What makes August Wiese smile? "Giving people special-needs jobs," said the 27-year-old Noblesville resident, a Noblesville native and 2014 graduate of Noblesville High School. He was found Friday night at "Noblesville's Got Talent," a Noblesville Main Street event at the Lacy Arts Building greeting guests who stopped by his family's BeeFree Gluten-Free Bakery vendor booth featuring gluten-free snacks. His family's company employs people with special needs. "I have special needs myself, technically. I'm on the autism spectrum. I have Asperger's syndrome. It's always been really important to me to give back to people who need jobs, people in the autism community..." He also likes seeing his family's company grow while "giving people healthier food alternatives." BeeFree was started by his mom, Jennifer Wiese, in 2010, after discovering five years prior that her son was allergic to gluten. He would attend birthday parties and could never eat the cake. So his mom started making gluten-free foods that August's friends could enjoy, too. The gluten-free baking took off from there and has grown to be able to employ special-needs people to make on-the-go granola snacks. August, who graduated from Ball State University with a broadcast journalism and sports administration degree, does sales and is a team leader for his family's company, which distributes the snacks out of a Cicero warehouse, to grocery stores across the nation, including Sam's Club, Kroger. He has three younger brothers, Hagen, 25, Clay, 23, and Drake, 22. He enjoys watching sports and listening to music, singing music in his free time, and also enjoys doing stand-up comedy and looks forward to performing at The Brick Room Comedy Club in downtown Noblesville in the future.

Musical Director Steps In As Director Of 'Spitfire Grill'

Noblesville's Brenna Whitaker has found it easy to get caught up in the musical she's directing at Basile Westfield

Playhouse.
While "The Spitfire Grill" is a bit different from your typical "big Broadway" musicals, she said, with only seven characters and no chorus or ensemble, the show is a bit of a roller coaster. "Once it starts, it really doesn't stop, outside of intermission."
And the more than a dozen songs are so much fun.
"There isn't a single song in the show that doesn't get stuck in your head," Whitaker said. "I'll go home from rehearsal and find myself singing a different song each night."
The show is a musical tale of redemption, perseverance and family. This heartwarming and inspirational musical -- opening Thursday and continuing

through April 27 -- depicts the journey of a young woman just released from prison, who decides to start her life anew in a rural town in Wisconsin, and participates in a journey within the town toward its own tenuous reawakening.
Why did she want to be involved in this show?
"I was introduced to the show about 10 years ago," Whitaker said. "I vocally directed a production of 'The Spitfire Grill' and was in the cast." That performance was in June of 2013 at The Belfry Theatre in Noblesville. She not only vocally directed the show but also played the role of Shelby in the

Residents Encouraged to Drop off Unused and Unwanted Prescription Drugs.
In honor of National Drug Take Back Day, the Hamilton County Council on Alcohol & Other Drugs (HCCOAO) will host a take-back event on Saturday, April 22 in the far east parking lot of Riverview Health in Noblesville on Westfield Road. The drop off location is directly across from Federal Hill Commons.
"Most people who misuse prescription drugs get them from family, friends, and acquaintances," says HCCOAO Executive Director Monica Greer. "We know prevention starts at home. The simple step of clearing out medications that are no longer needed makes our homes safer, prevents prescription drug misuse, and can help save lives."

Course Records, Qualifiers, And Impressive Results Highlight Picture-Perfect Carmel Marathon Weekend

Under sunshine and ideal racing conditions, the 2023 Carmel Marathon Weekend started with a full capacity participant field and finished with five course records. More than 4,000 participants crossed the start line after traveling to Carmel, Ind. from 40 states and six countries for the event on Saturday, April 8.

With one of the fastest and flattest Midwestern marathon and half marathon courses in the spring, the event attracted its largest elite field in its 13-year history. 208 people, or 22.7 percent of the full marathon field, finished with a Boston Marathon qualifying time, moving the Carmel Marathon Presented by Franciscan Health to fourth on MarathonGuide.com's list of top Boston qualifier races in 2023. The top 55 women and 75 men qualified for the Boston Marathon, and it took an impressive marathon time of 3:05 to break into the top 100 finishers on Saturday.

Carmel Marathon Presented by Franciscan Health women's winner Parley Hannan of Scarborough, Maine, broke the course record in her full marathon race debut with a time of 2:33:42. Hannan, along with runner-up and 2022 race winner Peighton Meske of Knoxville, Tenn., also qualified for the U.S. Olympic Marathon Team Trials by finishing under the women's standard of 2:37:00.

"This race held a lot of emotion and power for me," Hannan said. "It's been a hard couple of years and running has been a huge outlet for me. The night before the race, I looked at the clock at 11:11 and made a wish. Instead of making a wish to qualify, I just wished I would feel good and enjoy the experience. I was able to walk away with both—feeling incredible and loving every moment, and with an Olympic Trials qualifying time!"

On the men's side, local Carmel resident Jack Beakas broke the Carmel Marathon Presented by Franciscan Health course record in 2:18:18. While he just missed the men's Olympic Marathon Team Trials standard of 2:18:00, he already has plans to race again in June for another attempt at hitting the qualifier.

"The course was great," said Beakas. "Being able to run a marathon on the roads I've been training on every morning was very rewarding."

Cynthia Limo of Kenya set a course record in the women's Carmel Half Marathon in 1:12:08. Limo is a 2016 World Athletics Half Marathon Championship silver medalist and recently returned to U.S. racing after maternity leave.

"The course is very

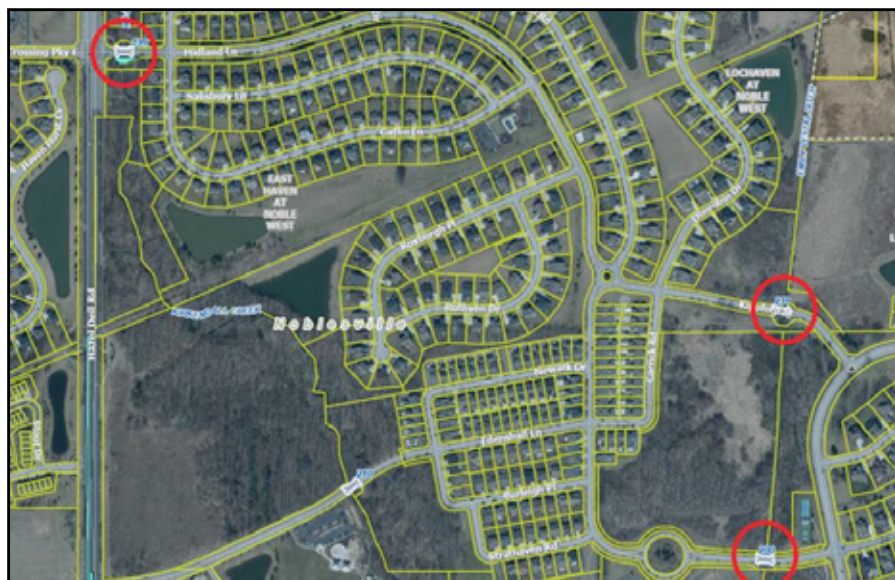
good, the race is operated extremely well, and I was truly made to feel welcome by the other runners and the whole community," said Limo. "The Carmel course reminded me a lot of the course in Cardiff, U.K., that was used for the Championships in 2016 because Carmel is very clearly marked with not too many turns, and it is very possible to run a fast time in Carmel. I would like to return next year with another elite female runner; we would push each other to run very quick times here."

Speedy finishes continued throughout the day, with Indianapolis resident Lucy Dobbs breaking her own course record from 2022 in the women's Indiana Spine Group 10K with a time of 34:48. John Poray of Fishers, Ind., set a new Indiana Members Credit Union 5K course record in 15:45.

Race finishers enjoyed free brunch courtesy of the Indiana Spine Group Pancake Village. Thanks to the sunshine and a live, local band playing at Carmel's Carter Green, the Boston Beer Company/Truly Hard Seltzer Beer Garden was popular for race finishers and spectators alike long after the race ended.

Help For Kids Who Stutter Is As Close As Your Library

Kids who stutter have a lot to say, and friends can show them how in Stuttering: For Kids By Kids, a DVD in English and Spanish starring kids who stutter, available at most public libraries or through interlibrary loan.

Many children who stutter have never met others who struggle with the same disability. In this DVD from the Stuttering Foundation, they meet kids who recount how they handle challenges such as teasing, speaking out in class, and teaching others about stuttering.

Swish, a lively and engaging animated basketball character designed by students at Purdue University, narrates the DVD. The children, who range in age from first-graders to high school students, offer frank and sometimes differing views of stutter-

ing. For example, Matthew, age 10, says about his speech difficulties, "It's no big deal;" but Kate, age 9, worries about talking, what is going to happen next and whether or not she'll stutter. Arianne, age 14, says, "The hardest part about stuttering is to get through it and to stay in there when you're stuck." Umang, age 12, agrees, "Sometimes it gets kind of annoying when you want to say something and you can't. I also get worried what other people might think if I do stutter and wonder if I'll be able to get out of my blocks and things."

"All those interested in helping kids learn more about stuttering will want to see this tape," said speech-language pathologist Bill Murphy of

Purdue University. "The children featured are a perfect example of how to openly and honestly handle stuttering." "This is an important tool for families and teachers of kids who stutter," added Jane Fraser, president of the nonprofit Stuttering Foundation.

Other professionals and specialists in stuttering in this production include Kristin Chmela of Northwestern University, Joe Donaher of Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Lisa Scott of Florida State University, and Lee Cagiano of Friends.

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Indiana Delegation Supports Governor's Request For Major Disaster Declaration

U.S. Senators Todd Young and Mike Braun, along with Representatives Frank Mrvan (Ind.-01), Rudy Yakym (Ind.-02), Jim Banks (Ind.-03), Jim Baird (Ind.-04), Victoria Spartz (Ind.-05), André Carson (Ind.-06), Greg Pence (Ind.-07), Larry Bucshon (Ind.-08), and Erin Houchin (Ind.-09) wrote to President Joe Biden urging him to support Governor Eric Holcomb's request for a major disaster declaration for Johnson, Morgan, and Sullivan counties due to severe weather on March 31-April 1, 2023.

"Five Hoosiers lost their lives, while 34 more were injured; over 106,000 power outages occurred; 165 structures were destroyed while 157 more sustained major damage; road systems have become impassable due to downed trees and utility infrastructure; and countless vehicles and private

property have been damaged or destroyed. While these Hoosier communities and families will respond with resourcefulness and resilience as they always do to challenges, it is clear that in the immediate aftermath of these storms, federal assistance is necessary and required under the terms of the Stafford Act and associated federal regulations," the Indiana congressional delegation wrote in the letter.

 Dear President Biden,
 We write today in support of Governor Eric J. Holcomb's request for an expedited major disaster declaration as a result of major storms that impacted Indiana on March 31-April 1, 2023.

While the State of Indiana has exercised its emergency operations plan, the Governor has determined that the severity

of the storms exceed the capabilities of the State and affected local governments to respond. No less than 25 tornadoes touched down in Indiana, as part of a larger storm system that unleashed severe thunderstorms and flooding across the state.

While the total impact of these storms is still being determined, sufficient tragic facts are known that warrant the declaration of a major disaster. Five Hoosiers lost their lives, while 34 more were injured; over 106,000 power outages occurred; 165 structures were destroyed while 157 more sustained major damage; road systems have become impassable due to downed trees and utility infrastructure; and countless vehicles and private property have been damaged or destroyed. While these Hoosier communities and families will respond with resourcefulness and resilience as they

always do to challenges, it is clear that in the immediate aftermath of these storms, federal assistance is necessary and required under the terms of the Stafford Act and associated federal regulations.

We support the Governor's request for supplementary federal assistance for the people and communities of Johnson, Morgan, and Sullivan counties, and request that you expand assistance to additional counties in the future as requested by the Governor, should it be required.

Indiana's congressional delegation stands ready to support your response to these storms and your consideration of this request. We thank you for the support already offered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and other federal authorities, and request your swift consideration and approval of this declaration for the State of Indiana.

Indiana Humanities To Host New Statewide Film Tour

Free screenings of 'Liminal: Indiana in the Anthropocene' to take place in six cities.

Indiana Humanities will host a six-city tour of Liminal: Indiana in the Anthropocene, a new work by Hoosier filmmakers. Liminal is a meditative, aerial look at our state as an example of the geologic period known as the Anthropocene — the time during which humans have had a substantial impact on our planet.

The tour is part of the Unearthed initiative, Indiana Humanities' multiyear environmental theme that asks Hoosiers to consider how we affect the environment and how the environment affects us.

"We're looking forward to bringing this film to communities across the state and creating an opportunity for Hoosiers to think about and discuss our impact on the environment," said Megan Telligman, director of programs at Indiana Humanities. "We hope the film sparks conversations about the legacy we humans will leave behind."

Created by Hoosier filmmakers Zach Schrank and Aaron Yoder, Liminal was filmed entirely with drone cameras by Indiana Aerials and is accompanied by an original score written by Grammy-nominated Fort Wayne composer Nate Utesch of Metavari.

Zach Schrank is a ninth generation Hoosier, sociology professor and director of the Center for a Sustainable Future at Indiana University South Bend. He teaches social theory, consumer society and environmental sociology courses. In 2020, he co-directed the documentary Big Enough, Small Enough: South Bend in Transition, which is available for streaming through Hoodox, a platform featuring exclusively nonfiction, Indiana-based films.

Aaron Yoder is a South Bend, Indiana, native with passions for aviation, technology and photography. He founded Indiana Aerials in early 2017 as a drone service provider in northern Indiana and to foster the growth of aerial data capture techniques.

The evolution of Metavari's work in electronic music has defined the career of Fort Wayne, Indiana, composer Nate Utesch. The musician and Grammy-nominated art director (Smashing Pumpkins, Phoebe Bridgers, Weezer, Sharon Van Etten, etc.) has led the band for over a decade. Metavari is best known for their career-defining Record Store Day titles on the

famed Belgian label One Way Static Records; the synth-heavy reimagining of Fritz Lang's Metropolis, and ABSURDA, the pioneering collection of music for the short films of David Lynch.

Screenings are free and open to the public. While advance registration is requested, a ticket does not guarantee a seat. Seats are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Doors will open 30 minutes prior to start time.

cast. That production won the Encore Association’s Best Musical award, and Whitaker won for Best Supporting Actress. She said, “It has been a favorite (show of hers) ever since. The characters are compelling, the music is beautiful and the story truly resonates.” Whitaker originally signed on to vocally direct the show about a year ago. But in January, she stepped in as play director after the original play director had to step away. Providing both musical and overall directions has its pros and cons.

“The cast and I get to spend a lot of time together,” she said. “Usually, that time is split between a vocal director and the (play) director. But they haven’t had much of a break from me in this process.”

Whitaker said, “I think it can be difficult for the cast when they are trying to focus on other things (besides vocals) -- (such as) scene work and blocking -- but their vocal director is there and can see if the music slips as the other things temporarily take focus.”

She said, “On the positive side, it has allowed us to be much more holistic and flexible in our approach. If we need to take 15 minutes out of rehearsal to clean music or fix a cue, it’s easy to do because the vocal director is always around. And for this show, in particular, there is so much music.”

She said, “Directing both (the music and the overall play) allows a consistent, cohesive vision for both music and the overall performances. I do have to mention, the only reason I could possibly handle both vocal and overall direction is because of my two amazing assistant directors (Ryan Shelton and Amber Shatto). The extra sets of eyes have been invaluable.”

Whitaker said, “Seeing this show come together and the growth the actors have shown with their characters has been extremely satisfying. And just hearing their gorgeous voices sing this music that I love so much makes it all worth it.”

Virginia bluebells with their gorgeous blue flowers, yellow swamp buttercups, both yellow and white trout lilies, pink wild geraniums and two types of trilliums — prairie and large-flowered. Prairie trilliums have a small reddish-purple flower, while the large-flowered trilliums are white. She also sent a list of later bloomers that might be seen on the April 29th walk. They include: pink and white shooting stars; lavender wild hyacinths; mayapples, which have a white flower and leaves that look like little umbrellas; and jack-in-the-pulpits with their distinctive hooded flower that resembles a preacher in a pulpit.

Those are just some of the spring wildflowers that can be found at the Blatchley sanctuary. According to Tess, Blatchley has about the largest collection of wildflowers in central Indiana! I’ve visited Blatchley myself several times, so I’m going to add a few more plants I always seem to spot when I’m there. Remember the wild ginger I mentioned in the column about the Herb of the Year? There are several patches of wild ginger at Blatchley. Their big, heart-shaped leaves make them easy to identify even when they’re not blooming.

Dutchman’s breeches are another wildflower I’ve often seen. The plant’s white flowers resemble miniature pairs of pantaloons hanging upside down. That’s how it got its name.

Another wildflower I usually encounter is squirrel corn, which can be mistaken for Dutchman’s

breeches. There is a close resemblance, but squirrel corn’s flowers are more heart-shaped.

Then there’s skunk cabbage, with its large flat leaves. I’ve never actually seen it blooming because that takes place in late winter, but maybe that’s a good thing. When it’s blooming, it’s supposed to smell like rotting flesh!

Wildflowers aren’t the only interesting sights along Blatchley’s trails. The sanctuary is also a good place for bird-watching, insect watching and critter watching in general.

I’m particularly fascinated by the six-spotted green tiger beetles. Their brilliant metallic green color makes them resemble little jewels.

And I’ve never been to Blatchley that I didn’t look down from the bluff overlooking White River and see at least a half dozen turtles sunning themselves on an old log that extends out into the water.

The Blatchley sanctuary is located a little north of Potter’s Bridge at 125 Boulder Drive. From Cumberland Road, turn west on Edith Avenue, the first road north of the river, then follow the signs to Boulder Drive.

nationwide, the United States Drug Enforcement Administration, along with its law enforcement partners, have removed more than 15.2 million pounds of medication from circulation since the inception of National Drug Take Back Day in 2010.

“The only safe medications are ones prescribed by a trusted medical professional and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist,” Greer adds. “Old and unwanted medicine too often becomes a gateway to addiction.

Events like these are a critical effort to curb the historic surge in U.S. overdoses.”

Hamilton County residents are encouraged to drop off their expired or unused medications between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. at the drive-thru event. No liquids, sharps, or needles will be accepted. For those who cannot make it, there are opportunities to safely dispose of unneeded medications at local pharmacies, hospitals, and police departments throughout the year.
