The Hamilton County Health Department will host four Back-To-School Immunization Clinics in July and August as part of a statewide effort to help families easily access school immunizations prior to the start of the 2023-24 school year.

"Routine immunizations are the best way to protect children from highly contagious diseases and can help ensure every student

has a healthy start to the school year," says Gema Lopez, School Immunization Liaison. "We're encouraging parents of school-age children to check their children's vaccine status and to take advantage of one of our upcoming clinics or schedule an appointment with their healthcare provider.'

The first of the four clinics will take place on Wednesday, July 19 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the Hamilton County

Health Department at 18030 Foundation Drive in Noblesville. Three other clinics are scheduled for August 2, August 16, and August 30 for the same times and location.

Those interested in participating are asked to register in advance at https://patients.vaxcare. com/registration. Parents need to enter the code IN15561 and then select their preferred date. Families should provide insurance information if available. There is an

eight-dollar administration fee per vaccine for those who are uninsured or underinsured.

The clinics are open to children ages five and older. Indiana school children going into kindergarten, sixth grade, and 12th grade are required to receive age-specific immunizations prior to school starting. A full list

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Legislation To Help Small Businesses

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


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Hydrofoils Defined And Why Environmentalists Are Excited

Dear EarthTalk: What exactly are hydrofoils and why are environmental advocates so bullish on them revolutionizing the shipping industry?

The shipping industry emits around three percent of the world's greenhouse gas emissions annually, which is a comparable figure to that of the widely known airline industry's footprint. Looking at how to make the shipping industry, and maritime transport, more sustainable is accordingly a key concern for environmental leaders around the globe. Hydrofoils are not a new concept, but electric ones may be a promising new innovation for the future of sustainable maritime travel, and the field is developing fast.

December 2022 saw the advent of the world's fastest and most long-range electric ferry to date in Stockholm, Sweden, in the form of the Candela P-12 shuttle. Like all hydrofoils, this public transportation shuttle was built with a wing-like structure underneath itself that functions much like the airfoil seen on airplanes: As the official Candela press release states, "The hydrofoil technology means that the boat is lifted on wings that

'fly' underwater, eliminating water resistance from pushing the hull through water. The hydrofoils reduce energy consumption by 80 percent compared to conventional ships." This new combination of technology makes electric hydrofoils both faster than diesel-powered ships and cheaper to operate due to less stringent energy demands.

The wide-spread implementation of electric hydrofoil technology has not yet occurred. However, Stockholm's KTH Royal Institute of Technology asserts that the inclusion of electric hydrofoils or similar technologies could potentially reduce the shipping industry's emissions by 97.5 percent compared to the emissions of standard diesel-fueled ships. Furthermore, the very nature of the construction of these light-weight electric hydrofoils requires less material, overall minimizing the emissions of an electric hydrofoil throughout its lifetime.

In the face of rising global temperatures, and a projected increase in global greenhouse gas emissions, hydrofoils are necessary additions to the maritime industry if it hopes to reach the International Maritime Organisation's goal of cutting carbon emissions by 40 percent by 2030. Beyond

that, these ships also serve in the interest of efficiency, particularly since their lighter designs and inability to produce a wake mean that they are oftentimes faster than standard diesel boats: For example, the implementation of an electric hydrofoil has cut down one commuting route in Stockholm from 55 minutes to only 25.

The original concept of a hydrofoil has existed for decades, but electric hydrofoils are the "new kid on the block" focused on growing sustainable practices for the future. These boats' low carbon footprint, lower operating costs and ability for more efficient transportation make them an interesting new opportunity for investment, and for a future that will require more environmentally-focused decisionmaking.



Attorney General Todd Rokita And Team Take Strong Actions Against Robo-Callers

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita and his team have continued a months-long crackdown against illegal robo-callers responsible for billions of calls nationally and tens of millions to Hoosiers.

As part of this effort, Rokita's team has collaborated with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and other law enforcement partners nationwide — including attorneys general from all 50 states and the District of Columbia — in a national sweep the FTC has dubbed "Operation Stop Scam Calls."

"All Hoosiers, my wife and I included, hate these unwanted automated calls that disturb our peace and interrupt our routines," Rokita said. "But these calls are more than mere annoyances. Quite often, they're part of elaborate scams aimed at stealing people's money and identities. We're working to stop these criminal acts and hold perpetrators accountable."

The national sweep targets telemarketers and the companies that hire them — as well as lead generators who deceptively collect and provide consumers' telephone numbers to robo-callers. These deceptive lead generators falsely represent that consumers have consented to receive calls.

Operation Stop Scam Calls also targets Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) service providers who facilitate tens of billions of illegal robo-calls every year, which often originate overseas.

Over past months, Rokita's team has taken the

following actions:
•In April of 2023, Attor-

ney General Rokita's team finalized settlements with Startel Communication LLC, Wanda Hall, and Rapid Eagle Inc. — doing business as VoIP Essential Inc. These companies allegedly helped robo-callers make over 4.8 million phone calls to Hoosiers and hundreds of millions of calls to other states across the United States. The alleged robo-calls included a variety of scams, including IRS and Social Security Administration imposter scams, legal action or arrest scams, Apple support scams, and Amazon subscription scams. The settlements included civil penalties and injunctive terms. Rapid Eagle Inc. LLC agreed to follow state and federal laws on telephone privacy and pay \$150,000 to the State of Indiana. Startel Communication LLC and Wanda Hall agreed to leave the robo-calling and telecom industry forever.

•In March of 2022, Attorney General Rokita's team settled with Piratel LLC — a California telecommunications company whose clients included the aforementioned Startel Communication LLC. The settlement resolved allegations that Piratel LLC had accepted money to essentially "look the other way" rather than act upon its knowledge that Startel facilitated robo-calls. Piratel LLC agreed to follow state and federal laws on telephone privacy and pay \$150,000 to the State of Indiana.

•In April of 2023, Attorney General Rokita's team settled with Greg Sheppard doing business as Connected Leads out of Chicago, Illinois for allegedly sending at least seven robo-calls sent to Hoosiers on the Indiana Do Not Call List. The settlement included a judgment of \$30,000 and other injunctive terms.

•In August of 2022, Attorney General Rokita announced that his team was leading The Anti-Robo-call **Multistate Litigation Task** Force. The Task Force is a 51-state-member collective, led by the Attorneys General of Indiana, North Carolina, and Ohio, which is focused on actively investigating and pursuing enforcement actions against various entities currently, VoIP providers — in the robo-call ecosystem that are identified as being responsible for significant volumes of illegal and fraudulent robo-call traffic routed into

and across the country. On behalf of the Anti-Robo-call Multistate Litigation Task Force, Attorney General Rokita's team in November of 2022 filed a petition to enforce a Civil Investigative Demand issued earlier that year to One Eye LLC. In May of 2023, the court ordered that One Eye LLC, its ownership group, and its successive company One Owl Telecom Inc. stop transmitting calls to: 1) phone numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry; 2) phone numbers on the Indiana Do Not Call List 3) phone numbers with an Indiana Area Code; and 4) Indiana

residents.
•Co-leading a 49-at-

torney-general coalition, Attorney General Rokita filed a civil lawsuit in May of 2023 against Michael D. Lansky LLC — doing business as Avid Telecom and others alleging violations of various state and federal telephone privacy and telemarketing laws. The complaint alleges that Avid Telecom sent or transmitted more than 7.5 billion calls to telephone numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry. This was the first enforcement action that arose out of the investigative efforts of the 51-member Anti-Robo-call Multistate Litigation Task Force. As of July 2023, the case remained pending.

Attorney General Rokita and his team, along with six other states, prepare for trial in August of 2023 against Health Advisors of America Inc., Michael T. Smith and Scott Shapiro for their alleged role in one of the United States' largest robo-calling schemes. The complaint alleges defendants made 25 million calls to Hoosiers in 2019 and 2020, which included more than 13.5 million calls to people whose numbers were on the Do Not Call Registry and 5 million calls to Hoosiers on the Indiana Do Not Call List. In March of 2023, the Attorney General settled with John Spiller and Jakob Mears.

"Collaboration is a key component in investigating and prosecuting illegal robo-callers," Rokita said. "We will continue working with state and federal partners to combat this criminal activity and achieve positive outcomes for Hoosiers."

Realtors® Release June Central Indiana Housing Data

New housing data issued by the MIBOR Realtor Association for June 2023 shows no change in median sales price and decrease in active inventory compared to June 2022.

The median sales price remained the same in June compared to June 2022, and remained the same compared to May 2023. New listings decreased 27.7 percent in year-over-year comparison. Active inventory decreased 3.5 percent in year-over-year comparison and increased 1.0 percent compared to last month.

Pending sales decreased 12.8 percent in year-over-year comparison. Closed sales decreased 20.9 percent compared to last year.

"Home prices in central Indiana held steady at the all-time high of \$300,000 in June, unchanged from last month and the same as last June. Year-overyear closed sales of 2,988 were down 20.9%, the largest year-over-year drop since January, although sales rose slightly compared to last month. Pending sales are about 13% below last year, while new listings were down 27.7%. Similar to what we are seeing on a national level, the lack of inventory in central Indiana continues to keep home prices high and despite higher interest rates, the market remains solid," said Shelley Specchio, CEO of MIBOR REALTOR® Association. "Median days on market have remained relatively steady, with June at 8 days, compared to 7 days in May 2023 and 5 days in June of 2022. While the market has slowed from the rapid pace of 2020 – 2022, the market continues to show resiliency."

Dr. Elliott Eisenberg,

an internationally acclaimed economist and public speaker says, The chronic lack of new listings due to mortgage lock-in continues to suppress inventory levels, and as a result, the market remains tight and in a 'wait-and-see' mode. Because of high rates, buyers are much more interest rate-sensitive than they were a year ago. A half-point move in interest rates in the current environment will result in larger swings in market activity than in the past. Until we have a downward movement in interest rates, it's unlikely that we will see inventory rising. At the national level, year-over-year home prices continue to be relatively stable, showing that this remains a very strong market. In this cycle, despite rapid and steep interest rate increases, prices have barely budged because of the lack of inventory. And while many experts predicted that prices would decline more than they have, instead, seasonally adjusted year-over-year prices are starting to rise, and it's likely that the worst may be behind us."

More Than 19k Federal Student Loan Borrowers In Indiana Approved For Loan Forgiveness

The Biden-Harris Administration has approved 804,000 borrowers for \$39 billion in federal student loans for automatic discharge this summer. Eligible borrowers will not have to take any action to receive this income-driven repayment (IDR) forgiveness.

In Indiana, 19,470 borrowers will receive \$932.80 million in IDR forgiveness in the coming weeks.

Below is a statement President Joe Biden released on Friday (in the press release linked below, a statement from Education Secretary Miguel Cardona is included and a statement Vice President Kamala Harris is linked):

"I have long said that college should be a ticket to the middle class - not a burden that weighs down on families for decades.

"My Administration is delivering on that commitment. Starting today, over 800,000 student loan borrowers who have been repaying their loans for 20 years or more will see \$39 billion of their loans discharged because of steps my Administration took to fix failures of the past. These borrowers will join the millions of people that my Administration has provided relief to over the past two years - resulting in over \$116 billion in loan relief to over 3 million borrowers under my Administration.

"But we're not stopping there. My Administration has worked hard to secure the largest increases to Pell Grants in a decade, fixed broken loan programs such as Public Service Loan Forgiveness, and created a new income-driven repayment plan that will cut undergraduate loan payments in half and bring monthly payments to zero for low-income borrowers. And, when the Supreme Court made the wrong decision, I immediately announced a new plan to open an alternative path to relief for as many borrowers as possible, as soon as

possible. "Republican lawmakers - who had no problem with the government forgiving millions of dollars of their own business loans – have tried everything they can to stop me from providing relief to hardworking Americans. Some are even objecting to the actions we announced today, which follows through on relief borrowers were promised, but never given, even when they had been making payments for decades. The hypocrisy is stunning, and the disregard for working and middle-class families is outrageous.

"As long as I'm in office, I will continue to work to bring the promise of college to every American."

Additional Background

An IDR plan sets a borrower's monthly student loan payment at an amount intended to be affordable based on that borrower's income and family size. IDR plans also offer forgiveness of any remaining loan balance after borrowers make 240 or 300 monthly payments, which corresponds to 20 or 25 years. The number of required payments depends on when a borrower first took out the loans, the type of loans they borrowed, and the IDR payment plan in which the borrower is enrolled.

Before the Biden-Harris Administration's improvements to the IDR forgiveness program, qualifying payments that should have moved borrowers on IDR plans closer to forgiveness were not counted properly. Inaccurate payment counts have resulted in borrowers losing hardearned progress toward loan forgiveness. Some borrowers were steered into forbearances and other statuses instead of toward IDR in ways that ran counter to our policies. Now, the Department is ensuring all borrowers have an accurate count of the number of monthly payments that qualify toward IDR forgiveness and is discharging the loans of borrowers who have met the requirements.

The Department has begun notifying eligible borrowers about their discharges. The emails from Federal Student Aid inform borrowers their discharges will start 30 days from the notification date. The emails also explain that borrowers who wish to opt out of the discharge for any reason should contact their loan servicer during this period. Borrowers will be notified by their loan servicer after their debt is discharged. Those receiving forgiveness will have repayment on their loans paused until their discharge is processed; borrowers who opt out of the discharge will return to repayment once payments resume this fall.

The Department is taking steps to help borrowers access affordable payments going forward, including recently creating the most affordable payment plan ever—the Saving on a Valuable Education (SAVE) IDR plan. The SAVE plan will cut payments on undergraduate loans in half compared to other IDR plans, ensure that borrowers never see their balance grow as long as they keep up with their required payments, and protect more of a borrower's income for basic needs. 





Amplified Sciences Receives \$400,000 NCI Grant To Improve Early **Detection Of Pancreatic Cancer**

Health care providers and their patients could know with greater confidence whether pancreatic cysts are benign or potentially malignant, and if surgery is required to remove them, by using a new diagnostic test currently in development.

Amplified Sciences, a clinical-stage life sciences diagnostic company that licenses Purdue University innovations, has received a Phase I Small Business Innovation Research, or SBIR, grant of approximately \$400,000 from the National Cancer Institute (NCI) to develop the test. The company focuses on accurately detecting and categorically assessing the risks of debilitating diseases.

CEO Diana Caldwell said the incidental detection rate of cystic pancreatic lesions has increased significantly due to the aging population and advances in clinical imaging technologies. However, there is a lack of definitive diagnostics to accurately assess if a cyst is benign or potentially malignant.

"Health care professionals need better tools to help them manage these patients and identify individuals most at risk for pancreatic cancer," Caldwell said. "Pancreatic cysts are a window to early detection and represent an important risk factor in identifying pancreatic cancer early.

Caldwell said clinicians must balance the risk of missing a potentially malignant cyst with taking unnecessary surgical action to remove a benign cyst. She said retrospective studies have found almost one-fourth of surgeries to remove pancreatic cysts



are unwarranted.

"However, previous studies have also revealed that when clinicians use a wait-and-see approach to monitor the development of pancreatic cancer, up to a quarter of patients receive surgery too late," Caldwell said. "The dual-edged nature of this process highlights the need for better early-stage diagnostic tools.'

Caldwell said the NCI grant will help fund important technical and clinical validation milestones, including the procurement of banked patient samples and clinical trials.

The company's pancreatic cancer diagnostic products are based on medicinal chemistry and molecular pharmacology in Purdue University's College of Pharmacy and a faculty member of the Purdue Institute for Drug Discovery. Davisson serves as the chief scientific officer of Amplified Sciences.

"This award recognizes the strength of our scientific team, the potential of our chemistry platform and the National Institutes of Health's interest in supporting early-stage diagnostics in this disease

Future-Focused Korean Industries Indiana Secretary of Commerce Brad Chambers announced this week the opening of a new Indiana **Economic Development** Corporation (IEDC) office in Seoul to build on the growing industry ties and economic momentum between Indiana and South Korea. The office, which officially opened July 1, marks the IEDC's second new office expansion this year and its eighth international office, reinforcing the state's commitment to global engagement.

"Indiana's new Seoul office underscores the importance of the state's deepening relationships with Korean companies and their increased interest in a dynamic Hoosier workforce and economy," said Sec. Chambers. "With over \$6 billion of recently announced capital investment from Korean companies and their JV partners, an IEDC office in Korea is a further commitment to building high-tech, future-focused investments and job opportunities to the Hoosier state. After visiting with government and industry leaders in Seoul twice over the past

year, I'm confident that Indiana and South Korea share similar visions for our futures and that investing in our growing partnership will deliver mutually beneficial results in industry and innovation.'

The IEDC's Seoul office, which will be managed by Narai Kim and Max Kim, will focus on attracting new foreign direct investment in future-focused sectors, such as energy, mobility, hard tech, advanced manufacturing and life sciences, and building on the industry and innovation partnerships between Indiana and South Korea. The Seoul office will be led by director Narai, a 15year veteran in international business-to-business, business-to-government and government-to-government projects in the advanced manufacturing sector. She has experience collaborating with governmental organizations around the world to support the technology transfer and licensing programs with a focus on the battery, materials and aerospace sectors. Narai

will be joined by manager Max whose background stems from the manufacturing and energy sector with experience in market research and project management for global companies.

Today's news builds on the growing economic relationship between Indiana and South Korea, following two state-led economic development trips to Korea within the last year. In August 2022, Gov. In 2022, the IEDC secured \$22.2 billion in new industry investments, including \$15.5 billion from companies establishing new operations – either as a startup company or as an established business investing in Indiana for the first time.



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

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
