From Time to Thyme

I've had the phrase, "spring cleaning," rattling around in my head ever since I mentioned it in a column a couple of weeks ago.

Our attitudes toward that practice sure have changed over the years.

These days we tend to take a rather casual approach to spring cleaning. Thanks to devices like power mops and vacuum cleaners, and the availability of entire aisles of cleaning products in local stores, there's really no need to wait for spring to clean our homes. We can do that pretty much year-round.

In the years prior to World War II, however, spring cleaning was just that. It was a Big Deal (or maybe a Big Ordeal, if you were the person tasked with it) that people suffered through annually at the end of winter.

Homes had to be cleaned from top to bottom then by necessity. Buildings heated by coal, wood or oil that had been sealed up all winter were covered in soot and ash by the time spring arrived. All that dirt and grime had to be removed.

Warm weather helped by allowing windows to be opened so that fresh air and sunlight could come in, and dust and stale air could flow out.

All this was, of course, considered women's work. In 1909, the Hamilton County Ledger described spring cleaning as "the time that the head of the house crawls into his hole and the madam becomes IT."

The article goes on to paint a picture of the (ahem) poor, suffering husband who comes home to "alleged meals" during this frenzy of cleanliness. It warned that, if a man wasn't careful, he might slide on a "husk of soap on the front step" and go tumbling, or grab a seat at the kitchen table, only to find himself sitting in a pan of warm soap suds.

(Hmm. Maybe he could have avoided those hazards by pitching in to help?)

Timely housecleaning hints often appeared in the newspapers. The following examples are from the April 30, 1937 Sheridan News:

A little bit of kerosene and water, "rubbed on with a cloth half wrung," then dried with newspaper

Branna Takes Wrong Kind of Trip

What's black and blue and hurts all over? Well, that would be my face, neck, shoulder and left wrist! It may be spring break, but my trip wasn't to the Bahamas. It was to the ER.

Yes, late Saturday night, I became a statistic. Falls are a leading cause of injury-related death and hospitalization, particularly among older adults - like me. It may not have been on my bucket list, but I got my first black eye at age 67. Even Sephora couldn't conceal this shiner!

For individuals aged 65 and older, more than 1 in 4 report falling each year, with the risk of falling and related injuries increasing significantly with age.

About 1 in 5 falls results in a serious injury, such as a broken bone or a head injury, and causes more than 95 percent of hip fractures. Finally, taking a tumble is the most common cause of traumatic brain injuries.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, even if not

injured, many people who fall develop a fear of falling again, which can lead to reduced physical activity and loss of independence.

Falls often result from a combination of hidden risk factors. Physical factors including muscle weakness, poor balance and gait problems serve as common causes. Such sensory issues as vision problems, particularly involving cataracts or glaucoma, can increase fall risk. Then there's the issue of medications. Side effects from certain medicines, particularly sedatives or blood pressure drugs, can cause dizziness or confusion.

If you haven't already, it's time to take a look at your designated dwelling as well. (This was MY downfall!) Your home environment may need a "safety sweep." While I don't plan to remove the antique dresser that my face met with before I hit the floor, I may need to consider ousting the area rug next to it. All too often, unsafe home conditions, including cluttered floors,

poor lighting and those pesky loose rugs, can result in a worse flight than American Airlines.

With our unfailing age advancement, we often encounter chronic medical conditions like arthritis, diabetes and heart disease. These, too, can elevate our risk for an ambulance ride.

Note to self and my friendly followers of all ages - falls are no fun and can seriously impede our life adventures. So secure your surroundings, heed any health concerns and cater to more careful practices. Destination Hawaii ANY DAY over the hospital!

1. We Hoosiers love our food, and when we want it fast Mickey D's is the place we search for the most. At least that's what a study by Restaurant. eatapp.co found when they analyzed the most searched-for fast-food restaurants. While McDonald's holds the top spot, Indiana's love of pizza shines through with Pizza Hut and Papa John's following closely behind. Nationally, McDonald's also ranked first, but second and third were held down by Domino's and Chick-fil-A. Starbuck's finished fourth in the U.S.

2. Did you know that Fort Wayne has one of the most historic housing markets in the U.S.? That's what a new study from residential protection plan experts at ProGuard <https://proguardplans.com> found. They analyzed Zillow sale listings for the 100 most populated cities in the U.S. by filtering the search criteria to include only properties constructed over a century ago. The study aimed to identify the cities with the highest concentration of historic homes for sale. Fort Wayne ranked ninth with 39.3 percent of listed properties being over a century old. Indianapolis ranked 23rd with 17.6 percent. Predictably, the east coast led the way with Baltimore first. St. Louis was a surprising second and Cleveland was third.

Heights Junior Files Provisional U.S. Patent for AI-Driven Tool

An extraordinary team effort from Hamilton Heights administrators, educators, and legal partners created the opportunity for Hamilton Heights High School student Alexander Weiland to successfully file a provisional U.S. patent on Friday, March 6, for an innovative engineering tool he developed as part of a classroom project.

The patent filing marks a significant milestone for Weiland, whose work began in the high school's engineering classroom taught by Dave Post. Students were challenged to identify a real-world problem, design and test a solution, refine it through iterative development, and build a business case around their idea. Weiland asked to pursue a concept he had been thinking about long before the assignment — and with teacher support, he was encouraged to bring that passion into the classroom.

What followed was a remarkable display of student initiative, technical skill, and perseverance. Weiland wrote extensive lines of code, built detailed part-file libraries, and conducted deep research to bring his idea to life. His final product, the TraceAI Reverse Engineering Analysis Tool, uses artificial intelligence to dramatically reduce the time and cost associated with reverse-engineering printed circuit boards (PCBs).

The Problem: Reverse-engineering a PCB typically requires 20–40 hours of manual tracing by engineers. The process is slow, expensive, and requires specialized tools.

The Solution: TraceAI analyzes a photo of any PCB and automatically generates a schematic, component list, and netlist in minutes. Us-

ers simply upload an image, no specialized hardware required, and the tool provides the design information needed to reproduce the PCB.

"My provisional patent is for an AI system that can reverse engineer PCBs from photos," explained Alexander Weiland of the innovation behind his patent. "You take a picture of a circuit board and the software automatically figures out what components are on it, traces all the connections, and delivers a full schematic. The main inventions are a pipeline that combines multiple AI models for better accuracy, and an engine that reconstructs the actual circuit logic just from the image."

Weiland's TraceAI web application project was entered in the STARTedUP statewide entrepreneurship competition, where his project has now advanced to the Region 2 Finals at Purdue University on April 16.

The rapid turnaround from idea to provisional patent was made possible through swift collaboration. The initial outreach to legal counsel occurred on February 24, and

within two weeks, barriers were removed and the path cleared for Weiland to file.

Weiland, who is already looking ahead said, "I want to turn my patent and idea into a technology startup. The goal is to make an integrated tool that hobbyists, engineers, and companies can use when they've lost documentation, want to understand how a product works, or analyze a competitor's product. I'm building out the AI training pipeline now and getting feedback from engineers. I will continue developing and improving upon my idea and hopefully it becomes a real product people can use in the next year or two."

Reflecting on the classroom experience that sparked this achievement, he shared, "This was always something I wondered if I could pull it off, so getting it working was really fun. I like working on stuff that's challenging, and doing it during school time is even better. My engineering teacher gave me lots of good feedback, and I did most of the coding outside of school, which honestly gave me more freedom

to experiment."

For Weiland, the biggest thing he took away is that you don't have to wait until everything is perfect to start. "The patent process made me think about what sets my idea apart, and going through that actually refined the idea itself. Building something real from an idea that you have is a great experience, and I'd recommend it to anyone."

"I want to say a huge thank you to the patent attorneys, Todd Coffeen and Joel Tragesser, for their expertise," he added. "I also want to thank my engineering teacher, David Post, and the Hamilton Heights Administration for supporting my patent efforts and giving me the space to pursue this."

Hamilton Heights celebrates Alexander's achievement and extends gratitude to the administrators, educators, and legal partners whose support made this milestone possible. This accomplishment reflects the power of student-centered learning and the extraordinary potential unlocked when passion meets opportunity.

and polished with a soft cloth would clean windows.

Grease could be removed from wallpaper with a piece of blotting paper and a hot iron.

White spots on furniture could be erased by "wetting a piece of flannel with turpentine and rubbing the spot hard."

(I'm not vouching for the effectiveness, or safety, of any of those tips!)

Spring cleaning wasn't confined to individual homes, though. Entire communities considered it a matter of public

health and safety, and civic pride.

In 1916, Noblesville's mayor, Dr. E. C. Loehr issued a proclamation designating April 24th to April 29th "THE CLEAN UP AND PAINT UP WEEK."

During "Clean Up and Paint Up Week" residents were asked to clean up their homes AND yards to minimize the risk of fires, to paint whatever needed painting, to destroy places where mosquitoes and flies could breed, and to get rid of weeds.

They were also

requested to clean up any vacant lots in their neighborhood. ("Nothing gives a stranger a better impression of our City than well kept lawns, beautiful flowers, clean alleys and streets.")

The mayor's proclamation ends:

"Little beds of flowers,

Little cans of paint
Make homes attractive

Out of them that ain't."

Poor English, but a worthy sentiment.

Note: The Blatchley Nature Study Club is holding free wildflow-

er walks at the club sanctuary again this year. The first walk will be this Saturday, April 11 from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The second, to catch later-blooming wildflowers, is April 25, also from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The sanctuary is on Boulder Drive, on the north side of White River, a little west of Potter's Bridge.

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Campaign On to Make Roads Safer

Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership is partnering with the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute to increase patrols aimed at reducing speeding and distracted driving on Indiana roadways.

As part of the Comprehensive Highway Injury Reduction Program, an ICJI initiative that provides federal funding for local traffic safety enforcement, officers will work overtime through April 13 to identify and stop drivers who are speeding or violating Indiana's Hands-Free Law.

"Distracted driving and speeding are preventable behaviors that put drivers, passengers, and pedestrians at risk," said Douglas Huntsinger, executive director of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute. "This campaign is a reminder that these actions have real consequences, and law enforcement officers are actively working to keep Indiana's roads safe."

According to the National Highway Traffic

Safety Administration, Indiana recorded 249 speeding-related fatalities in 2023, and distracted driving accounted for 47 fatal incidents. However, limitations in data collection suggest that the actual number of deadly crashes caused by distracted drivers is likely higher than reported.

"Distracted driving and speeding continue to be contributors to serious and deadly crashes," said Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush. "These actions put everyone on the road at risk. Our deputies will be increasing enforcement efforts and will issue citations to those observed violating

these laws." Indiana's Hands-Free Law, which took effect in 2020, prohibits drivers from holding mobile devices while operating a motor vehicle. Calls may only be made using hands-free technology, such as Bluetooth, headset, or any other hands-free technology.

To help prevent dangerous driving behaviors, ICJI and law enforcement encourage motorists to:

- Put the phone down and avoid multitasking while driving
- Obey posted speed limits and adjust speed for road conditions
- Allow extra travel time, especially during busy commute periods
- Keep a safe distance

between vehicles
