

Catching Up With The Ketchums



PAULA DUNN From Time to Thyme

In honor of National Native American Heritage Month, this week I'm writing about Clay Township's first settlers, the Ketchums.

Although I've mentioned the Ketchum

family in this column before, I've never done any meaningful research on them until now.

I knew the task wouldn't be easy since so much Native American history consists of oral accounts, but I found more information than I expected. The problem is, I also found a lot of conflicting details. It's difficult to know what's accurate and what isn't.

Nevertheless, I think I have a handle on the basics.

The family patriarch was George Ketchum. In past columns I called him "Charley" because that was the name in the county histories. I know now, however, that Charley — or Charles — was one of George's sons.

George was descended from another George Ketchum, whose name in the Delaware tongue was Twehullahlah, which translates as "Could Run and Catch Deer." That's where the family name, "Ketchum," is said to originate. ("Catch-um, get it?)

Our Clay Township George Ketchum was born in Pennsylvania about 1787. As the Delawares were pushed westward, he and his family moved first to Ohio, then to Indiana.

I'm not sure exactly when they arrived here, but it was likely sometime between 1808 and 1811.

When the other members of the Delaware tribe gave up their Indiana land and moved west in 1821, George Ketchum decided to remain behind for some unspecified reason.

He cleared some land and built a cabin at what is today the intersection of Range Line Road and Smokey Row Road. In 1826, a Quaker neighbor bought that land for Ketchum and Ketchum farmed the acreage for the next several years.

(I'm not sure why Ketchum had his friend make the land purchase. Maybe it was to ensure the sale was recorded accurately. Ketchum's command of English was said to be less than perfect.)

The Ketchum family were fairly well known while they

200,000 Pounds Of Poultry Products Donated To Hoosiers This Year

Today, Gov. Eric Holcomb, Indiana State Department of Agriculture Director Don Lamb and the Indiana State Poultry Association recognized the generosity of Indiana's poultry producers at the 76th annual Governor's Poultry Presentation at the Indiana Statehouse. Over the past year, Indiana poultry farmers and businesses have donated 200,000 pounds of duck, turkey and chicken and 172,000 dozen eggs to Hoosiers in need.

In addition to the 200,000 pounds of poultry protein, Indiana farmers and businesses have donated \$340,000 to organizations fighting food insecurity.

"Hoosier generosity is second to none, and our poultry producers are always quick to assist their neighbors," said Gov. Holcomb. "It was an honor to be apart of this annual donation event and to recognize these outstanding businesses going above and beyond in their communities.

For decades, Indiana's poultry producers have been working to address food insecurity in their local communities by providing protein to food banks across the state. Some of the main products that were donated over the course of this year include eggs, chicken, duck and

The strength of Indiana's poultry sector was also recognized during the ceremony as Indiana is one of the top poultry producing states in the country. According to the USDA National **Agriculture Statistics** Service, Indiana ranks No. 1 in duck production, No. 2 in egg production, No. 4 in turkey production and is home to high quality broiler chicken production as

The poultry industry is a substantial economic driver for the state contributing more than \$15 billion in total economic activity. Additionally, this sector employs more than 12,500 Hoosiers.

Indiana State Poultry Association (ISPA) members continually give back to their local communities throughout the year. According to **ISPA** President Becky Joniskan, the large poultry donations come from farming families in small communities across Indiana that these producers call home. "Indiana's poultry

farmers show their care and concern for the communities within which they operate and to all Hoosiers through their generous donations," said Joniskan. 'Whether through direct financial contributions or donations of eggs, duck, turkey, or chicken el the spirit of giving throughout the year, and especially at Thanksgiv-

Today's items on display were donated to Second Helpings, a hunger relief agency, in Indianapolis. This ceremony marks an annual tradition that dates back to the late 1940s. Organized by ISPA, one of the oldest poultry organizations in the nation, it was designed to recognize the strength of Indiana's poultry industry, as well as the annual donations made by its members, who are responsible for more than 95% of the chicken, duck, turkey and eggs produced in Indiana.

"There's nothing like going for a hike the day after Thanksgiving to work off the turkey and fixings from the day before," said Dan Bortner, DNR director. "The benefits of opting outside go beyond the quality memories created with family or the mental perks of spending time in nature. Hoosiers can also win fun prizes that will keep them connected with Indiana DNR year-round.

State Gets Data Security Settlement

The state announced it has obtained \$690,000 as part of a multistate settlement with a global financial services corporation to resolve allegations of negligent internal data security practices.

"We have taken this action because companies must be held accountable for protecting Hoosiers' data privacy in accordance with our laws," Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita said. "Our team will continue standing up for hardworking families and defending their interests and rights as consumers."

Morgan Stanley Smith Barney LLC — better known simply as Morgan Stanley — allegedly compromised the personal information of its customers with a poorly executed plan of decommissioning its computer devices and a failure to erase unencrypted data in certain of those computer devices.

As far back as 2015, Morgan Stanley failed to properly dispose of

devices containing its customers' personal information by hiring a moving company with no experience in data destruction services. Morgan Stanley failed to properly monitor the outside firm's work which involved decommissioning thousands of hard drives and servers containing sensitive information of millions of its customers. The computer equipment, some of which contained customer data, was sold via internet auctions. Morgan Stanley learned of problems when a downstream purchaser discovered the data and called the company.

In a second incident, a records reconciliation exercise undertaken by the company during a decommissioning process revealed that 42 servers, all potentially containing unencrypted customer information, were missing. During this process, the company learned that the local devices being decommissioned may have contained unencrypted

data due to a manufacturer flaw in the encryption software.

An investigation found that Morgan Stanley failed to maintain adequate vendor controls and hardware inventories and that had these controls been in place, both data security events could have been prevented.

Indiana is one of six states — which include Connecticut, Florida, New Jersey, New York and Vermont — entering into agreements with Morgan Stanley. The company has agreed to pay \$6.5 million in total and to adopt a series of provisions that better protects the personal information of its consumers

going forward, including: • Maintaining a comprehensive information security program that includes regular updates that are necessary to reasonably protect the privacy, security, and confidentiality of personal information;

· Maintaining an inci-

dent response plan that documents incidents and actions taken in relation to the incidents;

 Maintaining a written policy that governs the collection, use, retention, and disposal of consumers' personal information;

• Encrypting all personal information, whether stored or transmitted, between documents, databases, or elsewhere;

 Employing a manual process and automated tools to keep track of locations of all hardware that contains personal information;

 Maintaining a vendor risk assessment team to assess and monitor that their vendors comply with Morgan Stanley's data security requirements.

For "The Man Who Come to Dinner," Concord Theatricals calls for a cast of nine females and 14 males, but Matters has cast only 16 actors in total. "The doubling up of roles has allowed us to make the ratio of male to female break evenly, (eight females and eight males)" Matters said. "The challenges for this one were the same as any in community theater, different acting styles, different interpretations of a character," Matters said. "The ease was the cast being as intelligent and creative as they are; they brought a lot to the table.'

How difficult or easy is it to teach actors to be comedic?

"Comedy is a funny thing to teach, all puns intended, and timing is hard to teach," he said. "Thankfully, I was able to cast a great group of actors who already had a basic feel for the proper timing of certain lines or actions. I just needed to tweak some of their ideas on where and how the line should fall to help them maximize the laugh." Matters credits his understanding of comedy to his own improv classes, various theater teachers throughout his life, and "watching so many shows, seeing what felt good and what didn't make audiences laugh."

The 1939 play, by Boss Hart and George S. Kaufman, is set in the 1930s. So finding costumes for the show required some work. Costume designer Addie Taylor did some wonderful research into period appropriate clothing, Matters said. "While a good many of the characters will be in standard midwestern garb from the time, a handful will be in high-end fashion from Hollywood. "Some pieces a real person might have worn then as many of the characters of this play have nods to famous people of the era."

Taylor said, "When Eric asked me to costume this show, I knew I had a fun challenge on my hands. The 1930s is one of my favorite eras in fashion because of the silhouettes but can be so hard to recreate."

She said, "The first costume piece I pulled was (character) Maggie Cutler's blue floral dress worn in Scene One. I fell in love with the dress five years ago, and have been looking for a show to use it in ever since.'

Another thing to note about this show is that Westfield's Tom Smith (who last performed at The Belfry in "Our Town" in 2018) is acting on stage with a relative. "The coolest thing about the show is that my grandson, Drake, is in the show with me," Smith said.

Rehearsals all took place at the church, which has some excellently sized rooms and were very accommodating in finding us the space we needed," Matters said.

The show will be in the Church's large Celebration Hall. "This room is, for all intents and purposes, a theater," Matters said. This theater season, "The Man Who Came to Dinner" will be among three shows that will be at the church, including "Father of the Bride" and "Beauty & The Beast Jr." Matters said, "It has a raised stage, theatrical lighting and sound systems, areas to be used as dressing rooms and a green room. It feels like home."

Matters said he's happy to be directing with The Belfry again. He's recently become The Belfry board president and is looking forward to helping the organization move forward.

He said, "The arts are a major driving force in my life."

lived here. They pop up several times in the county histories and old newspapers.

Local historian Augustus Finch Shirts relates one tale involving George and his son, Charley, in the April 22, 1887 Noblesville Independent.

According to Shirts, George and Charley each thought they had the faster pony, so they arranged to have a race down Noblesville's Polk Street (Eighth Street.) The winner was to get five dollars.

Charley won and George went off to drown his disappointment.

In no shape to head home after that, George ended up sleeping off his bender under a red haw tree near what is now Tenth and Logan. It was fall and the ground beneath the tree was littered with fruit, but that apparently didn't bother George.

While he slept, Shirts' oldest brother and some other boys passed by on their way home from school. Unable to resist the slumbering target, the boys started lobbing haws at George's nose.

George woke up furious and took out after his tormentors. He

wasn't sober enough yet to catch the boys, but he managed to follow Shirts' brother home.

Shirts' mother saved the day by intercepting George at their door and announcing that supper was ready. George knew the Shirts family well and was undoubtedly aware Mrs. Shirts was an excellent cook. (Her corn pone was practically legendary.)

The prospect of a good meal made George forget all about extracting revenge on the boys.

The Ketchums left Hamilton County in 1831 or 1832 (sources differ) to rejoin the other Delawares in Kansas. They later moved to the Indian Territory (Oklahoma.)

The family was as prominent out west as they had been here. Two of George's sons, Charles and James, became Methodist preachers and were known as eloquent orators. They were also tribal leaders.

Ketchum, Oklahoma, is named for James Ketchum.
