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Reading, ‘Riting and ‘Rithmetic in the Early Days

From Time to Thyme

Now that Labor Day is behind us, I feel more comfortable writing about schools. (I don’t think I’ll ever get used to the idea of kids’ summer vacations ending in July!)

A couple of interesting letters about early schools appeared in the Noblesville Daily Ledger in 1916. The man who penned them, E. A. (Ellis Addison) Hutchens, served as Hamilton County School Superintendent for 18 years, from 1885 to 1903.

(The office of County School Superintendent was created by the state legislature in 1873. The County School Superintendent and County School Board, which was made up of the nine township trustees, supervised Hamilton County’s schools until 1964, when the school reorganization transferred that responsibility to indi-

vidual school districts.)

In his letters, Hutchens tapped the memories of his grandmother and other early settlers to point out differences between the pioneers’ schools and the schools of his day.

He observed that schoolhouses built prior to 1855 wouldn’t be considered “suitable to keep Short Horn cattle in now.” Apart from the two-room brick county seminary that opened in Noblesville in 1852, the early schools were all log structures. Some weren’t even built with hewn logs. There were no desks; students sat on benches with no backs.

These first schools were subscription schools, where teachers were paid by their pupils’ parents and they boarded with their school’s patrons. Teachers earned \$10 to \$20 a month for two to three months of teaching, but they were also expect-

ed to perform other tasks such as chopping wood and carrying water from nearby homes.

Hutchens described the early teachers as being “as well educated as a sixth grade pupil in the district schools of today and some no farther advanced than the average third grade pupil.”

He named a few pioneer teachers: “Old Curious,” (who had “singular ideas,”) someone named Terwilliger (no first name was given,) and Sammy Hockett, who wore a long-tailed coat and high plug hat. (That’s a hat with a stiff brim, like a bowler or top hat.)

Hutchens also mentioned Nathan Mills, who “taught writing school in nearly every neighborhood of the county” and Mills’ rule for “backing a letter.” (That must have meant addressing an envelope. Hutchens

■ THREE THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1. Did you know that Bachelorette parties now cost an average of \$1,300, and new research from custom apparel company Rushorder Tees reveals how brides-to-be are cutting costs by choosing local themes. Here in Indiana, Hoosiers made 84 monthly searches for a Beach-theme bachelorette. The top five themes in Indiana were Beach, Vegas, Disco, Mamma Mia and Cowgirl. Across America, the most popular themes reflect what’s accessible in each state, from beaches and big cities to Western culture, showing that brides are leaning into celebrations that don’t require expensive travel. Researchers analyzed Google search information for various bachelorette party themes between March 2024 and February 2025, uncovering distinctive patterns in how Americans plan these pre-wedding celebrations. The study uncovered major differences in how women across the country plan their final fling before the ring, with a clear split between preferences on the coasts versus inland areas.

2. Fall hunting licenses are officially on sale, and DNR’s upgraded licensing system, the Activity Hub, works a bit differently than the prior method. To make sure you’re ready to go, please sign in now, check your account, and grab your licenses early. Getting set up ahead of time gives you plenty of room to troubleshoot, ask for help, or visit a retailer if needed. Don’t wait until the last minute. DNR wants you to get into the field without a hitch. Go to GoOutdoorsIN.com and click the login button. You’ll be directed to Access Indiana, where you’ll log in or create an account. Once logged in, you’ll return to the Hub to verify your personal info, purchase licenses, and apply for reserved hunts.

3. Speaking of outdoors, do you know a kid who loves deer hunting? Mark your calendars for youth deer weekend, Sept. 27-28. In the lead-up, we anticipate a high volume of license system traffic so don’t wait until the last minute to access your account in DNR’s new license system, the Activity Hub. If you previously had a child or other person linked to your account, you will need to reestablish that link in the new system. The process functions differently from the previous license system, so allow plenty of time to learn the steps.

S&P Global Reaffirms Hamilton County ‘AAA’ Long-Term Rating

S&P Global Ratings has assigned Hamilton County its highest credit rating – a ‘AAA’ long-term rating – on the County’s anticipated \$12 million general obligation Series 2025 bonds. The rating outlook is stable. S&P has also reaffirmed the county’s ‘AAA’ long-term rating on its other outstanding general obligation and lease debt.

S&P analysts cited Hamilton County’s “very strong economic profile, characterized by robust economic growth,” and its “strong budgetary management practices” that “have enabled the county to maintain an extremely strong reserve position while managing its operating and capital expenditure growth.”

“This rating is a direct reflection of the County’s responsible financial stewardship and strategic planning,” said Sue Maki, President of the Hamilton County Council. “By earning and maintaining a AAA rating, Hamilton County is able to finance critical projects at the lowest possible cost, saving taxpayer dollars while improving services.”

“This just demonstrates the strength of Hamilton County’s economy and the prudence of our financial management,” said Steve Dillinger, President of the Hamilton County Commissioners. “It ensures we can continue to invest in projects that directly benefit our residents while preserving our long-term financial health.”

Officials plan to use the bond proceeds to fund mental health facilities and the acquisition of a storage facility and the Sheridan Airport.

Hamilton County remains one of only a handful of counties nationwide to maintain a AAA bond rating, the highest rating awarded by S&P.

We are Living in Surreal Times

In the spring of 1968, just four and a half years removed from the assassination of our

country's 35th president, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, we watched a year dawn unlike any we had seen in our young lives.

Martin Luther King was gunned down in April. Bobby Kennedy was murdered two months later. And two months after that, we watched unprecedented violence in Chicago at the Democratic National Convention. In subsequent years we also had college students shot and killed at Kent State, Gov. George Wallace (the man who physically stood in the doorway to prevent two black students from entering the University of Alabama) shot multiple times and political unrest like this country had not seen since the Civil War.

It was a surreal time to be an American. . . . but let's revisit that in a second. First, let's recap the last few years or so:

June, 2017. Remember the shooting at a Republican baseball practice when Rep. Steve Scalise and four others were shot?

How about November that year when Sen. Rand Paul was attacked by a neighbor while mowing his lawn?

Less than three years later, FBI and Michigan State Police broke up a plot to kidnap Michigan Democrat Governor Gretchen Whitmer.

Remember the Jan. 6 Capitol Hill riot? Take whatever side you want, the fact is things got very out of control that day.

In June of 2022 an armed man mad about Roe v. Wade was arrested near Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh's home.

A couple of months after that, a man showed up at Nancy Pelosi's house with a plan to kidnap her. She wasn't home but husband Paul Pelosi was and got a fractured skull for it.

Of course we all remember the assassination attempt when President Donald Trump got nicked in the ear, an inch or two away from a very different outcome.

That was in July of last year. A year ago this week what might've been a second assassination attempt was

subverted when Secret Service saw and shot at a man hiding on Trump's golf course in Florida with a rifle.

Ancient history? OK, fine. How about just this year?

In April, Pennsylvania Democratic Governor Josh Shapiro, his wife and four children (as well as another family), fled the governor's mansion after someone threw a Molotov cocktail inside, causing significant damage to the home. This came just hours after the family had Passover Dinner there.

I don't remember anyone celebrating the deaths of JFK, RFK or MLK. Sure, there was plenty of hate in the country. Some of us recall the wanted for treason posters that circulated before JFK was shot and killed.

the tragic consequence of demonizing those with whom you disagree day after day, year after year, in the most hateful and despicable way possible."

Really? This from the guy who calls every political opponent names straight off the schoolyard playground? It's the same on the left when Bernie Sanders took a break from calling Trump and conservatives fascists to issue his own pleas for singing Kumbaya around the campfire.

It really doesn't matter whether it's global, national, regional or local. Heck, I had several emails asking if I was worried that I could be a target because of the conservative and Christian viewpoints I've taken. One delightful reader – who used to be friends with my parents, wrote that she's worried for me. I wrote back and told her how much I appreciated the concern, but folks like Charlie Kirk touched millions. At the very most I'm seen by thousands – and probably read by 11 or 12 of you.

She wrote back and said it only takes one.

Does that mean I'm right? Not my call to make. I believe there comes a day of judgment when my Boss – a former Jewish carpenter – will tell me how I did. I'm scared to death I won't measure up, but I'm certainly OK with the concept.

The problem it seems, is that we live in a polarized world where almost all sides have decided they get to do the judging.

How surreal is that?

ORDINANCE NO. 09-08-25-B
AN ORDINANCE OF THE HAMILTON COUNTY BOARD OF
COMMISSIONERS REQUIRING ANY REQUEST TO INSPECT AND/
OR COPY HAMILTON COUNTY'S PUBLIC RECORDS TO BE MADE
IN WRITING AND PROHIBITING THE USE OF ANY INFORMATION
OBTAINED FROM SUCH A REQUEST FOR A COMMERCIAL PURPOSE
WHEREAS, the Hamilton County Board of Commissioners hereby
adopts this Ordinance to require any Person who requests to Inspect and/or Copy
Hamilton County's Public Records to make such a request in writing and to
prohibit the use of Information obtained from such a request for a Commercial
Purpose; and
WHEREAS, Indiana's Access to Public Records Act, Indiana Code§ 5-14-
3-1, et seq., governs a Person's right to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's
Public Records; and
WHEREAS, one purpose of this Ordinance is to ensure that any Person
who is entitled to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public Records under
Indiana's Access to Public Records Act may Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton
County's Public Records under that Act; and
WHEREAS, under Indiana Code§ 5-14-3-3(a)(2), Hamilton County may,
at its discretion, require that any Person requesting to Inspect or Copy Hamilton
County's Public Records submit such a request in writing on a Form provided by
Hamilton County; and
WHEREAS, Hamilton County maintains several categories of Public
Records in electronic data storage systems, including, without limitation, Public
Records which have gathered to respond to requests to Inspect or Copy Hamilton
County's Public Records as well as other records; and
WHEREAS, Hamilton County invests substantial time and resources into
reviewing and responding to Public Records requests; and
WHEREAS, Hamilton County may save time and resources if a Person
must submit Public Records requests in writing on a Form because such a Form
should help Hamilton County identify and process requests in an efficient manner;
and
WHEREAS, Hamilton County also should be able to communicate in an
efficient manner about Public Records requests that are submitted in writing; and
WHEREAS, one purpose of this Ordinance is to allow Hamilton County to
identify, process, and communicate about Public Records requests in an efficient
manner; and
WHEREAS, under Indiana Code§ 5-14-3-3(e), Hamilton County may
prohibit any Person who obtains Information from Hamilton County's Public
Records from using any such Information for a Commercial Purpose; and
WHEREAS, a Person should not profit from the time and resources that
Hamilton County dedicates to reviewing and responding to Public Records
requests; and
WHEREAS, one purpose of this Ordinance is to prevent any Person from
profiting from the time and resources Hamilton County dedicates to responding to
Public Records requests; and
WHEREAS, Hamilton County shall provide reasonable accommodation
to any Person who is unable to submit a request to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton
County's Public Records in writing; and
WHEREAS, one purpose of this Ordinance is to ensure that Hamilton
County does not discriminate against any Person who is unable to submit a
request to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public Records in writing; and
WHEREAS, this Ordinance should be interpreted, applied, and enforced in
a manner that will advance the above-stated purposes of this Ordinance.
IT IS THEREBY ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Hamilton
County that:
SECTION I. APPLICABILITY.
This Ordinance applies to requests to Inspect or Copy Hamilton County's
Public Records.
SECTION II. DEFINITIONS.
a. "Commercial Purpose" means any commercial purpose identified in
Indiana Code § 5-14-3-3(e), including, without limitation, any act taken to sell,
advertise, and/or solicit the purchase of merchandise, goods, and/or services and/
or sell, loan, give away, and/or otherwise deliver the Information obtained by any
request to any Person.
b. "Copy" means transcribing by handwriting, photocopying, xerography,
duplicating machine, duplicating electronically stored data onto a disk, tape,
drum, or any other medium of electronic data storage, and reproducing by any
other means.
c. "Form" means the Public Records Request Form available on Hamilton
County's website and any office where Hamilton County's Employees provide
services to the public.
d. "Hamilton County" means the political subdivision known as Hamilton
County, Indiana, as well as any elected official and/or Person employed by that
political subdivision.
e. "Information" means any word, image, and/or audio recorded on and/or
in Hamilton County's Public Records.
f. "Inspect" means any activity identified in Indiana Code § 5-14-3-2(h).
g. "Office" means any office operated by Hamilton County.
h. "Ordinance" means this ordinance, Ordinance No. 09-08-25-
1. "Person" means any individual, corporation, limited liability company,
partnership, unincorporated association, and/or governmental entity.
j. "Public Record" means any writing, paper, report, study, map,
photograph, book, card, tape recording, or other material that is created, received,
retained, maintained, or filed by or with Hamilton County and which is generated
on paper, paper substitutes, photographic media, chemically based media,
magnetic or machine readable media, electronically stored data, or any other
material, regardless of form or characteristics which is not deemed confidential,
privileged, or otherwise not subject to public disclosure under local, state, and/or
federal law.
k. "Required Field" means a field identified by an Asterisk and emphasized
with Bold font on the Form which is provided by Hamilton County on its
website and/or its Offices. Hamilton County Employees shall identify Required
Fields and/or identify a Person who can identify Required Fields if a Person has
questions about Required Fields under this Ordinance.
SECTION III. PROCESS FOR REQUESTING HAMILTON
COUNTY'S PUBLIC RECORDS.
a. Any Person may Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public
Records if the Person is entitled to access to such a Public Record under
Indiana's Access to Public Records Act and the Person identifies with reasonable
particularity the Public Record in writing on a Form provided by Hamilton
County. Any Person submitting such a Form must provide all details which
must be provided to complete the Required Fields on such a Form. Completed
Forms may be submitted via Hamilton County's NextRequest Portal at https://
hamiltoncountyin.nextrequest.com/, email to legal@hamiltoncounty.in.gov, and/or
in person at Hamilton County's Offices.
b. Any Person who desires to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's
Public Records under Indiana's Access to Public Records Act may identify
with reasonable particularity the Public Record the Person desires to Inspect
and/or Copy in writing on any document which provides all details which
must be provided to complete the Required Fields on a Form provided by
Hamilton County. Such documents may be submitted via Hamilton County's
NextRequest Portal at https://hamiltoncountyin.nextrequest.com/, email to
legal@hamiltoncounty.in.gov, and/or in person at Hamilton County's Offices.
c. Any Person who is unable to submit a completed Form or written
document to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public Records who is
entitled to a reasonable accommodation under local, state, and/or federal law may
request and receive such a reasonable accommodation.
SECTION IV. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURES.
Hamilton County may enforce this Ordinance as follows:
a. If Hamilton County receives any request to Inspect and/or Copy
Hamilton County's Public Records which does not comply with this Ordinance, it
may deny any such request.
b. If Hamilton County receives any request to Inspect and/or Copy
Hamilton County's Public Records from any Person who has not complied with
this Ordinance, Hamilton County may direct any Person to comply with this
Ordinance.
c. If Hamilton County receives any request to Inspect and/or Copy
Hamilton County's Public Records from any Person who has not complied with
this Ordinance, Hamilton County may provide a Form and/or direct any Person to
submit a completed Form pursuant to this Ordinance.
d. If Hamilton County receives any request to Inspect and/or Copy
Hamilton County's Public Records from any Person and Hamilton County is not
able to verify that the name and/or contact information which was provided with
the request is complete and accurate, Hamilton County may require any Person
who submitted such a request to verify the name and contact information provided
is complete and accurate. Hamilton County may find that any Person who refuses
to provide a name and contact information which is complete and accurate has
abandoned the Person's request to Inspect and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public
Records.
e. If Hamilton County receives a request for a reasonable accommodation
and the Person making this request is entitled to a reasonable accommodation
under local, state, or federal law, Hamilton County shall provide such a Person
with such a reasonable accommodation.
f. Any Person who uses Information obtained via a request to Inspect
and/or Copy Hamilton County's Public Records for a commercial purpose is
not entitled to obtain access to Hamilton County's Public Records under this
ordinance or Indiana Code§ 5-14-3-3(e).
SECTION V. EFFECTIVE DATE.
This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on November 1, 2025,
which shall be more than 30 days after publication of the Notice of Adoption of
this Ordinance. The Hamilton County Auditor is directed to have this Ordinance
codified in the Hamilton County Code of Ordinances.

described the final step as putting a stamp in the upper right corner.)

In addition to learning chirography (the art of handwriting,) pioneer students were taught spelling, reading and arithmetic.

Spelling lessons were like spelling bees. Pupils lined up and took turns spelling words. If you spelled a word the student in front of you had missed, you moved ahead in the line. The goal was to become the first one in the line. This was what Hutchens called "spelling for head."

The spelling text was Noah Webster's Speller (yes, the guy who wrote the dictionary.) The

sentences in it that were to be spelled out did double duty by including lessons on topics such as temperance, morals and manners. ("Teachers like to see their pupils polite to each other.")

There was no regular textbook for reading, so teachers used whatever book was handy, often the Bible.

The multiplication table was taught in rhymes. ("Two times one are two, I will teach you something new; Two times two are four, Repeat it o'er and o'er.")

For geography lessons, the students would recite the names of states, their capitals and the river on which the

capital sat.

Hutchens ended by noting changes in the county's schools that began around the time of the Civil War — the Friends opened Union High School, "the first real high school in the county," in Westfield in 1861, school years expanded from 60 or 80 days to 100 days and new subjects — physiology and United States history — were added to curriculums.

I wonder what he'd think of today's schools?

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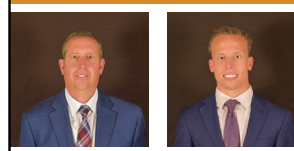
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
