What makes Theresa Caldwell smile? "I love my job and the people of Noblesville. Everyday someone says something that makes me laugh or smile," said the Noblesville local who will be the new Noblesville Township Trustee on Jan. 1, replacing Tom Kenley. She was born and raised in Kokomo, graduating from Kokomo High School in 1987. She earned a bachelor's degree in Child Development and Family Studies from Purdue. "My first job out of college was at the Tipton County Boys & Girls Club. I worked there for a couple years then moved to the Noblesville Boys & Girls Club as a Program Director for Girls and Teens (around 1995). I worked at the Noblesville club for a couple years and decided I wasn't so sure I wanted to work with kids." She took a job at Automatic Irrigation Supply Co. in Fishers, eventually working in Accounts Receivable. During that time, she met Trent Caldwell, who also worked there and grew up in Noblesville. Trent's mom (Billie Caldwell) was the Noblesville Township Trustee at the time, and was looking for someone with accounting and computer experience. "With my past jobs I had both of those...So, I made the move to the Noblesville Township Trustee Office and I have been here for 19 years." She's currently the deputy trustee. Every holiday season, Tri Kappa's Beta Epsilon sorority chapter and The Times partner with the Noblesville Township Trustee to raise money for the Red Stocking Fund, which provides over 100 Noblesville children with shoes from Shoe Carnival and clothes from Kohl's. 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A Life Well Lived: Remembering Larry Wagner

Earlier this year, I was fortunate to sit and visit with Noblesville's Larry Wagner.
I had talked to Larry many times, but on this occasion he was sharing more than I'd ever heard about his life.
Last year at this time, I was attending Larry's 86th birthday with his wife Elaine and their family and many friends.
I got to know the Wagners originally through Hamilton County Theatre Guild and The Belfry Theatre, where Elaine was a director and actress, and Larry 31 years ago started building sets as well as run-

ning lights and sound for the little church-turned-community theater, now celebrating its 58th season.
He made a brief but memorable appearance on stage in the 2010 production of "Guys and Dolls" musical, directed by his wife. He was a member of The Belfry's administrative board for many years, serving both as secretary and president. He also created and maintained The Belfry's original website. He brought in Belfry advertisers for the nostalgic Belfry ad curtain. He was a faithful door host for The Belfry shows and would volunteer for every show, greeting guests and taking ticket payments. He kept the historical data on The Belfry, including every show, year and director's name, and I have often pulled info from his data.
He was always one of the first to sign up to volunteer at The Belfry booth in the Commercial Tent at the Hamilton County 4-H Fair. I remember him being at the Fair and talking to passersby at the booth, which he decorated with old photos that he snapped of Belfry shows.
He always walked the Noblesville parades and carried The Belfry banner until his health

declined.
After tiring of volunteering, Larry most recently became a Belfry board Member Emeritus, an honorary position.
Last Sunday, Dec. 18, Larry Wagner would have turned 87. He passed away just more than a month ago, on Monday, Nov. 14, 2022. Services were conducted on Friday, Nov. 18, at Noblesville First United Methodist Church.
Earlier this year, the Wagners' sons, Michael and Brian, invited me to sit down with Elaine and Larry in their living room and share about their life.
So I honor Larry Wagner today in my Times newspaper column.
He was born Dec. 18, 1935, in Farmland, Ind., where he remembers growing up on a farm until he went to college. "I had cows," said Larry, who "didn't like milking the cows." He drove farm tractors in the

New Trail Marks 50th Mile of NLT Projects

The DNR and Monroe County Parks and Recreation celebrated the opening of a newly completed segment of the Karst Farm Greenway in Monroe County on Dec. 6. The 2.67-mile asphalt extension accommodates both pedestrians and cyclists and was made possible by a grant of over \$2.33 million from the DNR Next Level Trails (NLT) program. The greenway extension is the 15th NLT project to be completed and marks the 50th mile of trail funded by NLT.

The project extends the existing 4.5-mile trail north to Highway 46 in Ellettsville. The trail now covers close to 7.3 uninterrupted miles.

The trail creates a link between Ellettsville and Bloomington, linking Karst Farm Park, Campbell's Park and several residential areas and educational campuses. The

Duke Energy Foundation assisted with the project, providing a large grant for trail amenities.

In April, Ellettsville was awarded a third-round NLT grant of over \$1.13 million to build the Heritage Trail, a 2.11-mile extension connecting to the Karst Farm Greenway. That project is expected to be complete by the end of 2024. Once finished, it will create a continuous paved trail of nearly 10 miles between the two communities.

As part of the Next Level Connections initiative, NLT is Indiana's largest-ever infusion of trails funding. The program is administered by the DNR and facilitates trail connections within and between Hoosier communities. To date, NLT has awarded nearly \$120 million to 73 projects across Indiana. Close to 140 miles of trail are under development.

costly. When ice expands inside pipes, it creates tremendous pressure that can crack and burst them, leaving homeowners with a costly plumbing bill, and thousands of dollars in water damage.”

Luckily, these problems are preventable by evaluating areas of vulnerability and taking certain precautions. Indiana American Water offered the following winterization tips:

- Search your house for uninsulated pipes, especially in unheated areas. Consider wrapping pipes with foam insulation or electric heating tape but follow manufacturer's instructions carefully to avoid a fire hazard.
- Check to make sure your garage door and crawl space doors/vents are closed.
- Leave cabinet doors open in kitchen and bathroom areas to allow warm air to circulate and consider letting a faucet drip to keep water moving through the pipes. If you have young children, relocate any chemicals of cleaners that may have otherwise been out of reach behind the cabinet doors.
- Seal cracks and holes in outside walls and foundations with caulking, especially where cables or phone lines enter the house, to keep cold air away from pipes.
- Make certain the water to your hose bibs is shut off inside your house (via a turnoff valve), the lines are drained, and the hose is disconnected from the spigot.
- Drain and shut off entirely the water to any



unoccupied residence such as a summer or vacation home. A loss of power during a winter storm could cause pipes to freeze. If you intend to leave a property entirely without heat, be sure to drain all water to prevent the possibility of frozen pipes.

- Set the thermostat at no lower than 55 degrees if you're going out of town. Although you may be able to get away with a lower temperature, this setting is generally considered to be safe for pipes.
- Make sure you know where your main water shut-off valve is in case you need to shut your water off in an emergency.
- Consider wrapping your water heater in an insulation blanket. While not really at danger for freezing, this can lower your heating bills.

Indiana American Water is also encouraging customers to keep fire hydrants clear near their homes and businesses when snowfall accumulates. This small step can save precious time if firefighters need to access it in an emergency. Remove snow and ice within a 3-foot perimeter of the hydrant and shovel a pathway from the hydrant to the street so that firefighters can access it quickly.

Meanwhile, CenterPoint Energy is encouraging customers to have an emergency plan, particularly if they depend on natural gas to heat their homes. The company offered these safety tips to help customers prepare as soon as possible:

- Natural gas:**
 - Make sure your heating system is working properly. Malfunctioning home heating equipment can cause a fire or carbon monoxide poisoning. Check that outside furnace vents aren't blocked by snow or ice. Keep your furnace filter clean for safe, efficient operation.
 - Use space heaters safely. Use a space heater with an automatic shut-off feature, and keep children, pets and all items at least three feet away. A space heater that uses gas, propane or wood should never be used for space heating.
 - Check your carbon monoxide (CO) and smoke alarms. These devices are essential to warn you of a fire or dangerous condition involving a furnace, water heater, fireplace or stove. Test your alarms monthly and change batteries as recommended by the manufacturer.
 - Immediately report a suspected natural gas leak. If you smell the "rotten egg" odor of natural gas, immediately leave on foot, go to a safe location and

call both 911 and CenterPoint Energy at 800-227-1376. Don't use electric switches/outlets, phones (including cell phones), drive or start a car inside or in close proximity to the location or do anything that could cause a spark.

Furnace: A furnace is the largest natural gas consuming appliance.

- Set your thermostat no higher than 68 degrees. If possible, set it at 65 degrees when you are home and 60 degrees when you are away from home.
- Lowering your thermostat can help you save on your annual heating costs. Installing a programmable thermostat can help you

automatically control your heat usage. Add on extra layers of clothing to keep warm.

• Change your air filters monthly. A dirty filter restricts airflow and can increase the operating cost of your furnace by as much as 10 percent. A good reminder is to change the filter each time you receive your natural gas bill.

Other appliances: Although they consume less natural gas, you can still maximize their efficiency.

• Run your washing machine, dishwasher and gas dryer only with full loads.

Make your home more airtight and keep cold air outside:

• Seal leaks around doors, windows, and other openings such as pipes or ducts, with caulk or weather-stripping. The most common places where air escapes in homes are floors, walls, ceilings, ducts, fireplaces, plumbing penetrations, doors, windows, fans, vents and electrical outlets.

• If it has been a while, consider adding more insulation in your attic.

• On sunny days, open draperies and blinds to let the sun's warmth in. Close them at night to insulate against the cold air outside.

maintenance," he said. Larry worked on planes and did some flying in Indianapolis. He was in the U.S. Army National Guard from 1958-61, as a Recon Utility Cargo Helicopter Repairman, ranking as Specialist E-4 and earning a Course A Marksman riflery badge. While he was in the National Guard, he worked as an engineer at Western Electric.

In the 1960s, he owned a Mobile service station in Lawrence, where he worked on cars and pumped gas. A better opportunity came along, and he worked at RCA.

"Then I saw an opportunity to work for the government," said Larry, who went to work in 1967 at the U.S. Army Finance and Accounting Center in Lawrence. He worked there for 20 years.

"That's where I met her," he said, pointing to wife Elaine. "She started two weeks after I did."

She said, "He taught me how to write code for the computers ... He helped me after class."

At the time, Elaine lived in Speedway and Larry lived in Lawrence.

He gave her a ring, and they married in 1968, moving to Speedway for a little while. She went back home and returned to teaching private piano and voice lessons, later teaching music at Noblesville Schools, and she still teaches piano and voice (and taught both to my own daughter). When they married, Elaine had two young children, Michael and Brian, whom Larry adopted at age 5 and 8.

To rewind a little, there were six kids in Larry's own family growing up, and he was the youngest. His oldest sister, Cleo, went to Indiana Business College in Muncie and, at that time, before World War II started, she was recruited and went to Washington, D.C., and worked for a Navy admiral, and part of her duties were to compose condolence letters for the families of missing or deceased Navy servicemen during World War II. Cleo Wagner met and married George Peck, an engineer in the Naval Gun Factory who ended up being a commander, and among their three sons was

George "Skip" Peck II," born in 1945 and who was sent during high school to live with his grandparents on the farm in Farmland, where the Wagners grew up. Skip attended Ball State University, where he met Sally Shaddy, who was in nursing school, and they married in 1965 and lived in Noblesville (because Sally's sister, Janet and husband Don Roberts lived here) and Skip and Sally had three children, Darren Peck, Laura (Peck) Keith and Mitch Peck, who are among Larry's great nephews and nieces in Noblesville.

"You brought me to Noblesville," Elaine said to Larry. "But Skip is the one who got us here." Skip and Sally invited Elaine to sing in the Noblesville First United Methodist Church choir.

When they moved to Noblesville, Elaine's parents thought she was moving to the country. "She didn't want to move," said Larry, pointing out that 146th Street was then "a dirt road."

Larry was promoted to Supervisory Computer Specialist. "I had a window with a view of the lawn," he said. Larry worked at the Finance Center until retiring in 1988, when he was awarded the Commander's Award for Civilian Service, the Army's highest civilian service award. (Now, that award is known as the Department of the Army Civilian Service Commendation Medal.) He then worked as a Y2K coder at Mayflower Moving Co. from 1989 to 1997, and as a call center operator at Charles Schwab from 2000-2001. He also worked for the California Testing Bureau, scoring various state school exams, including the Indiana ISTEP test. Then, from 2004-2013, he handled shipping, receiving and purchasing at Feeding Concepts in Noblesville.

While Elaine was teaching music at Conner Elementary, she was also directing plays at the Hamilton County Theatre Guild's Belfry Theatre in Noblesville, where she had also acted in productions. Years before, the Indianapolis native had sang at the St. Louis Municipal Opera Theatre, before she

returned to Indianapolis before meeting Larry. In 1991, Larry started volunteering alongside Elaine. "I did lights for the Belfry," he said. "I learned it on my own. It wasn't difficult." He also did sound and built sets. While Larry acted in a couple of shows at The Belfry, he enjoyed being in the light booth, "watching the show and changing the lights." Elaine said Jane Campbell really liked his way of lighting things. "She always wanted him to do lights for her."

More recently, he had organized The Belfry props. He also took photos at Belfry shows, where the late Ray Townsend for many years had taken promotional photos for the media.

At Noblesville First UMC, Larry was a head usher and scheduled all of the ushers. His job? "Make sure they showed up," he said. Larry never sang in the First UMC choir with Elaine but he did take piano lessons during summers growing up. He also was in the church's Sunshine Friends special needs ministry.

He liked to play Bridge and games of logic. Larry taught Elaine, who played Euchre, to play Bridge, and they played Bridge in several couples' and neighborhood groups.

Larry also liked to do magic tricks, which he learned as a kid. And their kids said Larry, as an engineer, would always try to build a perfect mousetrap. When asked about this, he laughed, covering his face with his hands. "My oldest brother had a shop about a mile from town. I would go out there at night and put together mouse traps," Larry said.

Elaine said Larry, who was in an inventors' club, also created a mailbox flag that would notify you if there was mail in the box. "Right now, there's something in the (mail) box," he said, pointing out the window at his mailbox in front of their house. "If you open the mailbox, then the (yellow) flag pops up."

I thought it was interesting to read about the differences and similarities between Christmas then and now.

In Noblesville, the holiday was observed with both public and private celebrations.

A capacity crowd filled Noblesville's Christian Church on Christmas Eve to see a "brilliantly illuminated" Christmas tree surrounded by a "tremendous collection of presents." After listening to some "excellent" music, the presents were distributed to the congregation.

A short distance away in the county courthouse, the First Baptist Church held an equally well-attended festival on Christmas Eve and Christmas night. The festival, which was a benefit for the church, also included entertainment and a Christmas tree loaded with presents.

On Christmas day, a number of Noblesville residents and their out-of-town friends attended a fancy dress ball at City Hall. The supper was catered by a local restaurant owner and music was provided by "the Italian band."

Christmas day in Noblesville was also marked by several private parties, services at the Evangelical Church, and — curiously — open doors at most of the city's businesses ("... not a little business was transacted.")

Westfield held no public celebration, but a number of private parties were "largely attended."

The Westfield Masons had quite a shindig. Members and their families assembled at the lodge room on Christmas Day with "baskets filled with good things to refresh the inner man." Entertainment was furnished by the Westfield String Band.

Additional reports of holiday activities came in from the Ledger's county correspondents. (I have no idea why, but the correspondents at that time always used pseudonyms instead of their real names.)

"Charlemagne," a Washington Township correspondent, mentioned a panorama exhibit held at the Bowman schoolhouse on Christmas Eve.

(The Bowman schoolhouse, Noblesville Township's School No. 3, was located on what is now State Road 32, in the vicinity of Mill Creek Road.)

Charlemagne also

described a private party where the guests feasted on "roast turkey, chicken, pies and cakes of every description, and everything else that accompanies a first-class dinner."

An unnamed correspondent from East Branch reported that, despite feeling under the weather, N. S. Davis had hosted an oyster supper on Christmas Eve.

(East Branch was the original name for Gray, a small community that once sat at the intersection of 146th Street and Gray Road. All that's left of Gray today is the Gray Friends Church.)

"Kalip" wrote about a Christmas tree concert at New Britton on December 23. (New Britton was on 131st Street, halfway between Lantern Road and State Road 37.) The tree at this event boasted almost 300 presents "varying in value from five cents to ten dollars." Entertainment was by the King Glee Club of the New Britton School.

"Golly" reported that a similar celebration took place at Fishersburg on Christmas Eve. Santa Claus even made an appearance there, passing out toys and other gifts to children.

Golly added that a "splendid oyster supper" was held in Fishersburg's Granger Hall on Christmas night. (Oysters again!)

Clarksville's "Penobscot" observed that "we had a tree, sure enough ... " and noted that the "young gents and ladies" of the community were out early on Christmas morning shouting "Merry Christmas."

In addition, an all-day Christmas turkey shoot was held in Joseph Nicholson's woods.

Then there was Strawtown ...

"More Anon" wrote that "Christmas passed by in our village without any fighting and but very little drunkenness [sic.] No turkey dinners, parties, dances or anything else of much interest. On the whole a real dry time."

Labor and Pensions Committee. He said committees will begin meeting at the start of the 2023 legislative session.

"I look forward to helping craft a balanced state budget that maintains our commitment to fiscal integrity," Goodrich said. "Education makes up more than half of the state's budget and will continue to be a top priority. I'm especially excited about identifying ways we can provide more hands-on work experience during high school to ensure our students are better prepared for jobs today and into the future."

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) received an appointment to serve as vice chair of the House Judiciary Committee, and as a member of the House Utilities, Energy and Telecommunications

Committee and the House Courts and Criminal Code Committee. Jeter said committees are responsible for vetting bills, including hearing public testimony and considering amendments.

"Committee meetings are a vital part of the legislative process, and it's a great opportunity to hear directly from Hoosiers and make improvements to a bill or hit the pause button," Jeter said. "It's great to be able to use my legal background to best serve our district and Hoosiers."

State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) received an appointment to serve as vice chair of the House Public Health Committee and as a member of both the House Statutory Committee on Ethics and the House Insurance Committee.

"Committees are a great

way for the public to voice their opinions about legislation," Schaibley said. "This session we'll examine a lot of important issues, including lowering health care costs for Hoosiers. This will be a busy session and I look forward to getting to work."

State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel) will serve as chair of the House Judiciary Committee and vice chair of the House Joint Rules Committee. He was also appointed a member of the House Employment, Labor and Pensions Committee and the Rules and Legislative Procedures Committee.
