The Noblesville resident is chairperson and among 40 volunteers who typically work a three- to four-hour shift for the Market, which is in its ninth year and will be open 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday at the historic First Presbyterian Church on Conner Street in Noblesville.

The church doesn't track attendance due to the event being free admission, but, Auble said, "We feel each year it continues to grow in attendance."

The 60 artisan booths, including 19 new vendors -which will be set up inside and outside the church at 1207 Conner St., in Old Town Noblesville -- will sell handmade creations, including antiques, collectables, repurposed items, home decor, candles, soaps, garden art, boutique clothing, kids and pet items, pottery, wood, glass, metal, fibers, furniture, photography, jewelry and fine

Along with the artisans, live entertainment will perform throughout the day.

At Least There Weren't Any Ants

Occasionally, I stumble across something in the old newspapers that's of no great importance, but is just too

funny and / or too bizarre not to share. This is one of those stories.

The July 11, 1899 Hamilton County Ledger ran an article about a group of people who set out to enjoy a Fourth of July picnic in the beautiful **Hamilton County** countryside near what we know today as Riverwood. (Riverwood didn't exist until 1923.)

The holiday part isn't actually important; it's what happened at the picnic that's the real story. I could see Carol Burnett making a skit out of it for her old television show.

The participants in this "skit" were Mr. and Mrs. W. A. "Al" Clarke, Mr. and Mrs. George M. Snyder, Mr. and Mrs. William A. Booth, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. "Joe" Little, Dr. and Mrs. Edgar C. Loehr and an out-of-town guest of the Snyders.

These people weren't exactly nobodies, which is probably why the tale appeared on the paper's front page. Al Clarke and Joe Little were prominent Noblesville businessmen, Will Booth was an attorney, and George Snyder was a banker. Both Snyder and Dr. Loehr were later elected mayor of Noblesville.

The friends had a destination in mind for their picnic, but after fighting their way "through unbroken fields and acres of weeds that were topheavy with dust" they decided to try another spot.

They moved on to a beautiful grove of trees near White River. There, they unhitched their horses, set up hammocks and were preparing to eat when another couple who'd been camping nearby built a fire to warm some coffee.

The couple's fire spread to some dry grass and in the blink of an eye, over an acre of ground was covered

reason people come to shop at our market. Everyone who applies goes through a jury process, and we only select handmade and one-of-a-kind items," said Auble, who is a retired art teacher from Westfield and a member of the church for 35 years.

To create a European market feel, the free event allows guests "to wander about enjoying live music and entertainment throughout the day," Auble said.

She has contacted me for the past several years to share details about the Red Geranium Market, which has vendors from around the globe, from Marina Shepeluk, who hails from Zhytomyr, Ukraine, with hand-painted traditional Ukrainian art, to as close as the women of the Presbyterian Church, who offer homemade goodies.

Auble said teams of volunteers set up on Friday and tear down after the event. Greeters, market helpers, youth selling bottled water and all of the musical talent donate their time for the market.

"I have a wonderful mission team that helps prepare for and put on the event each year," she said.

Helen LeCount, who works the cash box, "even at 100 years old, loves to greet all the people and count back their change for them. It really makes her day," Auble said. (The Times featured LeCount's volunteer efforts just prior to the 2023 market.) A 70plus-year member of the church, LeCount had told me: "You know you're getting the right change, and I know I'm giving it to you." LeCount plans to work the bake sale all

The first Red Geranium market was in 2016 with about 20 vendors, but rain dampened the event which was cut short. In 2017, there were 34 vendors, local

musicians and "a beautiful, sunny day," Auble recalled. The third year, international organizations and local mission groups in Indiana were added. There was a booth featuring handpainted Pysanky Eggs made by a Ukrainian artist, AfricaBags handmade by women from Africa, a mum sale for Legacy Christian School, a group of talented musicians from Noblesville High School raising money for a mission project in Ghana, Africa, and artwork created by young people with disabilities at ArtMix in Indianapolis. ArtMix, which is devoted to developing skills in teens and young adults with disabilities, will be among those vendors returning, selling handmade ceramic art from its Urban Artisan program.

In recent years, the market has added more new vendors and a food truck and expanded booth locations to include spaces inside the church.

In 2023, there were 52 vendors, and in 2024 there are 60 vendors thanks to an expanded and reconfigured booth arrangement. The market received

more than 100 vendor applications for this year, Auble said. "A jury committee selected the 60 finalists based on uniqueness, quality and originality focusing on limiting crafts to just a few of each kind to provide variety for our shoppers."

She said, "We keep growing and improving our market, but our focus is still one-of-akind, handmade and unique artisan products. We have some great new people joining us and are looking forward to the return of many longtime artisans to see what new creative ideas they have cooked up over the winter."

Auble said, "We are really excited about the enthusiasm our artisans have shown by promoting our event on social media. We don't have a budget for advertising because we are focused on raising money for missions, and their participation really helps us get the word out."

County Traffic Safety Partnership Reminds Drivers: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

Drive sober or get pulled over. That's the warning the **Hamilton County Traffic Safety**

Partnership is issuing to drivers as they gear up for the annual end-ofsummer impaired driving enforcement campaign. Starting Friday and running through Sept. 2, officers with the **Hamilton County Traffic** Safety Partnership will join with officers across the state to increase patrols and sobriety checkpoints to crack down on those driving

The extra high-visibility enforcement is funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) through grants administered by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

under the influence of

drugs or alcohol.

"Driving drunk or drugimpaired is a problem for everyone," said James Bryan, ICJI's Traffic

Safety Director. "Making the choice to operate a vehicle while impaired is never the right option."

Alcohol-impaired driving continues to contribute to many deaths in Indiana. In 2023, around 20 percent of all traffic fatalities in Indiana involved alcohol impairment. Drugimpaired driving is another major contributor to deadly crashes. In 2023, nearly a quarter of all traffic fatalities involved drug impairment.

"Our foremost concern is the safety of everyone in our community," Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush said. "If you're planning to drink, take responsibility by planning ahead. Let's join forces to safeguard our community and put an end to these preventable actions." Even if you only have one drink, designate a sober driver, or use public

transportation or a ride service to get home safely. Never drive impaired or let friends get behind the wheel if they've been drinking.




