I'm not sure how to count the fogs this year. The WISH-TV fog map showed fog in different small sections of the county on August 5, 6, 14 and 15, but the only day the entire county was covered was August 22.

So, do we count five fogs, or one? (This is why I don't do



Feeding Team - Festival Thank You to Neighbors, Plus Ask us Anything

Thank You Neighbors! 1800 people attended the 2022 Feeding Team Festival at Federal Hill Commons. Almost 6,000 meals were donated and over fifteen thousand dollars was raised. It was a beautiful fall day with great bands and vendors. Thank you, bands, sponsors, vendors, and volunteers! The feedback we received was extremely positive. It is rewarding to see neighbors step up and serve alongside FeedingTeam.org volunteers. Hungry neighbors appreciate your contributions.

Ask us Anything: When I stopped by a pantry, it was almost empty, have you stopped stocking? What's going on?

We regularly receive notes from neighbors reporting a pantry that is low on resources. Occasionally, and it breaks my heart, a neighbor will complain that we aren't doing enough or worse yet, that we have stopped placing food in the pantries. I assure you we continue to load food in the pantries as we have for the last several years.

During 2022 pantry use has exceeded what we can supply. We have no way to control what neighbors take out of a pantry. Our, "Take What You Need Give What You Can" approach, is open to abuse through overuse. We do not have unlimited resources to buy food for the pantries. As a 501C3 not for profit, with no paid employees, we do all that we can within our budget to provide as many meals as possible. We moderate food volume and rotate

stocking days in response to abuse and overuse. Unfortunately, we have seen hundreds of meals gone within a day of a pantry being stocked.

Our mission is to provide a few meals to many people. Our locations target GAP families. In today's world we have many neighbors taking dozens of meals, much more than is intended. Personally, when I speak with them, they are hurting and afraid. Embarrassment has been overridden by fear. Often, they can't afford the combination of daily life expenses and lien on the pantries as a primary food source. Volunteers observe these painful circumstances and offer referrals to organizations built to handle these situations. Pantries regularly receive hundreds of meals each month. They are not designed to be a neighbors personal grocery store, but unfortunately that is a regular occurrence presently.

How do the pantries get food in them?

Through the work of volunteers, food is distributed every other Wednesday afternoon at our offices. Volunteers stock, clean and organize their pantries at least once a week and usually twice weekly. Last month 9,000 meals were stocked in pantries. Countless other meals were donated by the public.

How best can I or my group help FeedingTeam. org?

Get involved. Donate at www.feedingteam.org or volunteer by reaching out to charity.rosandich@ feedingteam.org. You can drop off some canned goods directly in any pantry or at our offices. We all have items in our home that could help a neighbor. Every time a call goes out for public assistance in stocking a pantry that is low on food, neighbors step up. I've seen it numerous

As we head into winter, what items will be in highest demand? Canned proteins,

ramen, soup, vegetables, canned fruit, pouches of baby food, protein bars, powdered drinks and boxed pasta are all higher demand items in the winter. We don't stock glass items through the

winter. With over 27,000 food challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, www.Feedingteam.org is a registered 501C3 not for profit organization that provides outdoor 24x7x365 no questions asked free food pantries throughout the county. The pantries exist, to meet the food insecurity needs of GAP families, neighbors that may not qualify for public assistance and could use a few meals before payday. The pantries serve as many food-challenged neighbors as possible, and our hearts are with those that like my family, could not always make ends meet.

Thank you for embracing the pantries. We love serving with so many neighbors across Hamilton County. In future columns we will share more stories about how your generosity served neighbors in times of need. The face of hunger in Hamilton County is not what you may think.

In practical terms this straightforward way to help neighbors is having real impact on lives, families, and our communities. Thank you. A few meals can change the course of a person's life. A can of green beans means so much more when you have nothing to feed your kids. Would you like to get involved? Volunteer opportunities are available. We are evaluating new pantry locations. State Auditor and Treasurer Races on Tap Nov. 8

By Whitney Downard


Two frequently overlooked statewide elected positions, Treasurer and Auditor, will appear on the November ballot this year, along with the higher-profile races for Congress and Secretary of State.

Both positions are largely administrative roles, with few differences between Republican and Democratic officeholders.

Treasurer Race Over a dozen states allow their governors to appoint their Treasury leader and two states, New York and Texas, have folded Treasurer duties into comptroller (or auditor) positions. Twenty-six other states will also vote for their Treasurer candidates during this election cycle. Additionally, Utah will have a special election for Treasurer this year after a

2021 resignation. Current Treasurer Kelly Mitchell is term limited and cannot campaign for a third term. This open seat prompted four Republicans across the state to compete for the nomination, with Morgan County's Daniel Elliot narrowly clinching the win.

The office serves as the state's chief investment officer and banker, serving on multiple boards and

In particular, the Treasurer chairs the Indiana **Education Savings Author**ity, which administers the state's education savings program that promotes financial planning for higher education. For rural or impoverished counties, the officer manages TrustINdiana, an investment pool, and chairs the Indiana Bond Bank, which assists municipalities with lowcost financing.

Republican nominee Elliot, then a county chairman for the Republican Party, previously made waves for his 2018 push to keep anti-gay language in the GOP platform that defined marriage as a union between a woman and a man.

Opposite Elliot, Monroe County Treasurer Jessica McClellan could be the first openly LGBTQ candidate elected to statewide office. McClellan incorporates ideas for helping unbanked and underbanked Hoosiers with financial services into her platform.

In their words "I know that kind of stuff may not seem sexy to most but I just love it because you're building your community. You're helping that community grow and giving opportunities," Elliott said.

"There's a whole sector of people that we can help improve their lives," McClellan said. "(With) involvement from the state level to make sure that the word gets out because this is something that's needed."

Auditor Race

Two dozen states elect their state auditors, otherwise known as comptrollers or controllers. Other states' governors nominate someone who must be approved by the legislature or legislatures directly vote for someone to fill the office. Appointed auditors are frequently nonpartisan.

Incumbent State Auditor Tera Klutz, a Republican, will have two opponents this year, facing challenges from Democrat ZeNai

Brooks and Libertarian John Schick.

The office includes five departments: Accounts Payable, Accounting and Reporting, Finance, Local Government and Payroll. The auditor has the responsibility to balance the state's checkbook and pay state employees.

Additionally, the office oversees the state's transparency portal, distributes school tax distributions and administers Indiana's Deferred Compensation Plan, a retirement planning tool.

Both Klutz and Brooks are CPAs, with a background of audits in the public and private sectors, respectively. Schick, who works for an advisory firm that does data and analytics, advocates for reducing the government's rules

and regulations. In their words

"I feel like with that local government experience, it was very vital for me to come in here," Klutz said. "I tell people, the state auditor doesn't audit the financial records of Indiana – we create the reports that get audited.'

"It's not a job where we go in and try to catch people doing something wrong," Brooks said. "I served as an auditor for mostly non-for-profit organizations over the past seven or eight years and it's really coming alongside them as a partner and making sure they're in compliance with their granting or regulations."

"The people in the Senate and in Congress and the governor - who are all making decisions to spend money - all tend to be playing on the same team with the auditor," Schick said. "People should consider that it's probably best not to have the auditor on the same political party."



wind on the equinox indicates the weather in January and February, and the wind the following day is what March and April should be like.

A north wind means cold weather, a northeast wind is heavy snow, and a northwest wind foretells blizzard conditions. A west wind equals cooler weather, an east wind is wet cold and a south wind indicates fair weather. A southwest wind is a sign of fair and cooler weather.

(Clara didn't mention a southeast wind, but if I had to guess at an interpretation, I'd say fair, but cold.)

Because I can never seem to catch all the weather reports on TV on those days, I took my wind data from timeanddate. com. That website displays the local daily weather conditions at midnight, 6

a.m., noon, and 6 p.m. On September 21, the day before the equinox, the wind came from the southeast, southwest, west-southwest, and then the west. On the equinox, September 22, it was from the north, northwest, north and north. The September 23 wind was north-northeast, northeast, southeast and west-northwest.

It's pretty clear the west wind predominated on September 21 and the north wind on September 22, but I'm going to let you decide about September 23. North? East?

Now, the wooly worms. Whether it's due to climate change or our skyrocketing population, the little critters seem to be getting scarcer. For a

while I was afraid I wasn't going to have a wooly worm report this year, but several people finally came through for me.

Jeanne Flanders saw a wooly worm she described as "carrot red." (I think it probably falls in the "brown" category.) Tim Chenoweth spotted a black worm, Steve Owens found a white one and Bonnie Zarins saw a tiny brown

On Clara's chart, brown wooly worms predict fair weather, black ones mean cold weather and the white ones forecast snow.

It's not unusual for there to be no consistency in the color of the wooly worms, but it IS unusual that everybody reported solid colors this year. Normally, most of the wooly worms observed are the banded,

two-tone kind.

Finally, we have the persimmon seed report, courtesy of Bonnie Zarins. Bonnie has my utmost admiration for her ability to split persimmon seeds in half. It's NOT easy.

According to Clara, a split persimmon seed that shows a spoon shape means many snows, knives are fair weather and forks are bitter cold.

This wasn't clear, either. My first impression of Bonnie's seed was that it was a spoon — then it started to look like a knife.

Better keep your snow shovels handy — just in case.
