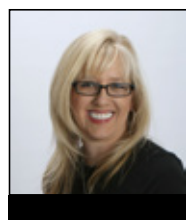

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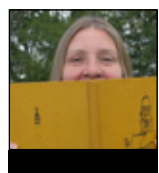

See how well you know your Jackson Township history. (Again, this shouldn't be too difficult if you're a regular reader of this column, but the answers are below if you get stumped.)

1. What two schools were combined to create Hamilton Heights High School?
2. In what year was Jackson Township first settled?
3. What was Deming's original name?
4. Who were the three men who founded Roberts Settlement?
5. What was the first year for Atlanta's New Earth Festival?
6. Which Jackson Township town was once known for its

7. True or false — Millersburg was named for its mill.
8. In 1916 a Jackson Township high school became the first Hamilton County school to play in the state basketball finals. Which school was it?
9. What three towns were combined to create Atlanta?
10. How did Cicero Creek (and therefore, presumably the town of Cicero) acquire its name?

And the answers:

1. Hamilton Heights was formed in 1965 when Walnut Grove and Jackson Central were consolidated. (Jackson Central was itself the consolidation of Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta's high schools.)
2. 1828. That year Henry Jones, William Taylor and a man named Blanch or Blanche (I believe his first name was John, but I'm not 100% sure) settled on tracts of land a short distance west of the future site of Cicero.
3. At the time Deming was laid out by Elihu Pickett, Solo-

mon Pheanis and Lewis Jessup in 1837, it was called Farmington. The name was changed in 1854 when a post office was established there because Indiana already had a Farmington post office.

4. Elijah Roberts, Hansel Roberts and Micajah Walden. In the summer of 1835, they bought 400 acres from the federal government. Five years later, the African American farming community had a population of about ten families and had grown to cover 900 acres.

5. The first New Earth Festival took place October 5 and 6, 1974. Celebrating its 50th year in 2023, it's the oldest festival in Hamilton County.

6. Arcadia. The colby-type "Arcadia Cheese" was made from 1898 to 1942, then again from 1959 to 1961. The cheese was so popular, customers who moved away from this area had it shipped all over the country. Once, it was even sent to China!

7. False. Although Millersburg did eventually have a grist mill, the name comes from its founder, Peter Miller.

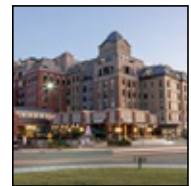

Cities Must Help Protect Our Planet

Carmel is taking many actions to promote sustainability.

Earth Day is coming up on April 22, but caring for our natural environment and the health of our planet shouldn't just be top of mind on one day a year. All year long, we must all do our part to protect the Earth.

Caring about the environment is not a Republican or Democrat issue. We all want to breathe clean air and drink clean water. Our planet should be a concern to all of us.

Across the country, mayors and city councils are at the forefront when it comes to promoting sustainability and positive environmental policies.

The City of Carmel was recognized by EPA for being the first municipality in the state to pass a climate resiliency and recovery resolution. The city has also been recognized as a "Green Community" by the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns and has been presented numerous awards and grants from various natural resource organizations in regards to our Urban Forestry initiatives.

As a member of the City Council, I voted to pass our city's climate change action plan and create a subsequent commission to ensure the recommendations are put into place.

But we must remain vigilant. Here are some things Carmel should con-

tinue to do to be environmentally friendly:

- Promote walkability with bike paths, side-walks, crosswalks and more. When people walk or ride their bike instead of driving a car, it helps reduce carbon emissions.

- Continue to replace traditional intersections with roundabouts. Since cars don't stop and idle, roundabouts help reduce carbon emissions.

- Protect greenspaces and trees. During rezoning or development processes, we can insist that trees are preserved or replanted which helps create a lush, green atmosphere while helping absorb carbon dioxide.

- Encourage and incentivize green construction for new buildings.

- Push for more solar panels for city properties and new mixed use developments.

- Support change out of city vehicles with electric

vehicles as the fleet ages out.

- Allow for electric charging stations in city garages and parking lots.

- Reduce paper waste by encouraging e-sign and electronic paper packets for boards and commissions.

- Continue to monitor light pollution created by commercial buildings. Push for energy efficient LED lighting.

- Push for more outdoor recycling receptacles around the city.

Again, most of these suggestions we are already doing or plan to do, but it's important to let people know that Carmel cares about our environment.

We have been recognized and awarded for our environmental consciousness and we must continue to remain vigilant.

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Indiana Lawmakers Advance Controversial “Union-Busting” Bill Denounced By Hoosier Teachers

The bill would nix a mandate for school administrators to discuss certain concerns with teachers and unions.

Hundreds of educators rallied at the Indiana State Teachers Association’s “Pack the House” event on Thursday, April 13, 2023, at the Indiana Statehouse.

Indiana lawmakers are one step closer to advancing a contentious bill to the governor’s desk that has been decried by the state’s teachers unions as “unnecessary” and “union-busting.”

The House voted 63-36 Monday — with seven GOP legislators opposed — to send the proposal back to the opposite chamber for final approval. The bill barely passed the Senate earlier this session after facing bipartisan opposition.

Educators and union leaders maintain that Senate Bill 486 would “silence teachers” by stripping their rights to discuss concerns over student learning with school administrators.

Specifically, the bill would no longer require school administrators to discuss topics like class sizes, curriculum and student discipline with teachers and their union.

Republican lawmakers in favor of the bill have said it’s a “deregulation bill” that will empower ad-

ministrators and educators. They argued the changes would ensure discussions about working conditions are more open to non-union teachers and are not limited to the 16 topics in state law.

“This bill is all about flexibility for educators in the classroom — at the building level and at the system level,” said Rep. Jake Teshka, R-South Bend, who sponsored the bill. “The goal is to eliminate mandates that are either outdated or unnecessary so that our state’s teachers can focus on educating Hoosier children.”

“As we move more and more into a school choice environment where parents can rightly choose the education environment that works best for their child, there’s less need for us to be so prescriptive in our regulation of traditional public schools,” he continued. “This bill treats educators as the professionals that they are by trusting them to communicate with each other as partners, not adversaries.”

But the Indiana State Teachers Association (ISTA) has pushed back, saying the bill would further erode teachers’ collective bargaining rights.

The state’s largest teacher’s union rallied at the Statehouse last week.

Among their demands was a call for lawmakers to kill Senate Bill 486 and “stop

attacks” on the teaching profession.

Dozens of teachers returned outside the House chamber Monday, chanting and yelling in opposition as lawmakers debated and voted on the bill.

“We have had a union busting effort going on ... this body is not dealing with the desires of the community. ... We are not walking with the people of these communities,” said Rep. Vernon Smith, D-Gary, speaking Monday on the House floor. “(This bill) is destructive.”

Teachers rally against the bill

The legislation, authored by Sen. Linda Rogers, R-Granger, would let school administrators choose not to discuss decisions about classroom sizes, curriculum and other similar topics with their teachers’ union representatives. The bill also would strip down teacher training and evaluation requirements currently in state law, like those related to student homelessness.

The bill does not change requirements for districts to negotiate wages with teachers’ representatives, however.

Tensions rose in the House Education Committee last week as lawmakers debated the bill and an amendment proposed by Rep. Ed DeLaney, D-Indianapolis, that would have deleted most of the

language in the draft legislation. That amendment ultimately failed.

Democratic lawmakers held that the existing 50-year-old mandate requiring school administrators to discuss working conditions with teachers’ labor representatives is essential for ensuring collective bargaining between school districts and educators is mandatory — not optional.

During nearly three hours of testimony before the House committee — mostly from teachers speaking in opposition — educators said the bill would negatively impact students and worsen Indiana’s already historic teacher shortage.

“Bills like these are directly causing an effect on our teacher shortage,” said Joel Hand, speaking on behalf of the Indiana Chapter of the American Federation of Teachers, a separate union with a significant Hoosier membership. “And when teachers feel like and have the impression that they’re not being listened to by their administration, by their legislators, they give up, they leave the profession, or worse yet, we have young people ... who decide they’re not going to go into the teaching profession.”

Administrators stand in support

Those who spoke out

against the measure additionally argued that school administrators are unlikely to consistently maintain open lines of communication without the mandate.

“We’re tired of screaming what we need and we’re tired of not being heard. Teacher working conditions are student learning conditions. You will codify our silence with this bill,” said Allison Haley, a high school teacher and local union president in Noblesville. “Teacher voice is imperative. Can we just call this what it is? An attack on a majority women profession that requires the demanding and exhaustive combination of intellect, professionalism and empathy.”

Still, not all teachers oppose the measure.

That includes members of Indiana Professional Educators, an association of teachers that oppose unions.

They argued that the bill would open teacher-administrator discussions up to non-union employees. Opponents noted that nothing in the current law prohibits administrators from having such discussions with those teachers, though.

Supporters further argued the bill would better allow teachers and administrators to do their jobs in ways that best fit their local communities — rather than have to respond to top-down mandates from

the state.

“I don’t believe communication at the administrative level for a superintendent of public schools is an option. I believe it will have to and will continue,” said Robert Taylor, executive director of the Indiana Association of Public School Superintendents. “Can I guarantee that? No, I cannot. But [I can] assure you that we as an association will continue to advocate, train and facilitate all superintendents that we have in our association to become effective communicators.”

Multiple other groups representing school administrators supported the bill, too.

“Building professional relationships with staff is the key way our educators grow and thereby help our students grow,” said Todd Bess, executive director for the Indiana Association of Principals. “We commit to emphasizing this point with our school leaders so all educator voices are heard.”

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Budget Amendments Refine Economic Development But Leave Mental And Public Health Funding Uncertain

The \$43.3 billion state budget overcame another hours-long hurdle Monday evening, with Republicans adding a handful of amendments but resisting the majority of efforts to change the underlying bill.

Following Monday’s changes, the budget will need to pass the Senate again on Tuesday before heading to an inevitable conference committee to negotiate the final details. In particular, mental health and public health funding are the largest remaining questions and are likely to see big changes in the coming weeks.

The next revenue forecast is slated to be published on Wednesday and will inform the final version of the budget. The General Assembly has until the end of the month to finalize legislation.

Amendments added into the budget

Senators decided to incorporate a smattering of Republican amendments via voice votes, including one that would increase the document storage fee

by \$3 for county-level clerks and another to expand what economic development dollars could be used toward.

The governor’s and House budget both call those dollars’ part of the Regional Economic Acceleration and Development Initiative while senators named it the Collaborative Communities program. Those dollars, \$500 million over the biennium, can now be used for child care facilities and recruiting young professionals.

However, a separate amendment would require that at least 10% of “deal closing” dollars from the Indiana Economic Development Corporation go toward counties with less than 50,000 residents.

Though the Republican supermajority did opt to accept one Democratic amendment — a statutory fix to restore regional sewer district authority — another 30 were defeated.

Defeated amendments included the perennial attempt to legalize marijuana for medicinal and recreational use, which Republican leadership has

repeatedly rebuffed.

But Republicans also rejected calls to establish a climate solutions task force, which has a vocal youth activist base, or dedicate \$2.5 million to address the state’s backlog of rape kits in need of testing. Another failed amendment would have given financial support to Indiana’s Task Force One, a search and rescue unit.

Sen. Fady Qaddoura introduced 25 amendments alone, calling down 16 for a vote and explicitly saying it was his sole opportunity to introduce Democratic bills passed over by Republicans earlier in the process. None of his amendments passed.

“I appreciate your patience with me. This is my only opportunity as a member of the minority to share my ideas on the floor,” Qaddoura, D-Indianapolis, said.

His amendments ran the gamut from property tax relief to tweaking the road funding formula to “fix” the calculation for urban areas.

In particular, Qaddoura attempted to eliminate a

pilot program introduced in the Senate budget without fanfare that he said would “privatize” counsel for certain cases under the Department of Child Services in Marion County and around Allen County. Those two urban areas represent nearly half of the state’s population, Qaddoura said, and yet that language hadn’t been heard or vetted in a committee.

Only Sen. Mike Young, R-Indianapolis, defended the pilot and his Republican colleagues defeated the amendment.

Funding for mental, public health still TBD
Republicans who otherwise agreed with Democratic suggestions to increasing funding for mental health services under Senate Bill 1 or public health services under Senate Bill 4 urged waiting to finalize those numbers.

“I think in the next week and a half we just have to collaborate on what that (cell phone) fee will be,” Sen. Ryan Mishler, R-Mishawaka, said about funding for 988 mental health crisis

services.

Federal law allows states to impose a cell phone fee of up to \$1 monthly to fund 988, designed to be the mental health counterpart for 911, which is partially funded in Indiana by a \$1 monthly fee. Mishler indicated last week that Republicans hadn’t settled on a final fee amount.

Alternatively, the public health line item is significantly less than previously requested in Gov. Eric Holcomb’s budget, now at \$225 million over the biennium instead of a combined \$347 million.

Sen. Andrea Hunley, D-Indianapolis, offered an amendment to increase funding to \$100 million the first year followed by \$200 million the next but it was opposed even by the author of the public health bill, Senate Bill 4.

“I would ask that you vote down this amendment, not because I don’t support fully funding Senate Bill 4, but because this is a work in progress,” Sen. Ed Charbonneau, R-Valparaiso, said. “People that are working on the budget are dealing

with this and I don’t know where it’ll end up but I hope it’ll be fully funded.”

Democrats did voluntarily withdraw a couple of amendments saying ongoing negotiations with budget writers seemed positive, including two related to funding for local public defenders.

Sen. Eddie Melton, D-Gary, said he felt confident that a cigarette tax increase would be incorporated into the final budget, opting not to call his amendment to increase the \$0.99 tax by \$1.50.

“I am optimistic that this is going to move forward,” Melton said on the floor after introducing and then withdrawing the proposal.

class to attend the new North Elementary.

The class was also the last seventh-grade class to attend the same school that their parents could have attended in high school. They attended the former high school at 1448 Conner St., originally built in 1923 and served as a high school until 1955, then junior high until 1968, then became the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville and more recently, in 2018, The Farm, a business office for Culver's restaurants owned by Kristina and Jeff Meyer (K and J Investments). Zeckel said students might remember the wide stairs, shop class in the basement of the west academic building, walking across the sky bridge over to the east building, and the cafeteria in the basement where they had a vending machine that sold cartons of chocolate milk. There was also the old gymnasium reminiscent of the "Hoo-siers" movie and the old locker rooms. Students had to jog to Memorial Field behind North Elementary for PE class and wore track shoes with 2-inch spikes to be able to compete on the cinder track.

The Class of '73 was also the first eighth-grade class to attend and graduate from the new Junior High at Field Drive and 16th Street (now Noblesville East Middle School). They had "the first indoor pool in the history of Noblesville Schools." Their freshman year (1969-70), the new Dale Swanson football field was dedicated, and NHS had the first swim team.

In 1973, the senior class was the last year of the high school's building configuration from the second remodel of the school. In 1974, Noblesville High School's auditorium was added and a lot of the two stories of glass down the west sign disappeared, and the shop wing was enlarged.

While classmates witnessed the Vietnam War, the class graduated between wars. When the guys in the class turned 17, they received a draft card, but they were spared from going to Vietnam after in January 1973, Paris Peace Accords was signed, ending the war.

The Beatles arrived when classmates were in the third grade.

When the class transitioned from junior high to high school, some of the teachers moved with them, including Larry Jacobi and the late Gary Shriver. They had teachers that taught their parents, Wes Able, Earl Wolf and Murat Nugent.

And freshman year, the students were allowed to

wear blue jeans to school, where the late '60s and early '70s brought mini skirts, culottes, paisley shirts, ties and blouses, bell bottoms and long hair.

As freshmen, with no drivers licenses, they organized two bus trips, to the Coliseum at the State Fairgrounds to see The Turtles and Three Dog Night, and to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway to time trials. When they got their driver's licenses, they cruised the Jim Dandy, Danners strip mall, Forest Park, Rainbo Roller Rink and Happy's Hamburgers on South 10th Street, along with B&K root beer stand. They went to Stardust Bowl, Diana Theater, ABC Drive-In, Blue Ribbon Dairy, B&W Pizza, and Bill's Drive In. They swam at Hillside and Forest Park pool and slid down "the dam" at Morse Lake.

The Class of '73 is featured in the eight-page Spring 2023 NHS Alumni Newsletter, which Beaver puts together and mails out to alumni each year announcing the banquet, which traditionally takes place the last Saturday in April. Thanks again, Jeff Zeckel, for all of this awesome history, which is also included in the Alumni Newsletter.

While the NHS class of '70 and '71 missed out on their time to be honored during 50-year reunions during 2020 and 2021 banquets, due to the pandemic, those two graduating class years were honored at the 2022 banquet.

Attendees every year at these banquets seem to have a great time.

"If you have never been to one of our NHS Alumni Banquets, you are missing out on a fun evening reminiscing with classmates from all graduating classes," said Beaver, who was on the homecoming court her senior year. "Our main mission is to celebrate our alumni and hold a banquet each year for all of you to gather and enjoy the company of your classmates."

Beaver said average attendance, over the past more than 20 years, at the NHS Alumni Banquet is about 300 guests.

The NHS Class of 1974 will be hosts at this year's banquet, greeting attendees as they check in, directing guests to their tables and serving punch during social hour. It's a tradition for each class to play host the year prior to its 50-year reunion, next year on April 27, 2024. Also, in tradition, NHS students will serve the Jim Dandy meals to each table.

One outstanding NHS Alumnus of the Year, vot-

ed on by the NHS Alumni Association board, is recognized with a plaque and isn't announced until the banquet. (The 2022 winner was Karen Williams Pryor, Class of '74) But before then, during the banquet, door prizes are presented to the graduate who has traveled the farthest, who has the most grandchildren and the earliest and most recent graduates.

All of these add "a little more fun to the evening," Beaver said.

Current officers on the board are Peggy Baldwin Beaver, president, class of 1972; Terri Sigman Kennedy, vice president, class of 1972; Janice Robinson, treasurer, class of 1968; Vicki Wright Wilson, secretary, class of 1968. Other board members are Jeff Zeckel, class of 1973; Tim Timmons (publisher of The Times), class of 1975; Tom Gang, class of 1967; JoAnn Cook White, class of 1948; Debbie Davis Bastin, class of 1971; Charlie McMillan Jr., class of 1981; Michelle Menchaca Dixon, class of 1989; and Karen Williams Pryor, class of 1974 (2022 NHS Alumnus of the Year). "If you are interested in serving on the board, we would love to hear from you," Beaver said.

Donations are encouraged for the NHS Alumni Association Scholarship Fund, Newsletter Fund, general fund to support the banquet, and the Gold Star Program (in which name appears on a plaque and is on display at every banquet.)

All paid members will receive an alumni newsletter, "if we have your current address," Beaver said. The newsletter is mailed out in early March. The newsletter includes a banquet reservation form that can be completed and mailed in with a check payable to NHS Alumni.

The 2021 scholarship winners, announced in April 2022, were Johnathan Baker, Nate Cook, Graecen Leo, Riley Strong and Lindsay Wilson. The 2022 scholarship winners will be announced in May during NHS Senior Honors Night.

Reservation deadline is Saturday. Doors open at 5 p.m. for socializing with dinner at 6 p.m. and program at 7 p.m.

Beaver encourages folks to make a reservation, "so we can plan for our seating and number of meals," she said.

"Have you made your reservation? It's not too late," Beaver said.

8. Cicero High School. (They accomplished this feat despite having no gym, playing with the same ball all season and being forced to travel to away games by rail, by car and even by hay wagon!)

9. Spargerville, Shilville and Buena Vista. The combined community was initially called Buena Vista, but the name had to be changed when the town acquired a post office. (A Buena Vista post office al-

ready existed in Indiana.) I couldn't find a definitive reason "Atlanta" was selected to replace "Buena Vista," but it seems likely the choice was influenced by Civil War veterans who'd been to Atlanta, Georgia during the war.

10. According to Shirts' 1901 county history, Dr. William Beattie Laughlin of Brookville named the creek. Dr. Laughlin came here in 1821 to survey some of the recently acquired New Purchase land and brought along his

young son, Cicero. One day, while attempting to drink from the creek, the boy lost his balance and fell in. Dr. Laughlin promptly dubbed the creek "Cicero Creek." The name stuck. (Dr. Laughlin, also referred to as Judge Laughlin, was a man of many talents and the founder of Rushville, Indiana.)
