A Major Historical Find?

From Time to Thyme

This month marks the 161st anniversary of the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln by John Wilkes Booth during the waning days of the Civil War.

The details of Lincoln's murder at Ford's Theater are pretty well known, but you may not be as clear on what became of Booth afterward.

After fleeing the theater, the actor rode south with one of his co-conspirators, David Herold. The two men made it as far as a tobacco farm near Port Royal, a small town in northern Virginia, before a detachment of Union soldiers caught up to them.

Herold surrendered and voluntarily left the barn in which he and Booth were hiding, but Booth refused to come out. The soldiers then set fire to the building to force him out.

Booth was shot while attempting to escape the blaze. He died on the porch of the farmhouse.

That's the official story, anyway.

In 1907, a lawyer, Finis L. Bates, published a book in which he claimed the man killed at the tobacco farm wasn't Booth. (An interesting aside — Bates was the grandfather of Academy Award-winning actress, Kathy Bates.)

Bates wrote that, while he was living in Texas in the 1870s, he'd been friendly with a man he knew as "John St. Helen." At one point during that time, St. Helen was stricken with what he believed was a fatal illness, so he made a deathbed confession to Bates that he was really Booth.

St. Helen didn't die, however. After he recovered, he told his story to Bates, revealing that the man who'd been shot in the barn had simply been carrying his papers.

Eventually, both Bates and St. Helen moved out of Texas and lost touch. Bates heard no more about St. Helen until 1903 when he was notified that St. Helen, or "David E. George," as he was known then, had committed suicide in Enid, Oklahoma Territory. (Oklahoma wasn't a state yet.)

By now you're probably wondering what the heck all this has to do with Hamilton County, Indiana.

In 1965, a story appeared in the Noblesville Daily Ledger that would seem to support the theory that Booth survived the inci-

1. An Illinois man implicated in the deaths of women in multiple states will remain on the hook for killing a Hoosier victim — an Indianapolis woman named Carma Purpura — thanks to the work of Attorney General Todd Rokita's appeals team. On March 12, the Indiana Court of Appeals affirmed the murder conviction of Bruce Mendenhall. "Monsters walk among us," Attorney General Rokita said. "It's the job of our criminal justice system to identify them, hold them accountable, and keep our communities safe. For the sake of Carma Purpura and all Hoosier victims, our team will continue doing its part on the appeals front." Rokita expressed particular gratitude to Deputy Attorney General Michelle Hawk Kazmierczak for her work on this case, as well as Criminal Appeals Section Chief Kelly Loy and Chief Counsel of Appeals Angela Sanchez.

2. According to a new study from our friends at Hormone health clinic, Feel30, Indiana is tied for seventh as having the highest rate of obesity in the U.S. West Virginia is first with Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama and Oklahoma ahead of Indiana. We are tied with Iowa. Feel30 analyzed data from the CDC to determine which states have the highest rates of obesity among adults. Lead Nurse Practitioner Anneliese Cadena said "According to the CDC, 39.2% of men and 41.3% in the US are obese. Many factors contribute to obesity, such as diet, lack of physical activity, socioeconomic factors, and genetics, to name a few. Obesity rates have increased over time, but we may see a slight decrease in the years to come due to the increased use of weight loss medications."

dent in the tobacco barn.

According to the Ledger, workmen remodeling the Hamilton County courthouse had recently discovered a stash of old papers in the walls of the courthouse tunnel.

The papers were set aside to be burned, but a member of the Hamilton County Historical Society who'd gone combing through the pile of trash to see if anything in it was worth saving, noticed a "neat bundle" tied with a ribbon and pulled it out.

That "neat bundle" turned out to be personal papers that appeared to belong to John Wilkes Booth. The most startling of these was a request for safe passage for the bearer through Indiana. It contained a notation from Westfield, Indiana, dated May 17, 1865.

Booth supposedly died April 26, 1865.

Nobody knew how that paperwork ended up in our courthouse. There was some speculation, however, that Booth might have considered settling here, on the assumption that

anyone on his trail would never look for him in such a strongly Union state.

Supposedly, the valuable documents were sent to Indiana University for safe-keeping and restoration, but I couldn't find any additional information about them.

So, what happened? If there was proof John Wilkes Booth had survived the incident in Virginia, let alone considered living in Indiana, that should have been big news.

Were the documents lost or destroyed somehow? Were they stolen by some nefarious person who sought to preserve Booth's secret?

OR, could it be that the Ledger story was published on APRIL 1? (Just like this column, she added with a grin.)

The information about Bates and his conspiracy theory is all true, though. Look him up.

NPD Targets Online Predators

During the week of March 23-27, 2026, the Noblesville Police Department carried out a targeted online predator investigation designed to identify and apprehend individuals seeking to exploit minors.

Throughout the week, specially trained detectives posed as juveniles between the age of 13-15, and living in Noblesville, in online applications and websites. During this time, numerous individuals communicated with our detectives even after being informed repeatedly that they were interacting with someone underage.

This week's investigation culminated with an operation Friday whereby two individuals were arrested after allegedly arranging meetings, and their actions demonstrated intent to engage in unlawful sexual activity with the perceived minor.

"The efforts during this investigation by the Noblesville Police Department, along with vital assistance of the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office, are a clear indication that we are actively pursuing those who attempt to lure and prey on children," Chief Brad Arnold said. "Let this be a warning that we will be relentless in identifying and arresting child predators so that they cannot harm those that are most vulnerable."

As a result, two Hamilton County men were arrested and transported to the Hamilton County Jail. Tyler A. Marcum, 26 and of Noblesville, was charged with Child Solicitation, a Level 4 Felony, and Sexu-

al Misconduct with a Minor (attempted), a Level 5 Felony. Gregory A. Carter, a 40-year-old from Carmel was charged with Child Solicitation, a Level 4 Felony, Sexual Misconduct with a Minor (attempted), a Level 5 Felony and three

counts of Neglect of a Dependent, a Level 6 Felony.

Noblesville Police remind that a charge is merely an accusation, and the defendants are presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty.

NFD Battles House Blaze

Last Friday morning, the Noblesville Fire Department battled a house fire in the 15000 block of Winning Colors Drive. Crews arrived to a working fire and immediately deployed multiple hose lines into the residence and were able to bring the fire under control quickly. The fire was declared under control a short time later. The resident was home at the time of the incident and became aware of the fire after smelling smoke. He was able to safely exit the residence and contact Hamilton County Public Safety Communications via 911. There were no reported injuries to civilians or pets. Fire investigators remain on scene, and the cause of the fire has not yet been released. NFD was assisted on scene by the Fishers Fire Department and the Noblesville Police Department.

"It's exciting to see this building begin a new chapter as the district's newest elementary school," said Andy Hilton, Principal of Cool Creek Elementary. "The updates, including the newly completed media center and this soon-to-be renovated playground, are creating welcoming spaces where our students will learn, grow, and thrive for years to come."

The project also includes improved traffic flow and dedicated drop-off and pick-up zones to reduce congestion and enhance safety for families.

"These improvements reflect our commitment to strategically prepare our schools to serve students well into the future," Superintendent Dr. John Atha said. "This updated space will soon be transformed into the perfect place for young learners to begin their journey toward becoming Life Ready."

Upon completion, Cool Creek Elementary will become the district's eighth K-5 school.

Baldwin Encourages People to Attend Listening Session

State Sen. Scott Baldwin (R-Noblesville) encourages residents of Senate District 20 to attend one of 10 state-wide listening sessions hosted by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission to share the impacts of energy prices.

Locally, a listening session will be held from 6 to 8 p.m. on Thursday, April 9, in the Council Chambers at Noblesville City Hall, 16 S 10th St., Noblesville.

"It is crucial to hear from Hoosiers facing rising utility costs, and I am glad to see the IURC taking steps to get public input," Baldwin said. "Listening sessions like these are a great way to share your concerns,

and I would encourage anyone interested in attending the event to go."

During the 2026 legislative session, Baldwin supported House Enrolled Act 1002, which overhauls Indiana's ratemaking process for electric utilities to promote affordability, predictable monthly bills and reliable service. The legislation switches Indiana to a performance-based ratemaking model, requiring utility companies to meet certain affordability and reliability goals in order to collect their full return on investment.

Baldwin encourages constituents to contact him with any questions or comments they may have.

This morning I went to a Lenten breakfast. It was the last in a series of four very early Saturday morning meals and lessons. My goal was to attend all four occasions this year. Mission accomplished! But God had much more in mind for me today in the form of a real life, day-long parable!

The speaker at breakfast talked about his journey along the way of becoming a clergyman. He described his aspirations and likeness to "Superman" and "Spiderman" and "Clergyman"! Through his journey he learned that it wasn't about what he did, but about what Jesus did...and that names really didn't matter that much except the sweet and holy name of Jesus.

As in the previous meals, I ate entirely too much, but the fellowship and the speaker were warm and welcoming. Now ... onto goal # 2 for the day.

Next stop, I drove to another church to help with an Easter scavenger hunt. The children at my assigned "station" were greeted by three jars of jellybeans and were challenged to guess the amounts in each jar to win the yummy beans.

There were other adults helping the children fill out the contest entry slips, so I decided to hand out Easter stickers as the parents and children exited the area.

One small boy (about 4 years old?) approached me with a gleeful, mischievous gleam in his eyes and looked me square in the face and asked, "Do you know my name?"

Thinking he was challenging me to a guessing game, I told him, "No but do you know mine?" Immediately, he looked at me and said, "Yes! You're Pastor Bonnie!" He wasn't teasing at all! He really knew my name!

Now instead of feeling proud of my very own title, I felt ashamed. I should have known his name, but I did not. I believe he is one of the 100+ children I see for a few minutes each month to teach Bible stories in the local Preschool.

As the family left for the next scavenger

hunt station, deep guilt surrounded my heart as this sweet child departed gleefully with his little Easter stickers.

Yet, even as I write this piece, I feel so terrible and filled with tears. "Pastor Bonnie" should have known better. I feel I let him down or disappointed his little spirit regardless of the happy smile on his face. I prayed for this young boy and asked God for forgiveness. (God never forgets a name!)

I felt I might have scarred him for life, like some stories I have heard from younger generation — you know, the ones about the "bad experiences" they had at church. This was an awful reason to never return to worship God in community. I want no part in that — ever!

The title "Pastor onnie" suddenly carried no esteem or pride at all; this "likeable" "clergyman" title that I experienced an hour before at the Lenten breakfast was now despised in my heart.

Considering it all and through my guilty tears, God shared his wisdom and divine preparation with me. Ask, seek and knock. He delivers.

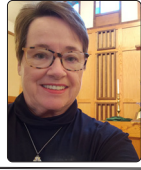
Next time someone asks me if I know their name and I do not, I will quickly and joyfully respond, "Yes! You are my friend!" Then ask them to kindly remind me of their name if appropriate to do so. I will try to do better at "Do No Harm" and avoid saying "No" because no adult or child ever wants to be invisible, seem unimportant or unknown. Our Father would never support that. Nor shall I.

Task # 3 for the day was to enjoy a trip with my youngest granddaughter to an Easter Concert with a full orchestra, over 150+ beautiful voices and a children's choir. I was invited by a friend, and through texting, I became acquainted with the music director a few days before.

I explained that every year I try to find an uplifting, positive event to celebrate the life of my twin sister, Brenda, who died at sunrise on Easter morning many years before. (I miss her dearly, even 30 years later...just picking up the phone to connect with her about anything and everything at all! Broken connections can feel so painfully devastating!) Seeking life-giving events are very important to me, especially around Eastertime.

This concert and choir event surely did not disappoint. In fact, it was especially anointed! The songs, the voices and music, the videos and pictures all told the daily story

of Holy Week from Palm Sunday to Easter Day. From cruelty and death to the resurrection of Jesus and the promise it holds for each of us in all eternity.
