
Pork Riblets have been named Indiana Pork's "Taste of the Fair" food at the 2024 Indiana State Fair. They will be served at the three Indiana Pork tents for \$11 from Aug. 2-18. The signature food, which features a smaller portion of traditional pork ribs, is paired with three unique sauces: Hot Honey, Nelson's Red Sauce, and Citrus Explosion. Indiana Pork has three tents located on the Indiana State Fairgrounds. Tents can be found in front of the West Pavilion, Indiana Farm Bureau Fall Creek Pavilion, and near Pioneer Village.

Organizations and communities can now apply for grants to support developing and expanding public rifle, handgun, shotgun, or archery ranges through the DNR's Shooting Range Grant program. 



The new store features convenient digital shopping solutions, including Shop & Scan, which allows shoppers to scan barcodes via a

mobile app and bag their items as they shop to make checkout convenient. The store also offers deep discounts on surplus food via the Flashfood app, an expanded area for Meijer Home Delivery and Pickup services, and mPerks rewards to help customers earn on every dollar spent.

The new Noblesville

Grocery store is the third Meijer Grocery format store and the 43rd Meijer store in Indiana. checked in at the Exhibition Center.

Despite the construction, the 4-H Fair, which opens Thursday and continues through July 22, will carry on this year as usual.

I'm told all of the 2023 4-H Fair food vendors will return for the 2024 4-H Fair.

"Exactly the same, just new locations," said Bernie Huber, program assistant at Purdue Extension of Hamilton County.

"It will be a scavenger hunt this year to find your favorites," she said.

What does that mean?

"There is a new layout. Picnic tables will be under two tents and spread around the grassy food court areas. Food vendors are all around the **Exhibition Center** where all exhibits will be this year, except animals and crops," Huber said, noting that the food court locations have changed numerous times and weren't listed in the Fairbook's map. "That's because it changes

constantly. Made layout proposal No. 13," she said.

Homemakers will serve breakfast and dinner each day in the Exhibition Center dining room as usual. But there will be no tables for eating in the Exhibition Center's Hall B, just exhibits. And one kitchen for all food vendors to share.

What else? There will be an entertainment tent in the commercial area for bands and special events.

Huber said, "The word this year is 'flexibility."

Fishers United Methodist Church will serve pork tenderloin, fruit cobbler and ice cream. First Christian Church will serve corn dogs, sloppy Joes, shrimp, chicken nuggets, breadsticks. North Circle Church will serve funnel cakes and fried Oreos. Husky Dawg Wrestling will sell walking tacos. Noblesville H&H 4-H Club will sell novelty candy, but no chocolate. Ice Guys will serve SnoCones.

Hamilton County Junior Leaders Stand will offer Coke and Powerade, pizza, hot dogs and chips.

Hamilton County Farm Bureau will serve milkshakes and milk.

show made from pieces of columns I've written over the years. I've been looking for themes and ideas and stringing them together, and I thought I'd done a pretty good job, so I sent off a draft

"This is not what we talked about!" Eli told

I was hurt. When we first spoke, I wasn't sure what to write. I had a lot of ideas about different things. But, since then, I'd read a bunch of books about how to write a script properly, and everything I read said I needed to be focused. I needed to know exactly what topic I wanted to talk about and stay on track.

Staying on track is sometimes hard for me when there are so many enticing bunny trails along the way. So I'd spent the last few weeks tossing out all the stray ideas. I made the whole thing one streamlined thesis, and I was pretty pleased with myselfuntil I talked to Eli.

"You were going to write about all kinds of things, not just one subject!" he went on, not sounding happy with me at all.

"Well, yes," I admitted, "but that was before I understood how important it was to find one main topic and stick to it and..."

"I like the other idea better!"

I didn't know what to say. I don't know Eli very well, but I respect him a lot. I thought he'd be pleased I had done all this research and was so much better organized.

"But the 'other idea' wasn't really an idea!" I told him. "I just had a picture in my head of a lot of stories about different things that may or may not be

connected."

"I like that better!" he said.

So then I had to think. And I've been thinking ever since.

Because Eli wants this script to be something bigger than a few funny stories. He doesn't want a single, easy-to-digest theme. Eli wants the whole shebang. He wants me to tell a story about how I see the world and why. He wants me to take the happy and funny and sad and the painful and mix them in a way that makes sense of them as a whole.

And he's made me realize that we are all storytellers, telling ourselves our story every

We take stories from our youth and struggles we've had as adults and heartache and disappointments and moments of indescribable joy, and we make sense of them in a way that defines us-to ourselves. All the happiest parts and all the hardest parts and every part in between, all the things that happened to us and what we thought about them afterward and how they changed us and become the story of who we are.

And Eli is right.

There is no point in trying to tell one piece of the story. The advice from the books I read would be great if I had some terrific new idea about how to do something faster or cheaper or more efficiently—but I don't have any ideas like

I just have this idea that it's good to embrace our stories-because they are ours, because we have the power to tell them in a way that allows us to change and grow. We can use our stories to make the rest of our lives a little better and more compassionate.

So now I'm rewriting my story for Eli-and for me.

2024 Mercedes-Benz G550 is Absolutely Ridiculous – And Charmingly Glorious for It











Mercedes-Benz G550 is absolutely ridiculous! **WILLIAMS** Originally Auto Reviews introduced forty-five

years ago as the military-ready Geländewagen, it looks like a Jeep, pampers like an S-Class and costs more than a Maybach. It has steel cargo plates on its roof, for goodness sakes! G-Wagens found favor with celebrities like Cindy Crawford and Tina Turner. One even carried The Pope. But, what does my family

We're on our way from Indianapolis to Clifty Falls State Park, near the Ohio River to find out.

think of it?

The G550 looks like the shipping container an EQE electric crossover rides in, but gleams with round LED headlamps, 18-inch matte black wheels, black logos, and rear-mounted spare tire. My eyes flutter in disbelief as we sling our weekend luggage and imbibes onto the cargo compartment's cherry wood floors. We clink shut the vault and go

The flat doors click open to opulence glorified by Nappa leather, twin

around front.

screens, ash wood, and the reek of wealth. My daughter conjures "The 10 Spot" on satellite radio, powers open the sunroof and rocks out to the deep Bermester audio system. It's pretty sweet. There's no wireless Apple CarPlay, and I only find oldschool USB-B ports, so connecting my new iPhone proves tricky. Daughter doesn't care as she discovers our heated and ventilated seats with massagers. I have a heated steering wheel too. This is going to be a good ride.

Navigation routes us out of our neighborhood, across city streets, and onto 165 South. It's been 22 years since I last drove a G-Wagen. It looks the same, but is slightly wider for side impact performance. It also gained an independent front suspension, rack-andpinion steering, and an air suspension. Three locking differentials remain should we confront a goat.Automatic emergency braking, lane keep assist, and blind spot warning systems

It's surprisingly sublime on the Interstate, but we soon route through tight two-lanes to the state

protect our flanks.

park. This is not a conveyance you toss into a corner casually. This witch will twitch if you go in hot, but driven with respect, it won't embarrass its patron. It simply pulverizes rough pavement while occupants hover on an electronically controlled cushion of air.

I cackle when I step into the 416 horsepower 4.0litre Biturbo V8 engine, sending its fortitude to the four-wheel-drive system through a 9speed automatic transmission. It makes quick work of short straights, tossing carnal luxuries from curve to curve with indecent vigor. There's always a yearning rumble beneath your feet, but brace yourself for 13/16-MPG city/highway.

Having finally arrived, the G550 looks natural lurking through forest and resting outside the inn. It's exactly the kind of ride you should take to a rustic inn as it gets you there in comfort and welcomes adventure. You sense the inherent tight maneuvering and excellent visibility for off-roading translate to tight garages too.

It's all a bit weird. Closing the door sounds like a 1970 S-Class. Clink! The engine channels AMG. Roar! Its tippy in corners, but the chassis delights.Wafty! It's all so endearing. I look at my daughter as we drive to a nearby café. She's rocking out with wind in her hair, looking like a YouTube influencer.She grins at me, "Slay!" I think that means the G550 has her approval.

It should. The G550 starts at \$143,000, but two packages that include massage seats, leatherwrapped dash, black logos and...Cherry wood floor add nearly \$38,000! All in, this specimen snatches \$188,650 - more than a Maybach GLS three-row SUV. But unlike vehicles they may lease and toss, I suspect owners will keep and cherish their G550s.






