First-Time Director Brings the Hills Alive

What more could a first-time guest play director ask for? A great cast and crew. Talented singers. And sold-out performances. Noblesville High School graduate Evan Elliott is having the time of his life directing "The Sound of Music" in The Belfry Theatre's 58th season. Why did he want to direct a show? "It has always been on my bucket list," the 2009 NHS grad said following the show's opening weekend of standing ovations. "The Belfry was looking for a guest director

to produce a musical in their holiday slot, and I jumped at the opportunity," Elliott said. Four more performances continue this Friday through Sunday at The Ivy Tech Auditorium in Noblesville. Tickets are still available at press time but are going fast. While it's Elliott's first time in the director's chair, he came in with assistant play director experience, assisting director Carla Crandall in 2007 for "The Christmas Story" and assisting director Connie Murello-Todd in 2015 for "Bus Stop," both at

Local Soldier Shows Heroism by Risking Life for Stranger

The phrase "look for the helpers - you will always find people who are helping," coined by Nancy Rogers, has become a moniker for hope following disaster or tragedy in the U.S. where often times, members of the Army National Guard act as some of the first to respond. Earlier this year, one Hoosier citizen-soldier stood up as that beacon of hope and acted as that helper during a shooting in Baltimore. While mobilized to Fort Meade, Maryland, Indiana Army National Guard Sgt. Kent G. Willman worked as an operations noncommissioned officer with the 127th Cyber Protection Battalion. He was visiting Baltimore's Inner Harbour with a group of friends when gunshots rang out at the waterfront promenade in May. Off duty and in civilian clothes, Willman responded quickly and selflessly

amid chaos to aid a wounded victim. "My military training and experience definitely aided in the way that I responded, because I've been in situations before in the past throughout my training where I had to learn how to react quickly and efficiently without any discrepancies," said Willman, of Carmel. Realizing his group was in danger, Willman immediately directed his friends to safety inside a nearby store while quickly assessing and ensuring the safety of his companions. As bystanders fled the scene, one motionless person remained - and that is when William leapt into action again. Leaving the safety of the store's cover, Willman ran back out to the public square of the historic seaport, knowing the shooter remained in

The First Airport in Hamilton County

Today, Hamilton County has several small airports, both public and private, but back in 1945 there was only one and I'll lay odds most people don't know where it was located. Fishers? Carmel? Noblesville? Nope. It was Sheridan. In February of 1945, the

United States Department of Commerce notified the Town of Sheridan that Blackhawk Airport had been tentatively approved as a designated landing area by the Civil Aeronautics Administration. And just like that, Hamilton County got its first airfield. Blackhawk Airport was located on 40 acres about 5 miles north of Sheridan on 296th Street, just a little east of the Clinton County border. As you might guess, it was named for Sheridan High School's athletic mascot. The facility's owner, Lloyd G. Bailey, was a Sheridan High School alumnus. According to a 1961 Noblesville Daily Ledger article, Bailey came from a large family

Indiana Wins Court Battle Defending Dignity of Life

Indiana won another court battle this week defending the dignity of life.

This time, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita and his team secured a decision in the 7th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals upholding — for the second time — an Indiana law requiring medical facilities to bury or cremate fetal remains following abortions.

“The bodies of unborn babies are more than mere medical waste to be tossed out with trash,” Rokita said. “They are human beings who deserve the dignity of cremation or burial. The appellate court’s decision is a win for basic decency.”

In 2019, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld this same law against a challenge claiming that it violated the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th

Amendment.

In the latest case, former abortion patients who preserved their fetal remains claimed the law requiring burial or cremation violates the First Amendment’s free speech and free exercise clauses.

“Given the Supreme Court’s earlier decision upholding this very law, we were perplexed that the U.S. district court somehow found the plaintiffs’

arguments persuasive,” said Indiana Solicitor General Thomas M. Fisher. “The appeals court provided a fast — and much-needed — course correction.”

The appeals court refuted the notion that Indiana’s burial-or-cremation requirement jeopardizes anyone’s First Amendment liberties.

“A moral objection to one potential implication of the way medical providers handle fetal remains,” the court’s opinion states, “is some distance from a contention that the state compels any woman to violate her own religious tenets.”

The court issued a summary reversal without full briefing or oral argument — disposing the entire case based on Indiana’s motion to stay the injunction.

Youth will have follow-up activity after each lesson to reinforce learning, including one “virtual” component and one “off-screen” component. Guest speakers will join the lessons during various

sessions to bring in expertise and provide youth the opportunity to connect with professionals.

"The casting process has been my favorite part, because it's like putting together a complex puzzle. Everyone has to be in the right seat on the bus for the production to be a success. Directing at The Belfry came naturally, because I've grown up on that stage."

Why did he choose "The Sound of Music?" Elliott said, "I wanted to direct a 'feel good' show that attracted all ages. Being in a holiday slot, I also wanted to direct something a bit different than what is normally produced onstage around Christmas."

What was most important to Elliott? "I was fortunate to field a cohesive cast that is not only talented on stage, but also friendly off stage. Stair stepping the children was one challenge we faced, as there were so many talented kids who auditioned."

Auditions took place the second week of September, and rehearsals began the following week with cast members learning the music led by music director Brenna Whitaker of Noblesville.

Elliott said after the many weeks of rehearsals, his greatest challenge in directing this show came just before the show opened.

"Our greatest challenge has been moving into the Ivy Tech space with only four days of rehearsal before opening night," Elliott said. The show moved into Ivy Tech on the Saturday before

Friday opening, had a "tech rehearsal" on the Sunday, then rehearsed the show Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, was off on Thanksgiving, and opened last Friday. (But thankfully Elliott had an experienced crew, including stage manager Fran Knapp of Noblesville and assistant stage manager, Knapp's sister, Anne Auwaerter of Fishers, who have been working crew at The Belfry since 1976 and 1975, respectively.)

"Getting everyone in the same place at one time for rehearsals was also a challenge, because we are no longer rehearsing or performing in the former Belfry building," Elliott said. (The last public performance in The Belfry building was "Side by Side by Sondheim" musical directed by Ron Richards, with Whitaker as vocal/musical director Jan. 24-Feb. 9, 2020, just before the pandemic.)

For "The Sound of Music," Elliott said, "We hopped around three different rehearsal venues. With busy schedules and some early illness, we truly had to adopt a 'whatever it takes' attitude."

Elliott's first time on stage was at age 5 in a kids' production of "The Little Mermaid" at Meridian Street United Methodist Church. "I played King Triton and wore some pretty awesome swim trunks," he said.

His parents moved from Indianapolis to Noblesville when he was in first grade. "Since then, I performed in nearly every school production, including all four years at NHS." After graduating in 2009, Elliott took on the role of Director of Speech & Debate at NHS, when he was 20, and loved coaching the team. At that time, he was still in school (he's a proud Purdue University grad) and began a career in real estate. Today, he owns his own real-estate brokerage downtown Noblesville with his mom, Paula, and he assists NHS Theatre teacher Susan Nieten with the NHS Thespian Troupe. "I enjoy helping students with monologues and competition strategy. Through coaching students, I've found my greatest passion in helping others discover their greatness."

of aviation enthusiasts. He and his five brothers learned how to build and fly an airplane early in their lives. Bailey himself was licensed to fly at the age of 16.

One of his first positions was with Capitol Air Service, a flight school that operated out of Indianapolis' Weir Cook Airport (now the Indianapolis International Airport.)

During World War II, Bailey began to see a growing need in this state for smaller airports that could serve rural communities. When the fighting ended in Europe, he moved to a farm north of Sheridan and set about turning his dream of owning one of those airports into a reality.

The first structure at Bailey's airfield was a one-plane wooden hangar that also contained the office. Once that was complete, the grass runways were leveled and the field was graded. Before the airport was even officially open, the hangar had to be enlarged to accommodate three additional planes Bailey had acquired.

In the first few months of operation a number of people brought their own private planes to the field. That prompted the construction of yet another building in the fall of 1945.

A new brick and steel structure which housed a mechanic shop and a lunch room opened the following year. At that time the airport's office was also moved into the new building.

The Bailey Air Service offered charter flights and did a brisk business taking passengers on sightseeing tours. When some of those sightseers decided they wanted to learn how to fly

themselves, yet another plane was added to the fleet "for instructional purposes."

Of all the students Bailey taught to fly, he was undoubtedly proudest of his wife, Margaret, the first licensed female pilot in Hamilton County. Margaret Bailey celebrated Mother's Day of 1946 by making her first solo flight.

Mrs. Bailey wasn't the only member of the family who caught the flying bug, though. Under Bailey's watchful eye, the couple's son, George, was operating small aircraft at the age of 10, even though his feet couldn't reach the rudder pedals yet.

As an adult, George Bailey flew charter flights for Roscoe Turner Aviation and was later employed as a corporate pilot for Merchants Bank and Eli Lilly.

During the years of Blackhawk Airport's operation, it served as a social center for private pilots in this area. It was a place where they could catch up on the news and pass on their experiences.

By the 1990s, however, the Baileys were getting older and LLOYD's health wasn't good. In 1994, after 49 years of business, the couple reluctantly closed Blackhawk Airport and returned the land to farming.

Sheridan still has an airport, though — the Sheridan Airport, established by Kenneth Biddle, owner of Biddle Screw Products, on his farm north of Sheridan. It opened in 1946, the year after Blackhawk Airport.

the vicinity.

"My first initial thought was making sure everybody I was with was safe and behind some sort of cover," Willman said. "And then my next thought, well it wasn't really much of a thought, I just kind of reacted based off of instinct and went back on my training."

The training that prepared Willman in his response came from Basic Combat Training that every new soldier attends and the National Guard's Basic Combat Lifesaver course. Willman attended the lifesaver course twice in his career while serving in a combat arms role prior to joining the cyber protection battalion. Through this course, soldiers receive specialized training in responses to lung injuries, external hemorrhages, spinal inju-

ries, bullet and fragment injuries, and respiratory failure.

As the first person to arrive to the victim, Willman immediately assessed the injuries and provided first aid, just as he learned in his military combat lifesaver classes.

Willman attributed his confidence and quick thinking to his military training.

"Without really thinking, I ran out to him and started to administer some help. By using my training, I had remembered to start feeling for a wound," said Willman.

Shortly after reaching the victim, a local security guard ran out and aided Willman, who continued to address injuries. Willman then directed cardiopulmonary resuscitation procedures to the security guard while reassuring the

victim until EMTs arrived and took the victim to the hospital.

"Because of my training I was at least able to give him a chance," Willman stated.

Taking the action to help during an emergency reaffirms Willman's, and the Indiana National Guard's, commitment to being always ready, always there.

The mobilized battalion's operations officer in charge and Willman's immediate supervisor, Capt. Cooper C. Allen, said Willman's act of heroism upheld the civic virtues and values outlined in the Army's oath of enlistment.

"We're always on duty once you take that oath of office," said Allen. "If you have the ability to support your fellow citizen in your community, you have the moral and ethical

obligation to do so, and Sgt. Willman embodied that completely," he added.

While Willman's previous combat arms roles and specialized training provided the skills and knowledge used in his response in Baltimore, his recent intelligence and operations roles bolstered the citizen-soldier's work experience and resume for his future civilian employment outside of the uniform. Willman also said the Indiana Army National Guard gave him more than a deep-seated will to help others, transferable life skills, and academic knowledge.

"I've had jobs in the past where I've had good coworkers that end up being good friends; but in the military, I've had good friends that end up being, just, family to me. And

I've learned a lot, just in my particular situation, while being able to pivot from one [job] to a completely different job," said Willman.

Allen, of Fishers, said the National Guard's unique federal and state dual missions provides service members the ability to serve the military in different capacities while simultaneously living in the community as a civilian. Individuals serve part time at home or full time while activated on orders.

"As a Guardsman, we have the opportunity to serve the communities we live in, which is very unique. It's very hard to find the opportunity to serve the people that you live around in a direct

way, whether that's a natural disaster or any state of emergency," said Allen. "I can tell you now that you won't find more job satisfaction working in any other sense of community if you're not in uniform."

The cyber protection battalion service members closed their mobilization and returned to their Hoosier roots shortly before Thanksgiving.

Despite the change in duty status and location, the Indiana Army National Guard soldiers will continue to train part time on technical occupational skills and specialized lifesaving skills in order to be the first responder and beacon of hope in future times of need.
