Three Things You Should Know

1 An early-season outbreak of epizootic hemorrhagic disease in deer, which started in the northern region of Indiana, has been detected by the Indiana DNR. Humans are not at risk for contracting EHD, a viral disease that commonly affects white-tailed deer and is transmitted by biting midges, aka sand gnats or "no-see-ums." A significant number of suspected EHD cases have been reported in deer in Wabash, Allen, Pike, Warrick, Miami, Huntington, and Porter counties. Deer infected with EHD may display unusual behaviors such as lethargy, excessive salivation, or disorientation. Anyone who finds a deer that is showing signs of EHD or finds one dead in water is asked to report it at on.IN.gov/sickwildlife.

2 Gleaners Food Bank of Indiana's annual fundraising event, Gleaners Huddle Against Hunger, presented by the Indianapolis Colts, will be held on the field of Lucas Oil Stadium on Tuesday evening, Oct. 15. All net proceeds will go directly and solely to Gleaners Food Acquisition Fund to acquire food for Hoosiers facing hunger in Gleaners' 21-county service area in central and south-central Indiana. 60 Years Ago, Jack Marks' Story of Night With A Beatle

Noblesville's Jack Marks always had a story to tell. And he had old photos or memorabilia that went along to prove most

of his stories.

One of those tales was about how the late retired Indiana State Trooper gave The Beatles' drummer Ringo Starr a sightseeing tour, including a ride back to his farm in Noblesville to meet Marks' family.

Through the years, that story has passed around the community as well as the State Police Post. I even heard State Troopers talking about it at the Indiana State Fair, wondering if Marks' story held true.

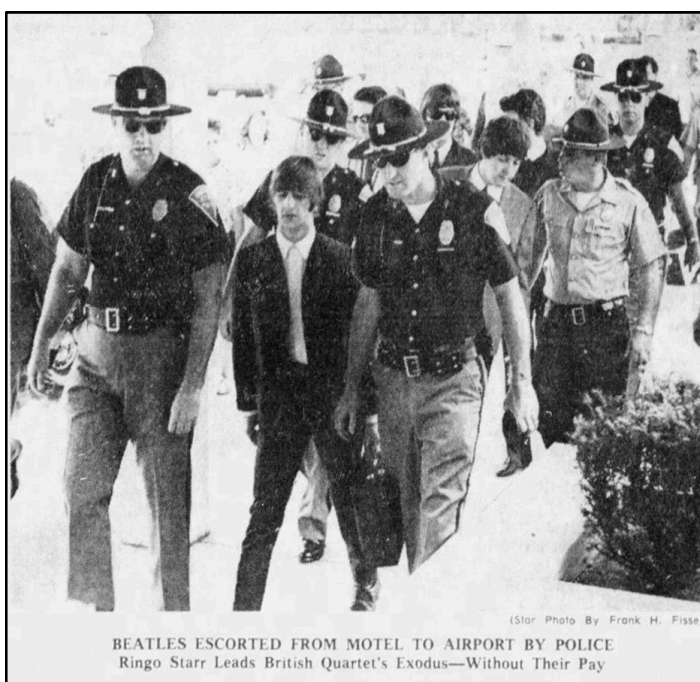
I actually wrote about Marks' memories of the Ringo Starr visit at least twice during my years as a reporter and lifestyle editor for The Noblesville Ledger and again in 2007, when Marks died, as editor for The Times.

Marks invited me into his farm west of Noblesville, and we sat at his kitchen table, talking about the Ringo Starr visit, which he said everybody was always curious to hear, no matter how many times he told it.

His story took place 60 years ago, when The Beatles played two shows at the Indiana State Fairgrounds on Thursday, Sept. 3, 1964.

Marks, at the time, was an 11-year veteran of the Indiana State Police and The Beatles' assigned security officer during their Indianapolis visit.

He joked about getting paid to watch The Beatles. His daughters were definitely

envious.

The night of the show, after midnight, Marks made sure band members got back to the Speedway Motel without any riots. Not able to sleep, Ringo Starr started talking to Marks and then invited himself to "go with" Marks on a ride. So he climbed into the back seat of Marks' car.

They toured Speedway, Monument Circle and wherever else they could see at night. Ringo Starr said he was hungry, so Marks then suggested that they just go back to Marks' house in Noblesville, wake up his wife, Doyne, and have her fix breakfast. But Marks had forgotten that it was the day that their prize-winning Morgan horses would be shown at the State Fair, and Doyne was up early in the barn, getting them ready to show.

Needless to say, she wasn't so impressed with her

husband's famous visitor, and invited them to get their own breakfasts. Although Marks' daughter was thrilled to wake up and meet Ringo Starr. They had coffee, then went to breakfast in Carmel at the former Ben's Island Restaurant, where Ringo Starr signed autographs after he dined.

Once back at the Speedway Motel, there was concern when Ringo Starr was missing. But soon Marks would drive one of the limousines carrying The Beatles to the airport. Marks said just before the plane took off, Ringo Starr asked to see Marks, saying "Thanks for a good time" and that he "was treated well and appreciated it."

Despite all the time spent with Ringo Starr, Marks never got his autograph or snapped his photo. And he asked his kids not to tell

An Old Landmark Gone

Last week, when I wrote about the Sheriff's Residence and Jail, I mentioned the building that had previously occupied that site, the old Recorder's office.

The old Recorder's office is one of our lost landmarks, and as such, it really deserves a bit more attention than that brief reference (especially since the June 18, 1875 Noblesville Ledger has such a nice article about it — "An Old Landmark Gone.")

As the Ledger noted, "The little brick although not pretentious, was substantial, the oldest public building in the county (at that time,) and has had an interesting history."

That "little brick" was built in 1832, when most, if not all, the structures in downtown Noblesville were made of wood and fire was an ever-present danger. Even the courthouse in use then was a frame building, a fact that made county officials understandably uneasy about storing important public documents in it.

To remedy the situation, a free-standing brick office was constructed for the County Recorder on the southwest corner of the courthouse square. The new building kept the important documents close enough to the courthouse to be handy, but made them less vulnerable to fires.

The county records' new home was definitely sturdy. During its demolition, it was discovered that the building had three floors — "two plank floors, transversely laid," with a brick floor on top of those.

For about six years after the Recorder's office moved into the little brick building, the records of the County Clerk were also housed there because John D. Stephenson held both positions during most of that time.

In 1838, the Recorder's office moved again, this time to a small frame

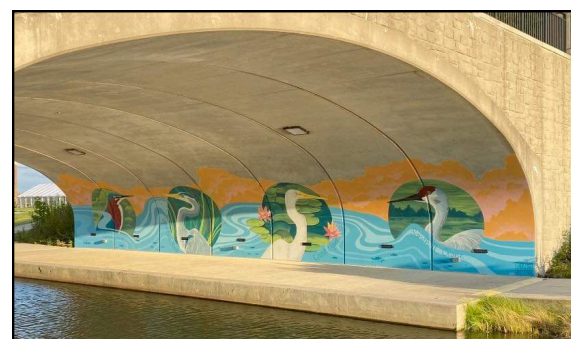
While the design of the actual mug will not be announced until early 2025, the Christkindlmarkt staff are confident it's a pick that their visitors will absolutely love.

visitors to get their hands on our royal blue mug with a heart-shaped handle," Rosenfeld said. "But we are already excited to unveil the 2025 mug early next year."

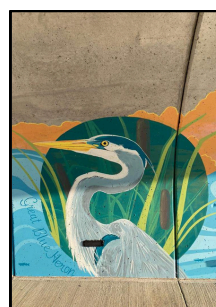

their friends about Ringo Starr's visit, in fear that the family would receive unwelcome company.

Jack Marks' memory is one of many written in freelance writer and photographer David Humphrey's book, "All Those Years Ago: Fifty Years Later, Beatles Fans Still Remember." The memory was also shared by the Carmel Clay Historical Society, which then had posted on its Facebook page a photo of Ringo Starr with Marks escorting the Beatle. This year, in celebration of the 60th anniversary of The Beatles' concerts in Indiana, father and son, David and Evan Humphrey, are co-authors of a new book, "We Love You, Beatles: Why the Fab Four Still Matter to Their Hoosier Fans."

Jack Marks, I know your friends and family and former co-workers have enjoyed hearing your stories retold over the years. And that your wonderful stories will live on.

Fifty-three years and three days later from that memorable Sept. 3, 1964, night, Jack Marks passed, on Wednesday, Sept. 6, 2017, at his home in

Noblesville. He was 88. He retired from the State Police after 25 years as Lt. Commander of Pendleton Post, then later worked as an investigator for the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office. He was a Mason.

The Indiana State Fairgrounds, during the 2024 Indiana State Fair in August, celebrated the 60th anniversary of The Beatles historic Indiana shows with an entire day of Fab Four entertainment, featuring Beatles tribute band, Hard Days Night. And yesterday, Tuesday, Sept. 3 -- the 60th anniversary of The Beatles in Indiana -- a live listening session was presented of the original audio from the 1964 performance, followed by live in concert, 1964 The Tribute band, performing the original Beatles setlist, followed by The Beatles' greatest hits. The late Jack Marks would have loved the show.

Anthony "Tony" Cook (Hamilton Heights High School Class of 1969)

Tony Cook was a multisport athlete who excelled in football, basketball and baseball at Hamilton Heights. He was named all-county in all three sports and was rewarded as the Hamilton County Outstanding Player of the Year in 1968. He led the county in football points scored his senior year and was also the first quarterback to pass

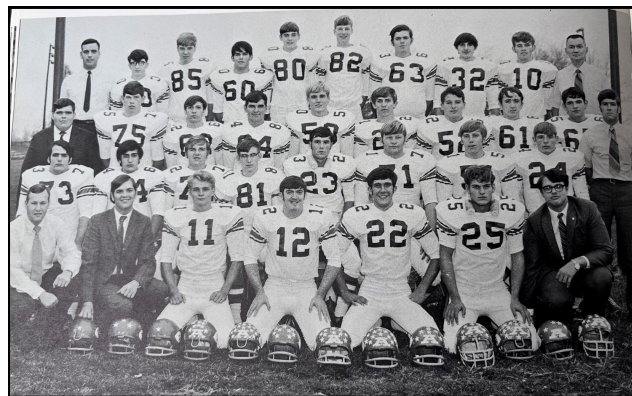
for 1,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards. After graduation Tony played football and baseball for four years and was a leader on the NAIA National runner-up team.

1970 Football Undefeated Football Team

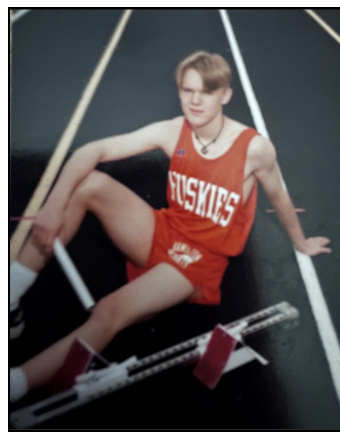
The Hamilton Heights football team scored a perfect 10-0 in the 1970 season. The team scored 329 points on the season (32.9 points per game average) and held their opponents to 63 points on the season. (6.3 points per game average). The 6.3 points allowed per game in the 1970 season set a school record that remains to this day. The team was coached by Indiana Football Hall of Fame Coach Ted Huber. Tracey Money Million (Hamilton Heights High School Class of 1988)

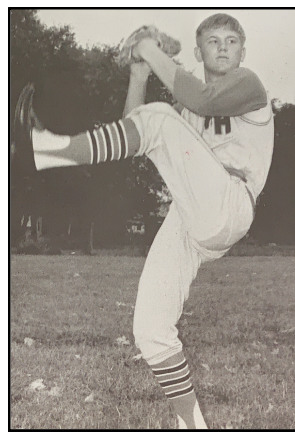
Tracey Money Million was a multisport athlete winning 12 varsity letters in her career (4 each in volleyball, basketball, and softball). However, she was best known for her success on the softball diamond. She was all-county and all-conference in softball



1970 Heights Undefeated Team



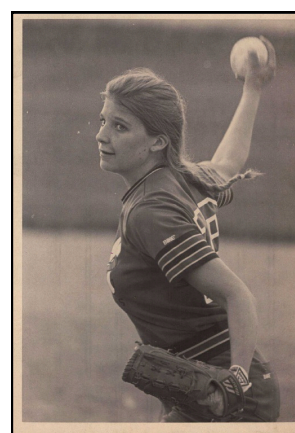

for three years. She was also the Hamilton County Player of the Year in 1986. In that season she led Hamilton Heights to their first ever softball sectional championship. She pitched in all three games to clinch the championship. She went on to pitch collegiately at Kentucky State University.

Zack Bardonner (Hamilton Heights High School Class of 1998)

Zack Bardonner had one of, if not the most decorated, track and field careers in Hamilton Heights history. As a sophomore he was part of a school record breaking 4x100 meter relay team that placed 9th in the state at the state track and field meet. Zach returned to the state meet in 1998 where he also ran school record breaking

times in the state meet in the 200 M Dash (where he placed 2nd in the state meet) and the 400 M Dash (where he placed 3rd in the state meet).

Austin Etherington (Hamilton Heights High School Class of 2011)

Austin Etherington was Hamilton Heights High School's first Indiana All-Star for men's basketball. He was a two-time all-conference and all-county basketball player. Austin scored 1,073 points in 59 games averaging over 18 points a game throughout his career. Upon graduating from Hamilton Heights, Austin went on to play at Indiana University for three years before playing two additional years at Butler University to finish his career. Austin is also a member of the Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame.

building “on the corner below Uncle Jim Brown’s hotel.” (Brown’s hotel was where the Houston Hotel would be later, i.e. the northeast corner of the intersection of South Eighth Street and Maple Avenue.)

Curiously, no explanation was given for this move.

For the next several years, a man named Ebenezer Ridgeway operated a shoe shop in the former Recorder’s office.

In 1843, Recorder Albert Cole returned the Recorder’s office to the little brick building on the square. The office remained there until about 1866, when another County Recorder, Marion W. Essington, moved the records into the two-story brick courthouse that had replaced the frame courthouse in 1837.

Once again, the Recorder’s office was opened up for private enterprise.

From 1866 to 1871,

Jacob Smith ran a tailor shop in part of the building. His advertisement in the Ledger read, “Cutting, making and mending, done to order on short notice. Latest styles of cutting and making.”

In 1871, when John W. Wilson was the County Recorder, the documents were moved back into the little brick building, possibly because the 1837 courthouse was starting to show dangerous signs of wear. (In February of 1875, part of a wall cracked and threatened to collapse during an important trial!)

In June of 1875, when the Recorder’s office was razed to make way for the new Sheriff’s Residence and Jail, the deeds, mortgages and other documents kept by the Recorder were moved into the Sheriff’s office in the decrepit old courthouse. They weren’t there long, however.

Owing to the poor

condition of the courthouse, an arrangement had been made to lease rooms for the county offices in a new building being erected three doors east of the southeast corner of Catherine (Ninth) and Conner.

The Recorder’s office, as well as the other county offices, remained in that building until the new courthouse was finished in 1879.

To my knowledge, the Recorder’s office has had a home in the 1879 courthouse ever since.
