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Thankful Noblesville Family in Spotlight as Riley Champions

A ring from a dial phone broke the 14-hour silence in the surgery waiting area at Riley Hospital for Children on a Sunday afternoon in August, nearly nine years ago.

"Her new heart is beating."

For Noblesville residents Kevin and Trinity Ginther, those five words ended years of uncertainty - and began a new chapter for their daughter, Hannah.

"At that moment, that's pure excitement," Trinity recalled. "Yes, you're still scared. You don't know what the journey is going to be like from there, but we haven't known what the journey was going to be like the entire way."

Now 12 years old, Hannah is a volleyball- and basketball-playing, make-up-loving preteen with a bright smile and a big personality. But for the first three-and-a-half years

of her life, she lived with what her parents describe as "half a heart."

Hannah was born with Hypoplastic left heart syndrome (HLHS), a rare and complex congenital heart defect in which the left side of the heart is severely underdeveloped. Children born with HLHS require multiple surgeries in infancy and early childhood to survive. By age 3, Hannah had already undergone three major heart surgeries. Compounding her challenges, she also experienced lung failure and now functions with one lung.

"It was the biggest span of emotions I have ever felt at once for so many reasons when we found out she was getting a new heart," Kevin said. "It was a magical night."

A Long Road to Recovery + Life Today

Following her transplant, Hannah spent three months at the Riley Heart Center adjusting to life with her new heart. She required ECMO support - a machine that temporarily takes over heart and lung function - as doctors managed high pulmonary pressure and closely monitored her recovery.

Over the next year and a half, Hannah returned to Riley three more times before finally turning a corner around age 5.

Throughout every setback and milestone, the pediatric transplant team remained by the family's side.

Transplant coordinator Maegan Boehm helped guide the Ginthers through the complex and often overwhelming transplant process - from waiting list logistics to post-operative

(Hey, it may not be completely accurate, but it sure is a lot shorter than the "Indiana High School Athletic Association State Basketball Tournaments Quiz.")

Test your knowledge of Hamilton County high school basketball history!

1. What was the first Hamilton County high school to play in the state finals?
2. How many Indiana Mr. Basketballs has Hamilton County produced AND can you name them and their schools?
3. Name the Indiana Miss Basketballs from Hamilton County.
4. What year did the IHSAA begin class basketball?
5. Have any Hamilton County schools won the IHSAA boys state championship?
6. What was the first year for the IHSAA girls state basketball tournament?
7. Have any Hamilton County girls teams won state championships?
8. In the 1960s, Indiana's sectional basketball tournaments were known for something in addition to basketball. What was it?

And the answers:
1. Cicero High School. In 1916 the Cicero boys team played Valparaiso in the first round of the finals. (They lost 34 to 23.)

2. There have been six: Carmel's Billy Shepherd in 1968, his brother, David Shepherd, in 1970, Noblesville's Tom Coverdale in 1998, Hamilton Southeastern's Gary Harris and Zak Irvin in 2012 and 2013, respectively, and Westfield's Braden Smith in 2022.

3. Amy Dilk of Carmel in 2018, Sydney Parrish of Hamilton Southeastern in 2020 and Maya Makalusky, also of Hamilton Southeastern, in 2025.

4. The IHSAA instituted class basketball during the 1997-1998 season. Under this system, teams are divided into four classes based on school enrollment. The smallest schools are class 1A, the largest, class 4A.

5. Yes. Carmel's 1976-1977 team was the first Hamilton County school to

Branna's Mad About March

A brain as wild as a March hare and marching to the beat of a different drum ... well, enough about me! Let's talk about the month of March's myriad of milestones!

The many marvels of March include the anticipation of the NCAA's annual basketball binge, beginning on March 17, but the madness doesn't stop there. This perennial period paints a patchwork picture of global proportions.

■ THREE THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1 Pilots reported 10,994 laser strikes to the Federal Aviation Administration in 2025 - a 14 percent decrease from the year before but still too high. Shining a laser at an aircraft poses a serious safety threat and is a federal crime. The FAA conducted outreach and training with local, state, and federal law enforcement throughout the year to combat laser strikes in areas with the highest numbers. In 2025, pilots reported the highest numbers of laser strikes in these states: California - 1,309; Texas - 1,100; Florida - 654; Illinois - 620; Arizona - 574; Washington - 484; Tennessee - 431; Indiana - 370; New York - 369; Virginia - 353. Lasers can incapacitate pilots, many of whom are flying airplanes with hundreds of passengers. Pilots have reported 337 injuries since the FAA began tracking laser strike reports in 2010. People who shine lasers at aircraft face FAA fines of up to \$11,000 per violation. They also can face federal criminal penalties of up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine, as well as state and local penalties.

2 Did you know that the great Hoosier state ranks 19th in new study that reveals the leading states for female-owned businesses? The research, conducted by demand planning software Algo, analyzed the latest U.S. Small Business Administration data to determine which states have the highest percentage of women-led firms across both employer and non-employer categories. The study showed that in Indiana 36.8 percent of businesses are owned by women. That put Indiana as the 19th best state, with 195,996 female-owned businesses. Georgia ranked first nationwide, with 42.2 percent of businesses owned by women, according to the new study.

3 Speaking of business, West Virginia ranked as America's best state for new business survival, according to findings by Franchise Opportunities. The comprehensive analysis examined Bureau of Labor Statistics data across all 50 states plus Washington D.C., tracking which regions offered the strongest foundation for business longevity between 2019 and 2024. In the national business survival study, Indiana ranked 14th, with 53.4 percent of its 2019 startups still operating in 2024. The state launched 10,862 new businesses during that period, maintaining a survival rate above the national average of approximately 51 percent. This highlights Indiana as a strong environment for entrepreneurs aiming to sustain their ventures through the critical first five years.

win a state championship, and the only one to win before class basketball took effect — but that was only the beginning. Carmel also won class 4A state championships in 2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2018-2019, and 2020-2021.

In addition to Carmel, Fishers won the state championship in class 4A in 2023-2024, and Guerin Catholic was the class 3A champion in 2011-2012 and 2014-2015.

6. The first girls tournament was held at the end of the 1975-1976 season.

7. Yes, four. The Noblesville girls team of 1986-1987 was the first — and the only one to win a state championship under the single class system.

They were followed by the 2007-2008 Carmel team, the 2018-2019 Hamilton Southeastern team and the 2021-2022 Noblesville team. (These were all class 4A championships.)

8. SNOW! Fans had to fight snowstorms to see their favorite teams play almost every year between 1960 and 1967. The worst years were 1961 and 1965.

The final day of the 1961 tournament a freak blizzard dumped around seven inches of snow and created huge drifts. Three thousand diehard basketball fans, primarily students, ended up spending the night in the Carmel gym.

The blizzard that struck central Indiana the day before the 1965 sectional started was even worse. “The Worst Blizzard of the Century” (they didn’t know what was coming in 1978!) produced around a foot of snow and drifts of three or more feet, postponing the tournament for two days.

For several years, people looked forward to the sectionals with a mix of anticipation and wariness. It wasn’t until the early ‘70s that the tournament snow curse finally lifted.

Correction: Michael Kobrowski tells me he’s no longer the communications officer for the Westfield Washington Historical Society. He IS still the curator of the WWHS museum, however.

1685 was a great year for music in Germany, as both masters were born there in the same year. However, their lives went in very different directions. Bach spent his entire life in Germany, composing mostly for the church, and in his lifetime he was more known for his virtuoso mastery

of the organ than for his compositions. He even said at one point that playing the organ was easy: “You have only to press down the right key at the right time, and the instrument plays itself!” It wasn’t until well after his death that others, especially Felix Mendelssohn, recognized the genius in his

music. Handel spent a great deal of time in Italy composing opera, and then later lived in England where he composed many oratorios, the most famous of which is Messiah. Despite being born in the same country in the same year, there is no evidence that the two men ever met.

is listed in the scholarship application form. All essays must be submitted via online application form to be considered for these awards. The student’s information must accompany essays.

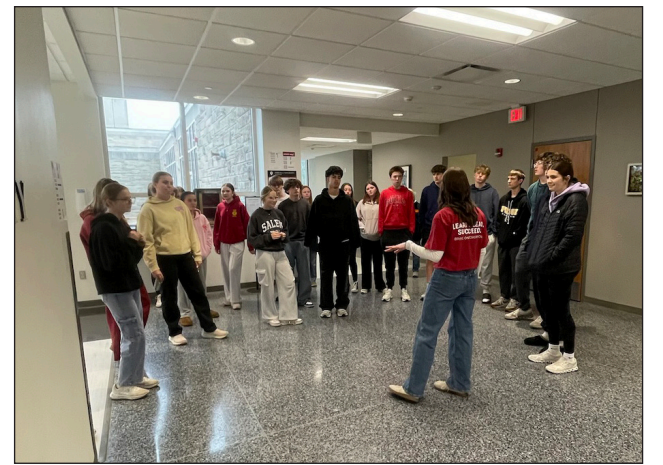
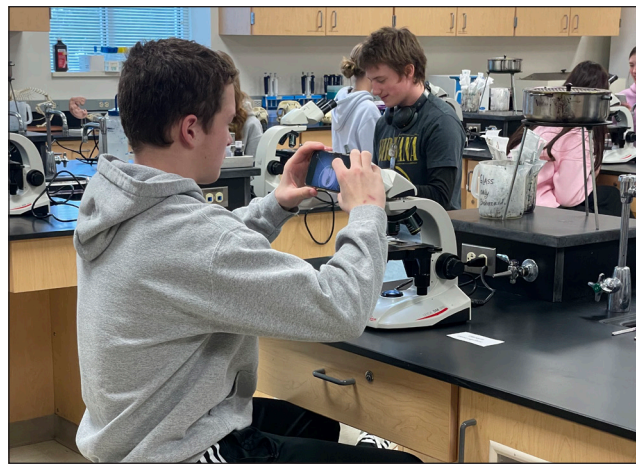

AN ORDINANCE OF THE HAMILTON COUNTY COUNCIL
ESTABLISHING A PROCESSING CHARGE FOR CERTAIN MINIMAL PROPERTY TAX LIABILITIES
 WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 6-1.1-22-9(g) provides that, notwithstanding any other law, a property tax liability of less than five dollars (\$5.00) is increased to five dollars (\$5.00), and that the difference between the actual liability and five dollars (\$5.00) is a statement processing charge that is considered part of the tax liability; and
 WHEREAS, the County Council is the fiscal body of Hamilton County and is authorized to adopt ordinances concerning the administration of county fiscal matters; and
 WHEREAS, the billing, mailing, collection, reconciliation, and accounting of property tax liabilities that are only a few dollars in amount impose administrative costs upon the County that exceed the revenue collected from such minimal liabilities; and
 WHEREAS, it is fiscally prudent and consistent with state law to apply the minimum five-dollar (\$5.00) amount authorized by Ind. Code § 6-1.1-22-9(g) in order to defray the administrative expense of issuing and processing property tax statements reflecting minimal liabilities;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF COUNTY, INDIANA, AS FOLLOWS:
 Section 1. Adoption of Minimum Liability and Processing Charge.
 Pursuant to Ind. Code § 6-1.1-22-9(g), any annual property tax liability for a parcel or taxpayer that is greater than zero dollars (\$0.00) but less than five dollars (\$5.00) shall be increased to five dollars (\$5.00).
 Section 2. Statement Processing Charge. The difference between the actual property tax liability and five dollars (\$5.00) shall constitute a statement processing charge. Consistent with IC 6-1.1-22-9(g), the statement processing charge is considered part of the property tax liability and shall be collected, enforced, and administered in the same manner as property taxes.
 Section 3. Zero or Negative Liability. If the net property tax liability for a parcel or taxpayer is zero dollars (\$0.00) or results in a credit or negative balance after application of deductions, credits, or adjustments, no statement processing charge shall be imposed.
 Section 4. Administration. The County Auditor and County Treasurer are authorized and directed at implementing this ordinance, including updating billing systems and tax statements to reflect the minimum five-dollar (\$5.00) liability where applicable.

Interest on the 2026 Bonds shall be calculated on the basis of twelve (12) thirty (30)-day months for a three hundred and sixty (360)-day year and shall be payable semiannually on January 15 and July 15 in each year, commencing July 15, 2027. care and follow-up.

“Love her,” Hannah said with a grin. “Ms. Maegan is pretty special to me. She’s always there for me.”

This year, after being nominated by Boehm, Hannah is honored as a Riley Champion, where she shares her story and spirit with the community to generate awareness about the Riley Children’s Foundation and hospital, and to help fundraise to provide lifesaving care.

Today, Hannah’s routine includes regular checkups every few months with Riley pediatric cardiologist Robert K. Darragh, MD, a physician Trinity describes in one word: “unbelievable.”

Outside the hospital walls, Hannah has embraced a full and active life. She plays sports, cheers on her sisters at their games and enjoys experimenting with makeup. The teddy bears she and her sisters received during hospital stays are kept in a special place at home - reminders of how far she has come.

The Ginther family also gives back to the place that cared for Hannah, donating Play-Doh to the Riley Cheer Guild - one of Hannah’s favorite activities during long hospital days.

Hannah’s journey is

especially meaningful during American Heart Month in February - a time dedicated to raising awareness about heart disease and congenital heart defects, which remain among the most common birth defects in the United States.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly 1 in 100 babies is born with a congenital heart defect. For children with severe conditions like HLHS, survival depends on advanced surgical care, lifelong monitoring and, in some cases, organ transplantation.

Tiptoeing Through Typo Turmoil

Let me start this week’s scribbles with a shoutout to three extremely talented individuals who put together an awful lot of the product you are currently reading.

Front and center is Jacob Hester. He’s our office manager and has been with us going on four years. Jacob does a yeoman’s worth of work and always has a can-do attitude.

Melissa Bernhardt is the senior member of the crew. She’s been here seven years (or will be when the calendar hits the first day of spring, March 20). And Texan Genny Lawson is the newcomer of the group.

They each do great work - Melissa and Genny paginate our pages. If you don’t know what that means, join the club. In the old days we ran all copy and images through a waxer and put them on stiff sheets the same size as the newspaper page. After the page was built, it went to the camera room where an image was created, turned into a negative, burned onto a metal plate, placed on a press and whisked to your front porch (or bushes, depending on the quality of the paper boy that day).

Pagination, best I can tell, is some sort of mystical spell that turns everything into electrons that come out on your computer screen (or junk mail, depending on the quality of the internet that day).

I share all this to tell you what great work these good folks do - and to let you know that if you see a mistake - a typo, a misspelling, a grammatical error, it’s very likely my fault, not theirs.

Back in the day, when we used to have actual copy desks, we had what we called rim and slot positions. The whole thing was a logistical puzzle - editing all the copy, deciding what was going on what pages (a small paper was six 12-page sections). At one paper I used to work at, our Sunday edition

was 10 sections, each averaging around 20 pages! Ah, those were the days.

And copy editors took their trade seriously. All copy got edited multiple times - by copy editors on the rim for spelling and grammar and factual accuracy - as well as section editors to make sure us lowly reporters didn’t completely miss the story (a young sportswriter named Tim once turned in a story on a football game that failed to mention the final score).

But we all got better (at least Dear God I hope I did). So forgive me for waxing a bit poetic about the old days and processes.

Hey, want to know a great trick we used to use to catch typos? Read your copy from right to left. You see, when we read left to right our brain puts the words in context, so it’s easy to miss something because we know what we meant to say. When we read right to left, the words make no sense and we are looking at each word on its own, not in context.

Us old newspaper dogs still know a trick or two!

I’ll share one last story on copy editing - back in the ‘80s I went to a copy editing seminar led by a giant in this business, Kenn Finkel. He had been an editor at the New York Times, Newsday, the Miami Herald, Dallas . . . all the big places. He was one of the last remaining true “wordsmiths” in our business. In his 2021 obituary, this was included: “. . . writers who worked closely with him remembered an editor who read their stories with great care, laboring over the smallest detail. Punctuation mattered. He was forever on the hunt for unneeded words.”

So there’s a room of about 30 of us and he gives us this 10-or-so page handout. It’s got a hundred numbered sentences, paragraphs, headlines, etc. Finkel tells us to assume the context is correct,

but that in each item, there is a mistake. Might be spelling, might be AP Style, might be factual, etc. Here’s an example:

“The two of them deserve each other. One’s born a liar, the other one was convicted,” Martin said.

The mistake was the quote is a famous quote and is incorrect. NY Yankees Manager Billy Martin was talking about Reggie Jackson and George Steinbrenner and said: “The two of them deserve each other. One’s a born liar, the other’s convicted.”

Finkel’s point was that if you are a sportswriter, it is your business to know the sports world THAT well!

Another example was this:

Despite living to an old age for horses, Native Dancer never won the Kentucky Derby.

The mistake is that the Derby is a race for 3-year-olds only, so a horse only has one shot at it. The context of that sentence made it seem like Native Dancer had multiple chances.

The deal was, we each had to stand up, read the next entry and tell what was wrong with it. I am looking at the room, counting the number of people in the row and figuring out which number would be mine. It was this:

“Our guys played hard,” the coach said. “They never gave up.”

I stared at those two sentences until I had sweat dripping from my forehead. Everything was spelled correctly. The grammar was correct. Coach was a lowercase C, which was right since it did not have a name connected. I could not find a single, solitary mistake.

When it got to my

turn, I stood up, read it aloud and said I was sorry, but I did not see anything wrong. Finkel exploded. “It’s drivin’,” he screamed. “Drivin’! If the coach doesn’t say anything better than that, don’t quote him.”

Most journalists would accept the point and sit down. Nope. Not me. I had to push back. I pointed out that I often heard quotes like that and that I could not control what a coach chooses to say or not say. I actually got on a bit of a roll, talking about how hard it is to interview a coach after they lose a game. What was it comedian Ron White said? I had the right to remain silent, but I did not have the ability.

Yup, that was me. Finkel stood at the front of the room, with this interested look on his face. I thought, Hey! I’m winning him over!

Silly me. I got all done and he said, and I quote: “You done?”

“Yes.”
“Did it ever occur to you to ask a better question? . . . Next!”

For the record, I don’t remember the second item I had to dissect, but I missed it too.

And that, dear friends, is why Jacob, Melissa and Genny put much of this together while I struggle to still get the questions right.
