Three Things You Should Know

1 The Indiana Site Certified program has temporarily paused accepting new applications until Jan. 1. The pause will not affect applications already being processed. The Office of Community and Rural Affairs launched Site Certified in 2015. This pause will allow program managers to evaluate relevant research and successful practices in other states. Questions on Site Certified should be directed to info@ocra.in.gov

2 Indiana Destination Development Corporation released the results of a statewide economic impact study on the impact of the 2024 total solar eclipse. The study, conducted by Rockport Analytics, concluded that the total economic impact in Indiana was \$148.5 million – and taxes generated by visitors totaled about \$45 million. "Indiana was a prime destination for the 2024 total solar eclipse," said Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch. "Every part of our state experienced 100% or 90% totality, allowing everyone to witness this incredible event." Crouch's office said that there were 3.5 million visitors to Indiana during the eclipse.

3 Speaking of travel destinations, been to Ohio's Hocking Hills? Located one hour southeast of Columbus, this tourist area offers everything from deluxe woodland cabins and lodges, tiny houses, country inns, treehouses and more. CCP's 'Anne of Green Gables' Youth Bring Story to Life at Cat

You may have already seen Carmel Community Players' summer photo shoot at Conner Prairie to promote CCP's summer youth

production of "Anne of Green Gables."

The phenomenal photos by Ron Slaven of Indy Ghost Light Photography likely have been part of the reason for this show's opening night this Friday to already being sold out. Add in the second reason that all performers in the show are local youth ages 10-18, and thirdly, that this play is based on L.M. Montgomery's timeless classic about Anne, an imaginative orphan girl who is mistakenly sent to live with an elderly brother and sister on their farm, when they were expecting an orphan boy to help on their farm.

Amber K. Roth and Bill Miller have teamed up -- Amber as the show's director and Miller as the show's producer -- to bring this beautiful production to The Cat in Carmel. The play continues through July 7 with tickets still available.

"The first thing that I automatically think about is the message that we have from, not just the play, but also from the book that L.M. Montgomery wrote. We see this girl go on this journey of self discovery and finding a family in some of the untraditional ways," Roth said. "I really find it important, specifically for the next generation of performers, to tell this story.... I think ultimately they are the ones that need to know the message of family isn't necessarily blood, it is people you center yourself around."

She said young performers and their friends and peers are "going through this time of self discovery, figuring out who they are, what they want to do for the future, how they want to better not just themselves but our world. And it's important for them to understand that those who they center themselves around are a reflection of themselves."

Roth, who is a theater teacher who earned her college degree from Ball State University in 2020, said the most fun of doing this show is being able to see the creativity of the performers and crew members, watching them immerse themselves and

receive hands-on learning experiences, "which is much more important than just putting on a play by acting or doing backstage work."

Roth, who is also set designer and decorator, dramaturge mentor, co-costumer, co-props mentor, and set painter, said, "I want my students to be able to learn lifelong skills that they can take into not just theater and continuing to pursue that passion and that art form but also lifelong lessons and opportunities and skills that they can make applicable to their everyday life."

Jumping For Joy at Coventry Farms

In the column on the Penney-Gwinn Farm I mentioned that in 1966 Fred Gwinn sold his farm to two Indianapolis

doctors who turned the property into Coventry Farms Stable.

That stirred up a lot of memories for me. I spent about six years taking riding lessons there, so I can tell you exactly where that farm was located -- on Cumberland Road, about a mile south of State Road 238.

The new owners were Dr. and Mrs. Richard Nay, and Dr. and Mrs. Warren Coggeshall.

Both men were cardiologists at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis and both were well known in their field. Dr. Coggeshall was a pioneer in the use of cardiac pacemakers and Methodist's coronary unit was later named the Richard M. Nay Coronary Care Unit in Dr. Nay's honor.

So, what were they doing buying a former horse farm?

According to an Indianapolis Star article from November of 1966, it all began because the Nays wanted a place their daughter, Nancy, could keep her horses. Nancy was a talented equestrienne.

The Coggeshalls decided they wanted to go in on the farm, too, and from that partnership, Coventry Farms Stable was born.

They built a huge new indoor riding arena, which was, according to an old Ledger article, the "largest privately-owned building in Indiana designed specifically for equitation." The 20,000 square foot structure included a heated observation room upstairs.

The first riding instructor, Patrick Wright, had been a career soldier in the British Army's cavalry. He came to Indiana following a teaching stint at a riding academy in Boston.

Among the horses Wright used in his classes was a

She loves working with the kids. “The energy that they have and the excitement that they have, it radiates.” She loves “the light bulb ‘aha moments’ whenever they connect with the character.” She also loves to see the pride and smiles on their faces. “These kids are so incredibly talented.”

Roth is proud of the strong cast and crew that she has brought together. The show attracted 43 youth who auditioned for 19 roles.

“They have a passion for it, and it showcases within their work. By the time audiences walk out, they’re not going to be walking out thinking ‘Oh, that was a very cute kids show.’ They’re going to be able to leave the theater and recognize ‘Wow, that was a touching and moving story put on by a phenomenal company of performers and crew members.’”

The 26 youth involved in the show, including crew, hail from in and around Hamilton and Marion counties and Central Indiana.

Costuming the show was a task, and while CCP was able to use a lot of costume pieces from its own costume shop, the theater was able to borrow costumes from other nearby community theaters.

Roth said audiences will love the show because

“it’s just not your classic tale” but the 116-year-old story is still relevant today. “Being able to have an audience come in, see this production and leave with lifelong lessons that they can spark a conversation with is what I feel is a reason they should come.”

Audiences can find a character to which they can relate, from the fiery redhead protagonist Anne (played by Carolyn Noneman) who is learning how to discover everyday life to the shyest of characters, Sam Everitt (played by Matthew Cuthbert).

Roth is thrilled to be a part of CCP, which is in “such a great transitional stage right now, with new shows, new leadership roles.” Roth is the new outreach director for CCP to take the lead in bringing in a larger audience, and giving back to the community.

Roth, who has been involved in both professional and community theater, said reaching out to Conner Prairie, an interactive history park in Fishers, to do the photo shoot was a perfect partnership, being that “Anne of Green Gables” was set in 1908. Plus, two of the youth in the cast -- Carolyn Noneman and Amelie Thibodeau -- are already Conner Prairie youth volunteers. “Meshing these two worlds while working with an amazing organization has been

incredibly rewarding,” she said.

Roth, born and raised in Indianapolis and who still lives there, has worked on more than 60 productions since finding her love for theater at age 6 in her elementary school’s operetta, in which she sang and was among the youngest cast with lines. She got involved in CCP at age 16, then returned two years ago and worked on CCP’s youth production of “Godspell,” as assistant director. She was recently offered and accepted the position as CCP’s youth outreach director. In August, she will teach CCP’s new pilot program of Master Class Mondays, focusing on elements of theater, for grades 6-12.

Roth said, “If you are an individual who loves literature or who loves a good self-discovery story of family, friendship and overall companionship, I highly recommend coming to see ‘Anne of Green Gables.’ It’s an absolutely beautiful story that, by the time you walk out, your heart will be touched and it will make you think more about who you have around yourself and who you need to thank for being there for you.”

He was a terrific jumper, but he had an ornery streak. You had to watch when you saddled him because he'd sometimes try to nip you when you weren't looking. My most memorable riding experience, however, came on another horse, Ironsides. (His name was actually Oliver, but nobody called him that.) Beginning students were usually put on Ironsides because he had a broad back and he was, frankly, kind of lazy. His favorite gait was a walk, and even then he'd sometimes stumble like he was half asleep. On this particular day, some low cross rail jumps had been set up in the center of the indoor arena for less experienced students like me, while more advanced jumps had been placed along the outer edges of the ring. I misunderstood my instructions and thought I'd been told to take Ironsides over a rather advanced jump I believe they called an "in-and-out." This was actually three or four fences set

so close together that you had to jump the next fence as soon as you made it over the previous one. Once you started, there was no backing out. You HAD to jump all the fences. That seemed a bit past my riding level, but hey, if the instructor thought I could handle it. . . As we approached the first jump, Ironsides must have been thinking "HOLY [expletive!] She's really going to make me do this!" I guess that was enough to wake him up. Somehow, he rose to the occasion and we made it through unscathed, but I bet he never did that again. I know I didn't. For several years Coventry Farms held horse shows, hosted imaginary fox hunts and trained many young riders, some of whom became nationally rated. Today, you can't even tell it was ever there. The stable, and the indoor and outdoor arenas are gone. All that's left is the barely detectable start of what was once the lovely tree-lined lane that led to them.
