Revisiting Grand Dragon Murder Trial After a Century

One hundred years ago this month, one of the most significant trials in Indiana

history took place on the second floor of the Hamilton County courthouse. (Yes, the same old courthouse that's still sitting on Noblesville's courthouse square.)

Most people probably know what I'm talking about, but for the benefit of anyone who doesn't, a little background information is in order.

In March of 1925, D. C. Stephenson, the former Grand Dragon of Indiana's Ku Klux Klan, abducted a woman named Madge Oberholtzer, put her on a train headed toward Chicago and did some pretty horrible things to her along the way.

They got off the train in Hammond, Indiana, and checked into a hotel. There, Oberholtzer convinced Stephenson to let her go out to buy a hat. (In those days, no woman went hatless in public.) While out, she managed to also buy some poison at a pharmacy and she swallowed enough pills to make herself deathly ill.

Her desperate act panicked Stephenson, who then had her driven back

to Indianapolis. She was carried into her Irvington home by a man who explained her condition as the result of an automobile accident.

Madge Oberholtzer lingered in agony until she died on April 14, a month after taking the poison. During that time, she dictated a dying declaration of what Stephenson had done to her to the family attorney. (If you really want to know the details of the crime, her statement is available online.)

Stephenson and his aides, Earl Gentry and Earl Klinck, were charged with first degree murder in her death. (Gentry had accompanied Stephenson and Oberholtzer on the train. Klinck was the man who carried Oberholtzer into her house upon the return to Indianapolis.)

The defense argued for a change of venue, claiming that it would be impossible to get a fair trial in Marion County. The Marion County prosecutor, William H. Remy, proposed moving the trial to either Shelby, Boone or Hamilton counties and Eph Inman, the chief defense counsel, chose Hamilton.

Take note of that – it was the PROSECUTION that suggested Hamilton County. People usually seem to slide over that point, but it's important.

In recent years, so much has been made of the discovery of those 1920s-era KKK membership cards in Noblesville back in 1995 that you may have gotten the impression that this county, especially Noblesville, was Klan Central, that the KKK ruled supreme here.

The fact that the men prosecuting D. C. Stephenson believed they had a fair chance of getting a conviction in Hamilton County would seem to contradict that notion.

Certainly, this county had its share of Klan members, but it was hardly unique in that regard. By 1925, the Klan's patriotic sales pitch to "100% Americans," i.e. white Protestants, had spread its membership well beyond Indiana and the Midwest to the rest of the country.

At the time of his trial, Stephenson had split from the national organization and was no longer Grand Dragon, but he still wielded plenty of power and influence in this state. When he boasted to Madge Oberholtzer that he was "the law in Indiana," that wasn't far from the truth. He'd made a lot of money as Grand Dragon and he had no qualms about spending it to get whatever he wanted or needed.

2. Indiana Gov. Mike Braun said that he is going to follow the recommendation of the State Parole Board and allow the execution of convicted killer Roy Lee Ward to proceed. "After carefully reviewing the unanimous recommendation from the State Parole Board, I have decided to allow the execution of Roy Lee Ward to proceed as planned for Oct. 10," Braun announced. Ward raped and murdered 15-year-old Stacy Payne on July 11, 2001, forcing his way into her home in Dale, Indiana, in Spencer County, when she answered the door. Ward stabbed her with a knife repeatedly, slitting her throat to the point that she could not talk and cutting her abdomen so deep her spinal cord was nearly severed. Stacy's younger sister witnessed the attack and called 911.

3. Two Purdue University alumni are part of NASA's 2025 class of astronaut candidates. The alumni, Adam Fuhrmann and Yuri Kubo, will immediately join the Cradle of Astronauts at Purdue, bringing the total number of its members to 30. "Known as the Cradle of Astronauts, Purdue University is excited to see NASA's announcement of two Boilermakers among the cohort of 10 astronauts selected to go to the moon and then Mars," Purdue President Mung Chiang said. Fuhrmann, currently in the U.S. Air Force, earned his master's in systems engineering from Purdue. Kubo earned two degrees from Purdue – a bachelor's in electrical engineering and a master's in electrical and computer engineering.

And with that Bubba let out a howl and started laughing hysterically.

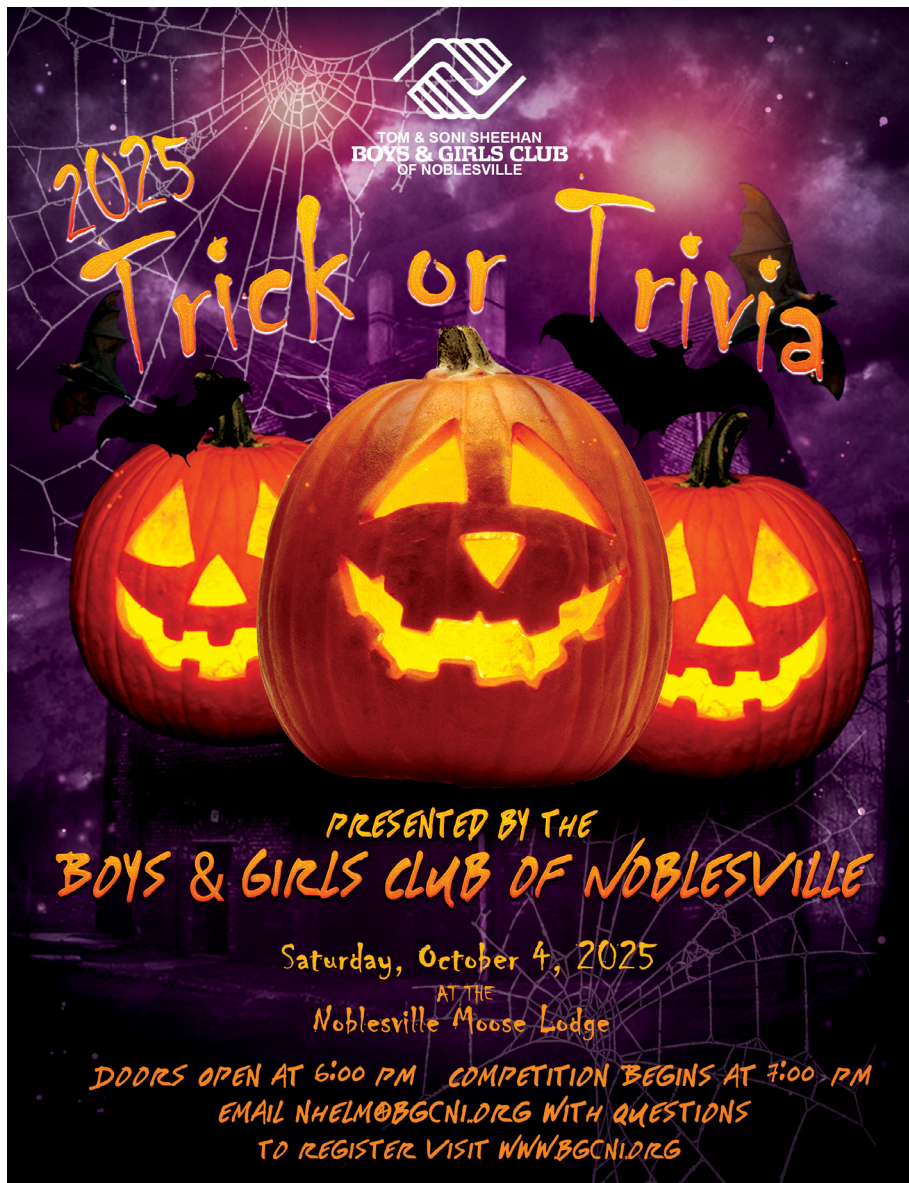
"I got you, didn't I Timmons! I got you!"

Dr. Singerman and Dr. Lovins are also among four alternate delegates to the AMA elected on Sunday. Elected as AMA Delegates are Heidi Dunniway, MD, Evansville; Lisa Hatcher, MD, Fort Wayne; and Thomas Vidic, MD, Elkhart. In addition to Dr. Singerman and Dr. Lovins, Elizabeth Struble, MD, North Manchester, will serve as an alternate delegate. AMA delegation members serve two-year terms and are elected on a staggered basis. Dr. Hatcher's election as delegate opened a fourth alternate delegate seat; Monica Wehby, MD, Carmel, was elected to serve the 15 months remaining in Dr. Hatcher's term.

Gunderman will be ISMA president-elect until September 2026, when he will succeed Ryan Singerman, DO, as president. Dr. Singerman, of Fort Wayne, was sworn in Sunday to begin his presidential term for 2025-2026. Dr. Singerman is a family physician with a specialty in obesity medicine, and is the primary care section chief and medical director of weight and bariatric medicine at Parkview Health in Fort Wayne. Historic Westfield Building to be Relocated, Restored in '26

The Board of Public Works in Westfield approved a contract with Brandt Construction to relocate and restore the "Green Building", the City of Westfield's oldest commercial building, following a public bidding process. As part of the State Road 32 improvement project, the Indiana Department of Transportation will cover 50 percent of the \$2,393,000 project cost to move and rehabilitate the historic landmark, which was

constructed in 1837.

"As we move toward Westfield's bright future, we cannot forget where we came from," said Mayor Scott Willis. "This project completes the preservation work started by the previous administration and protects this piece of our history for generations to come."

The City of Westfield will retain ownership of the Green Building once renovations are com-

plete and will be maintained under the stewardship of the Westfield Historic Preservation Commission. While restoration is under way, the City will issue a request for proposals to determine the future use of the building as a commercial space. Over its long history, the Green Building has housed The Old Corner Drug Store in the 1860s, Funderburgh Grocery, the town post office, Pickett's Cafeteria, Erika's Café, and

most recently, Dance Innovation.

Excavation and concrete work are anticipated to begin in late October or early November 2025. Once Duke Energy completes the underground utility relocation, the building will be moved to its permanent location on North Union Street, just south of the Basile Westfield Playhouse, in early 2026.
