Hamilton County Lawmakers Invite Local Students to Page at Statehouse

Hamilton County lawmakers are inviting local students to spend a day serving as a House page at the Indiana Statehouse during the 2023 legislative session. According to House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers), Hoosier students ages 13 to 18 can sign up to page, and assist lawmakers and staff with daily duties while touring the governor's office, the Indiana Supreme Court, and House and Senate chambers. "It's always a privilege to meet and talk with student pages during session," Huston said. "Civic engagement is critically important, and I hope to see more young Hoosiers from our community take advantage of this opportunity." State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) said pages will receive an excused absence from school and can participate

in groups, such as Girl Scouts troops. "Taking part in the page program is a rewarding experience that gives students the chance to meet leaders from across the state," Goodrich said. "I always enjoy seeing students from Hamilton County engage in state government and leave with a better understanding of the legislative process." "Meeting with students from House District 88 is always fun and insightful," said State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers). "Our team also works hard to give them opportunities to learn about how a bill becomes law, state history and how their state government works." State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) said Hoosiers can visit indianahouserpublicans.com/pageprogram or call 1-800-382-9841 to sign up their student to participate.

"Our youth are the future of Indiana," Schaibley said. "Pages gain exposure to how our state operates, which I hope encourages them to stay curious and involved in their government." "Through this unique, hands-on learning experience, Hoosiers connect with their elected officials while learning about the three branches of government," said State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel). "This is a great opportunity for our next generation of leaders, and I hope to see more Hamilton County students at the Statehouse this session." Opportunities to page are available on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout session, which began on Jan. 9 and must conclude by the end of April. Students are responsible for their lunch, and transportation to and from the Statehouse.

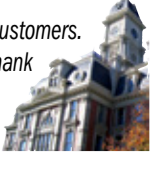

Rachel Eveleth (Wood) Merrill, 73, entered heaven on February 6, 2023. Known for her infectious smile and bubbly personality, Rachel loved to serve her community and was an avid genealogist and historian. She was passionate about her hometown of Westfield, IN and was so proud of her parents’ commitment to the community of yesteryear. A member of the Westfield HS class of 1968, she maintained lifelong friendships with her classmates. Born on January 17, 1950, in Bloomington, IN, Rachel was named “Judy Kay Combs” by her biological parents. She was brought home to the “big farm house on 32” by her adoptive parents, James William “Bill” Wood (deceased) and Virginia Eveleth (Fields) Wood (deceased), on February 14, 1951 and was given the name Rachel Eveleth Wood. She loved growing up on the farm and attending Westfield First Methodist Church. Her childhood friends fondly remember “tea parties with the farm kitties” and choir camp during the summers at Epworth Forest. She was active during her high school years, where she played flute in marching band, was a member of 4-H, the Sunshine Society, and was Prom Queen her Senior year. She went on to attend Ball State University, then transferred to Indiana State University and earned a degree in Education. On February 14, 1970, she married James Phillip Morris. Together they had three children, Jeffrey (Sara), Jennifer (Daniel) Cole, and Joseph (Allison). Rachel later married Douglas Lee Merrill on December 3, 1982, expanding her family to include Julianne (Megan).



She is survived by her brother, James Craig Wood (Sandy), and her sister, Mary Margaret (Wood) Banas (Edward), children, and grandchildren — Lilly, Ava, and Alex (Jennifer and Dan), Addison, William, and Carter (Joseph and Allison), Finn and June (Jeffrey and Sara).

Rachel loved her children and grandchildren and loved to celebrate their accomplishments with her friends. She loved to serve and educate others. She was a teacher in the parochial and public schools in Indianapolis, then a career counselor at Work Force One. In her later years, she worked for Home Instead where she cared for seniors, was chapter president of her P.E.O. sorority, was Regional Representative for the Indiana Extension Homemakers, and was heavily involved with the Westfield Washington Historical Society. She was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, where she served as a Primary teacher, was a member of the Relief Society, and was an active volunteer at the Fishers Family History Discovery Center. Because she was an adopted child, she found great satisfaction when helping others connect to their own family history.

The show is about a young working man who charms his way into a wealthy woman's household, despite the misgivings of the woman's niece. I can't say too much more or it will spoil the story," Hauer said. "It's considered a psychological thriller, but as a product of the 1930s, it's a slow burn in the best way."

Dan, the play's "young working man," played by Adam Phillips, is returning to the stage after a 13-year absence. "I always enjoy introducing or re-introducing actors to the stage," Hauer said.

"The fresh perspective, energy and questions they bring elevates the entire cast (of eight), and Adam is no exception. As it happens, the playwright, Emlyn Williams, played Dan when the show first opened in 1935," he said.

Hauer has written two plays that are finished, "American Brutus," that's been produced for Hyperion Players, a community theater he started and in its pilot season, and the other play, "Call Me Sister," coming to the Hyperion Players stage in June. He has several other ideas in various stages of development.

Hauer has acted in 37 full-length plays for eight different theater groups, including Westfield Playhouse, Duck Creek Players and The Attic Theatre.

He likes both acting at different theaters as he does like directing at different theaters.

"Working in different places with new performers keeps me sharp, and exposes me to stories I wouldn't otherwise encounter,"

Hauer said. After his show in June, he'll take a "sabbatical from directing," he said. "My energies are needed elsewhere for a while. I won't put a timeline on that and wouldn't rule out submitting for The Belfry in the future" (The Belfry, in its 58th season, is readying, too, for the next show, "Around the World in 80 Days," a comedy that will open Friday in a temporary venue, Arts for Lawrence's Theatre at the Fort. Read more this week in the Betsy Reason column.)

Hauer, a IUPUI graduate with a degree in history, who does communications for the state, said theater has brought him much happiness.

"Theater was my first love, and most of the good things in my life have come while pursuing that love," he said. Hauer has met most of his closest friends working on shows. The Minnesota native met his wife, Emily, while doing a show. He and his childhood friend started Hyperion Players together and they're getting ready to announce their second season. Hauer landed two of his jobs because of his theatrical experience. His coworkers, high school teachers, Realtor, dentist and the clerk who weighs his fish at Kroger grocery have all been roped into Hauer's stage projects one way or another. "But even if none of that were true, even if theater stood alone in my life, I'd still love the drama, power, art and truth it provides."

However, even the newspapers don't always get their facts straight. That's why it's important to verify information with more than one source — and why we're having another "Truth or Tall Tale" quiz this week. It's part of my ongoing effort to stop the spread of historical misinformation.

Can you tell which of these are tall tales?

1. A meteorite used to sit on the southeast corner of Noblesville's Tenth and Division Streets.

2. When Frederick Douglass escaped from slavery, Westfield was one of his stops on the Underground Railroad.

3. Strawtown missed being chosen Indiana's new state capitol in 1820 because one of the commissioners assigned to select the site skipped out on the voting to go fishing.

4. The mansion south of Noblesville on Allisonville Road that was once known as Golden Manor and is currently Third Phase Christian center was a station on the Underground Railroad.

Now, the answers . . .

1. A tall tale. Maybe. Then again, maybe not. A large rock, two or three feet high, did sit there for over 70 years after having been moved across the street from its original site, the Second Ward schoolyard.

Whether the rock was actually a meteorite or not is debatable, but people believed it was. They

even mounted it on a concrete base and placed a bronze plaque upon it.

Unfortunately, we'll never know the truth, because this Noblesville landmark mysteriously disappeared in 2007 and no one has ever admitted to knowing what happened to it.

2. That's a tall tale. The reference appears in an August 18, 1941 Noblesville Daily Ledger article that's part of a series written by Julia Stout Conklin on the Underground Railroad in Hamilton County.

According to Conklin, her grandfather, Washington Township pioneer Ephraim Stout, sheltered Douglass during his escape.

Douglass did visit Hamilton County — three times, in fact — but those visits all took place years after he gained his freedom. When he escaped from slavery he went from Maryland's eastern shore to New York City by way of Philadelphia. He was nowhere near Indiana.

Conklin must have misunderstood information passed down in her family, because she did some otherwise excellent research on Westfield's role in the Underground Railroad.

3. Definitely a tall tale. The belief that Strawtown nearly became the state capitol goes all the way back to the late 19th century. Although that story has been spread for years, it's not true.

According to a journal

kept by John Tipton, one of the commissioners assigned to choose the new capitol's site, Strawtown was never in the running. The only places considered were one near Waverly, Indiana, and what eventually became Indianapolis.

The part about the fishing seems to have been a later embellishment to the tale.

4. Another tall tale. This one probably got started because there used to be a tunnel between the mansion's basement and White River. (The tunnel's entrance was sealed off in the 1970s.)

That house was actually built by Indianapolis attorney William V. Rooker between 1908 and 1910, WAY after the Underground Railroad period.

I checked the 1866 map of Noblesville Township, and it does appear an earlier structure of some kind existed at that site, but that could have been a barn. Moreover, a couple of 1908 articles that describe what was planned to be the "largest and best appointed country home in Hamilton County" don't mention an earlier house at that location.

You have to wonder, though, why Rooker felt a need for a tunnel.

We'll probably never know.
