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Paula's Going With the Flow

After the quiz on Hamilton County waterways ran, Larry Cloud raised the subject of Carmel's Flowing Well.

That reminded me that, although I've written about the numerous mineral springs that once existed in this county, I've never devoted a column to the famous Carmel landmark.

The Flowing Well is a little different from the county's naturally occurring mineral springs. The well was created when drillers looking for gas on Charles L. Williamson's farm struck water instead.

Boy, did they ever. The pressure in the aquifer they tapped into was so great, a five foot geyser of water shot up out of the ground.

That pressure bringing the water to the surface without the benefit of a pump is what makes the well an artesian well. (I had to look that up. I was familiar with the term, "artesian," but wasn't clear on the exact definition.)

The year this took place is

generally believed to have been 1904, due to a notice in the January 12, 1904 Hamilton County Ledger that drillers for H. M. Gilchrist, president of the Giant Oil and Gas Company, had recently developed a gas well on the Williamson farm.

The farm was on Mattsville Road (116th Street,) a little east of Mattsville, a small village located at what is today 116th Street and Haverstick Road. (Mattsville is long gone. The only reminder of its existence is White Chapel Church, less than a mile to the east.)

If the June 6, 1951 Noblesville Daily Ledger can be believed, the idea for making the Flowing Well's water available to the general public came from Mattsville native Jerome T. "Tom" Wise.

In 1925, Wise and his daughter spent several weeks camping on the banks of Cool Creek near the well. During that time, Wise read an account of the story behind Sam Walter Foss' poem, "The House by the Side of the Road."

(Yeah, I'd never heard of

Foss either, but apparently his poetry was fairly popular 100 years or so ago.)

According to the Ledger column, one day Foss was hiking in his native New England when he came upon signs that invited thirsty passersby to drink at a spring just off the road, to rest on the bench nearby if they were tired and to help themselves to the basket of apples next to the bench.

The old man who owned the spring explained that his water was just going to waste and he had more apples than he needed, so he decided to share what he had.

The man's generosity not only inspired Foss' poem, it moved Wise to pitch the idea to Williamson of building a drinking fountain and sharing his well's water with others.

Williamson took to the notion, and he and his wife decided to turn the drinking fountain into a monument to the area's nine pioneer families.

During the next two

■ THREE THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1. The Indiana Native Plant Society's 32nd annual conference, Nature Everywhere: Curated Spaces and Wild Places, is scheduled for Oct. 25, at the Grand Wayne Convention Center in Fort Wayne and is open to the public. The speaker lineup features two keynotes, Larry Weaner, author of the book *Garden Revolution: How Our Landscapes Can Be a Source of Environmental Change*, and Roy Diblik, author of the book *The Know Maintenance Perennial Garden*. The conference features a native seed swap, where participants can select up to 60 species of donated native seeds to take home and plant, as well as a book sale, exhibits, pre-conference hikes, and a welcome social at the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory. Detailed information about speakers, topics, and pre-conference activities is posted at <https://indiananativeplants.org/inps-sponsored-events/annual-conference/>, along with links to online registration. Registration closes Oct. 17.

2. Indiana has earned a AAA credit rating from all three major credit-rating agencies: S&P Global Ratings, Moody's Investors Service, and Fitch Ratings. The AAA credit rating is the highest rating possible, and receiving it from all three major credit agencies demonstrates the State's leadership in disciplined fiscal management, economic resilience, and long-term financial stability. Only 14 states in the country have this top rating from all three agencies, with Indiana holding a AAA rating from all three rating agencies since 2010. This fiscal responsibility allows the state to protect itself during economic downturns.

3. The Indiana State Department of Agriculture and partners throughout the state have worked with the Gulf Hypoxia Program to develop a no-cost program with a focus on increasing the knowledge and use of soil sampling as a nutrient management practice to benefit farm operations. The program, titled Indiana's Mississippi River Basin Soil Sampling Program, is open now for applicants. It includes row crop fields, pastures, hay and specialty crops located within Indiana's portion of the Mississippi River Basin. Eligible landowners will be prioritized by acreage enrolled (i.e., 100 acres or less), fields that have never been soil sampled and fields that haven't been sampled regularly (i.e., within the last four years). Further prioritization may be implemented based on ISDA's workload capacity. This program excludes hobby gardens and private lawns. Interested landowners can sign-up online at ISDA's website or by reaching out to Nutrient Stewardship Program Manager, Ophelia Norman at soilsampling@isda.in.gov. ISDA is accepting registrations until Friday, Oct. 17, or until funds are exhausted.

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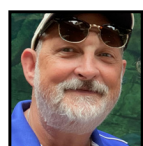
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Has It Really Been 24 Years since 9-11?

A quarter of a century almost? Has it really been that long since that awful Tuesday morning?

Most of us can remember exactly where we were 24 years ago as the Sept. 11 morning news began to trickle in. The idea that a plane had crashed into the World Trade Center caught our attention. A lot of us thought it was probably a small plane. Just about the time we were getting our heads wrapped around the idea it was a commercial jetliner . . . a second one hit – this time on live TV.

You remember.

Whether watching live or delayed, the horror was unmistakable. In the blink of an eye, hundreds of lives were snuffed out.

First one plane. Then another. Then another. Then another.

From the moment Flight 11 plowed into the north tower, we were at war and just didn't know it. A war that was killing hundreds of us by the second. A war that escalated when Flight 175 hit the south tower 17 minutes later. A war that exploded across our TVs and phones when Flight 77 smashed into the Pentagon 34 minutes later. A war that saw people choosing to leap to their deaths from the World Trade Center rather than be consumed in the inferno.

A war that left us speechless, out of breath, not even knowing what to think.

It was 56 minutes from the first blow when the FAA grounded all civilian air traffic. Fifteen minutes later the south tower crumbled. Some 800 first responders and civilians lost their lives.

Four minutes – 240 seconds – after that, the heroes on Flight 93 struck back. Todd Beamer said “Let's Roll” and brave men and women stormed the cockpit. In-

stead of hitting the U.S. Capitol or White House, they forced the plane nose first into a Pennsylvania field. They all died, but they died fighting back.

Not many of us are alive who recall FDR's famous words that came into American living rooms decades ago. “Yesterday, December 7th, 1941 -- a date which will live in infamy -- the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.”

But we remember 24 years ago. We remember the shock, the outrage. We remember the patriotism that accompanied the sadness as we united against a common enemy. Whether we would pull together as a nation today might be debatable. But 24 years ago we did.

Some 2,977 people lost their lives – including 415 fire and police. Thousands more were injured. It took almost 10 years before a team of Navy Seals caught and killed the founder of al-Qaeda and orchestrator of 9-11 . . . Osama bin Laden.

It's easy to look at the calendar today and overlook the significance. It's easy to file the memories away; forget the flood of emotions that overwhelmed us all. It's not even that hard to take in stride that a couple thousand of our fellow countrymen were brutally and mercilessly murdered.

Time does that. Wounds heal. Hurts subside. But for a little bit today, it might be worth remembering just how awful that Tuesday was.

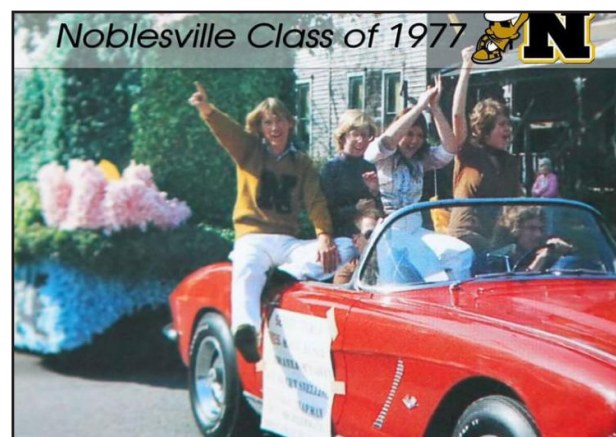

For artist Lynda Parziale, creativity wasn’t born in the studio. It bloomed in unexpected corners of life; calligraphy ink pots, needlework, scientific labs, and eventually, swirling layers of acrylic paint. Her upcoming exhibit, *AMBIGUITY*, is a celebration of intuition, imagination, and the unpredictable beauty of letting go.

Lynda’s journey as a creative has always run alongside her professional life in science. Raised in England, she learned italic calligraphy instead of cursive as a child—a detail that led to years of freelance work creating invitations, announcements, and teaching handwriting. Her academic career focused on chemistry, biology, physics, and nuclear medicine research at institutions including the University of Toronto, Stanford, Oregon, and UC Davis. More recently, acrylic pour became her primary creative outlet.

“It started as a hobby, and then just... flourished,” she says. With each pour, Lynda embraced the freedom that comes with surrendering control. “Paint has a mind of its own,” she explains. “You can’t reproduce the same effect twice, each piece is completely original.” What began as experimentation

quickly transformed into expression. The fluidity of the medium mirrors her own evolving artistic journey. Unpredictable, yet full of discovery.

The theme of *AMBIGUITY* reflects this openness. Lynda hopes viewers will engage with her work through the lenses of their own memories, emotions, and imaginations. “It’s surprising what people see. A child’s mind interprets a piece completely differently from a parent or grandparent. That’s what excites me, it’s art without restriction.”

Her connection to this work is deeply personal. Entering her 80th year, Lynda considers each creation a kind of gift, first to herself, and hopefully to others. Acrylic pouring, for her, exists in two dimensions: the mindful, meditative act of making, and the reflective experience of seeing something familiar or new in the finished piece. “It brings imagination and memories flooding back,” she notes. “And that’s what I want to share.”

Braun Signs Lopez Nursing Bill

Gov. Mike Braun recently and ceremonially signed into law a bill sponsored by State Rep. Danny Lopez (R-Carmel) to help ensure Indiana’s nursing workforce can meet the growing health care needs of Hoosiers.

According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, enrollment in baccalaureate nursing programs declined in 2022 after 20 years of growth. With Indiana projected to face a shortage of more than 73,000 licensed practical nurses over the next decade, Senate Enrolled Act 176 allows high school students to enroll in state-accredited nursing programs. Lopez said this step will help students save money on college-level courses that will count toward a future degree, gain experience in a professional environment sooner and create more opportunities for advanced education, including

training to become a registered nurse.

“Education and training should move at the speed students do, and that’s particular important as we look to move more Hoosiers into the nursing profession,” Lopez said. “Efforts like this help build our talent pipeline and get Hoosier students interested in high-demand fields here in our state.”

Several Ivy Tech campuses across the state offer programs to earn an associate of science in nursing degree or enroll in a transition to ASN program. Others have a practical nursing technical certificate program. Visit IvyTech.edu for more information.

Lopez said the law also adds two members to the State Board of Nursing, expanding representation and updating member qualifications to ensure the board can address evolving challenges in health care.

Do You Have Unclaimed Cash? Check IndianaUnclaimed.gov

As summer starts giving way to autumn in Indiana, Attorney General Todd Rokita invites Hoosiers to visit IndianaUnclaimed.gov to discover unclaimed property possibly waiting to "fall" into their hands.

“There’s no reason for money rightfully belonging to you to sit in a government account,” Rokita said. “We want nothing more than to get these funds back into your wallets or bank accounts where they belong.”

Unclaimed property includes assets such as unclaimed wages or commissions, money orders, safe deposit box contents, forgotten savings and checking accounts, refunds and overpayments on such things as credit card balances and cell phone bills.

During Rokita’s tenure, the office’s Unclaimed Property Division has set records for the amount of unclaimed property returned to Hoosiers – including \$81 million in 2023, the largest amount ever returned in a single year.

“Unclaimed Property Director Amy Hendrix and her staff have done incredible work,” Rokita said. “When I talk about serving with servants’ hearts, I can point to their devoted efforts as an example of exactly what our office stands for.”

Already in 2025, the Unclaimed Property Division has returned more than \$68 million – with a full third of the year yet to go.

years, a concrete structure with a bronze plaque bearing the names of the nine families (Moffitt, Williamson, Wilkinson, Applegate, Myers, Eller, Kinzer, Wise and Rooker) was erected around the well.

A formal dedication ceremony took place in 1929.

Since then, thousands of people have come from as far away as Chicago to fill their empty

containers with water from the well. Occasionally, the flow has slowed to a trickle, sparking fears that the old well might be nearing its end, but the water has always returned, albeit sometimes with a little help.

In 1983, the crumbling old concrete drinking fountain with its single pipe was replaced by a gazebo, and landscaping and parking spaces were added to turn the area into a small park.

Today, the water bubbles from four spigots and the old well is the centerpiece of the 15-acre Flowing Well Park, which was created in 1994 as Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation’s first public park.
