Century Scholars program, but the June 30 deadline is quickly approaching. Led by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education, the 21st Century Scholarship is the state's early college promise program that provides up to four years of undergraduate tuition and fees for eligible students at Indiana colleges and universities.

To qualify, students must apply during their seventh- or eighth-grade year (students cannot apply past June 30 of their eighth-grade year). Most students who qualify for the federal free and reduced lunch guidelines will qualify for the 21st Century Scholars program.

"The 21st Century Scholars Program created the opportunity for me to strive and excel throughout my college career. It gave me the chance to be a first-generation college graduate," said IUPUI graduate and 21st Century Scholars alum Melissa Aceves. "Through the Scholars program, I gained mentors who guided me, a scholarship for my tuition, a community of fellow Scholars and happiness because I had the opportunity to focus on my education as well as create an impact on the community.'

For 30 years, the Indiana General Assembly has provided bipartisan support for the 21st Century Scholars program. Since its inception in 1990, more than 45,000 students have earned a degree or credential through the 21st Century Scholars program and there are more than

100,000 students enrolled between seventh grade and college seniors today. The Commission published a report about the program and its impact for Indiana earlier this year

earlier this year. "The 21st Century Scholars program is a transformative opportunity for students," said Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education Chris Lowery. "This scholarship is one of the many ways Indiana has committed to ensuring students can access education and training beyond high school. It continues to be one of the proven tools to close educational equity gaps and help Hoosier

students succeed." Students in the 21st Century Scholars program go to college at much higher rates than the statewide average, with 81 percent of students who meet the program requirements enrolling in college, compared to the statewide average of 53 percent. The Commission's 2022 College Readiness Report also highlights how the program closes the race and ethnicity equity gap for low-income students.

However, opportunities exist to increase program utilization. Awareness of the 21st Century Scholars program remains a barrier to increasing participation. Currently, four in 10 high school graduates are financially eligible for the 21st Century Scholars program, but less than half enroll. The Commission is recommending all eligible students in seventh and eighth grade be automatically enrolled in the Scholars program.

"There are many organizations and volunteers that

help enroll students into the 21st Century Scholars program. Indiana's middle school counselors and educators are working on this effort, and the Commission has an outreach team dedicated to this goal. All of that is still not enough, however. Enrolling all students who are eligible will clear a barrier for Hoosiers and would enable everyone to shift resources toward ensuring students are succeeding in high school and college and beyond," Lowery said.

To best serve students, the Commission has split the state into eight outreach regions; and the Commission's outreach coordinators are available via phone or email. A full list of counties and associated numbers is available here

Help is also available in Spanish by calling 317-232-1072 or 317-617-0318. Additionally, the Commission's Padres Estrellas, or "Star Parents" are available. Padres Estrellas work with community organizations focused on empowering Hoosier Hispanic and Latino communities to

provide college and career support to students and families across the state.

Indiana's 21st Century Scholars program is an early college promise program designed to help ensure that every Hoosier student can afford the opportunity provided by a high-quality postsecondary degree or credential. Income-eligible students who maintain the Scholar Pledge through excellence in school and life can receive a scholarship for up to 100 percent of tuition at an eligible Indiana college or university upon graduation from high school. The program was created in 1990 and celebrated 30 years of success in 2020.

Created in 1971, the Indiana Commission for Higher Education plans, coordinates and defines Indiana's postsecondary education system to align higher learning with the needs of students and the state. The Commission also administers Indiana's financial aid programs, including the 21st Century Scholars early college promise scholarship, which celebrated 30 years in 2020.

Born in 1844, he was less than two years old when his mother died. Three years later his father was dead as well, leaving young Frank to be raised by his grandfather.

When he was 15, he went to live with his uncle, Simeon, just north of Carmel.

In May of 1862, the patriotic 18 year-old Hawkins left his uncle's farm and walked 14 miles to Indianapolis to enlist in the 11th U. S. Infantry. He was "uniformed and sworn into the service of his country by 6 o'clock the same evening.'

His first stop was Fort Independence in Boston. In the months that followed, he was present at several major battles: Antietam, Shepherdstown, Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville.

He received a leg wound at Chancellorsville, but it wasn't serious enough to prevent him from being part of the action at Gettysburg two months later.

On the second day of combat at Gettysburg, he was wounded three times as his regiment pushed from the area near Little Round Top toward the Wheatfield. The first bullet hit his left knee, the second broke off a rib on his left side, and the third passed through his left hand and wrist.

But, that was only the beginning of his nightmare.

Left for dead, he lay on the battlefield for 18 days in the July heat. During that time, another wounded soldier helped him stay alive.

The 1880 county history contains a rather graphic description of his condition on that battlefield, but I'll spare you that. Just imagine the worst and you probably won't be far off.

Finally, he was moved to a hospital in York,

Pennsylvania thanks to the efforts of one of the Sisters of Charity. (The Sisters of Charity was an order of Catholic nuns who nursed wounded soldiers — both Confederate and Union — during the

Civil War.) Six months later, the "maimed and crippled, care worn and reduced in flesh" Hawkins was honorably discharged from the service and he returned home to Hamilton County.

Given what he'd been through, he might have been excused for sitting back and taking life easy, but instead, he attended Union High School in Westfield, then went to college in Pittsburgh.

Over the next several years, he worked his farm northwest of Noblesville and ran a flax mill just outside the city while he held a variety of civic positions, beginning with his election as Clerk of the **Hamilton Circuit Court in** 1867.

He was appointed Agent of the Miami Indians twice, was Secretary of the Hamilton County Fair Association, was President of Citizens' Bank, served a term on the Noblesville City Council, was a candidate for U.S. Marshal and ran for Clerk of the Indiana Supreme Court at the 1872 Republican State Convention.

At the time of his death, his name was even being tossed around as a potential candidate for Congress.

Hawkins died in 1885 at the age of 41 of what the Indianapolis Journal termed "typhoid pneumonia." He's buried in Crownland Cemetery.

Robinson is only the second Indiana Elks president from Noblesville, the first being Paul Manship, 1961-62.

So how has being the Elks state president already changed his life?

"I feel a little weight on my shoulders to be the face of the Elks and to ensure I spread the word of what a great organization the Elks is and how we support the communities clearly across the State of Indiana," he said. "I have always felt that way for Hamilton County but my responsibilities (now) outreach my home and where I live and play."

Robinson is an East Texas native who came to Indiana to attend Purdue University, where he met his wife, Lisa, and then, after moving to Noblesville, he joined the Noblesville Elks so he could "bowl, play Poker and drink a little beer."

He said, "It became clear that the Elks did a lot more than what I thought until I joined and saw all the good work we do."

Robinson said, "We have raised over \$5.1 million over the past 122 years that we have put back into the community to help our youth, veterans, cancer research and residents who go to bed at night hungry.


In the Noblesville Elks, he was asked to be an Inner Guard, then jumped to Leading Knight and then took over as Exalted Ruler (president) when the lodge's ER resigned. After a year's vacation, he became Lodge treasurer and then secretary for the past 27 years.

Robinson said, "I wanted to be a part of this organization, with the idea that I could make a difference."

He was chosen as president, he said, he believes because of his "dedication to Elkdom that was seen throughout the West Central District," he said. "As a longtime member (32 years), I have been a resource for other lodges in our district, chairman of several District Chairs (scholarship, Elks National Foundation, orientation, membership) which provided me with a wealth of knowledge to support our major programs. I was nominated for vice president by our Noblesville Lodge which I then won the election of all lodges in our District. Once a VP of your district, progression leads to eventually six years later of becoming State President.

His goals this year, he said in an acceptance speech: to have a positive increase in membership in all districts, no reduction in lodges unless it makes sense, 100 percent participation in all programs, such as Hoop Shoot; Top 10 recognition 4 Star or 5 Star for the State Association Bulletin; increase communication in all lodges.

He has a personal goal to raise \$2,500 this year for the American Heart Association, a charity that has been close to his heart since his heart attack seven years ago. He also invites everyone to join him on Oct. 1 as an Elks Team for



a 5K Walk starting at Vic-

tory Field in Indianapolis. Robinson said in a letter to Elks brothers and sisters, "I hope to serve members of this great organization with humility in re-dedicating ourselves and our state once again to continue to serve our communities and to bring together people of goodwill and brotherhood and sisterhood under the lofty standards of Elkdom.'

He said, "My motto is LIFE (Living In Full Elkdom). What do we need to do in our communities to grow our membership and make a difference? The answer is simple: Volunteering is a way to help others in need, to build community, and, most importantly, to remind ourselves that we are all part of a bigger society. The ways that we can volunteer our time and skills are manifold, ranging from assisting our veterans, keeping our children from going home hungry, keeping our youth drug free by educating and mentoring our youth.'

Robinson said, "At the core of volunteerism is the idea of giving back recognizing that for our

society to thrive, we all need to do our part. As a bonus, volunteering benefits the volunteers themselves, too. In addition to reducing stress, volunteering increases feelings of joy and gratitude, which in turn improve our mood, sense of optimism, and immune system. In other words, as the idiom goes, 'You get what you give.' 'Volunteers do not necessarily have the time; they just have the heart.'

What attribute makes Robinson a good state president? "I hope I will be able to answer this question with results next year at this time," he said. However, saying that, Robinson has 32 years experience in Elkdom, more than 40 years of management experience in his personal career so he knows how to manage teams and get results, to turn around departments that are not performing to the organization's expectations and to develop staff to help them succeed.

He said, "I think these experiences will help me run the Indiana Elks Association like a business and meet the needs of our individual lodges that may need help and not get in the way of the lodges that are doing well."

Robinson said, "When I joined the Elks in the fall of 1990, my only goal was to meet new folks in a new community into which I had just moved," he said. "Like a lot of you, it became a calling, and I am proud of my contributions to this great order."




