Check Out the New Banners That Recognize Olympians at Our Pool

It's amazing to think how many Olympians and Olympic Trial qualifiers have trained at Forest Park Aquatic Center in Noblesville.

At one time, the aquatic center, formerly known as Central Pool, was the largest outdoor training facility in the Midwest, according to a newspaper article in the Indianapolis News.

It's the same pool that played host to the 1982 U.S. Junior Olympic Diving Championships. The same pool that was featured in the 1990 movie, "Diving In." And the same pool that families in the Noblesville community, including mine, have enjoyed for more than nine decades.

Not only do our families go there to take a dip in the pool, but we bring our children there to learn how to swim and to dive into the water of the same pool where Olympic gold medalist David Boudia learned to dive.

In fact, as the pool celebrates its 93rd anniversary on Tuesday, Friends of Central Pool, the nonprofit that has operated the facility since 1997, is busy planning a 10:30 a.m. June 25 formal dedication ceremony to honor 78 competitive swimmers, divers, coaches and volunteers who have come through the swimming diving facility and gone on to participate in the Olympic Trials.

Noblesville native David Boudia, 35, a 2008 Noblesville High School graduate, became a household name when he won the gold medal in the

10-meter platform diving competition in the 2012 Summer Olympics. The four-time Olympic medalist _winning Gold, Silver and two Bronze medals at the 2012 and 2016 Olympics. Boudia has recently become the new diving coach at Purdue University.

Boudia's photo graces one of 40 new banners at Forest Park Aquatic Center honoring the list of 78, including 23 who have gone on to qualify for the Olympic Trials.

Forest Park Honoring Olympians and Hopefuls

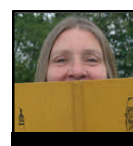
The Forest Park Aquatic Center is planning a formal dedication ceremony for 40 new 60"x24" banners. The banners honor the 78 competitive swimmers, divers, coaches and volunteers who have come through the facility and gone on to participate in the Olympic Trails over the years. The list of 78 also includes 23 individuals who competed in the Olympic Games, collectively earning 13 medals. All 78 individuals

are represented on one single banner, while all individuals from the State of Indiana as well as those that have competed at the Olympics are represented on individual banners which hang from the facilities 20 light poles. Each light pole banner also has a QR Code that links to the biography of the individual.

The Mysterious Mr. Cole

From Time to Thyme

A few weeks ago Michael Kobrowski sent me an interesting post he found on the General Lew Wallace Study & Museum Facebook page.

The piece, which originally came from the Tippecanoe County Historical Association, describes 13 year-old Lew Wallace's experiences at a huge political rally that was held on behalf of presidential candidate William Henry Harrison at the Tippecanoe Battleground in 1840.

Wallace would later become one of the most famous Hoosiers of his day as a politician, diplomat, artist, author (he wrote the novel, "Ben Hur,") and Union General during the Civil War, but in late May of 1840, he was just a kid itching for an adventure.

His father, David, Indiana's Governor at that time, was a member of Harrison's Whig party, but was away from home and unable to attend the gathering, so young Lew took it upon himself to go in his father's stead.

Lew set off from home, i.e. the governor's mansion in Indianapolis, with nothing more than what he was wearing: his shirt, pants and "a ragged straw hat." He had no money, no shoes and no plan for how he was going to eat or otherwise survive during the 10 days or so he'd be gone.

Luckily, he ran into a "fervent Whig supporter named Cole from Noblesville." Cole gave the boy a ride in his wagon and saw to it that he had everything he needed — bedding, food, and access to a barrel of hard cider (a symbol of Harrison's campaign.) He even bought him a new suit of clothes!

Michael wondered who "Cole" was and asked if I knew.

I didn't, so I set out to track the man down. I was only partially successful.

The 1840 U. S. Census shows four men named Cole in Hamilton County. Two lived in Noblesville.

John Wingfield, of Fishers, a 2008 U.S. Olympic Diving head coach who owns and operates Ripfest Diving Camp in Arcadia, is another face on the commemorative banners.

Forest Park Aquatic Center's diving tower features 5-, 7- and 10-meter platforms that are used daily by Wingfield's diving camp.

"How lucky were we to grow up with a world-class aquatic facility in our backyard?" asked Lacey (Boutwell) Schnell, a former Noblesville Swim Club member, a high school state champion and NCAA champion and Olympic Trial qualifier. "I'm proud to have hailed from Forest Park and to see what the community has done with it over the years," the Noblesville resident said. "I cherish the memories created at swim practices, hosting swim meets, jumping off the towers, and even once upon a time painting the bottom of the pool." She competed at the 2000 and 2004 trials in swimming.

Greg Conner, president of the Friends of Central Pool which has operated the pool since 1997, told me about these commemorative banners when I visited the Aquatic Center just before the season opening.

Jason Lancaster, who coached the Noblesville Swim Club in the early 2000s, barely missed qualifying for the Olympics finishing third in 1996. Conner found it in his research.

Scott Donie, 1992 Olympic silver medalist in platform diving competition, said, "The first time I believed that I could be great was during my first competition at the Forest Park Aquatic Center at age 13." He found the pool "to be a magical place," where he had the opportunity to witness and watch and be inspired by so many, including my friend and mentor Patrick Jeffrey, who showed me how to

shine on the big stage."

There have been so many memories made.

"The Forest Park Aquatic Center is where I made my first national team," said Patrick Jeffrey, head diving coach and participant in the 1982 National Age Group Diving Championships at Forest Park Aquatic Center.

Sophie Verzyl, a 2024 U.S. Olympic Diving Trial Qualifier, is honored to be recognized with "so many other extremely accomplished athletes," She said, "There is no better setting than training Luke Whitlock, 2024 U.S. Olympic trial qualifier, said, "I have so many memories of Forest Park Aquatic Center growing up." Greg Conner, President of The Friends of Central Pool, the not-for-profit entity that has operated the facility since 1997, stated, "When we started working on this project we figured there might be a couple dozen individuals who had come through the facility and gone on to participate at Trials. However, we had no idea the list would be so large. To think that the Forest Park Aquatic Center has been part of the journeys of so many accomplished athletes is extremely humbling and a huge source of pride for this community!"

The new banners were 100 percent financed through private contributions. "I can't say enough about the support we

The list of 78 is led by Noblesville native David Boudia who's diving career started at the Forest Park Aquatic Center when he was 11 years old. Boudia, who would go on to have one of the most storied diving careers in the history of the sport which includes winning a gold medal in the 10-meter platform competition at the 2012 Olympics stated.

"The Forest Park Aquatic Center is where it all started for me, Boudia said. "It's where I overcame my fear of the 10-meter platform and gained the confidence to truly believe I could compete at the highest level within the sport of diving. I can't be completely certain one of those two was young Lew's benefactor because I found a few other "Coles" mentioned in the old newspapers whose names don't appear in the census. (Nancy Massey, the Hamilton County Genealogist, confirmed that not everyone got counted in those early censuses.)

However, the two Coles from the census seem the most likely candidates. I just don't know which one it was.

Both were Whig politicians who'd held elected offices. A. B. (Albert Burnham) Cole, served as Hamilton County Recorder from 1839 to 1853 and Bicknel/Bicknell Cole represented Hamilton and Boone Counties in the Indiana State Senate from 1836-1839.

(I've seen both spellings for "Bicknel," but the earliest references seem to favor only one "L.")

When I discovered the Facebook tale had originally come from Wallace's autobiography, I checked the autobiography to see if anything had been left out of the Facebook post that might help me in my search. I did find some additional details.

County Courts Launch Program for Text Reminders

Hamilton County Courts have joined a pilot program spearheaded by the Indiana Supreme Court's Office of Court Technology, aimed at enhancing communication and reducing failures to appear in court. The program sends text message reminders to petitioners and respondents in divorce, paternity, and other family cases.

"We believe this initiative will help people stay informed about their court dates and understand what is happening at the courthouse," Circuit Court Judge Andrew Bloch said. "We've already seen a drop in failures to appear for eviction hearings due to a similar text reminder program, and we're hopeful this will have a positive impact on family cases as well."

Participants receive text reminders about upcoming court hearings if they provide a cell phone number in their party record with the Court. Reminders are dispatched in the evenings, five days and one day before the scheduled hearing. Additionally, if a hearing is canceled or rescheduled within five

Wallace wrote that he'd begun his journey walking ahead of the convoy of wagons that had set out for the rally from Indianapolis because he didn't want anyone to identify him as the governor's son and send him home.

At the first village he passed, he spotted a red flannel petticoat flying from a pole. Recognizing it as an insult directed at Harrison (Harrison's opponents sneered at him as a "granny" or "red petticoat general,") he shinnied up to the roof of the log building next to the pole, knocked the pole down and made off with the offensive "flag."

When Cole, "an old gentleman, a Whig of the intensest color" saw Wallace with the petticoat, he quizzed him about his trophy. Impressed by the boy's party loyalty – and possibly by the admission of his identity – Cole took Wallace under his wing.

I still don't know who "Cole" was, but Bicknel, at 42, was closer to being an "old gentleman" than A. B. He was 34.

days of the hearing date, a text notification is sent to update the involved parties.

"It's similar to the reminders we get for dental appointments or prescription refills," Bloch added. "People move frequently, and email notifications can often be overlooked, but cell phone numbers often stay the same. This program ensures that critical information about court dates reaches folks directly."

Hamilton County began implementing this text reminder system a month ago and is currently assessing its effectiveness. Residents interested in participating are encouraged to update their cell phone numbers with the Clerk's office. The service is voluntary, and parties can opt out at any time.

started and currently owns several businesses, including financial consulting, farming and real estate.

In 2017, when her local state senator announced he would retire, Victoria was encouraged to seek the District 20 seat and was elected by caucus in a seven-way race to fill the remainder of the term.

She brought her fiscal conservative approach to the Indiana State Legislature, where she has gained a reputation as a limited government conservative Senator who isn't afraid to tackle the tough issues and challenge the status quo.

In 2020, she was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives representing Indiana's 5th District where she now serves on the Judiciary Committee. In an era of politicians with sound bites, Spartz is a policy leader who is already made a legislative difference even in her first two terms—12 bills signed into law and many policies developed from scratch. She is also known for her work holding the Biden

Administration accountable.

She has been named Commissioner to the U.S. Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe (known as the Helsinki Commission). She serves on the Judiciary Committee, Subcommittee on the Administrative State, Regulatory Reform, and Antitrust, as well as the Subcommittee on Immigration Integrity, Security, and Enforcement.

Lowering health care costs have also been a large part of her policy agenda. She received the "Champion of Healthcare Innovation" award from the Healthcare Leadership Council and helped pass HR 5378 Lower Cost, More Transparency Act.
