■ THREE THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1. The Indiana State Fair has some great concerts coming to the Hoosier Lottery Free Stage. Beginning on the Fair’s opening day will be ‘70s super group Three Dog Night. After that will see Babyface, Bill Murray and His Blood Brothers, Melissa Etheridge and more. The Fair runs from Aug. 1-17 (closed on Mondays). All shows at the Hoosier Lottery Free Stage are free with paid fair admission and seating is first-come, first-served. All shows start at 7:30 p.m., unless noted otherwise.
2. For the 4th year in a row, the Zionsville community will paint the town purple on Saturday, June 21 for Zionsville Memories on Main to raise funds for the Alzheimer’s Association. This year, more than 30 local Zionsville businesses plan to participate through raffles, specials or donating a portion of sales to advance Alzheimer’s care, support and research. Businesses will also have materials available to customers to help raise awareness of the free support services available to those who are affected by the disease. Aligning with Alzheimer’s and Brain Awareness Month, Zionsville Memories on Main is part of The Longest Day – a do-it-yourself fundraiser that takes place on or around the summer solstice, the longest day of the year. Since its conception, Zionsville Memories on Main and the Zionsville community have raised nearly \$28,000 to help advance care, support and research for Alzheimer’s and all other dementia.
3. A new report from Harmony Healthcare IT is offering a detailed look at how Americans are engaging with telehealth in 2025 — including who’s embracing it, who’s not, and why. The report found more than 3 in 4 (77%) of Americans believe telehealth is the future of healthcare.
 - 53% prefer telehealth to in-person doctor visits
 - Top telehealth uses: therapy/mental health, one-off ailment, and sexual health
 - Nearly 1 in 5 (17%) turn to telehealth for prescriptions their doctor won’t approveThe most common reasons for choosing telehealth? Convenience, faster service/easier scheduling and privacy. A little more than 10 percent say they use telehealth to avoid small talk — and nearly a quarter (24%) admit to feeling embarrassed when discussing personal issues with a doctor. For those not embracing telehealth, 30% say they aren’t aware of what’s available and 29% think it’s lower quality of care than in-person visits.

Walton home has incredible history

When I was offered an opportunity to visit the Asher G. Walton home in Atlanta recently, I jumped at the chance. If you’ve ever driven along Atlanta’s Main Street, you may understand why. The old Victorian mansion has clearly seen better days, but it’s still an imposing — and intriguing — presence in downtown Atlanta. It sits right across from Atlanta’s Town Hall, on the southeast corner of Main and Railroad Streets. Most sources indicate that it was built in 1868, but I found a 1923 Noblesville Daily Ledger article, written while Asher Walton was still alive, that states that the year was 1872. Either way, “Atlanta” didn’t exist at the time the home was constructed. It was “Buena Vista” then. (You may recall Atlanta is made up of three small villages: Spargerville, Shielville and Buena Vista.

children are raised within individual families should be made by parents. This year, I supported a bill that will protect parental rights in Indiana. Senate Enrolled Act 143 will: Guarantee parents have the fundamental right to direct their child’s upbringing, religious instruction, education and health care; Prohibit the government from denying a parent access to information related

to their child’s health care or social, emotional and behavioral well-being; and Block government employees from advising, directing or coercing a child to withhold information from their parent. SEA 143 does not allow a parent to commit child abuse or neglect, and the prohibition on withholding information from a parent does not apply to a parent under criminal investigation and the police request the information be withheld. This new law will ensure parental rights have the same level of legal protection as other fundamental rights like the freedom of speech or freedom of religion, and I was glad to support it.

CenterPoint: Call 811 Before Digging

CenterPoint Energy is reminding everyone to contact 811 before starting any outdoor digging project. Anyone planning to dig – including gardening, building or repairing a fence, planting trees, installing a deck, placing a mailbox or laying a patio – should contact 811 at least three business days (excluding weekends and holidays) before starting their project. 811 is a free service that community members can use to have utility lines located and marked. According to the Common Ground Alliance, a member-driven association of nearly 3,800 damage prevention professionals in the underground utility industry, utility lines are damaged every few minutes because digging occurred prior to contacting 811. In 2024 alone, CenterPoint experienced more than 3,100 natural gas line damages within its service territory because 811 was not contacted

before digging. “As temperatures continue to warm up, our customers and community members are working on more outdoor projects around their homes. While they take advantage of the warmer temperatures, we want to remind everyone of the importance of having utilities located and marked prior to digging. By contacting 811, everyone takes a critical first step in helping keep themselves, their loved ones and communities safe,” said Al Payton, CenterPoint’s Vice President of Safety and Technical Training. “No matter how shallow or minor a project, everyone can help prevent safety incidents and loss of utility service for their communities by contacting 811 to have underground utility lines located and marked.” Safe digging practices are required by state laws and help prevent

damage to underground natural gas, electric, communications, water and sewer lines. Utility lines can be buried as shallow as inches below the surface. Digging without knowing the approximate location of underground utilities can result in serious injury, including death, as well as service disruptions, fines and costly repairs. Safe digging steps To prevent damage and stay safe, CenterPoint urges everyone to follow these steps before any digging project: Plan ahead! Contact 811 at least three business days before starting work. Make the request early in the week ■ for weekend projects. ■ Confirm all utility lines are marked ■ before beginning work. ■ Adjust plans if needed. Relocate ■ projects that are too close to marked utility lines.

■ If using a contractor, ■ verify they have contacted 811 before their work. ■ Smell natural gas? Act fast If a natural gas line is struck outside of a home or business, customers are reminded to: Leave the area immediately on foot. Do not attempt to restart or move powered equipment or use your mobile device or any other item that could cause a spark. Go to a safe location, then call 911 and CenterPoint. Remain in a safe area until directed by emergency personnel to do otherwise. Don’t try to repair a natural gas leak. Leave all repairs to a trained technician. When the local post office in Shielville moved to Buena Vista in 1886, there was already a Buena Vista post office in Indiana, so the name had to be changed. That’s when “Buena Vista” became “Atlanta.” During his lifetime, Asher Goodrich Walton was one of the most prominent and prosperous merchants in Atlanta, and indeed, the entire county. Born in Pennsylvania in 1836, he was brought to Indiana as a child. Both parents died when he was young – his father from wounds received while fighting in the Mexican War. According to the 1880 county history, Walton was raised by an uncle in Johnson County. He came to Buena Vista in the late 1850s and began clerking for John S. Wolff in Wolff’s general store. After

his 1858 marriage to Wolff’s daughter, Julia, he bought an interest in the store. That was just the beginning of Walton’s business career. In 1877 the Noblesville Ledger described him as a “handsome, athletic man, of fine physique” who ran a store, two stave machines, a lumberyard and a flour mill, in addition to acting as the local freight and express agent for the railroad and Buena Vista’s postmaster. In later years, he served on the board of directors of the Atlanta Steel and Tin Plate Company and in 1900, he and his sons, Edgar and Shirley, established the Bank of Atlanta. (Shirley was originally a gender-neutral name.) After Walton’s death in 1924, family members continued to occupy the house until the 1940s or ‘50s. (Sources differ.) There were no permanent residents in the

years that followed and as a result, the structure deteriorated badly. Things began turning around for the historic home when Mike and Donna Freeman bought it in 1987. They spent nine years restoring it to its former glory before selling it to Larry and Lea Vaughn. The Vaughns opened the Walton House Bed & Breakfast in 1997, and the home quickly became a major tourist attraction for Atlanta. It was a focal point for the town’s New Earth Festival and served as “Grant’s headquarters” during the Civil War Days celebration. Health issues forced the Vaughns to close the bed and breakfast in 2005. The current owner has made the house available to groups for paranormal investigations. (Did I mention that it has a reputation for being haunted?) I didn’t see any spirits floating around when I was there, but

my friends and I did hear some inexplicable noises, smelled oranges when there were no oranges present and came away with a very interesting photo. The best part of the experience, however, may have been the opportunity to explore the historic Victorian mansion. The woodwork is gorgeous (Walton was a lumberman, after all,) the curved main staircase with its handcrafted railing is impressive and the curving wall on the second floor is simply amazing. Thirty-seven stained-glass windows made and installed by the Vaughns add to the atmosphere. If Asher Walton is haunting his old home, I can understand why he wouldn’t want to leave. These are Christ-like qualities, gifted by God to humankind. The quiet display of these characteristics is indicative of an emergence toward righteousness, becoming more like Christ himself. And when you see it, you know it--- you just KNOW it is of God. It is a divine treasure.

I felt like the woman in the Gospel of Mark 5: 25-28 (NKJV)

25 Now a certain woman had a flow of blood for twelve years, 26 and had suffered many things from many physicians. She had spent all that she had and was no better, but rather grew worse. 27 When she heard about Jesus, she came behind Him in the crowd and touched His garment. 28 For she said, “If only I may touch His clothes, I shall be made well.”

This woman needed to be healed and she KNEW, by her faith, that Jesus had the power to heal her. “If only I may touch His clothes”, she said. “If only.”

I sat and chatted with many lovely couples and then, a gentleman asked me to dance! I’m sure he thought I had two left feet. After all, it was many, many years since I was asked to dance! The song was quickly over, and we graciously parted company.

However, later that evening as I sat at my table, out of the corner of my eye I saw a figure heading my way from the far corner of the room. He looked like Jesus in the picture, you know the one, where the Lord comes running to pursue the lost lamb. No kidding! Bold, strong, determined. Yes, another manly vision, who also asked me to dance with my two left feet. And I
