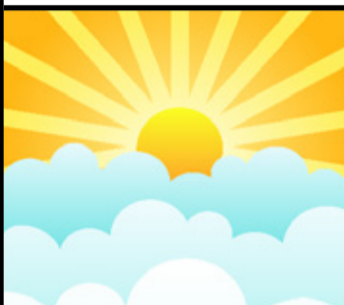

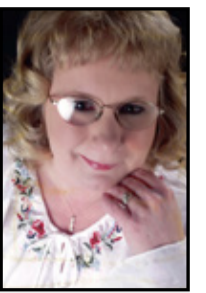

Indiana's Fall Pumpkin Yields Will Vary, Depending on Summer Rainfall, Irrigation

While genetics play a key role in a pumpkin's potential size, the festive fall vegetable's growth relies heavily on timely summer rainfall. Looking back at June and July's precipitation totals, the record-setting hot and dry months pose possible cause for concern for many who grow and buy pumpkins.

Stephen Meyers, an assistant professor of weed science in the Department of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture in Purdue University's College of Agriculture, said on his family's small farm that planting a quarter of an acre of pumpkins in June was difficult, with records set as one of the hottest Junes in Indiana's recorded history.

"For many farms, the pumpkin season actually starts this time of year as they are planted into a cover crop that is going into the ground right now. The cover crop will then be terminated in late spring or early summer, which is when the pumpkins are then planted to time with a fall harvest," Meyers said. "For our farm, we planted and didn't receive much, if any, rainfall for June, which doesn't encourage much growth for the pumpkins starting out."

Indiana is one of the nation's largest pumpkin

producers, cultivating around 6,000 acres each year. Large-scale operations often have irrigation systems in case of limited rainfall; however, there can also be a slight benefit to a dry summer.

"A dry summer obviously isn't good for seed germination, but the dryness means there is less disease pressure," Meyers said. "Pumpkins are susceptible to a number of plant pathogens, but when conditions are drier, that means fewer fungicides have to be sprayed."

Although farms that don't utilize an irrigation system can lose yields to a summer drought, farms in those situations typically replant the areas where pumpkin seeds failed to germinate or young plants died early in the growing season.

"On our farm, we let nature take its course for the most part, but we did go back this year and replant in some spots," he said. "Different pumpkin varieties have different days to maturity. So, for example, your initial planting might take 115 days to reach maturity, but other varieties can take 90 to 95 days. So, when you go back and replant, you select a similar variety that is a bit quicker."

The traditional jack-o'-lantern is the most popular variety grown — big enough to carve but light enough to be carried out of the pumpkin patch. The weeks leading up to October also bring out people looking for more decorative varieties.

"We see a lot of people looking for the different

colored pumpkins, many of which grow with sort of a flat surface so you can stack them," Meyers said. "They seem to be a popular porch decoration that people seek."

The majority of Indiana's commercial pumpkin crop is sold into the "fresh market," meaning a consumer buys the whole pumpkin the way it comes off the vine rather than processed into consumables like canned pumpkin or pumpkin seeds.

Pumpkin yields will be very site-specific this year. Although pumpkin harvest for some was delayed and yields will be lower, Meyers said to expect plenty of pumpkins available in Indiana, whether consumers are looking to carve them or bake a pie.

Red Fox Pointe Super-Voluntary Annexation
WHEREAS, The City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana received a petition requesting that certain territory generally located along the north side of East 191st Street and west of Little Chicago Road, as herein after described ("Annexation Territory"), be annexed by Noblesville; and
WHEREAS, the petition has been signed by the sole owner (i.e. 100%) of the property within the Annexation Territory; and
WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana Code §36-4-3-5.1 (e), on or around September 13, 2022, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing regarding the Annexation Territory.

WHEREAS, in accordance to Indiana Code § 36-4-3-1.5, the Common Council has determined that the Annexation Territory is contiguous at least by one-eighth (1/8) of the aggregate external boundaries of the Annexation Territory and coincides with the boundaries of the City.

WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a non-capital nature (including police protection, fire protection, street and road maintenance and other non-capital services normally provided within the corporate boundaries of the City) to the Annexation Territory within one (1) year after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those non-capital services provided to the areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography, patterns of land use, and population density; and
WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a capital nature (including but not limited to street construction, sewer facilities, and storm water drainage facilities) to the Annexation Territory within three (3) years after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those capital services provided to areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography patterns of land use, and population density; and in a manner consistent with federal, state and local laws, procedures, and planning criteria; and
WHEREAS, the Common Council now desires to annex the Annexation Territory generally known as the Red Fox Pointe Planned Development.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana as follows:
Section 1. Contiguity. The petition requesting voluntary annexation for the Annexation Territory further described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein and graphically depicted in Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated herein.
Section 2. Annexation Territory. The real estate containing approximately 18.4 acres, more or less legally described in Exhibit A, and graphically described in Exhibit B, both attached thereto and incorporated herein, and generally known as the Red Fox Pointe Planned Development, is hereby annexed to and declared to be a part of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.

Section 3. Council District. The above-described real estate is hereby assigned to City Council District 2 and shall become a part thereof immediately upon the effective date of this Ordinance.
Section 4. All prior Ordinances or parts thereof that may be inconsistent with and provision of this Ordinance are hereby superseded. The paragraphs, sentences, words, and Annexation Territory of this Ordinance are separate, and if a court of competent jurisdiction thereof declares any portion of this Ordinance or the Annexation Territory unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the remaining portions of the Annexation Territory or this Ordinance.

Section 5. The effective date of this annexation shall be as soon as allowed by law following its adoption, execution, and publication as required by law. Upon a motion duly made a seconded, the Ordinance was fully passed by the Members of the Common Council on this 27th day of September, 2022.

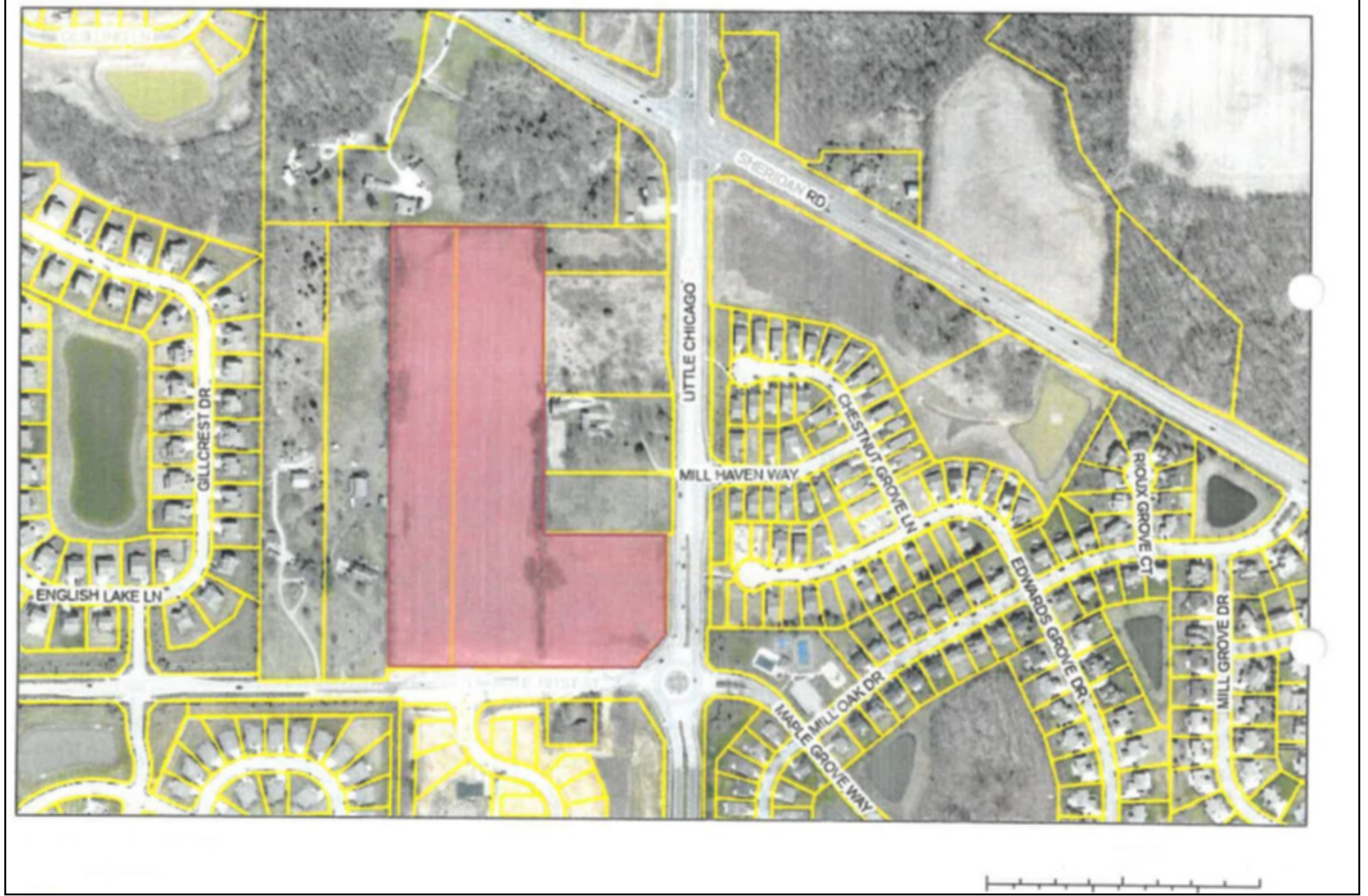

Could Morales Allegations Tilt Secretary of State's Race?

Republican Secretary of State candidate Diego Morales has fielded controversy since his first unsuccessful bid for public office in 2018, but could a pair of sexual misconduct allegations less than a month before Election Day endanger his latest campaign?

Two longtime former Republicans divulged decade-old allegations of sexual assaults in interview transcripts published this week by political columnist Abdul-Hakim Shabazz.

One woman, who the Indiana Capital Chronicle also interviewed, said she was 22 in 2009, starting her first job out of college under then Secretary of State Todd Rokita, a Republican. She described being a week into the position when Morales asked her to grab drinks and invited her to partake in "campaign sex." After he forcibly kissed her, she said, he stonewalled her at work for weeks.

She didn't report it to her supervisors or human resources.

"Going into that job, I was terrified I was going to get fired," she told the Capital Chronicle. "(Todd Rokita) didn't know me; I hadn't established any sort of credibility with him. And I was a couple of weeks into a new job. ... I didn't want to come in and immediately start accusing people of things, especially when that person was saying things like, 'You led me on' and, 'You need to lighten up.'"

The second woman told Shabazz that she and Morales became friends while working on a Republican congress-

sional campaign, and reconnected when she was 20 and Morales moved back to Indianapolis. She found herself in his new apartment to pick up a gift from the congressman when he repeatedly tried to kiss her, she said. After Morales drove her back home, she never again spoke with him.

"I called my parents right away. And actually, my father asked me if I wanted to file a police report," she told Shabazz. "... I thought it could only be bad for us and our party, and that he would get away with it no matter what."

When Morales announced a bid for Secretary of State, his name began popping up again.

"I really believed that if I went to party leaders who have known me for decades — these are people I spent a lot of time with. They're my friends. They're my colleagues — I believed if I went to them and I told them what happened, that at least we could deal with it [in] private," the second woman said. "... And I gave them plenty of chances to do that. And it never went anywhere."

The women went public with their allegations in a story published Friday.

Morales responds

Morales issued a strong rebuke — "The claims being made against me are false and I unequivocally deny all of them. The women, who will not reveal their identity, cannot corroborate their stories... The falsities stem from 15 years ago and were not brought forward until now. Being 39 days out from the election, the timing is clearly politically motivated, especially because the women mention being volunteers and

supporters of my opponent."

Andrew Downs, director emeritus of the Mike Downs Center for Indiana Politics and longtime political analyst, said "there is a chance [the allegations] could affect his race."

Downs pointed to the case of former Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill, also a Republican, who in 2018 was accused of sexual misconduct by four women. A special prosecutor found the allegations credible, but didn't find sufficient evidence to convict Hill of a crime.

The Indiana Supreme Court in 2020 found that Hill committed a misdemeanor battery and suspended his bar license for 30 days. Hill lost the Republican nomination for Attorney General to Rokita in 2020, and has since lost an additional nomination bid for Indiana's 2nd Congressional District.

"All we have to do is look at Curtis Hill for an example of somebody who saw the significant negative effects of this sort of information," Downs said. "I would say these are very different situations, but the fact that there have been allegations made sends us down the road of the possibility of them being true. And for some folks, they're looking for candidates who we don't have to wait to find out if these are true or not. They would rather just have candidates who don't even have the accusations against them."

Hill was also decades into a career in public

service. He was elected Elkhart County Prosecutor in 2002 and reelected three times before being elected Indiana Attorney General in 2016. He left that office in January 2021.

In Morales' case, however, "We're not talking about an incumbent here," Downs said. "We're not talking about somebody who has a long standing reputation, who people may immediately give the benefit of the doubt to. Instead we're talking about somebody who's already had to talk about his work history, as well as potentially his military service."

Morales has been dogged by criticism of his work history for the Secretary of State's office.

He left jobs in the office twice after being written up for poor job performance, once under then-Secretary Todd Rokita, and again under former Secretary Charlie White. The Associated Press first reported the disciplinary actions during Morales' unsuccessful 2018 congressional bid.

And in a race against others with uncomplicated military histories — Dem-

ocrat Destiny Scott Wells is a Lt. Colonel in the Army National Guard and Libertarian Jeff Maurer currently serves in the Indiana Air National Guard in Terre Haute — Morales' campaign was slow to clear up confusion over his own months of military training.

"We're talking about somebody who has changed, some would argue, his position on a number of issues after having earned the nomination," Downs continued. "And so another issue has been raised, another thing to make people question him as an individual — his personal character, even."

The Indiana Democratic Party and other opponents have targeted Morales for walking back a proposal to cut early voting and downplaying doubts over the validity of the 2020 elections.

Polling

"If you look at the polling data that's currently available, it certainly suggests there could be a loss here," Downs said.

Wells narrowly led Morales, 36% to 32%, in a poll released Tuesday, conducted by ARW Strategies on Shabazz's behalf. The poll largely uses online polling, whose reliability is not as strong as traditional methods.

The poll of 600 likely voters, 25% of whom were undecided, was conducted in late September, just before the allegations against Morales became public. The margin of error of 4% is enough to wipe out Wells' lead, or give her a large boost.

Just 65% of Republi-

cans were behind Morales, according to the poll, but only 2% had thrown their support behind Wells. About 7% supported Libertarian candidate Jeff Maurer, while a full 27% were undecided.

And Wells will need to capitalize on her opportunity.

"Does she have the money to actually advertise and remind people there is an alternative candidate, if not to drive home the point about the accusations?" Downs said. "So you know, you have to be able to take advantage of opportunities when they present themselves, and we can't really know if she's going to be able to do that."

Wells responded to the allegations last week, saying "Diego Morales' victims need to be heard and believed. It takes tremendous courage in coming forward, and the last thing I want is for their personal sacrifice to be for naught. While this race has been focused on safeguarding our right to vote, we too must safeguard a woman's right to exist in the workplace free of sexual harassment and assault. For weeks we have seen mounting evidence that Diego will say and do anything to get what he wants—as Hoosiers, I know this is not in line with our values—we have had enough."

Although finding "decent places" to perform, especially in Noblesville and Fishers, is tough. He knows Hyperion is not the only theater bouncing around at the moment, trying to find "the sweet spot of affordability, availability and technical capability."

While he's found three different locations for his pilot season, he's on the lookout for a long-term home, as are other local theater groups. Without a home, Hyperion, as do other theaters, require load-in sets that are built offsite and brought in for the show run. For now, this means "we try to keep it simple while still building something that looks good," Hauer said.

"For 'Barefoot in the Park,' we're constructing a lot of the individual elements and wall sections offsite, and we'll put those together at load-in. Then we'll work on set decoration." There are

quite a few folks involved who also help out with transportation and set building.

Tickets for the first show in the pilot season are \$12, which is \$2 more per ticket than the \$10 tickets for Hyperion Players' inaugural show, "The Glass Menagerie," by Tennessee Williams, in February. But the ticket price is still well below other local community theaters.

Most of the theater's funding comes from individual donors. There are a couple of sponsors for the first production, plus a grant from the Indiana Arts Commission to put toward Hauer's original play in the spring. "Call Me Sister" will be on stage in June 2023 at The Ivy Tech Auditorium in Noblesville.

For Hyperion's first season, they sought a comedy, a drama and an original script and look for future seasons to have

"Because we see a lot of the same artists moving between organizations, the arena can feel smaller than it is, but I believe there is a large enough population to attend, support and sustain multiple groups."

He is thrilled that the arts in Noblesville are expanding. "Live theater is so important for the artists, for the audience and for the community."

the opportunity recently arose for me to be part of a small, informal tour of the building, I jumped at the chance.

Led by new owner Christopher Nurnberger, we covered the entire structure from bottom to top, with the exception of the space occupied by the Linden Tree. It was an eye-opening adventure.

Just walking into the old Kirk's store was startling. I'd never seen it when it wasn't crammed to the gills with hardware items and household goods. I hadn't realized how big that room actually is.

It must have appeared pretty much like that when Albert Lacy, the man responsible for the building, started looking for his first tenants.

Lacy is largely forgotten these days, but during his lifetime he was considered one of this county's most successful farmers and businessmen.

He was a director of the Citizen's State Bank, a charter member of the Indiana Loan Association, served on the board of the Hamilton County Fair Association, owned part of a lumber business, and from 1878 to 1880 he was a member of the Noblesville City Council.

The Lacy Block was finished in October, 1888. (That's how contemporary newspapers refer to the building. I always thought a block was the distance

between two streets, but I've learned it can also be a building with multiple rooms, apartments or offices.)

The earliest stores to occupy the Lacy Block's first floor were Griffin Bros. hardware on the west and Lake & Boaz, a furniture store, on the east.

Although the west store went through several owners and name changes, it's never been anything but a hardware store, from the time Griffin Bros. opened in January 1889, until Kirk's closed this year.

The east store has a more diverse history. Besides being a furniture store, it's also been a used car dealership, a bowling alley and several different theaters. The Logan Theatre had the longest run — from 1932 to 1956. (I still find it hard to picture a theater in that narrow room.)

From 1959 to 1984, it was a Sears catalog store. The Linden Tree has occupied that space since the 1990s.

I must admit, I got a little disoriented when the tour moved upstairs because there aren't just three floors. There's a half floor between the first and second floors, and another between the second and third floors.

I haven't found any mention of those half floors in the early newspapers, so I'm inclined to think they were later additions.

When the building opened, the second floor was used for office space. One of the first tenants was the newspaper, the Democrat. Other initial renters were the law firms of Kane & Davis and Booth & Potter.

The whole third floor belonged to Bernice Lodge, No. 120, of the Knights of Pythias. Organized in 1884, the lodge moved into their new castle hall in the Lacy Block in February, 1889.

Even in its current state of disrepair, it's easy to see why the Democrat referred to the K. of P. lodge as "one of the finest halls in the state." The huge ballroom has a decorative tin ceiling and walls. It would be gorgeous once restored.

In 1952, Noblesville's new Boys Club took over ownership of the hall and did extensive remodeling. The elevator used as a private entrance by the K. of P.'s Chancellor Commander was torn out, the rear room was turned into a gym and various activities rooms were added.

The Boys Club moved out in 1970. The third floor has been empty since then.

With a weekly evening farmers market, new splash pad and an incoming brewery, downtown Arcadia's vibrancy continues to grow. Arcadia Clerk Treasurer Jennifer Pickett wants to continue that trend: "I had seen the crosswalk art done by Nickel Plate Arts at the Forest Park aquatic center. I thought something like that would really add to our Main Street environment."

Pickett made a grant request to Duke Energy's community relations liaison Dagny Zupin and the cross-community project began to take shape.
