NHS Teacher Finds Fun In Directing 'Cinderella' Musical

More than 100 Noblesville High School students have come together as cast, crew and orchestra for NHS Choral Department's annual fall musical, Rodgers + Hammerstein's "Cinderella." Cast has been rehearsing since late August, while crew members have been creating costumes, doing hair, building sets and gathering props, while musicians have been practicing their music.

Opening night is only eight days away.

It all comes together for the community during four performances Nov. 16-18 at NHS Auditorium. Tickets are now available.

"The last two weeks, we have been piecing the show together into a cohesive product," said Connor Buhl, the musical's

director.

"We have finished the last of the blocking, music, and choreography and are beginning to see what the whole show looks like," he said on Monday.

"Having the orchestra along has been breathing a new life into the show, not just for us (directors), but for the students, too.

The musical features about 60 orchestra members directed by David Hartman, NHS orchestra teacher.

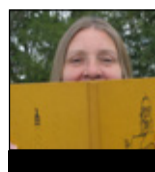
The cast features more than 40 NHS students singing, acting and dancing.

"We had 76 students audition for the show, so casting immediately became more difficult, in my opinion, than a professional production," Buhl said. "We narrowed down our cast to 48 students in a long and grueling process that took us late into the evening."

He said, "Let's just say restaurants in Noblesville don't give you a pass to stay all night long casting a show, but they have no such rules about con-

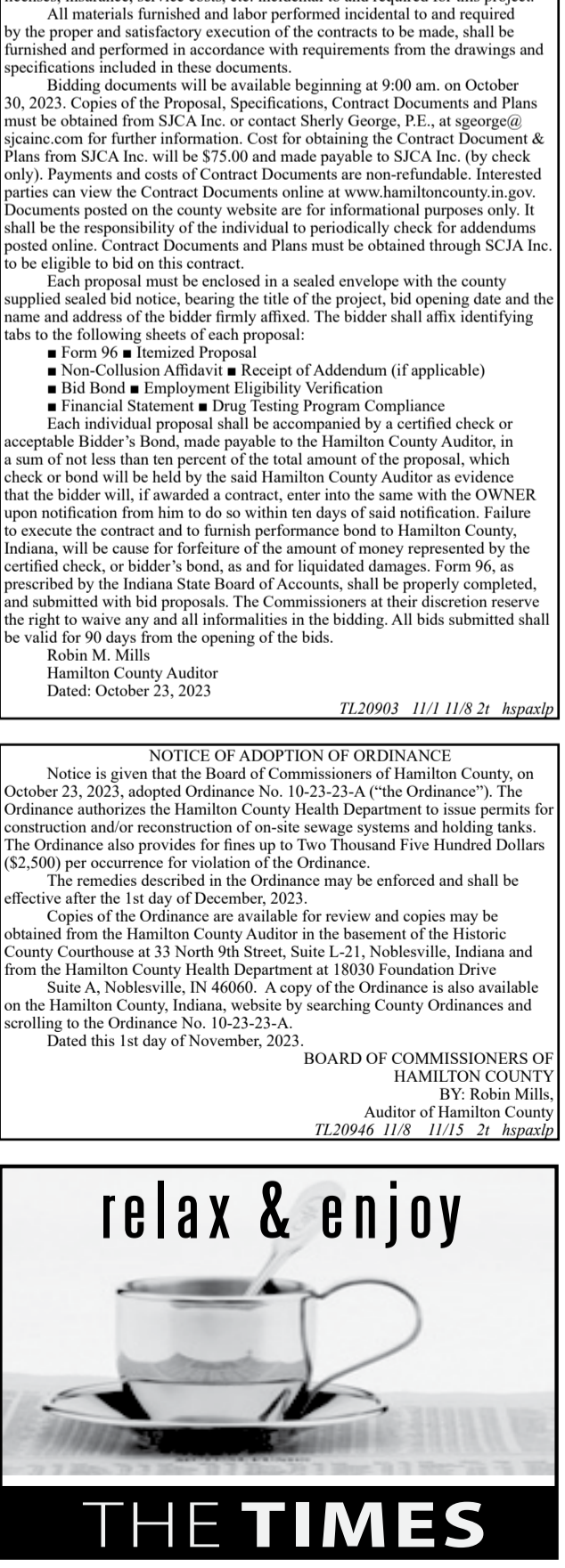

firming details in the parking lot."

Buhl added, "Another thing we have to keep in mind while casting is that our cast members are students first and performing artists second. Of course, we want to push them to grow as actors, singers and dancers, but we understand that they have priorities. I know if a student is academically responsible or irresponsible, I keep it in mind during the process. Thankfully, a lot of the variables that go into casting are remedied by having an amazing and efficient production team who all have valuable insight and visions for the show."

The cast rehearses after school every day on school days. The hours get longer as the show gets closer to opening. For instance, this week, practice, which includes cast, crew and orchestra, goes until after 9 p.m., and tech rehearsal was all day last Saturday.

Costuming is important in every show but especially "Cinderella."

"We knew we wanted something inspired by the late Renaissance and early Baroque period," Buhl said. "We also knew we wanted to be as opulent as possible with the ball gowns and dresses. But, of course, with musical theater, we don't always have to or want to make the costumes as historically accurate as possible."

Buhl, who is also a costumed interpreter at Conner Prairie, a living history museum in Fishers, loves history. "As many people know, I have a hyper-fixation with daily life in various periods of history, and I have to turn my brain off to historic accuracy." For instance, he said, "If you have a show (set) in the 19th century, the audience expects costumes similar to 'Little House on the Prairie' and not necessarily waistcoats and sleeve puffs."

He said, "A directing team has a vision, but audiences have a vision as well as to what the world should look like. With 'Cinderella,' being in an uncertain time period and location (Buhl jokes that the setting is Northern California for reasons that a clever eye will catch a minor detail during the show), we can play to audience expectations of what a fairytale setting looks like."

His directing team also includes NHS choral director John Neubauer as the show's music director, assistant choral director Julianne Fowler as the show's assistant director and choreographer and Shantel Morris as the show's producer. Plus, technical director Greg Richards, orchestra director David Hartman, sound and effects director Jason Jasper, student director Sean Wood. Kerin Meyer is costume designer, and Abby McGrew of ABC Ballroom & Country is assistant choreographer.

"Kerin Meyer is the most talented and efficient costume director I have ever worked with," Buhl said of the NHS teacher who was a costume mom when her own kids were at NHS. "Kerin has worked countless hours to

create costumes that will transport audiences into that fantasy world."

Buhl, who was born and raised in Fishers and a 2016 Fishers High School grad, teaches English 9 at NHS. "Cinderella" is his first show to direct at NHS, he comes here after teaching Theatre Arts at Emmerich Manual High School. "Cinderella" is his fifth production as a director.

Buhl is a graduate of Ball State University's Teachers College with a degree in Theatre Education. After graduating from BSU, he had every intention of teaching theater arts. "But, as many theater teachers will tell you, the job market for strictly theater teachers often means leaving the state ... But I love Indiana, and I found that I loved teaching English just as much as theater during my student teaching at Wes-Del High School and Middle School." He's directed "Zombie Prom," "Wizard of Oz" twice and "Music Man" and assistant directed "Mrs. Packard," NHS spring play, with NHS Theatre director and teacher Susan Nieten.

Buhl, who also is the coach of the ComedySportz High School League NHS team, loves having fun at school. During rehearsals, he has spirit days, and the students dress for a chosen theme. what is being worked on as transparently as possible in government. You hired me as your County Councilman, and my hope is that you'll choose to be informed by regularly reading this column, getting involved, and by asking questions. Council meetings are at 7:00 PM the first Wednesday of every month at the judicial center in downtown Noblesville. They are also available to watch online for those unable to attend in person. Here is where my time this past month has been spent.

October quickly turned into a memory and while it's rare for anything to move fast in government, the speed of my first year of service feels like sitting in the back seat of a two-seater Indy car roaring at 180 MPH around a certain famed neighboring oval track.

The 2024 budget public hearing was completed in October. While there is time available during council meetings for the public to comment, this public hearing is the opportunity for any taxpayer to address concerns they might have with planned 2024 budget decisions. All council meetings are advertised, and you can sign up for alerts on the Hamilton County website to receive email notifications of public meetings. The public hearing was mostly administrative and although we approve the budget, the Department of Local Government and Finance (DLGF) must bless the final product.

I am proud of the work we did. It is challenging to balance needs versus wants in dozens of departments. The final product keeps our county tax rate the same, allows for appropriate department growth, provides for better retiree benefits at a lower cost to taxpayers, increases county employee's compensation fairly, puts savings in our rainy-day fund, something that has been missing the last few years, and reflects a reduction of over nine million dollars versus the requested budget amount. Hamilton County has the second largest county budget in the State of Indiana with 2024's budget exceeding 260 million taxpayer dollars.

Your County Council consists of seven elected officials. Four of us were elected from districts around the county and three others were elected countywide, as At-Large members. The County Council is responsible for the financial oversight of Hamilton County government. We serve alongside three Commissioners, who are responsible for the administrative and executive oversight of Hamilton County. In the 2024 election cycle, two Board of Commissioners positions and all three of the At-Large Council positions will be up for election. The new four-year term will begin in January of 2025.

This month, our in-person personnel committee meeting was cancelled, replaced by a poll of the members for requests. Personnel requests are

then voted on at the next regular council meeting. Many of our highway projects require council sponsorship. Project details are reviewed in advance, sponsored, and then moved to votes at a subsequent full council meeting. This process, along with statutory regulations that govern procurement, are in place to ensure value and multiple checks and balances on behalf of the taxpayers.

In addition to the County Council public meetings, October's work included attending a Board of Commissioners public meeting as well as several meetings to investigate the county's participation in the Central Regional Development Authority (CIRDA). Being a member of CIRDA could allow Hamilton County to join with other central Indiana local governments in application for federal and state grant dollars on a larger scale. The month included four constituents service meetings. Usually, requests require research with a county department, securing the correct answer and then following up with the taxpayer. October's taxpayer questions, and the research required to get answers was more involved. Topics included the new County Utility District, US 31 corridor growth, and TIF districts in Northern Hamilton County. I also had the pleasure of speaking with several candidates for council board appointments and meeting with our Coroner regarding his department's equipment update needs.

Of note this month was the continued review of grant opportunities for both the Hamilton County Senior Center and PRE-VAİL and working to assist Cicero with funding for local utility projects. I had the honor to represent the County at the U.S. 31 Infrastructure Project Groundbreaking Ceremony and the IFI Fall Dinner.

This is my time sheet. This is where my time went during month ten. There are quite a few projects in the queue for 2024 and while my job is primarily the financial oversight of the county budget it is important to understand the Board of Commissioners priorities and balance them with the stewardship of taxpayer dollars. That is the job, and I am excited to do the people's business.

As a taxpayer myself, and listening to so many of you, our employers, it's important for the taxpayers to have access to all the information you want. I work for you and although you may not choose to do a deep dive into what your County Council does, it's important that you can always do so. 8. From 1942 to 1989, Purdue University operated an experimental agricultural farm in Clay Township. What was the farm's name and where was it?

9. Who was the first mayor of Carmel and when was he elected?

And the answers . . .

1. That depends. The first permanent white settler was Francis McShane. McShane erected a cabin in southeast Clay Township in 1825.

HOWEVER, the county histories note that a member of the Delaware tribe, George Ketchum, and his family were already settled on Cool Creek when McShane initially arrived in 1824. Ketchum worked a farm just like his white neighbors until he decided to leave in 1831 to join the rest of his tribe in the west.

2. 1996. It was built by Brenwick Development Inc. as part of the Prairie View subdivision and was located at the intersection of Main Street and River Road.

The first roundabout constructed by the city of Carmel opened the following year at 126th Street and Hazel Dell Road.

3. Pleasant Grove. Pleasant Grove was a small farming community that dated back to 1825.

4. In the 1830s, Clampitt was digging a well for water when he accidentally tapped into a pocket of natural gas and nearly blew himself up. It was the first instance of natural gas being found in Hamilton County.

(The first commercial gas well was dug in Noblesville in 1887.)

5. Bethlehem. Since a Bethlehem post office already existed in Indiana, the town's post office

ended up becoming "Carmel." Later, the name of the town was changed to Carmel to match the post office.

6. True. In 1830, a group of Friends met at a home a little east of Carmel to organize the county's first Friends Meeting. At that gathering, they decided that their Meeting would be held in an abandoned log cabin one-half mile north of Carmel and that it would be called the Richland Meeting.

(Did you think Westfield was first? The Westfield Meeting wasn't organized until 1834.)

7. Eldorado was a small community located at what is today the intersection of 136th Street and Ditch Road. Originally called Sockum, it became known as Eldorado when the residents acquired a post office in 1883. The post office closed in 1896, but the community of Eldorado continued to exist well into the first half of the 20th century.

8. Lynnwood Farm. The 621-acre facility, which had been donated to Purdue by the owner, Charles Lynn, was located in the general area of 126th Street and River Road.

9. Albert Pickett. He was elected in 1975 and served from 1976-1979. Pickett was followed by Jane Reiman (1980-1987,) Dorothy J. Hancock (*1987-1991,) Ted Johnson (1992-1995,) and Jim Brainard (1996-present.)

(*Dorothy Hancock assumed office a month early when Jane Reiman left to head the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana (SSACI.)

Correction: The floor of Westfield's Barker cabin isn't new. I've been told the wood was actually salvaged from an older cabin in Paoli, Indiana. The floor just looks new because it's been stained and sealed well enough to withstand heavy foot traffic.
