Caring For Hamilton County's Pioneer Cemeteries

This Memorial Day weekend, Hamilton County's larger cemeteries will undoubtedly be filled with people observing the holiday by laying flowers and mementoes on the graves of soldiers who've paid the ultimate price for maintaining our freedom.

Those aren't the only cemeteries where veterans of our country's wars have been laid to rest, though.

This county is dotted with a number of small pioneer cemeteries where the graves of veterans of the Civil War, the War of 1812 and even the American Revolution can be found.

Did you ever wonder who takes care of those less visited graveyards?

That would be the Hamilton County Cemetery Commission.

The HCCC dates back to 1975, when the Indiana State Legislature authorized the creation of county cemetery commissions for the purpose of identifying, restoring and maintaining historic, and often neglected, cemeteries established before 1850.

That year Noblesville attorney Joseph G. Roberts and Joe Burgess, the future Hamilton County Historian, appeared before the Hamilton County Commissioners to request that such a commission be created for this county.

■ THREE THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1. The Indiana Department of Natural Resources seeks volunteers for its annual Fishin' Pond at the Indiana State Fair, which runs Aug. 7-23 at the Indiana State Fairgrounds in Indianapolis. The Fishin' Pond is a popular, immersive, and free fishing experience for ages 5-17. Volunteers handle various duties including registering participants, baiting hooks, removing fish from the hook, preparing fishing equipment for use, and guiding participants around the pond. Volunteer training will be provided by DNR staff before the event. Learn more and register as a volunteer at on.IN.gov/fishing-pond. Volunteers receive a free parking pass, State Fair entry for the days worked, and a DNR Fishin' Pond volunteer T-shirt.

2. The Indiana State Comptroller's Office announced this week the launch of a new Federal Funding Expenditures Dashboard on the Indiana Transparency Portal that shows Hoosiers exactly where federal dollars come from and how they were used — broken down by federal department, expenditure category, account and state agency. "Federal grants made up 42 percent of Indiana's general revenue for fiscal year 2025 — a total of \$22.6 billion. This dashboard gives every Hoosier — from citizens to state legislators, media and federal partners — the clearest view yet of how those dollars move through Indiana government," said Comptroller Elise Nieshalla. "The historical data included further enables spotting trends and flagging where extra review is needed, and it's a meaningful assist to agency partners working to root out any fraud, waste or abuse that may be lurking. This is an additional tool for building and preserving public trust." The dashboard is Indiana's first public-facing, navigable tool dedicated to tracking federal expenditures and offers the ability to see trends by providing six years of historical data. Designed to complement USASpending.gov — which reports federal award amounts — this dashboard shows what Indiana agencies have spent, pulling directly from the State's financial system. It is modeled after the existing Total State Expenditures Dashboard on the ITP and is available at in.gov/itp/finances/Federal-Funding-Expenditures-Dashboard/.

3. During Indiana Small Business Month, Governor Mike Braun is recognizing companies working with Power Up Indiana, the state's program that supports those who invest in upskilling their workforce. Across Indiana, small businesses are doing more than filling open positions; they are building pathways for workers to grow. Through efforts like Power Up Indiana, employers are investing in training that improves retention, supports business growth and helps Hoosiers move into higher-skilled, higher-wage roles.

Fishers Survey Highlights Strong Resident Satisfaction

Results from the City of Fishers' 2026 Community Survey show strong resident confidence in the city's direction and quality of life. Nearly 3,000 residents participated in the survey, with 94 percent rating Fishers positively as a place to live and 99% reporting a positive overall quality of life experience.

More than 9 in 10 residents report feeling safe in Fishers, including 93% who feel safe in their neighborhoods at night. City services continue to earn strong marks, with 89% positive ratings for customer service, and Hamilton Southeastern Schools remain a cornerstone of the community, with 96% of residents rating the quality of K-12 education positively.

"As Fishers continues to be a national model for innovation and quality of life, these results show strong alignment between residents and City leadership which will allow us to continue to be on the leading edge of communities," added Fishers City Council President John DeLucia.

Beyond strong performance in core services, the survey results reflect a connected and engaged community. More than 9 in 10 residents report a strong sense of pride and belonging, with many participating in local events, volunteer opportunities, and civic

activities. Residents also highlighted neighborhood quality and community design as important contributors to overall satisfaction.

"Our employees are passionate about serving residents, and these results reflect their hard work and commitment every day," said Fadness. "It's especially meaningful to hear directly from residents that their dedication is building trust and delivering results."

Fishers Celebrate\$ by Awarding \$90K

As the school year comes to an end, Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness visited local classrooms to award over \$88,500 in funding as part of the City of Fishers’ Educator Innovation Grant program.

Launched in 2024, the program strives to empower educators within HSE Schools with the financial resources to bring innovation to the classroom and inspire students to rethink learning. Since its inception, the City has awarded 28 grants totaling \$473,093 to support classroom innovation. Grants have been awarded at every grade level across the district, helping to launch innovative makerspaces; supporting programming in STEM, virtual reality, film, media, and English as a New Language (ENL); and funding professional development opportunities for teachers.

The new round of grant recipients focuses on expanding technology at both local high schools, with recipients including:

Jeffrey Fronius (Fishers High School, Engineering Department): \$13,900 to purchase a laser cutter to expand student learning in engineering and robotics. By bringing this tool into the classroom, students will be able

to fabricate and design onsite, instead of leaving the school to gain hands-on experience. Along with integration into engineering courses within the Project Lead the Way curriculum, this tool will also help to grow the skills of the FRC #5010 Tiger Dynasty Robotics Team, which earned finalist honors and secured the FIRST Engineering Inspiration Award at a statewide competition this spring.

Braden Tribolet & Adam Good (Fishers High School, Media & Marketing Department): \$59,854 to modernize equipment within the school’s growing media program. Through integrating modern tools like drones, podcasting equipment, professional-grade cameras and stabilization equipment, students will explore emerging media formats that are shaping today’s media landscape to build competitive portfolios that mirror collegiate and industry expectations.

Lisa Brown (Fishers High School, Photography & Yearbook): \$12,933 to purchase two professional-grade cameras to capture content for yearbook, the student-run newspaper, social media channels, and district-wide art shows. By providing enhanced access to pro-

fessional-grade equipment, students can capture high-quality images in challenging and dynamic environments like sporting events and performing arts productions and prepare for future careers in visual arts and media.

Risa Petty (Hamilton Southeastern High School): \$1,820 to create a switch-accessible Office & Garden Work Zone for HSE’s Special Education Department to build vocational independence, work habits, and community transferable skills. By using switch-activated tools that replicate real-world office and garden routines, students with limited motor control can perform the same tasks as their peers and their experience for future careers.

Grants are awarded by a selection committee comprised of former educators from HSE Schools, community entrepreneurs, and HSE alumni. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis, and there is no funding cap for project requests. The next round of grants will be awarded in fall 2026.

advancing campus engagement and workforce readiness by sponsoring several major initiatives, including Ivy Tech Hamilton County’s inaugural State of the Campus event in October 2025 and Ivy Tech Day 2025, a 24-hour giving event dedicated to advancing student success, scholarships, and community impact across the college. These events highlighted the col-

lege’s growing impact in the region and strengthened connections between students, employers, and community partners.

Roberts, whom the Noblesville Daily Ledger observed had been "active in historical affairs for a number of years," stated that he was aware of several small graveyards that had already been lost to farming, land development or vandals. He wanted to save those that still existed.

Roberts and Burgess proposed the establishment of a five-member board that would be responsible for providing the upkeep for the early graveyards.

A couple of months later, the county commissioners officially created the Hamilton County Cemetery Commission to supervise the maintenance of pre-1850 cemeteries not currently under the care of other people or groups.

Joe Burgess was the perfect person to head the HCCC. As chairman of the county's Civil War Centennial Committee in the 1960s, he'd already collected an enormous amount of information on the burial sites of hundreds of this county's Civil War veterans.

(You can find that information and much more in his book, "Hamilton County and the

Civil War.")

Burgess went on to serve as chairman of the HCCC for 30 years, retiring from the position in 2006. During that time he became THE source for information about Hamilton County's old abandoned cemeteries. Sometimes he even discovered lost graveyards himself.

A 2006 Noblesville Daily Ledger article described how he'd uncovered a cemetery that dated back to the 1820s in a Wayne Township farmer's field, using a pole to locate markers that had sunk into the ground. The cemetery contained 15 graves belonging to the pioneer Finch family.

Currently, there are 117 known cemeteries in this county. Around 30 of them are owned by the county itself.

In accordance with the 1975 law, the HCCC works with the township trustees to see that all of this county's inactive pre-1850 cemeteries are kept in good condition, either by the trustees, the HCCC, or by the person or organization that owns the property. (The HCCC also assists the trustees in caring for some cemeteries created prior to 1870.)

The five members of the HCCC are volunteers who serve staggered five-year terms, with one appointment being made each year by the County Board of Commissioners, usually based upon recommendations from current Cemetery Commission members.

The money for all that mowing, signage, stone resetting, tree cutting, access maintenance, fence reconstruction and other necessities comes out of the County Board of Commissioners' budget.

I can personally vouch for the good work of the HCCC. A few years ago when I was doing

research for "A Brief History of Noblesville," Lisa Hayner and I visited each of the Noblesville Township cemeteries. They were all clearly marked and well maintained, whether they were on a main thoroughfare, or half hidden in a farmer's field.

Thanks to current HCCC board member, Nancy Massey, for her information and research.

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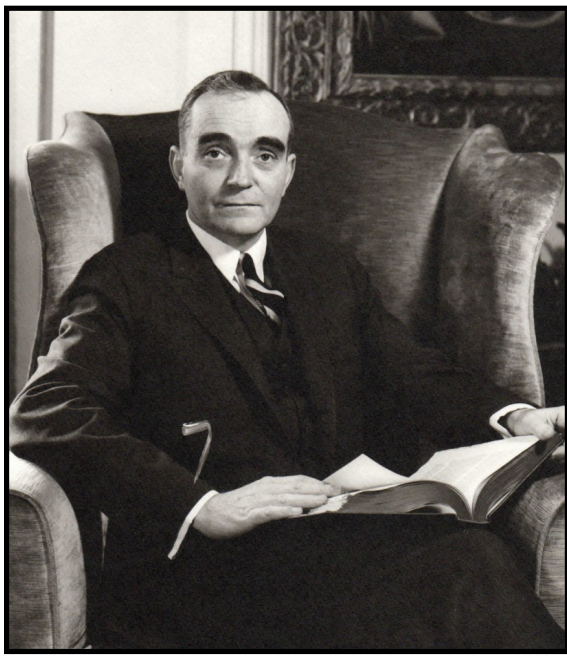
