Progress Update: Relmagine **Pleasant Street**

Reimagine Pleasant Street – a transformational infrastructure project in Noblesville and Mayor Chris Jensen's top priority recently passed the seven-month mark, with a more visible phase beginning.

Progress is evident as utility relocation is largely complete. Crews are installing storm sewers to handle both current and future water drainage needs. The foundation for the new White River bridge has been set, and crews are installing retaining walls. Construction of two new roundabouts on Eighth Street began June 5 with a 150day closure of Eighth Street between Washington Street and Mulberry Street. Pleasant Street between Sixth Street and Ninth Street, which includes the alley between Eighth and Ninth Street at Pleasant Street, is also temporarily closed.

Upon reaching this new construction phase, Jensen wanted to share an update on the construction progress.

"From the beginning, I promised that we were all in this together and that the needs of the community would be central to the project," he said.

Fishers Community Center At Johnson Farms Coming To Hoosier Road Westfield Library Foundation

100,000 +square foot center will feature highly desired community amenities including a dog park, indoor playground & walking/running track.

City of Fishers announced today its plans to build the 105,000-squarefoot recreation-focused Fishers Community Center at Johnson Farms on Hoosier Road near 121st Street.

"As we strive to build a culture of health in our community, a vital component of this is creating a place where our community can come together to care for their overall wellbeing," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "With this new community asset, we not only offer a place for health, fitness, and recreation, but also a place to gather and socialize with the friends, family, and neighbors, which we know is equally important in fostering a strong quality of life in our community.

Art Johnson, the current owner of the property, shared his excitement in becoming part of Fishers' next chapter.

"My family has been part of this community for generations, and I am excited to be a part of Fishers' legacy and

have our land serve as a central spot in the community for gathering and recreation for years to come," said Johnson.

The new community

center was designed based on input from residents. In 2021, a steering committee chaired by Fishers City Councilor Todd Zimmerman (At-Large) was formed to identify and prioritize community needs and how they could be served by an indoor facility. Nearly 3,500 residents completed a survey to share the amenities they most desired in this facility. Top items like a dog park, indoor playground, indoor walking/running track, and aquatics facility were included in the design, while other items like fine arts classes and performing arts were included in the new City Hall & Arts Center currently under construction in the downtown Nickel Plate District.

What I hope for residents to get out of this center is a sense of place and community," said Councilor Zimmerman. "More than the sports or athletics of it, this is a place to bring our residents together. It's also a place that is welcoming to all, from our neighbors in the surrounding communities to out of town visitors exploring Fishers for the first time.

The Center will offer both memberships and day passes with discounts for Fishers residents, while featuring free amenities accessible to both residents and non-residents, including a large indoor playground, indoor track for walking and running, and café.

The main level of the center will include a 5,300-square-foot indoor playground; aquatics facility with a lap pool and zero-depth entry warm water pool with a waterslide and play features; an 18,600-square-foot gymnasium featuring three basketball courts, which can also be converted into volleyball and pickleball courts; clinical rooms and offices for the Fishers Health Department; childcare facility; multipurpose rooms; public gathering spaces; a café, and more. The second level will feature a large fitness and wellness center, including a spin studio and group exercise rooms, along with an indoor track for walking and running. A roof terrace to host outdoor exercise and gatherings is planned for

future phases.

Through collaboration with community stakeholders like the Fishers Advisory Committee on Disability, accessibility features such as adult companion care rooms with adult changing tables, a zero-depth entry pool, water wheelchair, and accessible fitness equipment were added to the facility. The community center will also house Outside the Box's adult day program to support individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Center is estimated to not exceed \$60 million and will be paid for through city-issued bonds following a build-operate-transfer agreement that is slated to end in 2026. City leadership does not anticipate the Fishers City Tax rate to increase as a result of financing this project.

The project resolution will be presented to the Fishers Finance Committee on June 14 and the Fishers City Council on June 19 for approval.




a tournament would be something new and fun for our community."



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Dry, Hot Weather Stressing Crops And Farmers

Abnormally dry conditions across Indiana are causing concerns for farmers during a season of crop growth. Purdue Extension specialists Shaun Casteel and Dan Quinn and Indiana State Climatologist Beth Hall encourage producers to keep a watchful eye on crops and Indiana's drought status.

According to Quinn, an assistant professor of agronomy and a corn specialist, corn crop conditions across the state have deteriorated over the past few weeks, especially in corn that was planted later in May. When the weather is hot and dry this early after corn is planted, corn roots have a harder time establishing in the ground, leading to possible challenges later in the growing season.

"It's still too early to know if there will be significant yield losses, but if this does persist

into pollination and the critical growth stages in the life cycle of the corn plant, we will have reason to be concerned," said Quinn.

Soybean plants planted later in May are also struggling more compared to those planted earlier in the season. Casteel, an associate professor of agronomy and a soybean specialist, reminds farmers that in June, soybean plants might be off-green in color because of limited nitrogen supply.

Be mindful that dry

fertilizer needs water to solubilize it so the nutrients can be available for the roots in the soil. If you have fertilized during this dry spell or plan to in the future, you can expect to have fertilizer sitting on top of the ground waiting for water to work it in," Casteel said.

Hall remains cautiously optimistic, given a forecast predicting rain across the state. She explains that this dry pattern occurred concurrently with a high-pressure system with tem-

peratures ranging a few degrees above normal and humidity abnormally low for this time of year,

further exacerbated by lack of full-grown crop plants available to emit moisture.

have been dry, but these conditions would need to be sustained for another two weeks to indicate a flash drought. We hope the weather patterns will shift soon so this is only a scare," Hall said.

Thousands of car enthusiasts come out every year for the annual Central Indiana Vintage Vehicles' Father's Day Car Show at Forest Park. This year's show is 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the Noblesville park.

from 8:30 in the morning until 3 in the afternoon and get away with it," said Larry Grabb of Noblesville.

Where else can you drool over old cars, dance to your favorite song and enjoy a day at the park?

Grabb said it's fun hearing folks point out a car like their mom or dad drove when they were young, or a car that was just like their first car.

"You can always make sure it's the perfect gift for Dad, because dads always love something like this, whether they're car crazy or not," said Grabb, a dad himself.

Noblesville car enthusiasts and members of Central Indiana Vintage Vehicles, Grabb and Dave Shank Sr. head up the car show. Shank owns a 1954 Chrysler, and Grabb owns a 1967 Buick Skylark, and will be bringing that car along with his 1969 American Motors AMX. "I bought this car new when I returned from overseas more than 50 years ago," Grabb said.

Grabb also deejays for the car show. This year, he's doing half of the deejay responsibilities. His son, William, is doing the other half. "He's a real chip off the old block and a real help." Grabb said occasionally people at the car show will stop at the deejay booth and ask him about a certain car.

Shank, of Noblesville, said strolling the car show stirs memories for just about any dad.

"You will hear his stories about the great cars that he owned in his life and what fun they were to own and drive," he has said. "It is like a trip down memory lane with the music of those past years blowing through the trees. Dad and family will have a great time and many more memories until next year."

CIVV, a 33-year-old nonprofit that puts on the Car Show, donates all of its profits to The Elysian Foundation, a home-based care program that uses the money to benefit those in our community who are severely brain-damaged or who have other disabilities. Linda O'Dell co-founded The Elysian Foundation with her husband, Jim O'Dell, and daughter Tamela Grabb, wife of Larry Grabb, all of Noblesville.

The car club adopted The Elysian Foundation for its charity and has raised about \$67,000 for use in assisting clients at Normal Life of Sheridan, a residential facility for the severely brain injured. The O'Dells' son, who died nine years ago, lived at Normal Life. "Elysian" is "a Greek word that means "state or place of perfect happiness."

"We're delivering on those promises thanks to the city staff and project team's approach to managing this complex project."

Jensen pointed to three elements of the project that best illustrate this point: historic preservation efforts, stakeholder engagement and pedestrian connectivity.

More than a bridge Bridging the White River is a critical component to making an east-west connection in the city.

Construction of the new bridge required the removal of the 200-foot, two-span steel truss bridge that once carried the Midland Railway over the White River. In collaboration with Indiana's State Historic Preservation Officer, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and local historic consulting parties, the project team developed a plan to carefully remove and disassemble the historic bridge built in 1893 for future use. The City of Noblesville then formed a partnership with Conner Prairie to store the bridge while a final location is determined and as plans are developed for the bridge to be refurbished and reassembled.

"The care and attention we devoted to preserving the historic bridge and our partnership with Conner Prairie is just one example of the project's focus on preserving history," said Jensen.

As a portion of the project encroaches on the city's historic Plum Prairie Historic District, the city has committed to include several enhancements to preserve the historical integrity of the district.

The project team collaborated with local residents and other interested parties and historical preservation groups, as well as the Indiana State Historic Board of Preservation, to create historical signage in and around the district. The city also committed to funding a residential façade grant program for residents to improve exterior details of their buildings. The program provides \$150,000 over three years for improvements to the city's historic districts, with \$75,000 specifically designated to the Plum Prairie Historic District. Engaging the

The project also includes landscaping and other pedestrian enhancements such as high-visibility roadway crossings and three new pedestrian tunnels. Jensen acknowl-

10. When did Grand Park open?

And the answers:

1. Quaker Harmon Cox and his family are considered to be the township's first residents of European descent. They came here from North Carolina in late 1831 or early 1832 and settled on a tract of land in the southeastern part of the township, around 146th Street and Greyhound Pass.

2. Pork and beans. Although the Westfield factory closed in the 1920s, the brand name itself has survived. You can still buy Van Camp's Pork and Beans, now produced by food giant ConAgra.

3. Nipintuck (or Nip & Tuck, or Nip and Tuck, depending on the source.) Apparently, that was what Lamong was originally called. I still haven't uncovered the story behind it, though, or why the name was changed to "Lamong."

4. Eagletown. Although other county towns occasionally sponsored reunions of the area's early pioneers, the largest and longest running Old Settlers Meeting was at Eagletown. Gatherings were held there annually for nearly 60 years.

5. Journalist/historian/ author/politician/diplomat Claude G. Bowers. Bowers was born in Westfield, but the family moved to Jolietville shortly after that. Although they left the county when Bowers was just two or three vears-old, Bowers spent time each summer on his grandfather's farm near the Boone/Hamilton County line when he was a boy, and he remembered Jolietville well in later years.

6. Actually, both names have been used. When the Monon railroad reached

Hamilton County in the early 1880s, local citizens voted to call their community "Horton" after Hubert Horton who'd been instrumental in convincing the railroad to place a depot there.

Around that same time, they also acquired a post office, but the post office was called "Hortonville" to avoid confusion with another Indiana town, Holton.

Now that both the railroad and post office are gone, "Hortonville" seems to have become the preferred name.

7. Dismal Swamp.
Stretching diagonally
from Deming to Hortonville, the swamp helped a
number of runaway slaves
to escape slave hunters.
Among them were the
Rhodes family, who
famously "spilled through
the cracks" of a wagon
bed into the swamp as
they were being transported to Westfield.

In the 1880s, Dismal Swamp was drained and turned into productive farmland.

8. Joseph G. "Uncle Joe" Cannon. Cannon, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives from 1903 to 1911, lived at Tile Factory Corner for about four years when he was a boy.

(Tile Factory Corner was the area around the intersection of State Road 38 and Anthony Road.)

9. Coffin's wife, Catharine White Coffin, was the aunt of Westfield's Mordicai, Lilburn and Micajah White, all of whom were active in the Underground Railroad.

10. The official opening was June 21, 2014. (Has it really been that long?)
